S T A N D I N G R U L E S
FOR THE
CONSTITUTION AND GOVERNMENT
OF THE
Newfoundland Church Society.

NAME.

1.—The name of this Society shall be "THE NEW-FOUNDLAND CHURCH SOCIETY."

OBJECTS.

2. The objects of this Society shall be, (1) to contribute towards the maintenance of the Clergy and Licenced Lay-Readers, (2) to assist in the erection, enlargement, or repairs of Churches, Parsonages, or School-Rooms, and in the purchase of Land for Glebe or other Church purposes, (3) to provide for sale a supply of Bibles, Prayer-Books, School-Books, and other Religious Books and Tracts, and (4) to create and maintain a separate fund for assisting the Widows and Children of deceased Clergymen of this Diocese.

MEMBERS.

3.—The members of this Society shall be, (1) all persons who shall have paid to their Clergyman or the Treasurer the two preceding years the annual

sum of ten shillings for the objects of the Society; and (2) all Clergymen who shall have officiated in Newfoundland or Labrador the two preceding years with the Bishop's licence.

4.—All members shall have power to vote at the annual and other general meetings.

OFFICERS.

5.—The officers of this Society shall be (1) the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, President; (2) the Venerable the Archdeacon and the Rural Deans, Vice-Presidents; (3) a Treasurer; and (4) a Secretary; the last two to be chosen by the members of the Society at the annual general meeting; but in case of resignation of office, or removal, of either Secretary or Treasurer, during the interval between two Annual Meetings, the committee shall appoint a person to act in either case, until the next Annual Meeting.

MANAGERS.

6.—The Committee of management shall consist of the officers of the Society, and certain Lay-Members, elected as Representatives in each of the Deaneries; viz., four elected by Members of the Society resident in the Deanery of Avalon; three by Members resident in the Deanery of Conception Bay; three by Members resident in the Deanery of Trinity Bay; three by Members resident in the Deanery of Notre-Dame Bay; two by Members resident in the Deanery of Placentia Bay; and two by Members resident in the Deanery of Fortune Bay.

7.—The election of Representatives shall be as follows:—On some day in Easter Week, in the year 1859, and in every succeeding fourth year, a Meeting of the Members resident in each mission, shall be convened by the Clergyman in charge at some convenient hour and place, of which notice shall be given (with the Bishop's consent) in each Church in the

Mission, on some Sunday in the previous month; at which Meeting the Clergyman, or in his absence, some other person then to be chosen by the Members shall preside, and the Members present shall vote *seriatim* for the prescribed number of Representatives.

8.—When the voting (which may be continued, if necessary, six hours, but not longer) is completed, the presiding Officer in each Mission shall report the result to the Rural Dean, and the persons who have obtained a majority of votes in the Deanery, shall be elected Representatives; provided that every person to be a member of the Committee must be a Communicant of the Church of England.

9.—The Rural Dean shall report the result of the election in his Deanery to the Secretary in St. John's, the first convenient opportunity.

10.—The new Representatives shall be convened by the Secretary at the Michaelmas Quarterly Meeting; until which time the former Representatives shall continue in office.

11.—As often as it shall become necessary, from the death, absence from the Colony, resignation, disqualification, or refusal to serve, of any of the Representatives, to appoint another or others in their place, a special meeting of the Members, in the Deanery where the vacancy has arisen, shall (as soon as the Rural Dean, or, in his absence the Clergyman next senior in standing in the Diocese may in his discretion appoint) be convened in like manner as the Easter meeting, when the required Representative or Representatives shall in like manner be elected.

12.—The President, or a Vice-President, and six other Members of the Committee shall be competent to manage the business at every meeting duly convened.

13.—All Clergymen of the Diocese holding the Bishop's licence, shall be *ex-officio* honorary Members of the Committee with the right of speaking, but not, with the exception of the Officers, of voting at its Meetings.

TRUSTEE.

14.—The Lord Bishop of the Diocese shall be the Trustee of this Society, and shall have power to let or to take houses or lands, and to receive all rents and interest of monies as the same shall fall due, and shall pay the same to the Treasurer for the time being—taking his receipt, and handing it over to the Committee.

GENERAL MEETINGS.

15.—An annual General Meeting of the members and friends of the Society shall be holden in St. John's on the second Thursday after Trinity Sunday, or as soon after as the Bishop may appoint. The Secretary shall give notice to each of the Clergymen in St. John's, who shall publish it (with the Bishop's consent) in his Church on the previous Sunday.

16.—At the annual general meeting a report on the state of the Society, with the Treasurer's accounts duly audited, shall be submitted by the Committee, to be printed, or otherwise, as shall be then and there determined by the members.

17.—A special general meeting may be convened at any time, (1) by the President; (2) by a Vice-Presidents and six members of the Committee; or (3) by any twelve members of the Society whose payments are not in arrear; provided notice of such meeting be duly given as in the case of annual general meetings.

18.—The Chairman shall not vote at any general meeting, except in the case of an equality of votes.

COLLECTIONS.

19.—It is expected that a Collection for the various objects of the Society will be made every year by every Clergyman in the Diocese, from every head of a family and every adult member of the Church in his Mission, assisted if need be by his Church-wardens and other respectable Members of his Congregation.

20.—Every Clergyman shall transmit to the Secretary, a list of the Contributors to the objects of the Society in his Mission, with the amount of their several payments, and to the Treasurer one-fourth at least of his whole Collections, on or before the last day in every year, or as soon after as practicable.

N.B.—This Rule does not apply to the Clergy of St. John's, who shall send in the whole of their Collections to the Treasurer.

21.—All Clergymen who have collected as far as possible from every head of a family, and from every adult Member of the Church in their missions, towards the objects of the Society, for the two years immediately preceding, and who have remitted to the Treasurer one-fourth of the whole Collections, shall be entitled to assistance from the funds of the Society towards any of its objects in their own Mission; provided that no Clergyman shall make a collection for his own maintenance separate from, or independent of the general collection; and that pew-rents and assessments be not considered as part of the said collection or collections.

GRANTS.

22.—It shall be the duty of the Committee to determine from time to time on the appropriation of the Funds, by making grants towards the objects of the Society under the recommendation and sanction of the President.

