

Arctic Expedition

Sir Ernest Shackleton Finds the Call to the North Irresistible.

Like so many other explorers, Sir Ernest Shackleton finds the call of the North irresistible. Next May or June he has decided to head a party of scientists in an expedition to the Spitzbergen islands, in the Arctic Ocean. The party will be away for more than two months.

The chief objects of the expedition are biological research and the comparing of the flora and fauna of the Arctic and the Antarctic.

There is a probability of Sir Ernest making another expedition to the Antarctic two years hence, or perhaps sooner. It will be one of the largest yet sent, and will include three or four landing parties.

It is hoped to circumnavigate the Antarctic completely.

Society People Held Up
By Robbers as They Leave Party and Bobbed of Money and Jewellery.
New York, Jan. 20.—An unusual hold-up was successfully pulled off in a fashionable section of up-town New York shortly before 1 o'clock this morning.
Mrs. Frances Elliott, a wealthy society woman, had been entertaining a party of guests at her home on West 50th street, and her guests were just putting on their wraps when five men pushed their way through the open door. With drawn revolvers the intruders lined up the hostess and her guests in train robber fashion and proceeded to go through the pockets of the men and the handbags of the women, now and then pausing to remove a tempting bit of jewellery.
Mrs. Elliott and her friends were so thoroughly frightened that they made no outcry until the five men had left the apartments. Then Mrs. Elliott called up police headquarters. A squad of detectives were detailed to the case.
The robbers secured \$250 in money and jewellery valued at about \$2,500.
Rubber Oysters.
They Brought Trade and Saved Their Inventor From Failure.
"Rubber oysters laid the foundation of my success," said a millionaire hotel man.
"I had a small saloon in them days, and things looked very black. They looked, in fact, like bankruptcy. So in desperation I cut an old rubber doormat into oyster shaped pieces on April 1 and fried them in egg and breadcrumbs to a tasty brown.
"There was only one man in the bar when I fetched in that dish of smoking rubber oysters. His eyes glittered, and he grabbed a fork, jabbed it into a big fellow and took a hungry bite.
"Seeing the surprised look that spread over his face, I turned away to hide a smile. He gave an awkward laugh and said:
"Them's the boys in the street. I'll bring a couple of the boys in to sample them."
"Sure enough, he brought two friends a half hour later. The friends no sooner saw the appetizing rubber oysters than, setting down their beer they each sunk their teeth in one.
"They, too, sent in friends for oysters. I fried up no less than three old doormats and two overshoes that April fool day. The whole town laughed, and the papers printed funny stories about my joke. My joint got real popular.
"In short, I was saved—saved from bankruptcy by rubber oysters." — Washington Post.

Germany Militant.
'Eternal Peace' Mocked While Pres. Declares National Development is Strife.
Berlin, Jan. 18.—On the eve of the fortieth anniversary of the foundation of the Empire, the press indulged in an outburst of militant patriotism and natural pride over the nation's progress. The semi-official North German 'Gazette' warns the country against resting on her laurels, and sternly admonishes her to remember that the development of nation is strife, nothing but strife. General von De Goltz, whom the Kaiser made a field marshal on New Year's Day, made a speech of a similar tenor, saying, among other things: 'The devotees of eternal peace have received sharp sword thrusts from Germany. It would be merciful to strike deeper their wound, but I would recall Count von Moltke's saying: 'Eternal peace is a dream, and not even a pleasant dream.'

London Anarchists.
Verdict in Sidney Street Battle Inquiry—Dangerous Aliens.
London, Jan. 18.—The inquest on the death of the two desperadoes who perished in their Sidney Street home, while resisting the police and military, was concluded to-day. The verdict of the jury was that the man known as 'Josef' was shot to death, the victim of a justifiable homicide, and that his companion, known as 'Fritz', died of pneumonia.
The jury added a rider declaring that the fact that such an extraordinary occurrence was possible, should lead to the framing of more stringent measures for dealing with criminal aliens arriving in this country.
Mr. Winston Churchill appeared in the witness box, with the object of refuting some of the stories of his assumption of the office of commander-in-chief of the force engaged in the battle.
He declared that the troops were on the spot before he had heard that a riot was in progress. He denied that he overrode or directed the police who, he said, had an absolutely free hand. He thought that the action of the police in restraining the firemen from attacking the flames after the house had been fired, was humane and perfectly justifiable under the circumstances.

