trip right round the head of Placentia Bay. The ice in the bay occasioned a considerable amount of inconvenience, but in spite of this almost every settlement was visited. Lectures with magic lantern pictures of the germ causing the disease caled consumpion, or tuberculosis, was given in Harbour Buffet, Haystack, Woody Is., Sound Is., Clatice Harbour, St. Kyran's, Presque, Merasheen, Tack's Beach, Placentia and Argentia. In the course of these lectures a clear description was given of the manner in which the germs are conveyed from one person to another, and of the terrible results which are likely to follow such infection.

The different ways of preventing

infection were then explained, far and away the most important being the away the most important being the stopping of all spitting except into the stove, the sea, or other suitable receptables. It was carefully explained how this rule applied not only to persons known to have consumption, but even to those considered to be healthy. Sneezing and coughing also, when nothing is held in front of the mouth, were shown to carry infection in the same way.

in the same way.

The necessity for properly ventilated all living and sleeping rooms was then dwelt upon, and it was explained that the only satisfactory way of doing this was by keeping the win-dows constantly open at the top even though it was only a little way. Other matters were then touched upon, and finally it was clearly exupon, and finally it was clearly ex-plained how persons who were strong and hearty were in little danger of catching the disease compared to those who were sickly and run down. A second lecture on "Good Health" was also given in each of the above settlements, and a number of practical points were explained on which many people go wrong, thus sacrificing their good health, and laying themselves open to the attacks of disease, some-times through ignorance, sometimes through carelessness. In these lec-tures it was pointed out that air and water are the two greatest necessities for life, both being good and plentiful in this country. It was also clearly explained that cold and fresh air are not the cause of "colds" in the head or on the chest, sore throats, gum boils, and poisoned fingers, as so many people think. Germs are the cause of all these troubles, and where the windows are constantly open any germs that may be about are likely to fly out of the window instead of being shut up in the room and being breathed in by those in the room. Those

ed in by those in the room. Those who live out all the time in the fresh air, even though it be very cold, do not get so-called "colds."

Food was also discussed, and the all-too-common diet of bread and tea was strongly condemned, more especially for growing children. The commonly used white flour by itself is not a wholesome food. Even the more nourishing whole wheat flour is not a proper food in itself. The men were therefore urged when laying in their stores to buy less flour and to their stores to buy less flour and to lay out the moncy thus saved in oat-meal or rolled oats, cornmeal, peas, and beans. In this way even those who cannot afford pork or beef can supply their families with very much more wholesome food at no increase of cost, for with oat-meal or corn neal, or peas or beans at every meal

Many other helps to "Good Health" ere also touched upon, and it was xplained that the body is a truly conderful machine which mooth and well unless badly mis-andled. And in most cases when it jets out of order the fault lies with the treatment which the machine has seen given. What is necessary then in these cases to get it into good ord-er again is only to correct the had r again is only to correct the bad reatment it has been receiving, whether this has been in the matter of food, drink, air, rest, work, wet clothes, or any other condition. In such cases, and these according to the experience of most doctors comprise much the greatest part of the sickness in this country, all that is needed is to correct the fault, and the body will soon recover its good health. If the soon recover its good health. If the fault is not known, a doctor's advice should be sought, but on no account should recourse be had to patent medicines advertised in the papers or otherwise, for those very often contain dangerous poisonous drugs, and may do a great deal of harm; in fact they have caused a large number of deaths.



Why Men Want Higher Wages.

Costs To-Day 25s. to Buy as Much Food as 20s. Would Have Bought Ten Years Ago - A Well-Known Professor Throws Light on a Diffi-

At a first glance it seems rather absurd that the more gold John Bull has in his purse the more he has to pay his tradesmen for the goods they supply. And yet a very little reflecion makes this seeming absurdity quite intelligible. Gold, after all, is a commodity just as bread and sugar are; and the more plentiful the supply of any commodity the cheaper'it naturally becomes. Thus, as the gold ncreases in amount it depreciates in value; its purchasing power becomes less; and a sovereign will no longer go as far towards paying the housekeeping bills.

It is this fact, the glut of gold (if one may so put it), that accounts drew in 1900. largely for the deplorable increase n recent years of the cost of living, and the growing difficulty in poor homes of "making ends meet."