23.—No Clergyman declining or neglecting to col-

lect for the Society, or to transmit a list of the contributors and their payments, and a fourth-part of his collection (as directed in Rule 20) shall be entitled to receive any grants from the Society, for himself, or for any of the objects of the Society, in his Mission; provided that where a collection has been duly made, and the list with the fourth-part of the collections transmitted for the two previous years by his predecessor, any Clergyman newly in charge may, before sending his first annual collections, ask and receive for any of the objects of the Society, excepting only his own maintenance.

24.—It shall be competent to the Committee to make grants in the usual manner to any Mission, in connexion with the Society, which supports its own Clergyman; and any such Mission shall be held to be in connection with the Society whose Clergyman subscribes ten shillings, and makes a collection in his Mission, annually, towards the general funds of the Society.

25.—If a Clergyman leave his Mission before the time for sending in his annual collection, the Committee shall have power, on the recommendation of the President, to grant him a sum which shall appear equitable.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

26.—In the absence of the President, the Archdeacon, or, in his absence, the Senior Vice-President shall take the Chair at all meetings of the Committee or Members, and shall have a casting vote.

27.—The Treasurer shall receive all monies forwarded to him for the objects of the Society, and shall pay or disburse the same as determined by the Committee, and shall furnish to the President and Committee a statement of accounts up to the day appointed for auditing the same.

28.—No money shall be paid or disbursed by the Treasurer except on a written order, specifying the amount to be paid, and its object; which order must be signed by the Chairman of the Committee at which the grant was made, or in his absence, by the Senior Officer of the Society in St John's.

29.—The Committee shall meet for despatch of business in St. John's, on the first Thursday after every quarter day, at 2 o'clock, P.M.

30.—A special meeting of the Committee may be convened at any time, either [1] by the President, or [2] by two Vice-Presidents; or [3] by any five members of the Committee; provided due notice of such meeting with its object be given the day before to all the other members of the Committee in St. John's.

31.—At a special meeting to be holden seven days before the annual meeting, the Committee shall appoint two of their number to examine the Treasurer's accounts up to that season, which accounts examined, approved, and signed by the auditors as correct, shall be submitted to the Committee to be by them incorporated in or appended to the next yearly Report, and so presented to the members at the next annual general meeting.

32.—The Committee shall fix the salary of the Secretary, and shall provide for all the contingent expenses of the Committee and the Society.

DUTIES OF THE SECRETARY.

33.—The Secretary shall summon and attend all meetings of the Committee and Members, and shall arrange the business, and record minutes of the same to be signed by the Chairman. He shall prepare the annual report, and superintend the printing of the same; shall conduct the correspondence with the Clergy and others on behalf of the Committee; and

shall be responsible for the safe custody of all books, receipts and papers belonging to the Society.

PRAYERS.

34.—All meetings of the Society, or of the Committee, shall be opened and closed with the prayers used at the meetings of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, or others provided for the purpose by the Bishop of the Diocese.

ALTERATION OF RULES.

35.—These Rules may be altered, repealed, or added to by the Members assembled at any general meeting; provided the proposed alteration has been stated in writing by any person intending to propose it to the Secretary at least a month before, for the information of the President and Committee, and that assent has been given to it by the President and a majority of the whole Committee convened for its consideration; and provided also, that it shall be competent to the President to propose any alteration to a general meeting, notwithstanding such alteration may not have received the assent of the Committee.

NEW DEANERIES.

36.—New Deaneries created by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese shall be allowed to elect Representatives; provided that in every Deanery there shall be at least two resident Clergymen, and ten Churches and Congregations.

NOTE.—While it is expected that every Clergyman in the Colony will make a yearly collection for the promotion of the objects of the Church Society, and impress upon every individual under his Pastoral charge, the obligations by which he is bound to contribute thereto, year by year,—the system of the

Church Society does not require any Clergyman to withhold the ordinances of the Church in any case of refusal or neglect to pay towards his support.

The above rules were agreed to by the President and Members of the Church Society at an adjourned special general Meeting held on Friday, July 16th 1858.

PROCEEDINGS

At the Twenty-third Anniversary of "The Newfoundland Church Society," held at St John's 23rd June, 1864, the LORD BISHOP in the Chair.

The Report of the Committee having been read, and the Treasurer's Accounts submitted, the following Resolutions were agreed to.

Proposed by C. F. Bennett, Esq., and seconded by the Hon. H. W. Hoyles,—

That the Report now read, with the Treasurer's accounts be adopted and published.

Proposed by the Rev. T. M. Wood, and seconded by J. Tunbridge, Esq.,—

That this meeting desires to acknowledge with reverence and gratitude, the mercy and goodness of GOD to the Church Society, during the past year.

Proposed by the Hon. Judge Robinson, and seconded by the Rev. G. M. Johnson,—

That we receive with peculiar satisfaction and thankfulness the announcement of a determination to attempt the establishment of Missions in White Bay, on the Eastern, and Bay of Islands on the Western coast of the so-called French Shore; on the principle of requiring the people to support their Clergyman.

Proposed by F. B. T. Carter, Esq., and seconded by W. H. Mare, Esq.,—

That we desire to express our deep sense of the loss which the Society will sustain, in the departure of his His Excellency the Governor, our much esteemed Patron, and Lady Bannerman; with our earnest hopes and prayers for their future peace and happiness.

Proposed by the Hon. J. S. Clift, and seconded by the Hon. R. J. Present,—

That thanks are offered to the Committee for conducting the business of the Society; and that W. H. Mare, Esq., be Treasurer, and Rev. G. M. Johnson, Secretary, for the ensuing year.


The Bishop then proposed the following addition to the 5th standing rule of the Society:--

"But in case of resignation of office, or removal, of either Secretary or Treasurer, during the interval between two Annual Meetings, the Committee shall appoint a person to act in either case, until the next Annual Meeting."

And the addition proposed was unanimously agreed to.

Proposed by K. MacLea, Esq., and seconded by E. L. Jarvis, Esq.,

That the thanks of this meeting be respectfully offered to the Lord Bishop for presiding on this occasion.



REPORT FOR 1863.

