



Woods, Postmaster General, the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company has made arrangements whereby the sealing steamers will report every night between the hours of 9.30 and 10.30 o'clock. The object is to keep in touch with each sealers daily to ascertain if any sickness is on board, or if any persons are missing. Should there be nothing out of the ordinary a message saying:—"Good night, all is well" will be forwarded to the Postmaster General, who in turn will send a copy to ship-owners and the daily papers. The northern ships reporting through Fogo, and the Gulf ships through Cape Ray. Should it be impossible owing to climatic interruption for any particular ship to communicate with the above stations she is to get in touch with some other land point, and fallwith some other land point, and fail-ing this she is to ask some ship in the ricinity to transmit her message to the and. The sealing captains have been notified by the ship-owners, and the Marconi operators have received instructions from headquarters to see that the arrangement is carried out.





At least 250 troopers of the thirteenth United States Cavalry followed the Villa band into Mexico. Reports to Colonel Slocum, commanding the States troops at this point, late to-day, stated that Villa had made a stand, 5 miles south of the border, where spirited fighting ensued. The bodies of eighteen handits, including Pablo Lopes, second in command, had been gathered and burned before noon. Troopers reported an undermined number of dead still lying in the bush, led to attack under the slogan of "Death to Americans." Villa's followers fought with desperation. Just before dawn they crept along the ditches, skirting the United States cavalry camp and rushed the sheeping town, firing heavily the stores. The post office was looted. Oil was poured upon the frame structures and matches applied by still other bandits. Eighting in the town ended almost as suddenly as it began, less than two hours after the first shot was fired villa's buglars sounded the retreat. The raiders began a disordered flight, closely followed by the American troopers.
