The Company will delay, engage in conferences with committees from the City Council, and may perhaps make some apparent concessions, but the public understand thoroughly that nohing tangible will be the result and that the Company will not yield until driven into the last ditch. The Aldermen in their dealings with the Company should remember that its prom-ises are utterly unreliable; that it has never hesitated to violate its most solemn pledges, and that if it sees fit it will do so again. It once before, in 1887, conferred with committees from the Council and the Legislature, and as a result a contract was drawn up and solemnly embodied in an Act of Parliament-the well-known stat. 50, Vic., C. 85-but the ink was hardly dry before it set about violating the contract and disobeying the statute, and it has continued to do so ever since. It would be well to remind the directors of the Company that diso-bedience to an Act of the Legislature ls an indictable offence, punishable with one year's imprisonment, the words of Sec. 138 of the Criminal Code being as follows: "Every one is guilty, of an indictable offence and liable to one year's imprisonment who without lawful excuse disobeys any Act of the Parliament of Canada or of any legislature in Canada, by wilfully doing any act which it forbids, or omitting to do any act which it requires to be done, unless some penalty or other mode of punishment is expressly pro-