The events affecting the Church Society, in each succeeding year, though always important in themselves, and interesting to the members of the Church in this Diocese, are so generally uniform, or similar in character, that no report can present the attractions of novelty. Indeed it may be feared, that in consequence of the frequent repetition of the same, or similar statements, both the Reports and Anniversaries fail in some degree of their desired profitable effect. For it ought to be ever borne in mind that the Report of a Church Society is not intended as a bare statement of facts and circumstances, nor the Anniversary Meeting an occasion and opportunity only of making and hearing speeches; but it is hoped that reported success and advancement may excite feelings of thankfulness to Almighty God and be an encouragement to further exertions, in dependence on the Divine help and blessing; while failure should convince us of our own weakness, or show where and how we have fallen short of our duty, and determine us, by God's grace, to supply deficiencies or correct defects. And if a Report is, of necessity, in the main retrospective, it is always hoped and expected that it will elicit speeches and remarks tending to promote its objects and further its designs. It is devoutly to be wished that the Society's Twenty-third Anniversary and Report may not for want of novel and striking features be regarded with indifference, or be forgotten as soon as over. The Committee hope and believe that the events and circumstances to be brought before your notice are cal-

culated to increase your interest in, and endeavours for, the progress and prosperity of the Society, when you perceive and consider how greatly the cause of Christ's Church and true religion has been, and is, promoted by its operations, and how largely the sphere of those operations, with their holy and blessed effects, may be and should be extended in this diocese.

The Committee have great pleasure in being able to assure you and the members of the Church generally that, however far short of what may be, and it is humbly hoped will be, effected by its instrumentality, the affairs and prospects of the society were never on the whole in a more satisfactory and promising condition; whether as regards the funds contributed, or the purposes to which they are, and will be applied. It is indeed a subject of never ceasing regret that so many of the Missions are still kept from that communion and co-operation, which, if productive of no immediate and material benefit to themselves, (a result it might be hoped, not always insisted on)—if productive of no present and material benefit to themselves, in respect of income, or Church, or Parsonage-house, would assuredly strengthen the Church spiritually and increase its efficiency, and bring down the blessing promised to those "who are of one mind in a House." But still further, if every mission, sending to the Treasurer one-fourth of the general collection, may receive on any particular occasion, far more than the amount contributed, the interests of every Mission would surely in turn be served by such association. And that such has been the case—that every Mission contributing to the funds of the Society has received back, upon requiring and asking assistance, more than the amounts paid in,—might very easily be shewn by reference to the accounts of Receipt and Expenditure. This remark applies of course to the Out port Missions;

the town of St. Johns always, as in duty bound, contributing, beyond the requirements of its own Clergy and Churches, for the necessities of poorer Missions. But suppose it were otherwise, suppose the case of a Mission contributing year after year, for many years, one fourth of the Collections, and asking for nothing in return, should it not be an occasion of joy and thankfulness that by throwing this contribution into the common fund, the Church has been strengthened and extended in other parts of the Diocese? Let it never be forgotten that through these combined contributions,—besides the assistance given to the Clergy or their Missions, year after year, in the erection or repair of Churches and Parsonage houses, and the purchase of land for Church purposes,—the foundation of the Fund for the Widows and Orphans of the Clergy was laid by a grant of £500, and more recently by a grant of of £300, a Depot established for the sale of Bibles, Prayer Books and other religious Books and Tracts published by the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, and lastly and especially, half the annual stipend of two additional Missionaries provided. These considerations, it is hoped, will furnish a reply to those persons who not unnaturally or unreasonably complain of the limited extent of the Society's operations. But on this point we would be permitted to quote some remarks in the Lord Bishop's last Charge to the Clergy, two years ago. "With regard to our Church Society though it is much to be lamented that so few of the Missions assist, and are assisted by it, yet when it appears that in the last twelve months," (in "the year 1861") not less than £800 have been granted to the various objects directly contemplated in its rules, and that there still remains in the Treasurer's hands a balance of £711, we cannot, I think, complain of failure. Except the usual appropriations to the

Clergy in St Johns, the payment to the Secretary, the Printing, and other trailing miscellaneous expenses, the residue, it will be seen, has been expended wholly for the benefit of the Outharbor Missions, *in amount three times what they have contributed.*" "I desire", the Bishop proceeds, "to express my sincere gratitude to those who have enabled me to assist so largely so many important and sacred objects." The Bishop then brings forward one of many instances where the refusal to co-operate with the Society prevented much needed assistance which would otherwise have been gladly rendered. "The late calamitous fire at Port de Grave, (which swept away one of the best Parsonage houses in the Diocese,) and the narrow escape from like destruction of the new Church and Parsonage at Topsail, will, I conceive, shew the advantage of having a claim upon such a fund as that of the Church Society. Towards the purchase of the Parsonage at Port de Grave, twelve years ago, £100 was granted by the Society, and it would have, been a pleasure, I believe, to the Committee to have made a similar or larger grant, in that Mission's greater need, if contributions to the funds of the Society had been duly continued." Such are the Bishop's remarks, and they receive now additional weight from the fact that although considerable subscriptions were given by private friends for the erection of another Parsonage, and the inhabitants of Port de Grave have given what assistance they could, the house is not yet completed, and the Missionary resides in a rented house, in another part of the Mission.

The actual income of the Society during the past year, that is, between the last and present Anniversary, as shown by the Treasurer's Accounts, has been £1,003 5s. 2d. of which over £710 have been collected in St. John's, leaving about £290 as the contribu-

tion of the various Outharbors which have connected themselves with the Society. It must however be always borne in mind, as remarked in one of the Society's former reports, that this latter sum represents nearly £1,200 contributed in those Missions, as three fourths of every such collection may (except in St. John's) be retained towards the Missionary's own use or maintenance. On the whole, though the amount in some instances is very small and much reduced from former years, the total sum is larger than that of any year, since the Rule was passed requiring only one-fourth of the collections to be remitted to the Treasurer. Again, while only two Missions of those which contributed last year have made no return, and both of these may yet be expected, it will be seen that seven new lists have been forwarded with (in all but two instances) the full fourth part of the collection, in those two a portion only. The following are the amounts reported.

