Hou. F. D. Monk, K. C. M. F who had been ill for some tim died at his residence in Montrea on Friday morning last. He wa conscious to the last. Around hi bedside were his two sons, F. A Monk and J. D. Monk, and hi daughter; also the dead states man's brother.

Frederick Debarezch Monk wa born in Montreal on April 6, 1856 His earlier education was obtained at the Montreal College and the he went to MeGill University where he graduated B. C. L. in 1877. For twelve years he was an active member of the Catholic School Board. In 1892 he suc ceeded the late Sir J. A. Cha pleau as professor of constitutions and international law in Lava University, where he was given the degree of L.L.D. in 1890. H was created a Q. C. by the Ear of Derby, Governor General, in 1893. He was first elected to th House of Commons in 1896 and was re-elected at every succeeding appeal to the people up to and in cluding 1911. He became a mem ber of the Borden Cabinet when it was formed in October, 1911 and took the portfolio of Public




