The location is ideal and a great deal of appreciation is felt by all persons who are interested in the institution, and great thanks are due the Misses Reilly for their kind consideration and thoughtfulness in doing so.

St. Hilda's college has recently added to their staff of teachers, Monsieur Xavier Ballet, B.-es.-L. and B.-es.-D. of Paris, France, has been appointed to the position of French literature and French conversation. In addition to this the senior girls gave a very graceful flag drill, representing the red, white and blue. The boys contributed a humorous play. The trustees of St. Mary's school and several friends were present, and enjoyed the program, which was given in the new and beautiful assembly hall.

Miss Talbot, secretary of the Victorian League of London, England, gave a very excellent address to the teachers on Thursday afternoon in the assembly hall of the Central school. Miss Talbot has travelled a great deal, and is now completing a nine months' journey in the interests of the association for which she is working. Miss Talbot is now returning from Australia and New Zealand, and expects to arrive home in England about the middle of June. Having read widely, Miss Talbot is fully conversant with her subject, and gave her talk in an interesting and direct manner. The Victorian League is a non-party association composed of men and women, whose sole object is to promote by practical means a close understanding between different countries and the empire. In Canada the Daughters of the Empire, a similar association, is in existence, and where this society is thriving Miss Talbot renders what assistance she can, and gives information, but where no such association exists she organizes the Victorian League. For instance, she organized this work in four of the states of Australia. As regards the educational work of the league, it is founded upon conviction that there is a need for the spread of accurate information about the history of our race, and the geographical position in the world of the several countries inhabited by British people and owing allegiance to the King. Information is collected and the present day conditions existing in different countries, the point of view of each and the special needs of each are duly investigated after proper research is made. The public opinion of people in the country affects the government of the country, and the government of the empire. Hence it is a vastly important to educate public opinion. There is great need of such knowledge in the over-sea countries, and the same remark holds true concerning Canada and India and other younger nations with regard to Great Britain.

In Great Britain the Victorian League organization is widespread. There is one central association and branches extending out from this. They endeavor to begin with the youth of the land. The association consults the educational authorities and then the teachers. They offer to co-operate with them in making the facts regarding the empire vivid to children in connection with the history and the geography lessons.

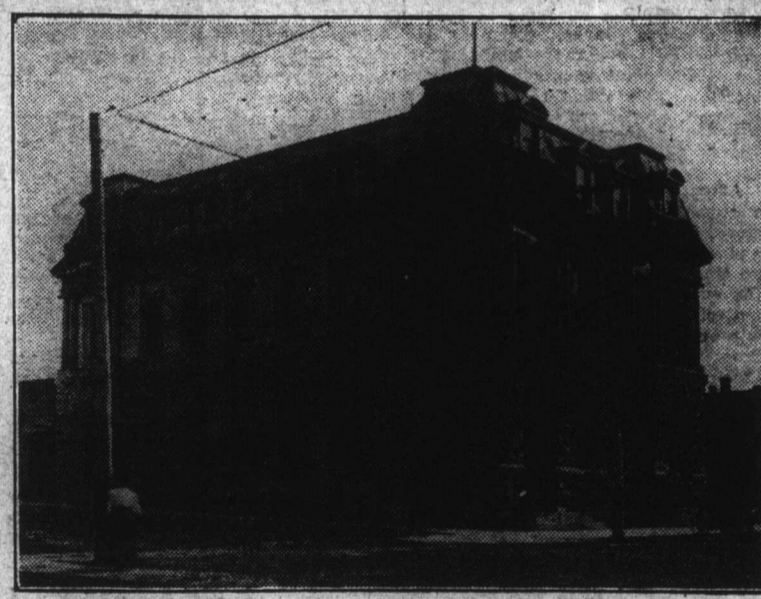
For example, in a portion of Great Britain they took up the subject of Canada. Several picture talks on Canada were given. The association has in its possession several pictures, specimens of various kinds and photographs of and pertaining to Canada. The schools can get the loan of these and also of different books on the same subject. If any children in Canada would desire to correspond with pupils who are attending schools in Great Britain, the association is in a position to arrange such a correspondence. Thus the Victorian League is endeavoring to stimulate interest and secure a sense of Britain's citizenship early in the child life.

A similar correspondence between teachers of Great Britain and any of her colonies could be arranged by referring the matter to the Victorian League.

