HORSE NOTES.

ORIGINAL AND SELECTED.

A SENSIBLE MOTHER.—A young man not yet twenty years old went to the races and was inveigled into investing all his money, \$300, in the pool box, buying the field against Judge Fullerton. Of course it was the intention of the boy's deceivers to clean him out, as Fullerton was the favorite at great odds. But it so happened that the great better had one of his bad spells that day, he took viciously and was distanced. The result was that the field won heavily, and the boy went home with 2,200 in his pocket, which his mother, like a sensible woman, took care of, and put in the savings bank.

LAST THURSDAY, says the Amherstburg *Patriot*, as a boy was driving a horse belonging to Mr. John Bell past the Catholic Church, a swarm of bees which were flying past suddenly lighted on his head, and stung him so severely that he stood still as if stunned, and his tongue protruded. Rev. Father Laurent happened to observe the occurrence, and obtained a quantity of straw and smoked them off. It was three or four days before the poor animal recovered from the stinging assault.

A GIRL'S SWIMMING MATCH.

The *New York Mercury* says: Miss Kate Bennett has begun at Bath Park, Bath, Long Island, her annual series of girls' natatory matches. Through a misapprehension of girls as to the day, all did not arrive that were expected, and those that entered the lists were Miss Minnie Shine, aged 16; Adeline Mason, aged 17; Katie and Annie Barclay, respectively 17 and 18; and Laura West, aged 20. A few boats were anchored at a couple of hundred yards from the beach, and Mr. John J. Fagan and another gentleman flanked each end of the line, to uphold any who might by any accident need aid.

The girls wore loose bathing dresses of gray, the pantaloons of which only descended to the knees, and distinguished themselves simply by top knots of blue, red, pink, green and yellow ribbon in their hair, the colors of which were soon lost to sight. The prizes of the first race were a gold chain, a pair of earrings, and a locket. The signal was an outburst of music, but Minnie Shine, who started behind the rest, lost faith in her success, and swam back. Annie Mason, also behind, starting, lost hope, and floated leisurely home. The remaining three kept well in line for a considerable period, buffeting bravely the rough water, until Kate Barclay shot ahead and won by at least twenty lengths. Miss Mason reached the boat second, and Miss West brought up the rear. As the distance to the boat had not been measured, the time was not reckoned.

At the second race, the prizes for which were two rings, Annie Barclay refused to swim, Minnie Shine again balked, and Katie Barclay was again the winner, Adeline Mason being second. At the close of this contest Miss Bennett made her appearance in the water, and displayed a variety of aquatic gymnastics.

HORSES.

There have been only four light draught horses sold during the week. Two bays brought from \$85 to \$95, and two dark colored from \$80 to \$90. They were purchased on American account, and considering the flatness of the demand, the prices paid were fairly liberal. From the other side of the lines there has been practically no inquiry during the past two or three weeks, and at present there are few, if any, Americans in town on the look-out for breed of any kind. The only possible inquiry during the coming week or two will be an occasional light draught horse.—*Montreal Star*.
