He is a very sick man indeed, and it is not only his throat that troubles him. Races Round the World. TRAVELLERS WHO HAVE MADE RECORD JOURNEYS.

A race round the world has always been a popular theme with novelists. Jules Verns, for instance, wrote Round the World in Eighty Days," a which he lessribed the recordreaking journey of one Phineas

eccomplished by real people. The ctual round-the-world record is held by an American, J. H. Mears, who, in 1913, circled the earth in 35 days twenty-one hours, thirty-five min and four-fifths of a second. Bef this the record was held by Jaeger Schmidt, who performed the trip in thirty-nine days and rather less thau twenty minutes.

SCHOOLBOY'S WONDERFUL TRIP.

Mears undertook the feat with the support of an important American newspaper, and the time allowed was thirty-five days, twenty-three hours thirty minutes. Mr. Mears left New York for Paris on July 2nd. From there he travelled by the Trans-Sib rian Railway. At one point he was held 'up fo

eighteen hours by a fleed. He man aged to pick up nine of the los nours by bribing the engine-driver but the Russian officials threatened to throw him into prison if he contin ed this policy.

In all he covered 21,066 miles, and averaged 587 miles a day .He arrived back in New York en August 6th, well inside his time limit. The total cost of the trip was only £168.

Two of the most notable record breaking trips were those of Charles Fitzmorris, a schoolboy, who won a race organized by an American newspaper by travelling round the world in sixty days and thirteen and a half hours, and Nellie Bly, a wom an journalist, who completed the journey in just over seventy-two days in 1889. The earliest known trip round the world was that of the Magellan expedition in 1519-1522. These hardy adventurers took three

It might he thought that, as ten ears have clapsed since the present ecord was set up, a modern travel might lower it. A journey round the world to-day would take consider ably longer than thirty-five days.

The last three records were set un with the assistance of the Trans-Siberian Railway. This is not working now owing to the state of affairs in ussia, and a world traveller would have to use the route which the early record-breakers followed-that is, by the Mediterranean, Suez Canal, Indian Ocean, and China. Oldest Garment in Europe.

What is claimed to be the oldest garment in Europe has been discovered by peat cutters in Gerum Fen, near Sikara, Sweden. It was found only a few feet under the surface of the peat, and the preserving qualities of the fen water have kept it intact since the Bronze Age, about 1,000 years before the

Christian era. Professor Montelius, who died reently, made a careful examination of the cloak, and Professor Kossina also namined it. Further confirmation of he authenticity of its age was forth-

oming from Dr. L. von Post, the ltate Geologist of Sweden. The garment has the appearance of a cloak to be flung over the shoulders, and it does not look very archaic when compared with more modern wear. It is woven by hand from rool.

Inquiries at the Bronze Age Deartment of the British Museum reealed the fact that pieces of materal hand-woven in the same period re tabulated here. "They were takn from the Swiss lake dwellings," said an official, "and there is no reason why this find should not be perfectly

CHICAGO, March 30-(By the Associated Press)-Electrical engineers the world over are watching Chicago in her attempt to rear the largest electric power plant in the world-a atation whose ultimate capacity will he approximately 900,000 horse power, or 600,000 kilowatts. The largest plant now in operation anywhere has a capacity rating of 230,-000 kilowatts.

The new goliath, the project of the Commonwealth Edison Company, purveyor of things electrical to almost the entire Chicago territory, is exrected to be in operation by August. 1924. The generating room, which is to house 10 huge turbo-generator units. each capable of producing 40.060 to 60,000 kilowatts, will be slightly more than 800 feet long, and 125 feet wide. Each generator will produce 60-cycle energy at 12,000 volts. The entire plant, comprising three principal units in addition to the turbine room, will occupy 72 acres of city property. Storage space for 300,000 tons of coal 13 provided. Fuel requirements for the anticipated normal operation, which is expected never to reach capacity, will be about 133 cars of coal daily, or approximately 2,000,000 tons a year.