Now, in Calgary the Daughters of the Empire is in existence, and any assistance will be freely given by the Victorian League if requests are sent to the Daughters of the Empire and forwarding such requests to the league.

Miss Talbot concluded her talk by asking several questions with regard to the educational work of the province, and also expressed her pleasure at meeting the Calgary teachers. The chairman, Dr. Scott, and several of the teachers who were present gladly gave the information thus desired. The report of the Daughters of the Empire, Mrs. Pinkham, honored the meeting with her presence.

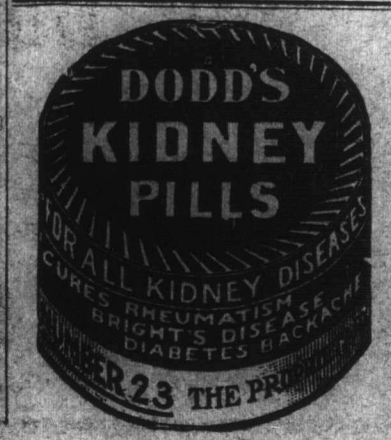

DISASTROUS FATE OF SOME ENDEAVORS

The Constructive Ability of Some Opposition Members Unsuccessful

THE MAN WHO BUILT UP WHARF SCANDAL

The Facts in Connection With the Richibucto Incident

(Special Correspondence) Ottawa, April 26.—Proceedings in the house of commons in the last few days in relation to a number of matters have furnished striking illustrations of the constructive ability of some individual members of the opposition; the conspicuous feature of which has been the demonstration of the ability of what to the gentleman in question no doubt seemed a very large structure from a very meagre supply of material.

First came the demonstration of capacity in this respect by Dr. Bradbury, the member for St. John's, who sought to build up an edifice of graft in the interior department in connection with the surrender of St. Peter's Indian reserve. This followed Mr. Crocket of York with his palace of corruption in the Public Works department and lastly, of most recently rather for doubtless they are not all done—Mr. Taylor of New Westminster with his batch of irregularities in the department of the postmaster general.

But unhappily the gentlemen built upon the sand, and being short of foundation material their structures came tumbling about their ears when the first wave of facts from the government side of the chamber swept away their underpinning. The effort of the member for Selkirk has been dealt with in this correspondence. That of Mr. Crocket of York, was less pretentious although it required nearly as much time and labored effort. The member attempted to revive his alleged "sawdust" wharf scandal at Richibucto, N.B., which was thrashed out before the public accounts committee in the early part of the session.

In each instance a want of confidence motion was voted down by a heavy majority, and only two purposes can be said to have been served by the abortive attacks on the government. One served to contrast the statement-ship displayed on the opposite sides of the chamber in a light anything but favorable to the opposition as now constituted by showing its membership capable of being willing to squander the time of the house at the rate of \$22 a minute on the most frivolous pretext to play at politics. The other by demonstrating the constructive ability of the gentlemen involved, served to bring them into prominence as available material for membership on the platform committee of the forthcoming Conservative convention.



ANOTHER GLIMPSE AT THE NAVAL DEBATE
Correspondent Gives Some Facts About the Big Discussion

THE ALL-CANADIAN POLICY OF LIBERALS
Contrasting the Arguments of the Government and the Opposition

