



REINFORCEMENTS REACH FRANCE.

PARIS, Nov. 28. For three days British reinforce ments have been pouring into France. There has been a steady stream of transports into the harbors of Havre. Disphe and Boulogne. It is believed that the arrival of these reinforcements will be the signal for a general offensive movement. The exact number of men of this new force is unknown, but it is believed that more of importance to report. than a million fresh troops have reached French soil.

Recruiting for Reserve Force.

To-day recruiting for the reserve force of the Newfoundland Regiment commences and from what we can gather there is much enthusiasm being displayed and a goodly number will likely offer themselves at the Recruiting Office to-night. We have no doubt that those in charge will have little trouble in getting the men required. The trouble will arise in connection with the facilities for training and especially in the smaller outports. The Committee in charge will face the problem and overcome the difficulties as they occur. In August and September, the problem of training was simpler. Weather conditions were such that a camp could be formed at Pleasantville and another at the Range on the Southside, and the training of the men could go on day by day. The course to be pursued now is for the city men to have drill three nights a week and also to have training with Morris tubes in the brigade armouries, and when shelters are erected at the firing points of the range to have regular target practice. This is probably the best that can be done for the present, but it is obviously much more imperfect than the training afforded the first contingent at Pleasantville, whereas there will be a much larger preparation of the new volunteers who have not had the advantages of brigade training which twothirds of the 1st contingent had before enlisting. As to the outports, the intention is to get as many enrolled as possible, and then to take up the problem of training, on the lines of sending a drill instructor to any large outport where fifty recruits can be gathered together. It is obviously desirable to bring as many men together at central points to facilitate training. To do this, men will have to give up work they do during the winter. This difficulty might be overcome and means afforded to get warm cloth-

Sergeant-major White, of the Army Service Corps, who has the distinguished conduct medal, and was made Queen's Corporal for carrying Lieutenant Roberts, mortally wounded, from the danger zone at Colenso, has just been notified that he will receive the Victoria Cross for gallantry at LeChateau.

Recounting his experience at Cardiff, where he undergoes an operation to-day for the extraction of a bullet, White said:-

"We got orders at night to move a convoy. We ran into an ambush of Uhlans, and they gave it us hot. I accounted for four of them with my sword, but we had to retire.

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

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Kaiser's Son Requests Shelter for Wounded.

A Red Cross nurse who was at Rheims from the time the town was first shelled by the Germans, tells the following story

One day a young officer in uniform tattered and extremely dirty, asked me politely in the street, after saluting, whether we could receive some wounded in our hospital. I replied it was impossible, as the place was full and it was impossible to feed those there. He thanked me. I saw him go to a shop and leave with his hands full of sausages and various eatables. The ragged young officer was the Kaiser's fourth son, a German general explained.

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
