A change, in hot weather, from stockings or socks of wool to those made of the soft and elastic material, silk. Those who suffer from cold feet, should wear two pairs of light soft socks. Old people should always have their feet thus clothed, for their hearts are not so strong as they were in their young days, and cannot pump the warm blood to the extremities with the force they were wont to. Few things are more destructive to, or rather I should say, few things tend more to waste the animal heat than cold feet and cold hands. The old among us should protect both, not forgetting that the spring and winter months are particularly fatal to those advanced in life.

The aged ought to wear a flannel rather than a heavy night-dress; it should be of sufficient length, too, to cover the limbs, and bed-socks should also be worn; these should be of the lightest, softest wool that can be procured. They should have a sufficient quantity of bed-socks, and more, each blanket being light and soft; but heavy counterpanes should never be slept under, for the weight of them makes sleep uneasy, instead of refreshing as it ought to be.

The best temperature at which to keep a room for health's sake is about 65° or 70° above the zero-point. Less than this is far more agreeable to many, and a greater degree is undoubtedly to say nothing of the danger of catching a chill on getting out of a room so heated. Elderly people should never put on a cold and unwarmed great-coat, before going out of doors in winter; it takes but a few moments to warm, so there is no need to run any and no does no harm either to warm limbs and feet before going out; this if a brisk walk be taken is little or no risk of any such or dangerous lowering of the animal heat. Walking can be done with greater ease and comfort if the clothes are light; and it is a very easy thing to have them made of materials that are both light and warm. The chest in people advanced in years needs all the protection you can give it; and hence I tell you something worth remembering; the back requires protection from the cold as much, yet it is not more than the breast, and yet protectors are nearly always worn on the chest, only a mistake that is fatal to thousands.

The custom of taking quinine, generally of a violent nature, to keep up the animal heat, is a very bad one.—Canada's Magazine.

Secrets of Success.

To be successful nothing should tempt us. If we are ever to do anything of success, we should be continually finding help and assistance where we least expect it. When all our efforts fail, we are sunk to the very brink of despair, Providence steps in, and looks us hope again. Another secret of success is a proper appreciation of the value of time. Samuel Johnson tells us: "He that loses to look back hereafter with satisfaction upon past years must learn to know the present value of his time; he must be ever ready to let go a particle of time well as to the ground." A friend of mine who had to wait at a railway station for a train was heard to exclaim: "Ten minutes lost forever! Here is one of the greatest secrets we had about said the great secret. Time waits for no man; therefore should we seize upon every moment for profit. Often, whilst contemplating an action, my mind will say: 'I must do this, or that, or I have time'—but the time never comes, unless they are determined to do it; for there is nothing in life that could not find an excuse for neglecting, were they not compelled by interest or necessity to find the time to do it."

A man may have every attribute of success and yet remain a wretched being, for he may be afflicted in his own power—a great deficiency, standing still in the background, when he should come forward to be seen and heard. Such a one will find his want of confidence increased as time passes, until at length there will be such a wide chasm between him and his followers that he will find it impossible to cross.

Another great secret of success is the choice of a good wife. Lord Burleigh, in his advice to his son, among other things said: "The great circumference in choosing thy wife, for from thence will spring all good or evil;—and it is an action of life like unto a stratagem of war, wherein a man can err but once. Inquire diligently of her disposition, and how her parents have been inclined in their youth—neither make choice of a fool; for she also will be thy continual disgrace; for then thou shalt find it to thy great grief that nothing is more fatal than a bad wife. Therefore, if we do much truth in the observation that men are what women make them. Although a man need not be subject in any slavish sense to his wife, still he is not unlikely to be influenced by her in some way or other, and fortunate indeed is he who obtains the help, meet for him—a loving, careful partner, full of sympathy and encouragement, smoothing cares and cheering clouds away. How great is the work of our wives!—Chambers' Journal.

The Weekly Monitor.

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 21st, 1883.

Latest reports from the inundated districts in the Ohio Valley, indicate a slight improvement. But the condition of affairs is something appalling. In New Albany, Ind., the city's relief committee say 10,000 people are homeless, thousands of houses submerged and the suffering indescribable.

A bill respecting the allowance for travelling expenses of Executive Councilors, passed the Local House on Friday last. The bill provides that members give an exact report of expenses incurred during travel on legislative business, and that they be allowed payment accordingly.

The Methodist brethren of this place held a social in the basement of their meeting house on Wednesday, 14th inst. Quite a large number were present, and the affair was a success both socially and financially, about \$35 being realized.

Imperial Parliament opened on the 15th inst. Her Majesty's speech spoke of affairs in Egypt, expressing gratitude for the return of tranquillity brought about by the sea and land forces, the clemency shown to conquered rulers, the withdrawal of troops and the reconstruction of the Government.

Black damp oozed the death of three miners in a coal mine in Macon, Cumberland, on Saturday last. One of the deceased lost his life in attempting to rescue others. Eight men went down the mine to work and had not been seen for some time.

The Hon. Jas. S. Macdonald, member of the late Banking firm of Jas. S. Macdonald & Co., of Halifax, who, it will be remembered, fled the Province on the failure of his firm, returned and took his seat on the opening of the legislature.

Shooting Accident.