(Special Correspondence.)
 Ottawa, April 28.—The naval debate, the question which has occupied a position paramount to all others in the house of commons during the present session of parliament, has run its course; the bill creating a Canadian navy has been passed, and thereby the attitude which the government of Canada proposes to assume toward the question of imperial defense has been laid down.
 The last word having been said, it may be fair to assume that the policies of the historic political organizations of the Dominion, that of the Liberal party as represented by the government, and that of the Conservative party, as represented by the opposition in the house, have been definitely and finally enunciated relative to the question.
 It may be observed by way of parenthesis that while there has not been for a very long time any doubt as to what the attitude of the Liberal party was or would be, owing to the divergent views held by the Conservative leader and the various sub-leaders, there has been considerable room for speculation as to what the ultimate policy of that party would be until the final pronouncement had been made; but that having been made, it is probably reasonable to presume that the policy which the party, as a political organization, will adhere to, has been registered.
 It may not, therefore, be inappropriate if at this time analysis of the two policies be made, that the people may by way of contrast determine for themselves which of the policies, best and most satisfactory to an individual, is the one which they desire to see the question raised at the imperial conference of 1902, when the various British colonies were called upon to say what they were prepared to do for the defence of the empire at sea.
 The Conservative policy as laid down by Mr. Borden, leader of the opposition, when making the last and final pronouncement on the third reading of the bill, was declared to be that Canada could best manifest loyalty and contribute toward the defence of the empire by placing at the disposal of the mother country a given sum of money—twenty millions of dollars was the measure—to be used in the construction of battleships for the imperial navy, this to be the sum total of Canada's contribution until the question as to whether Canada should have a navy had been submitted to the people at an election.
 The policy of the Liberal party, as expressed in the naval bill, and as expounded by the different ministers during the various debates, may be concisely stated as follows:—The theory that Canada can most effectively contribute to the defence of the empire through the defence of Canada.
 The government assumes that in any war in which Great Britain is engaged, the great war engines of the imperial navy must necessarily be depended upon to meet the main assault, but that the maintenance of the vessels for the protection of the different colonies and their ocean-borne commerce would constitute a serious drain upon the British navy, and, therefore, that Canada could most effectively contribute toward the defence of the empire by making provision for the defence of Canadian interests herself.
 As the principal defence Canada would require in such an emergency would be in the form of protection for ocean-borne commerce, the government assumes that by creating and maintaining a mobile navy of fast vessels such as are required for the protection of the merchant marine of a country, and thereby relieving the imperial navy of the drain from that source, Canada will more efficaciously contribute to the defence of the empire than by any other method it is within the means of the Dominion to adopt.
 This is the underlying principle of the undertaking which the government of Canada is offering as the answer to the imperial conference, as against the answer the Conservative party would give by handing over one lump sum of money.
 As to the contingent question, that of submitting to the people the determination as to whether there should or should not be a Canadian navy, the government takes the position that there is no occasion for such a submission for the reason that it is not a new departure of so radical a nature as to render going to the people for their judgment necessary; but that on the contrary it is merely an extension of an established policy of contributing to imperial defence as represented by the militia establishment, the creation of the navy merely extending to the sea the policy now in force on the land and the members of parliament being elected to represent the people, are fully competent to pass upon the wisdom or otherwise of such extension.
 Thus may the two policies be contrasted and a fair judgment be formed as to which policy is calculated to extend the larger measure of support and assistance and which will the better satisfy the demands of the conviction held by all Canadians, that the Dominion, now that it has grown in wealth and power, should share in the responsibility of maintaining the integrity of the empire.
 As the subsidiary questions raised during the consideration of the measure, some are worthy of being taken account of. The point was made by the opposition that if Canada is to have a navy, the command-in-chief should rest that the navy in time of war would come automatically under the control of the British admiralty and the ships become available for direction by the admiralty without reference to the government of Canada.
 The government holds that it is on every account preferable that while the command is in the King as the head of the empire in both peace and in war, the command shall be exercised through the government of Canada responsible to the people of Canada, at all times except when the needs of imperial defence render it advisable, as in time of serious war, that it should be exercised through the British admiralty, the transfer of direct control from his majesty's Canadian advisers to that of his majesty's British advisers to be by order-in-council to the Canadian government, subject to sanction afterward by the Canadian parliament.
 The opposition proposal, that in time of war the Canadian fleet should pass conditions from Canadian to imperial control, the opposition made its strong objection and based them on many and various reasons. The government's proposal was based on the elementary principle of constitutional government, money that those who pay shall control, but recognizing that in time of serious war only in full accord with constitutional the sea defence of the empire would be practice, but makes effective provision most effective under a single command, for effective cooperation with the imperial navy in time of war.
 A means is provided, as here stated, for placing the navy without delay and at the same time by the call of parliament, securing provision for its maintenance on a war footing, a very different matter it will be easily understood, only be achieved through the building up of conditions whereof the Canadian navy shall offer a career for the young men of Canada. The personnel must be distinctly Canadian, the ships must be officered and manned by Canadians and this can only be accomplished through making the navy a distinctly Canadian establishment, which it could not be, unless the command, under ordinary conditions, rested with the Canadian government.
 To conceive that the ambition of the government in this relation is easily within reach, one needs but to reflect upon the fact that in comparison to population no part of the world contains so large a percentage of seafaring people as the coasts of Canada, particularly the Atlantic coast. Nowhere are better or more capable seafaring men produced; they have but to be attached to the service. That it will be easier to do there can scarcely be room for doubt, if they are entering the service of distinctly their own Canada.

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