Of these, while some have fallen short of former years, particularly those in the neighbourhood of St. John's, (in consequence no doubt of the acknowledged great failure of the fishery.) others have proportionably advanced. The Committee cannot help noticing with regret that from Fortune Bay, in the day of its prosperity, no returns have been received, while the Collections in St. John's, during a season of much difficulty and distress, are the largest, it is believed, ever made. Still there are too many in St. John's, as elsewhere, who receive the services of the Church and Clergy without any due acknowledgement. Surely it is not too much to expect that all, according to their means, should make some sacrifices, if need be, in return for their great blessings and privileges as Christians and Churchmen, particularly in this city where the means of grace are, by God's blessing, so constantly and abundantly provided. Surely such sacrifices should be made cheerfully and thankfully, and not, as we have reason to know is sometimes the case, "now coldly given, now utterly refused." *"If thou hast much give plenteously, if thou hast little, do thy diligence gladly to give of that little, for so gatherest thou thyself a good reward in the day of necessity."* Taking the average of the amounts reported,—omitting only St. John's, the largest, and Quidi Vidi, the smallest, (both exceptional cases,)—it will appear that, if all the other Missions had made returns, the sum at the disposal of the Committee would have been, (besides, and in addition to, the collections in

the Capital,) £455; representing, with the three fourths retained by the Clergyman, the sum of £1820, or with the collections in St. John's about £2,550.

Besides the usual appropriations to the support of the Clergy in St. John's, which, in consequence of the absence of the Incumbent of the Cathedral are upwards of £150 less than in former years, the following grants have been paid towards the other objects of the Society, viz.

And there are still outstanding Grants to Out harbor Missions to the amount of nearly £200.

It seems needful to remark here that rule 20 re-

quires a *bona fide* fourth of the amount collected in any Mission to be remitted to the Treasurer, to ensure the printing and publication of the names of the Subscribers. Any sums required for local uses will be granted out of the fourth on application by the Missionary; though it is hoped that some balance, as much as can be spared, will be always left for mutual general use; to be refunded, with additions, when required for any particular purpose, to each Mission in turn.

The Committee are of opinion that it would tend to uniformity of action throughout the Diocese, in making collections for the Society, and to the increase of the collections, if blank forms were furnished to every Clergyman, in which he might insert the names of all those members of his congregation to whom he thinks it his duty to make application for a contribution, and the amount contributed by each. The forms so filled up to be returned, with the fourth of the collections, to the Secretary or Treasurer. Such forms will henceforward be furnished to the Clergy.

The Clergy Widows and Orphans Fund appears to be well sustained. Through the good providence of God there is still only one pensioner on the Fund. In consequence of the removal of several Clergy to distant and less healthy Dioceses it has been thought necessary to increase in future the amount of the annual subscription to be paid by those Clergymen who, after leaving Newfoundland, desire to continue their claim upon the fund. The new Rule however does not, and will not, affect the interests of the widows or children of any Missionaries who joined the fund before the alteration; but, looking forward to the certainty of a much larger demand upon the income of the charity, it appeared to the Rev. Mr. Pearson, who suggested the alteration, and to the members of the Society who con-

curred in it, that the families of those Clergy, who are content to remain in a poor Diocese should not suffer through the removal of those who are allured by brighter prospects to other and less healthy countries. The alteration was very carefully considered, and several of the Clergy attended specially on the occasion.

The actual income of the Fund this year including donations and interest of loans amounts to £319 4s. 10l. The capital is now upwards of £2000, of which £1175 is invested at 6 per cent. The remainder bears interest, in the Bank, of 3 per cent, but will soon, it is hoped, be more profitably invested.

The Committee cannot mention the name of Mr. Pearson without expressing their grateful sense of his valuable services as Secretary of the Church Society. Appointed to the office, on the Bishop's recommendation, directly after his arrival in the Diocese, without any previous knowledge of the Clergy, or their Missions, he soon by careful and unremitting attention gained all requisite information, and won their respect and regard. He assisted greatly in establishing the Clergy Widows and Orphans Fund, on what was supposed a secure foundation; but when, on looking forward he saw reason to apprehend that at some future, though distant, day, the demands on the fund might exceed the income, he did not hesitate to suggest an alteration, which, as already remarked, resulted in the new Rule 14; applicable however only in the case of future members.

Again, when it was determined to relieve the Lord Bishop of the care and expense of the Book Depository, and the management was entrusted to a sub-committee, Mr. Pearson engaged in the work with his usual zeal and discretion, and by strict attention to the accounts, and vigilance in taking stock at the appointed times, and judicious expenditure of the Society's li-

beral grant (previously referred to) placed, and has left, this important branch of the Society's operations in a very flourishing condition. During the past year there has been received by the sub-committee from the sale of Bibles, Books of Common Prayer, Hymn Books and other religious and useful publications, (the Bookseller's per-centage being deducted,) the sum of £291 14s. 11d; an increase of not less than 50 per cent upon the first half years sales under the new management. A balanced account will be presented, by which it will be seen that, after payment of all expenses due to the present time, a balance remains of £18 1s. 0d.; while the stock in hand, together with the furniture, may be fairly valued at little less than £300, the amount of the Society's grant. The Sub-committee in presenting their report have suggested the desirableness of devising some means whereby the expence attendant upon the sales may be lessened, with a view to a wider circulation of the many valuable books at present in stock. The Committee, of course, recognize the propriety and advantage of offering the books at as low a price as possible, consistently with safe custody, an eligible and respectable locality, and the power and will to attend to the commissions from the Outports, and, what is of primary importance, the certainty of keeping up the fund for a continued supply of books. The Committee have the question under consideration, and will gladly adopt any well considered alterations, as to economy or otherwise, which may at any time be practicable. It is desirable that the Clergy, and others interested in Schools, should be informed that the Sub-committee have lately added to their stock a supply of the Christian Knowledge Society's excellent reading and other School Books,—Grammars, Geographies, English Histories, &c., which, if slightly higher in price than similar works published by other Societies, will be found fully to justify the

difference by their superior quality. A large supply of the Society's Hymn Book, which has proved so generally acceptable in the Diocese, is always on hand. The amount realized by the sale of these books, since their introduction in the Churches, has been of considerable benefit to the Depository.

The departure of our much valued Secretary at this juncture has shown the necessity of some alteration or modification of the 5th Standing Rule of the Society, which directs that the Secretary and Treasurer should be elected at the annual general Meeting. The consequence is that since the departure of Mr. Pearson the Society has been and still (at this important juncture) is without a Secretary, and had not the Bishop obtained the assistance of the Rev. Mr. Temple, there would have been some difficulty in holding the Anniversary Meeting, or, at least, in presenting a Report. The inconvenience might be still greater if our excellent Treasurer should remove, or relinquish his office (of which, however, we earnestly hope there is no prospect,) and no person deputed to undertake his very responsible and by no means easy duties. To meet this difficulty the Bishop, as empowered by Rule 34, will submit to this Meeting a new Rule giving authority to the Committee to appoint, in the case of removal, or relinquishment of office, of either Secretary or Treasurer, some person or persons to act provisionally until the next general Meeting. On the present occasion the members now present will appoint their Treasurer and Secretary as usual, for the ensuing year.

