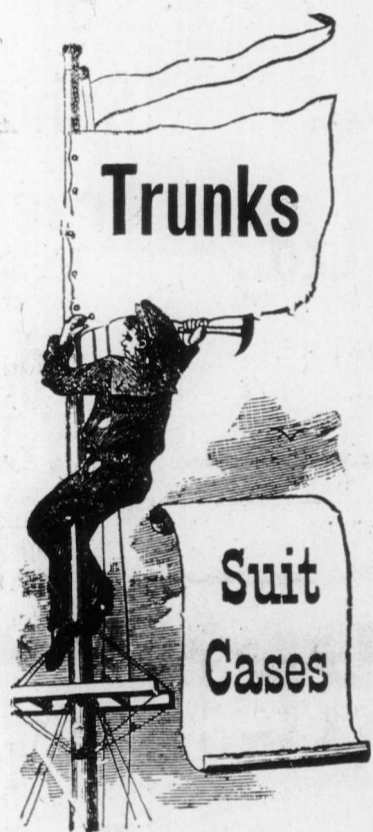

LOCAL & OTHER ITEMS

Rose K. paced a mile in 2:03 1/2 on the Columbus, Ohio, race track on Monday. Lieut. Governor Fraser of Nova Scotia died at Guysboro yesterday morning. He had been ill for some time.

At the regular meeting of the cheese board on Friday last, the prices for cheese sold will cents. At a place called the 'Devil's Brook' near Chatham, N. B., valuable copper deposits are said to have been found.

In a running race of 130 yards in England the other day, Estman a St. John N. B., colored man, beat his opponent Taylor by one foot.

A motor launch, 26 feet long built by Thornycroft London, attained a speed of 31 miles, unprecedented for a vessel of her size.

At the final hearing in the Crippen inquest in London on Monday, the jury returned a verdict of wilful murder against Dr. Crippen.

On Monday, telegraphic communication between Winnipeg and the Pacific coast was interrupted in consequence of a wreck in Fraser Canyon.

A C. P. R. brakeman, was charged at Regina the other day with attempting to chloroform a lady passenger on an east bound train. He was committed to stand trial.

Three persons were killed and two seriously injured at Gloucester N. J. Sunday, when an electric train on the West Jersey railway track struck an automobile.

Robert Leach, keeper of a restaurant at Niagara Falls, Ont. went through the whirlpool rapids Sunday in a barrel of his own construction starting from the American side.

Mrs. G. M. Hayman, one of Sir Charles Dickens, close personal friends died recently at South Sea, England aged 81 years. She was claimed by her family to have been the original of 'Little Dorrit.'

A Winnipeg despatch of yesterday's date says: The first killing frost of the season occurred last night extending throughout Manitoba and Saskatchewan. Five degrees of frost were recorded at many points. Harvesting operations, however, are about completed, and little damage can result.

James L. Whitney, for more than forty years connected with the Boston public library, and from 1899 to 1908 librarian, died of a cerebral stroke, at his home in Cambridge, Sunday. He was 75 years of age and a brother Henry M. Whitney, the prominent Boston financier.

Mrs. John Soos, and her three children, a boy aged seven and two girls aged 7 months and three years, were crowded at a small town about twelve miles from Westchester, Pa. The police are making separate efforts to locate a recent boarder with the family who is missing.

For the larceny of \$3,200 from the Bank, known as the Union Institution for Savings in Boston, of which he was receiving teller, John H. Cullen was sentenced in the Superior Criminal Court, by Judge Donaghey, to a term of from four to eight years in the State Prison.

Word comes from Havana that 45 divers have begun work on the wreck of the United States battleship Maine. Several bodies have been found in the cabin. The hull lies in mud six feet deep. The strictest secrecy is maintained by the Government Commissioner about all matters in connection with the affair.

Springhill, N.S., had some excitement the other night with one of the strikers by the name of Coon, who threw down his arms and applied for work and was at once given employment. After nightfall a band of men surrounded his house and shouted out threatening expressions at the inmates. Several shots were also fired in the vicinity.

Aviator Pollot was killed at Charlevoix Sunday while making a flight with a passenger. The latter escaped with little injury. The machine had reached a height of 80 feet when a piece of canvas ripped out from the wing of the aeroplane, which then fell backwards turning completely over, and burying the two men under the wreckage.

