'Atlantic" Flies To-Day.

Latest news from Hr. Grace states that the Handley-Page monster bithat the Handley-Page monster biplane will get away on her trans-Atlantic flight this afternoon. The weather and meteorological conditions are favorable for flying, but the wind is not favorable for a take-off, as the plane must go against the wind, which would mean that she must go up grade—a difficult and even dangerous task with her load of seventeen hundred gallons of fuel and oil aboard. Once the take-off is accomplished, however, the rest will be plain sailing—or flying. 