Costly Stagnation.

As we said yesterday, and as we have said many times before, so we say to-day, the line of civic improvement must be in the direction of cleaning up; and more than that, the campaign must be continued until every one is convinced that it is a duty he owes to himself, his family and his neighbours to keep his house and premises clean.

Dr. Brehm's impressive words about the connection of typhus and filth cannot be ignored, and the magnitude of the danger from the presence of even one pest spot has been exemplified in the present typhus outbreak.

The eloquent words of Reform about the necessity of the eradication of dirt must bear fruit when people at large realize that St. John's is paying through the nose in valuable lives, in sacrifices of health, in excessive sickness, in big doctors' bills, in drug bills, and in the innumerable eating up of hard earned money which needless sickness and death entails. Remember the death-rate of St. John's could be cut in two, two-thirds of the sickness avoided, more work done, and considerable savings made by improved sanitation, more cleaning up, purer food, and better ventilation.

A civic policy of better Public Health must be paid for. 'tis true; but it will be much cheaper than the present policy of death-dealing stagnation.



Famous Court Martials

Incidents That Have Roused the Ire of Britons.

The public interest that was aroused by the recent court-martial on Lieut. Sutor, considerable though it was, was as nothing by comparison with the fever of excitement into which the country was thrown some time back by a court-martial on two young officers of the 46th Regiment, named Perry and Greer, says Pearson's Weekly.

These young men were unmercifully "ragged" by the other officers, and because they dared to attempt to defend themselves with their fists in the good old English fashion, they were court-martialed, and their army careers ruined.

Or, at least they would have been ruined, but for the public outcry that ensued. The press took up their case, and not a newspaper in the country but what was upon their side. Even the Times broke with all its traditions, and bitterly denounced the military authorities, warning them in a most remarkable and outspoken leading article that the temper of the people was such that murder would probably be done unless Messrs. Perry and Greer were reinstated.

Meanwhile no officer of the 46th dared show himself in uniform in the streets of Windsor, where the regiment was stationed, and even officers of other corps, who had nothing directly to do with the affair, became the objects of gibes and jeers of the populace. Eventually, however, the sentences were reversed, and quiet thereby restored.

Another sensational court-martial was that in which a certain Captain Robbison was the principal figure. This also was a "ragging" case, but unlike Messrs. Perry and Greer, Mr. Robbison made no attempt to defend himself while he was being "ragged"; so, as it was determined to hound him from the service, he was tried on a charge of "submitting to ungentlemanly conduct by his brother officers."

To the ordinary civilian mind it seems as if the officers who had been guilty of the ungentlemanly conduct were the blame-worthy parties, rather than the one who under compulsion submitted to it, but this was not the light that the army authorities regarded the matter in. After a trial lasting thirty days, they found the prisoner guilty, and the unusual sentence of dismissal was pronounced; but again the public arose in its wrath, and once more the sentence was annulled.

A quite different type of court-martial, but one that aroused fully as much general interest, was that which sat at Chatham for the trial of Colonel Templar, chief inspector of the Army School of Military Banding on a charge of having sold secret information to a foreign Government. The evidence was of the most sensational description, but it pointed conclusively to others as being the real guilty parties, and Colonel Templar, after having been honorably acquitted, was publicly handed back his sword amid scenes of frantic enthusiasm.

Black memories cluster round the court-martial that was assembled at Kingston, Jamaica, by Governor Wall, for the trial of Sergeant Armstrong. The prisoner was charged with mutiny, but his real offence seems to have been that he had incurred the enmity of Wall, a harsh martinet.