Since our last Anniversary two new and beautiful Churches have been consecrated in the Mission of Ferryland, both of which were assisted by the grants of this Society; four others—two in Conception Bay, and two in Trinity Bay—are ready for consecration, three of these also have received grants of £50 each;

eight or nine more are in course of erection in different parts of the Diocese, four of which are near completion, two of them on the coast of Labrador. Grants of £75 have been promised to three; and all, in missions connected with the Society, may expect help if required. This statement, it is presumed, will sufficiently establish the benefit done and doing by the Society in this branch of its operations. It is more than probable that without the encouragement and assistance thus afforded, there would have been much greater delay and difficulty, in several cases, both in commencing and completing the. *in every case*, much needed and much desired, new and enlarged House of Prayer. Nor is it of small importance that, before grants are made, some description of the building—size, arrangement and probable cost—is required by the Committee; which affords an opportunity of at least suggesting improvements and the prevention of unnecessary expenditure. It is worthy of consideration whether this department might not engage the attention of a Sub-committee.

The Bishop, at the request of the Committee, has furnished a detailed statement of the number of Churches in Newfoundland and Labrador, shewing in each Deanery, the number (1st) of those consecrated and in use, (2) finished and ready for consecration, and (3) in course of erection, and has further stated the number consecrated by himself, as follows:

The Committee have learnt with much satisfaction that the Clergyman appointed to succeed Mr. Pearson, in the important Incumbency of St. Mary's Church in this Town, has been employed for several years under the immediate direction of the Lord Bishop of Fredricton his father, as Sub-dean of the Cathedral Church, with a Mission in the neighbourhood; and in each capacity has won the esteem and regard of the congregation. We doubt not his appointment will be hailed with satisfaction by his new parishioners, in the hope that the loss they have experienced in the removal of their late much esteemed pastor will be speedily repaired.

The difficulty which occurred after the death of Archdeacon Bridge and the Rev. Mr. Mountain in procuring a duly qualified graduate of an English University, to fill the offices of Incumbent of the Cathedral and Bishop's Commissary, has been again experienced since the resignation of Archdeacon Lower, and chiefly from the same cause,—the insufficiency of the stipend to induce a Clergyman of the required standing and attainments to leave England and settle with a family in this country. The correspondence which passed between the Bishop and two gentlemen who in succession offered themselves, has been shewn to the Committee, and while both declare themselves perfectly satisfied with the position and work, and express much regret in declining the appointment, the last applicant particularly, having a young family, speaks of the imprudence of lessening his means and injuring the prospects of his children, as he would do by accepting the situation, which in other respects has, in his view, many attractions. The Committee however are informed that an unmarried Clergyman is now expected by the next or following Mail Packet, who, from having occupied a very similar position with, and

under, the Bishop of Sodor and Man, (in whose Diocese he has up to this time resided as Rector of Kirk Michael) it is hoped and believed will fill his important and responsible offices to the satisfaction of the Clergy and his congregation, and to the honor and advancement of our Church and holy religion. He is a Master of Arts of the University of Cambridge, and for several years was his Bishop's domestic Chaplain, until promoted to the Rectory of the Parish in which the Bishop resides.

Since the last Anniversary, two Students of the Theological College have been ordained Deacons, and three Deacons, all formerly Students, have been advanced to the Priesthood; three of the five—one Deacon and two Priests—natives of or residents in the Colony. These circumstances evince the great importance of maintaining the College in full efficiency, for which purpose it may be expected that a large demand will shortly be made on the funds of the Society, inasmuch as the grant of S. P. G. to the College for the Students will expire next year, without much probability of its being renewed. This was one of the objects for which the Bishop, in his last Charge to the Clergy insisted on the necessity of keeping a considerable balance in the Treasurers hands. Its great importance cannot be doubted. Through the liberality of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel the College has afforded an opportunity to young men of this country of devoting themselves to the service of the Church, by offering them a good education and special training for the Ministry, at little, or almost no, expense. Board, lodging and instruction are all provided gratuitously. And the great and increasing difficulty of obtaining Clergymen from, or even in, England, as well as in the Colonies, is another reason for holding out this opportunity and inducement to pious and respect-

able young men whether of this country or otherwise. There is too much reason to fear that it would have been impossible otherwise to have kept the Missions filled, as happily at present they are.

The Committee are informed that one of the lately ordained Deacons is engaged as assistant to the Rev. Mr. Blackmore in the large and important Mission of Bay Roberts, the first instance it is believed, of a Clergyman being employed as Curate, by any Missionary in an Out-harbor. Similar assistance is much needed, and would be of essential benefit, in several other Missions; benefit to all parties concerned—to the Missionary, his curate and the people. But want of means, not less than of men, preclude the more general adoption of this desirable arrangement. The other newly ordained has taken Mr. Temple's Mission of Ferryland, which Mr. Temple has resigned with the disinterested, self-denying purpose of devoting himself to the service of the long neglected fishermen in White Bay and the adjacent parts of the (so-called) French Shore, trusting to them, under God, for his maintenance. The Committee has felt peculiar pleasure in making him a grant of £25 for the commencement of his arduous undertaking. They will have like pleasure in granting like assistance to the Clergyman whom the Bishop hopes to send next year, under similar circumstances, to the Bay of Islands and other harbors on the Western Shore, equally needing and desiring the ministrations of the Church. The Churchmen of Greenspond and Hearts Content who took upon themselves to support respectively their Clergyman, (he on his part relinquishing his claim to stipend paid by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel for the poorer and distant parts of his Mission,) are fulfilling their engagements, to the benefit and blessing of themselves not less, (may we not say even more?) than of

their poor neighbours. To each of the two new Missions formed from and in that of Greenspond the Committee have pledged the Society to the extent of £60 yearly. This is a good, though small, beginning, and nothing prevents the extension of similar benefits to many other parts of the Diocese, equally in need, but the insufficiency of the means at the disposal of the Committee, and the sad certainty that the reduction already commenced by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in this as in other Colonial Dioceses, (though in this much less rapidly and extensively than in most others,) will be carried on, to an extent which will require far greater exertions, than are at present used to maintain the existing Missions. Moreover half the stipend which the Bishop at present receives from home, will, after his removal be withdrawn. The Society will it is hoped, perceive and acknowledge that it is a matter of duty on the part of the Committee to look onward to these various demands and difficulties, and to temper Christian zeal with Christian prudence, in the management of the funds placed at their disposal.