The present conditions governing the winter herring fishery in the Bay of Islands, Newfoundland will probably remain unchanged during the coming winter. Pending the appointment of an International Commission, as authorized under the decision of the Hague Tribunal, to determine the fairness of the local fishery regulations made by the Newfoundland government, the Colonial government will not attempt to subject American fishermen to any additional regulations. So say advices from St. John's.

American apples tempt the English buyer. In proof of this statement, Albert W. Swain, American agent at Southampton, reports that a shipment of apples from the State of Washington commanded a higher price than any other American apples ever offered in the open English market, much of the shipment being sold at from 8 to 12 cents a pound, and eagerly taken at that price. The secret of success, he says, is for the American shipper to send good fruit, well packed, and kept out of an auction where a combination may control prices.

Willard Price, Robert Hicks and Robert Heath are in jail at Dalhousie, N. B. charged with forgery and theft from the Dalhousie Co. The stolen articles were found under the floors of the cells of the prison after the men had been there for some time. Fifteen are now dead as the result of a trolley car collision at Haverhill, Mass Saturday night, thirteen having met instant death in the wreck and two others succumbing to injuries later. Three others are now in the hospital and will probably die while six more are slightly injured.

LOCAL and OTHER ITEMS.

The Provincial Teachers Association held its annual meeting in this city during the days of the Exhibition, last week. At Columbus, Ohio, on the 21st., 'Independence Boy' paced a mile in 2:04 1/2 the fastest time made for the Grand Circuit racing.

The Prince of Wales, it is stated from London, will probably tour the world next autumn, visiting the principal British Dominions.

It is reported from Ottawa that J. Moore Bowell, son of Sir Mackenzie Bowell, has been suspended as local controller of Chinese on the Pacific Coast.

The Grand Trunk Railway has issued stringent orders for retrenchment at all its shops, and hereafter the men will be laid off one day a week until further orders.

Rev. Father Roach of the Canadian Catholic Church Extension Society, a native of Iowa in this Province, preached an able sermon in St. Dunstan's Cathedral on Sunday last. His theme was the history object and operations of this Society.

During target practice of the U. S. Atlantic fleet off the Virginia Capes Friday one of the big twelve inch ton guns of the battleship Georgia burst on the first range shot. The muzzle as far back as the forward of the jacket was blown off. The crew marvelously escaped injury.

There was a rather sensational shooting affair on the street at Hopewell, N. B. when Howard Tingley, son of A. W. Tingley was shot and badly injured by Pierce Benjamin. The assailant had a revolver and discharged a number of shots on the street before young Tingley arrived on the scene.

A dozen persons lost their lives and eleven others were injured in a wreck of the Rock Island passenger train to Denver from Kansas City. The wreck was the result of a cloud burst which carried away a steel bridge and turned the trolley bed of the river into a torrent many yards wide. The water washed out nearly a thousand feet of track.

The Vancouver, of the Dominion line, has been sold for \$18,000 to be broken up, and one more veteran of the St. Lawrence is removed. The Vancouver before the advent of the big passenger liners was one of the largest and best known boats coming on the regular run for several seasons and visited Montreal for the last time in 1908.

Clarence D. Hillier, chief clerk of the Chicago Rock Island & Pacific Railroad, was shot and killed early on the 22nd, by a negro burglar, whom he found ransacking the Hillier home. The murder was witnessed by the victim's wife, and two daughters, who were aroused when Hillier met the intruder at the stairs. The men fought for several minutes, finally rolling to the foot of the stairs.

Abbie Wood, of Montreal lowered the colors of Fred Cameron at Amherst Saturday. The race was closely contested throughout the whole ten miles and the cheer of his supporters encouraged the local boy to do his best. Wood's greater experience stood him in good stead and he defeated the Boston Marathon winner by about thirty feet. Time 55 min, 42 sec.

402 persons were killed and 7 were seriously injured in a head on collision between two interurban cars on the Wabash Valley Line near Fort Wayne, Indiana. The wreck occurred seven miles north of Elletts on a steep curve. The cars in collision were the northbound local car crowded to the steps and the southbound 'Extra' from Fort Wayne. They met while both were running at a high speed.

Efforts to expand the trade relations between Australia and Canada are engaging the close attention of Mr. W. H. Ross the Canadian Ambassador and trade commissioner for Victoria, South Australia and Tasmania. Mr. Ross has been interviewing the Minister of Customs with the object of inducing him to appoint an Australian to be stationed at Vancouver, whose business it would be to develop commerce generally between the two countries.