The sentence was eight hundred lashes, and the flogging was inflicted with such merciless severity, Wall himself standing by and urging the floggers to do their utmost, that the unhappy man died soon afterwards. Wall fled, and hid himself for twenty years, but he was brought to trial in the end, and being found guilty of murder was hanged in London in the presence of some forty thousand people, who shrieked imprecations upon him.



ALLIGATORS' NESTS.

They Resemble Haystacks, and Are Natural Incubators. "An alligator's nest is an interesting thing," said Alligator Joe. "Wild alligators build their nests on the

bank of a river or in marshy places. They are made of mud, saw grass and leaves and mold. They are sort of natural incubators. For the eggs, which are laid from thirty-five to eighty in a nest at one time, are hatched out by the steam which comes

up through the mud as much as by the sun. Around the nest a pile of grass is laid, sometimes as high as six feet, and from a distance resembles a stack of hay. The mother alligator has her den near by. She makes it by burrowing into a bank

of soft mud, and sometimes it is seventy feet or more high. The only way to get her out of a den like that is to take a long steel rod and thrust it down the tunnel, which is always slanting. When the alligator feels the prodding she will come out

to see what the trouble is. "It takes alligator eggs two months and six days to hatch. When the little ones come out the mother calls them together by a noise which is something between a cluck and a grunt, and they all scramble down

from the nest to her den. If it is on the edge of a river the den is filled with minnows. As the mother enters the den she awakes her tail around with terrific force, killing the smallest fish, and when they float the little alligators nab them up.

"A mother alligator will sometimes have four or five dens, and she takes her brood from one to another, repeating the swishing process in each one until the young ones have had a full meal." Harriet Quimby in Leslie's.



SOME FIGURES.

The London Statist has been writing up John Bull as a financier, and produces some wonderful figures for our delectation.

The inhabitants of Great Britain, notwithstanding the limited extent of the natural resources of their own country, and their need to purchase from other lands, and to transport from distant parts of the earth the greater portion of their supplies of food and raw materials, have been so successful in overcoming the obstacles placed in their path by nature that they have not only had the means of purchasing all the food, raw materials, and manufactured goods they have needed to buy from other lands for their own consumption and maintenance, but they have been able to create so much surplus wealth that they have supplied other nations with visible capital to the extent of nearly \$16,000,000,000, as well as with a large amount of private capital, so that the total sum provided is estimated to be upwards of \$17,500,000,000. The days of miracles are supposed to have passed, but had anyone predicted two generations ago that in 1910 Great Britain would possess this great wealth abroad, over and above the vastly increased wealth of her people at home, the prediction would have been regarded as beyond the possibility of realization.

The direct earnings of the British people from their investments abroad, now reaches an enormous sum. In the paper it is shown that the investment of about \$13,500,000,000 of British capital up to the end of 1907 in other lands gave a direct income of \$700,000,000 a year to this country, and it is fair to assume that the investment of nearly \$16,000,000,000 gives a return of about \$850,000,000 a year, a sum which comes to us in the produce of the countries in which we have invested capital, and thus provides us with no inconsiderable part of the supplies of food and raw materials we obtain from abroad.

But the indirect advantages of the capital investments are quite as important as the direct advantages. By means of the capital which our investors have supplied, the young countries and India have so greatly expanded their productions of food and raw materials that they have had the means not only of paying the interest due by them to Great Britain, but of purchasing greatly increased quantities of British goods. The prosperity of Great Britain, which has provided the capital, has been stimulated in three ways.

First, the remittance of capital to other lands has created a greatly increased demand for British goods.

Second, the remittance of the interest upon the capital has increased Great Britain's purchasing power, and has given her the means of paying for a large part of her supplies of food and raw materials.

Third, the investment of British capital abroad has greatly increased the production of other countries and given them the means of purchasing additional quantities of British goods.

In the Daughter States of the Empire and in India the investment of British capital has been very great; in the aggregate it reaches \$7,770,000,000, of which \$415,000,000 has been supplied in the present year. In the three Daughter States of Canada, Australia and South Africa, the amount reaches nearly \$5,500,000,000—a very large sum when we recollect that the total population of these three countries is only 20,000,000.