The Society must again be reminded that there are still many Missions far too extensive to be properly ministered to by one Clergy man, and greatly needing to be divided, or sub.divided,—Trinity, with five Churches and a sixth in progress, and a considerable population attached to each,—Harbor Buffet, with five Churches, all on different Islands, and several other stations, some of them 40 or 50 miles from the residence of the Missionary, and making necessary a circuit of upwards of 100 miles, all to be performed in a boat,—Moreton's Harbor with four Churches finished and consecrated, two others ready for consecration, and one advancing towards completion, (seven in all) scattered along 70 or 80 miles of peri-

lous coast, as our poor Sealers have this year learnt to their cost, in whose sufferings and losses we have great cause to sympathize. Those, and other Missions (as those of Fortune Bay and Hermitage Bay) scarcely less extensive and populous, loudly call for the relief which has been, in a measure, extended to Heart's Content and Greenspond, though in the former of these there are still four Churches; and in the latter three. A few extracts from the Annual Report of the Missionary of Moreton's Harbor to the Secretary of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel will furnish some idea of the nature and difficulties of that unwieldy and perilous Mission.

MORETON'S HARBOUR, PARSONAGE,

NEWFOUNDLAND, 14th April, 1864.

REVEREND AND DEAR SIR,

"I beg to enclose the annual statistical return, for the Mission of Notre Dame Bay.

"I was appointed to this Mission in June last. Upon my arrival I was anxious to visit the remoter stations, which can only be visited during the summer months, but there appeared then, not the slightest chance of my doing so. In consequence of the immense quantity of ice floating about, navigation was suspended until nearly the middle of July. One morning whilst debating how to proceed, I discovered the tall masts of a Man-of-War lying at anchor in our little harbour. I found that it was the s.s. VESUVIUS, and that her Captain had taken refuge, being unable to proceed Northward, in this peaceful haven. Having expressed my wishes to Captain HAMILTON, to visit the Cape Shore, the northern part of the Bay, he very kindly offered to touch at Shoe Cove, and land me. This was an offer which I thankfully and gratefully accepted. As it appeared doubtful when the ice would clear away sufficiently to permit our putting out to sea, and as I was living three miles from this place, the Captain pressed me to take up my quarters on board. Accordingly I went on board at an early hour on Wednesday morning, (the 7th July), the day passed, and the wind, as night came on, freshened from the s.w., driving the ice off land. The following day, early in the morning, orders were given to "get up steam." At 10 A.M., just as we were ready to sail, the wind suddenly changed in an opposite direction, bringing in the ice very rapidly. Trusting that he would get along under the land, the Captain put to sea, but the ice came in so quickly that it was impossible to proceed; so we had to

run down Exploits Bay and anchor, for that and the following day at Peter's Arm, forty miles further from my destination than when we started in the morning. On Saturday the 10th, at 4 A.M., we made a second attempt at proceeding on our journey, and after several delays, through fog and ice, I was landed at Cape John, six miles from Shoe Cove, whence the Coast Guard kindly conveyed me to Shoe Cove that evening. I arrived there just in time to let the good people know that there would be Divine Service in their new Church on the morrow.

"A few words about Shoe Cove and its people may be interesting. First as to the former. It presents a barren and inhospitable appearance. Huge rocks rising almost perpendicularly out of the deep green waters, and towering to the height of six or seven hundred feet above the level of the sea. The sea dashes and roars at the base of these rocks. It is a magnificent and glorious sight to watch the billows heaving in with the mighty power they do. The first view of Shoe Cove (especially if taken from the sea) inspires the visitor with awe, rather than love or pleasure. Ashore we find nothing which speaks a good word for it. Here and there a rough potato garden (or perhaps an apology for one, is the most fitting way of speaking). It seems a wonder how people can be content to live in such a place. Yet notwithstanding the want of all natural attraction, the place has its attractions both for the inhabitants and the Clergyman: To the former, those deep waters often times yield a rich harvest. This is the incentive to live there. Every available spot of ground is now occupied by fishermen. To the Clergyman the attractiveness of Shoe Cove consists in this, viz.—the people have generous hearts and right gladly do they welcome the messenger of glad tidings. Without any foreign aid they have erected a Church at a cost of nearly £300, and a Lay-leader holding the Bishop's License, officiates during my absence. We are hoping his Lordship the Bishop, will consecrate it during his next Visitation. There are no people in the Mission more desirous and willing to contribute to their Clergyman's support, and also to subscribe to the local charities, than these. During my two sojourns at Shoe Cove, I was highly gratified by observing the quiet and attentive demeanour of the people in Church, and the great reverence they paid to the Service. I held two full Services in the Church, and in the evening baptized privately two infants. On the following day (Monday), I visited the daily School, and found the children progressing favourably: Several were able to read with tolerable accuracy portions of the New Testament, and had some knowledge of the Church Catechism. Low as this standard of education appears to be, it is far more advanced than it was two years ago, when scarcely one (and, alas, perhaps not one) of the rising generation could discern between A and B: There is work—hard work—to be done here—rough ground to be

harrowed, ere the "word" can be sown with any success. Contemplating the Cape Shore as an extensive field for Missionary labour and enterprise, one is forcibly reminded of those words "Lift up your eyes, and look on the fields; for they are white already to harvest." I should rejoice, and I am sure our good Bishop would too, if another Clergyman were located somewhere or other on the Shore.

"At twelve (noon) I left Shoe Cove, two stout lads taking me in a boat, for Round Harbour, calling at Beaver and Tilt Cove, where I said Prayers and baptized two infants. As we roged into Round Harbour, Mr. Coombs, an old Englishman, and a most zealous Churchman, came down to the wharf and most cordially greeted, and at once took me to his house, where I was very hospitably entertained. Next morning at nine I held full Service in his kitchen, which was crowded to excess. We then proceeded, here after service to Snook's Arm, a distance of three miles, where I again held Divine Service—baptized three infants separately, and visited two sick persons. We returned to Round Harbor, and at 7 P. M. found a large congregation assembled, awaiting Prayers. Having again joined in public Worship, and baptized another infant, my services were required by a couple desirous of being joined together in Holy Matrimony. After performing this ceremony, I concluded the services of the day by family prayer. I was as you may imagine, tired and worn out by the excess of duty I had to do. Next morning I found it impossible to get away before I had again held Service; and when at last I did leave, it was with the most pressing invitation to return as speedily as possible and remain longer.

