An experi-ment is now being tried in the case of a condemned criminal, who has been inocu-lated, and whose case will be carefully tudied, in the hope that something definite may be learned concerning the dread disease. So much attention has been given to the subject in Honorlulu, and the disease is spreading so fast, that the white population, as above stated, has become aroused to the necessity for doing something to protect themselves.