The Glut of Gold.

Let us look at the matter a little nore closely. In 1910 (the last year for which complete returns are available), the world's gold mines produced £179 for every £100 produced ten years earlier. In the previous decade the world's supply of gold was more than doubled-it actually increased 114 per cent.; whereas between 1860 and 1890 the output renained practically stationary. fact, more gold was produced in th former year than in the latter.

Thus it is only during the last wenty years that the world has been literally flooded with gold. It has become plentiful and cheap; and as a consequence the cost of living has ncreased quite alarmingly.

We need not go back more than few years to see how true this statement is. In 1910 the general price of food was approximately 10 per cent, greater than in 1900. Thus, at the present day, 22s. would be required to purchase what £1 would have paid for ten years earlier. In the most important articles of food, the increase in cost is much greater. Bread, for instance, is nearly 15 per cent. dearer; sugar, 24 per cent., and bacon, 39 per cent

To understand clearly what this growth in cost of such important aricles of food really means, it is only necessary to say that in 1900 a sovereign would purchase as much bread, sugar and bacon as would cost a few pence over 25s. in 1910. An insignificant matter this for the housekeeper with a well-lined purse; but a very serious matter for the millions of workmen's homes where the income is measured in shillings a week.

Food Higher, Wages Lower. And not only has food become dearother human necessaries, such as rent, clothing, and manufactured articles generally, have similarly increased in cost. Rents have grown with the increase in taxes and rates and the greater demand for comfort and sanitary conditions in our houses. The price of manufactured ar ticles has increased through the greater cost of raw materials and the

pay it with. As a matter of fact, the British workman's wages are to-day less in some fields of labour than they were in 1900. For every sovereign earned by the coal-miners (more than a million of them) ten years ago, less than 18s. is earned to-day. In other branches of labour there is an increase, but so small as to be negligible. In engineering and agriculture it does not amount to 6d. in the pound; while in the building trade the wages remain exactly the same. Taking all industries-including the textile, in which there has been an increase of 1s. 5d. in the pound-the average workman does not receive a

Here, then, we have the matter i a nutshell. Wages are unchanged in the ten years; necessary expense have grown considerably; and to this extent the British workman of 1910 is poorer than he was in 1900.

Naturally, a growth in the cost of living should be met by increased wages. And this has been the case in practically every country but our own. John Bull alone adds to his workers' bills without putting a coin more into their purses. It is, of course, all very wrong and strange; but it is a fact. In practically every other country, from Japan to France the labourer is a richer man than he was a few years since; he has more money to pay his increased bills, and he can smile at the grocer's and bak-

er's charges. For every sovereign in wages the Russian bricklayer drew in 1900 he receives a little over 22s. to-day; the agricultural labourer of Sweden is 20 per cent. better off: the French ironminer, roughly the same; the Austrian cigar-worker, 30 per cent.; the United States railway fireman, 23 per cent.; the Japanese bricklayer, over 60 per cent.; and so on through the long list, ranging almost all over the world. The average increase in the wages of the foreign worker is well over 10 per cent., and thus his income has kept pace approximately with the cost of living.

Better Pay Abroad.

And it is precisely the same with all imported commodities. The larger cost of foreign labour adds to the price of its produce, whether it be raw materials or manufactured goods -especially the latter, in which materials usually cost much less than the work spent on them. Thus it is that the home workman, whose purse is just as poorly supplied as it was some years ago, finds his weekly bills heavier because, forsooth, his fellow worker abroad is a better-paid man

When Gold Becomes Scarce.

Can one wonder, in the light of these facts, that discontent is rife and general among our workers at such an unfair condition of things, or that this dissatisfaction finds its expression in strikes for higher wages, with all their paralyzing effects on the country at large?

In this state of things the glut of gold-although it is but one of many contributing factors-plays a conspicuous part, as no doubt it will continue to do for many years. As the output increases, the purchasing power of gold will diminish; the price of food will rise still higher; and in this respect the lot of our workmen will becomè worse. The day will inevitably dawn, however, when the last ounce of gold will be extracted from the last tone of ore. What will happen then?

This is too far a day to contemplate now. The youngest workman now alive will then have ceased to require his old-age pension. But meanwhile it is a matter of vital importance to continued taking it.