"The same welcome greeted me at Indian Burying Place. I Held Service here in the loft of a fish-store. The odour of the fish, the heat of the place, combined with the mosquito bites, rendered it anything but pleasant for people or Minister. Baptized several infants and celebrated Divine Service thrice. From Indian Burying Place, I proceeded to Nipper's Harbor (so called and not undeservedly, from the numbers of those voracious insects which infest the place). This place makes some pretensions to a very snug little harbor, where vessels of a small tonnage will find a secure haven. There is also a small Church which has just been completed. But alas! the building is far too small. The result is, it is crowded to excess, and some get no admittance, but are obliged to content themselves by standing outside, exposed to the scorching rays of the sun. I held five full Services and baptized several infants, and also a good deal of pastoral visiting. On the following day (Monday) I contrived to visit Rogue's Harbour, where I held Service, and in the evening Stocking Harbor, hoping to be put on to the next station the same evening. And here such a sense of loneliness, nay wretchedness came over me that I had never before experienced. Missionary

life appeared to me then in some of its sterner realities. I was on a desolate shore with only two or three wretched huts; and they more than a mile apart, and a few women and children, the men except two, having gone out fishing for the night. However, I held Service again. In standing up I struck my head so violently that I was almost rendered senseless. They build these huts without any regard to height or comfort; so that for the most part, they are the most wretched hovels imaginable. In one of these I was doomed to sleep, but sleep—that was out of the question. The mosquitoes most grievously tormented me, so that with the grey dawn, I rose from my hard bed, and wandered out in the cool and refreshing morning breeze. At 6 A. M., baptized an infant, and a man and a boy put me across to King's Cove. Here I held service and baptized an infant. I hurried on to Three Arms Island, and Mr. Wells the chief planter did all in his power to further my views by giving up, and preparing the best room he had in his house, which was soon crowded to excess. I did not baptize any infants during this Service; giving the preference to the Service I held on the morrow Wednesday came, and with it a bright day, and (as I waited till the boats came in from sea) I had a good congregation. Several infants were baptized, and I proceeded immediately after Service to baptize one privately. Early on Thursday morning I was roused by my host, who came to inform me that the "True Blue" (a schooner in which I had been promised a passage) was coming up the harbor and had sent a boat ashore for me. I was soon ready to join them—and the schooner having "shortened her canvass," we got alongside and safely on board. Immediately the sails were spread again, and away we went at the rate of ten knots before a splendid breeze. Little more than an hour had elapsed and we were safe in Ward's Harbour. Most of the men had left the day before for the Labrador, where they prosecute the cod fishery with much success. As the men in the harbor were very much engaged the day I arrived, I deemed it better to defer holding any service in the Church until next day, employing the time that intervened in visiting. Friday came bringing with it glorious weather, and consequently my congregation was very much larger than I had anticipated. Morning and Afternoon Service—at the latter several infants were baptized, and there would have been many more had the parents been at home. At 4 A. M. I left in a large boat for Leading Tickle [a distance of 14 miles] and arrived at noon, tired and hungry; having had a short night's rest and no breakfast before I started. Held Service at 5 P. M. the same day [Festival of St. James] in the Church, and twice the following day, with several [5] baptisms and one churching.

"Monday I was not well, but the following day pushed on to New Bay Head, where I had Service, and some more baptisms. I suffered

intensely, and scarcely know how I got through my duty. So much exposure, little rest, hard duty and oftentimes want of proper nourishment, tell on us. Feeling somewhat more relieved, early the next morning (5 A.M.) my slumber was disturbed by the announcement "crew ready Sir." A row of 12 miles is again before me, but it is soon accomplished, and I am once more safely landed at Exploit's Burnt Island. Held Service in the Church at 6 P.M. and on the following day at 11 A.M., when I had two baptisms, and at 6 P.M., called at Black Island, held Service and baptised one infant. A crew put me on to Morston's Harbor, and after an absence of more than three weeks I was restored in safety to my own home.

"A recruit of three weeks was all that I ventured to take, and seizing the opportunity afforded me by a schooner going in the Bay, I determined to visit my flock without any delay. I was eight weeks accomplishing this second visitation. This arose from the fact that I was not, as before, set down at the extreme point of my Mission, but had to get there as best I could, and partly because my visit in each place was longer, and because I found out several places where I ought to have called before, and lastly, because the weather was more boisterous (for the season was somewhat advanced when I returned). You will perceive that in all I was away eleven weeks—a long time. But is it too long, when the fact is borne in mind that no other Clergyman (unless some unforeseen event happens) will visit them till I do this summer? Is it too long when souls are thirsting for the Waters which flow from the smitten rock in the wilderness? Nay, if ever an earnest petition came to the Church for help—it comes from the Cape Shore. A Clergyman of the Church is what they want. I should rejoice, and I am sure our good and devoted Bishop would wish me, to see our Church raising the standard of the Cross higher than she has yet done in this benighted place. I might go on and urge the claims of the place, rather what I think are its claims, upon the Church, but I feel I have already trespassed to an unpardonable length upon your time.

"I am very sorry to inform you that at present the prospect appears miserable. The whole of Notre Dame Bay at this moment presents the most gloomy scene. Miles and miles of ice—nowhere a drop of water to be seen—and a fleet of a hundred and fifty vessels—some burning—others thrown out on the ice—many more disabled—is all that meets the eye. Crew after crew are constantly arriving, having abandoned their vessels, seeking an asylum ashore. From what I am told, I fear that this spring is likely to be the most disastrous ever known. No seals caught! The number of wrecks far exceeding that of 1821!

"Once more I would allude to the high regard entertained by the people for the Ministration of the Church. No matter in what light they may be viewed by some, there are others who appreciate and

estimate them highly. I speak from personal experience and observation.

"In conclusion, I can but hope that our labours for the cause of Christ and the extention of the Redeemers kingdom, may be abundantly blessed in a rich harvest of souls; and that many will awake from a life of sin unto a life of righteousness.