(From our Middleton correspondent.) A serious accident, which may yet result fatal, occurred at the residence of Mr. George Armstrong, Victoria, Va., on Friday, 9th inst. A little girl about ten years of age, daughter of Mr. William Neily of Wilmet Springs, was sent to Mr. Armstrong's on an errand, and while there Mr. Armstrong's six year old boy took from the cloak shelf a seven shooter, the chambers of which were supposed to be empty, and playfully snapped it at their dog but there was no discharge. He then cocked the weapon again and aiming it at the little girl snapped it a second time—the hammer falling upon the only loaded chamber in the revolver. The cartridge exploded and the bullet entered the end of the nose, taking a downward course, and lodged, it is supposed, in the back part of the throat. The muzzle of the revolver was so close that the girl's face was severely burned and blackened by the powder. The bullet has not as yet been removed nor even exactly located, and the girl's condition is serious, though hopes of her recovery are entertained.

The accident took place during the company absence of Mr. and Mrs. Armstrong from the house, and it should be added that neither of them were aware that the revolver was loaded. It seems that a boy who formerly worked with them had procured cartridges and primed with it and carelessly left one chamber loaded and put the weapon back in its place.

The Baptist social at Belleisle on St. Valentine's evening, was very largely attended and presented by a grand success. A favorable evening and a most commodious house, kindly placed at the disposal of the people by Mr. Abner Neily, did much to bring about satisfactory results. The supper was a sumptuous one, and the fancy articles reflected much credit on the deft fingers which manufactured them. The proceeds amounted to \$73, which is to be appropriated in the way of making necessary repairs on the Wadeville Baptist chapel.

We would call attention to the adv. of the Acadia S. S. Company's West India Branch. The well-known Commodore S. S. Delta has been placed on the line. She left London for Barbadoes and Demerara on the 17th inst, and will be at Annapolis about the 10th or 15th of March. From thence she will proceed to the West Indies, calling at Martinique, Barbadoes and Demerara, including Trinidad, if sufficient freight is offered for latter port. The rate of freight for potatoes in barrels to any of the above named ports from Annapolis, is only 20c per barrel and \$7 per ton measurement (40 cubic ft.) on hay. We are informed the Company expect to make arrangements with the W. & A. R. R. Company for through rates from all stations to the ports of call of their West India steamers. It is expected the passage from Annapolis to the West Indies will not exceed five days, so that our producers and dealers will have an opportunity of shipping potatoes to the islands with certainty of their arriving in good condition and making a good market. The Delta can accommodate eight or ten passengers and offers a good opportunity for invalids or any persons wishing to visit the islands. The passage will be \$50.00 and \$50.00 home.

The Paragon at Paradise on two evenings recently, was visited by the people of Clarence, who came with pleasant faces and kind words to dispense good cheer to their pastor and his wife, and left them happier and richer in many pounds of epico and useful articles.

A horrible murder was committed at Loch Long on the 14th inst. William Hughes (collier) killed his wife. She was twenty and he forty-five years of age. The cause was jealousy. He stroked her on the head with a hatchet, nearly severing the head from the body. The murderer has been arrested, and an inquest held on the remains, the jury returning a verdict according to the facts.

A Trotting Match.

Thursday last opened beautifully fine and clear. Long before the expected contest was to take place teams from all parts of the country commenced to arrive, and by noon the town was filled with strangers. Only on rare occasions in this County will as large a crowd be seen as that which gathered on the banks and wharves of our river on Thursday afternoon.

The entries for the race were as follows:—Bonny Belle, br. m., owned by G. Blanchard, of Kenilville, driven by L. Neary; Sammy, ch. g., owned by J. Cox, of Kenilville, driven by—Rookwell; Bridgetown Charley, b. g., owned and driven by T. A. Foster, of this town; Nellie, b. m., owned and driven by John Hall, of Lawrencetown; Trotting Dick, br. g., owned by Aard More, of Bridgetown, driven two heats by owner, remaining three by F. Fitz Randolph, E. Ruggles' ch. g. Dan, and J. Boddie's ch. h. Fearnaught were entered but failed to start.

The race was for three purses of \$40, \$25 and \$10 respectively; mile heats, beat three in five, and was won after a spirited contest by Foster's Bridgetown Charley, who took the three last heats, showing a marked gain at the close of every heat, Cox's Sammy and Hall's Nellie taking second and third money respectively. The first heat was won brilliantly by Cox's Sammy, who showed some distance in front of Bridgetown Charley and Bonny Belle following in close order, and crossing the line as named; Trotting Dick was not going well this heat and came in last.

The second heat was won by Bonny Belle, followed closely by Bridgetown Charley, Sammy, Trotting Dick and Nellie. In the third heat Bridgetown Charley took first place, followed by Bonny Belle, Sammy, Trotting Dick, Bonny Belle ran and gained in this heat and was set back to fifth place by the judges' rule. The fourth heat was a repetition of the third, save that Nellie took second position.

The fifth heat scored another victory for Bridgetown Charley, Trotting Dick following closely, coming in with a burst of speed that fairly redeemed his former positions. Nellie and Sammy followed. All interested in the race expressed satisfaction at the fair manner in which proceedings were conducted, and their willingness to engage in future contests. The chestnut gelding "Sammy" is a very hard puller, but on this occasion was raged up with the "Harding chestnut," which accounts for his steadiness and disinclination to leave his feet. During the morning a race took place between F. Fitz Randolph's g. Tom, and J. Bath's b. m. Fan, mile heats, beat three in five. Only three heats were trotted, the former horse winning all three easily. It is worthy of note that notwithstanding the large crowd present good order characterized the whole afternoon's proceedings, and a single disturbance taking place until the close of the race, when several negroes congregated at the head of Queen's street, used such offensive and threatening language as to bring about a fracas between themselves and some young men among the whites, resulting in a severe beating for the former. The negroes were to blame, but their punishment should have been delegated to the proper authorities to be enforced in the legal way. Who are our magistrates on such occasions?