The Committee believe they should disappoint the expectations of all present at this Meeting, and certainly they would not satisfy their own feelings and wishes, if they omitted to take advantage of this opportunity to express the sincere sorrow with which they in common with all the members of the Society, (if they should not rather say all members of society in this Colony,) contemplate the shortly expected departure of their highly respected Patron, His Excellency the Governor, and Lady Bannerman the true friend and ever ready helper of all our religious or charitable associations. Of his Excellency's administration of his Government it is not necessary, and might not become us on this occasion to speak at length, but we cannot, and need not, refrain from testifying with much thankfulness, that it has ever been directed, and has most happily tended, to the promotion of order, industry and peace; and that it is due to his courage, firmness and honesty of purpose that all classes in the community have been enabled to express their opinions and exercise their privileges freely and openly, the result of which has been that many members of this Society, before most unwisely and unrighteously prevented, are now permitted to serve their country, in a season of no ordinary trial and difficulty. His Excellency has been from the first a liberal yearly contributor to the funds of our Society, as well as to

many other objects and undertakings connected with our Church and religion. Of her Ladyship's charities it would be long to tell, indeed they are so numerous and various, and yet done so silently and unostentatiously, that none but He "who seeth in secret, and will reward openly" can ever in this world know them all; but, with regard to those more public ones, in which the members of our Church chiefly are interested—the Church Society, the Asylum for Widows and Orphans, the Self Assisting Clothing Society, (which have long enjoyed her Ladyship's bountiful patronage.) and more recently, the Industrial association—we are nearly all aware how cheerfully she has rendered all required assistance both by purse and in person, and has ever striven to combine the promotion of religion and virtue, with the relief of bodily want or suffering. Surely, "*the blessing of him that was ready to perish shall come upon her, and she has caused the widow's heart to sing for joy.*" Sir Alexander and Lady Bannerman will long live in our affectionate and grateful remembrance, and command an abiding interest in our good wishes and prayers. God bless them!

STANDING RULES .

OF THE

Clergy Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

1.—THE NEWFOUNDLAND CHURCH SOCIETY'S Special Fund, for assisting the Widows and Orphans of deceased Clergymen of the Diocese of Newfoundland, shall consist of all monies paid to the Treasurer of the Society for that object.

2.—The Committee of the Church Society shall have the management of the Fund.

3.—Every Hundred Pounds of available surplus shall be invested by the Committee as opportunities occur. Smaller sums shall be deposited every quarter in the Savings' Bank.

4.—All Clergymen in the Diocese holding the Bishop's license may secure the benefit of this Fund by contributing, within six months from the first day of this present July, or within one year of obtaining their license from the Bishop, as follows:—(1) Unmarried Clergymen, and Widowers without a child, one pound (£1) per annum: (2) Married Clergymen, and Widowers with a Child, two pounds (£2) per annum.

5.—Subscriptions shall become due on the 31st day of December, each year. Thirty days grace shall be allowed; but every Clergyman neglecting to make payment within that time, shall forfeit his claim upon the Fund, to be recovered only upon payment of arrears with ten per cent thereon.

6.—Any Clergyman neglecting to subscribe according to Rule 4, may secure the benefit of the Fund, at

the option of the Committee, on the payment of two pounds for each year from the first day of the present July, or from the day of his being licenced by the Bishop.

7.—Every Clergyman securing the benefit of this Fund, will be expected to make, and forward to the Treasurer, a yearly special collection from every Congregation in his mission, and solicit annual subscriptions from individual members.

8.—The Widow of every Clergyman who shall have paid his annual subscription, and forwarded an annual collection, till his death, or till incapacitated by mental or bodily infirmity, shall be entitled to receive a yearly Pension of thirty pounds (£30) currency, during widowhood.

9.—If the Funds should at any time permit, the Committee may increase the amount of Pension to any sum not exceeding £50; such addition, however being subject to be withdrawn wholly or in part, should the state of the Fund not warrant its continuance.

10.—If the Widow die or marry again, the Pension shall be paid to Trustees for the benefit of such Children of the deceased husband, as may be, if boys, under sixteen, if girls, under eighteen years of age.

11.—The Trustees named by a deceased Clergyman, in the event of the death or marriage of his Widow, shall be recognized by the Committee in paying the Pension for the benefit of the child or children; but if the Trustees so named are unwilling or unable to act, the Bishop of the Diocese shall act as Trustee in the application of the Pension.

12.—If the wife die before her husband, his child or children shall receive the Pension, so long as there is a claimant under Rule ten.

13.—The pensions shall be paid half-yearly by the Bishop's order on the Treasurer on the first of Janu-

ary and first of July. The first payment to be calculated for the interval from the husband's death to the day of payment.

14.—If a Clergyman, having joined the Fund after the 24th June 1863, removes from the diocese after having served less than fourteen years, his connexion with the fund shall cease, and he shall be entitled to receive back half the amount of the annual subscriptions he has paid. If he removes after having served fourteen years and less than twenty-one years, he shall be allowed to remain in connexion with the Fund by paying an annual subscription of six pounds, or nine pounds if residing within the tropics; or he may receive back half his annual subscriptions, upon which his connexion with the Fund shall cease. If he removes after having served twenty-one years, he shall be allowed to remain in connexion with the Fund by paying an annual subscription of five pounds, or seven pounds ten shillings if residing within the tropics: or he may receive back three fourths of his annual subscriptions, upon which his connexion with the Fund shall cease. All Clergymen in connexion with the Fund previous to the 24th June, 1863, to be governed by the original Rule 14 thereof.

15.—A yearly statement of the Treasurer's account with this Fund shall be published with the Society's Report.

16.—None of the above Rules shall be altered, or repealed except at a general meeting of the Church Society, and after a full years notice to the members of the proposed change.

“ The following is the original Rule 14, governing Clergymen in connection with the Fund before June 24, 1863.

14.—If a Clergyman removes, with the Bishop's

consent, from the Diocese, after officiating in it not less than seven years, he shall be allowed his claim upon the Fund, on the payment of an annual subscription of three pounds (£3); or, if he desire it, may receive back half the amount he has paid; which repayment shall release the Fund from all his claims upon it."

The above Rules; with the exception of the new Rule 14, were agreed to by the President and Members of the Church Society at a special general meeting held on Wednesday, July 14th, 1858.
