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BY-LAWS

OF THE

MUNICIPAL COUNCIL

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TOWNSHIP OF RALEIGH,

FROM MAY 7TH, 1866, TO MAY 7TH, 1867.



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No. 144—A BY-LAW

To confirm and authorize the use of a certain Seal in the Corporation of the Township of Raleigh.

PASSED MAY 7TH, 1866.

Be it Enacted, by the Corporation of the Township of Raleigh, assembled under and by virtue of an Act, cap. 54 of the Consolidated Statutes of Upper Canada :

I. That the Press Seal now in use by this Corporation, with a round die, and worded on the outside "Corporation—Township—Raleigh," with the word "Kent," in the center, be and is hereby adopted as the legal Seal of the said Corporation.

No. 145—A BY-LAW

To amend a By-law entitled "A By-law for the opening and establishing of a Public Highway across the Concessions Numbered Six and Seven, between the Lots Numbered Nine and Ten, in the Township of Raleigh.

PASSED 7TH MAY, 1866.

WHEREAS it is necessary and expedient to open said line of Road ; and whereas all parties interested and owning Land affected by said Road have given a release, except in one case :

Be it therefore enacted by the Municipal Corporation of the Township of Raleigh, assembled, under and by virtue of an Act, cap. 54 of the Consolidated Statutes of Upper Canada :

I. That for and notwithstanding anything contained in the Second section of the above recited By-law, the same shall take effect from and after the passing of this By-law.

No. 146—A BY-LAW

To raise certain sums of Money therein mentioned, in the Township of Raleigh, for the year 1866.

PASSED THE 28TH DAY OF AUGUST, 1866.

WHEREAS by By-Law by the Municipal Corporation of the County of Kent,

passed on the 15th day of June, 1866, entitled "A By-law to raise the sum of \$18,000 00, to meet the current expenses of the County of Kent, and "for other purposes," the Municipality of the Township of Raleigh is required to raise the sum of One Thousand Nine Hundred Dollars as their apportion for said year, to be paid to the Treasurer of the County of Kent, without any deduction, on or before the 31st day of December, A.D. 1866 ;

Whereas the apportionment of the Legislative School Grant for the Township of Raleigh for the year 1866, amounts to \$379, according to the apportionment of the Chief Superintendent of Schools, the Municipality of the Township of Raleigh is required to levy at least an equal sum of money according to law in such case made and provided :

And whereas it is necessary to raise the following sums of money to meet the current expenses of the Corporation of the Township of Raleigh, for the year A.D. 1866, viz :

- For the Salaries of Township Officers, the sum of.....\$450
- For the support of the Poor in the Township, the sum of..... 200
- For Non-Resident School Accounts, the sum of..... 350
- For Miscellaneous Accounts, the sum of..... 270

Be it therefore enacted by the Municipal Corporation of the Township of Raleigh, in Council assembled, under and by virtue of an Act, cap. 54 of the Consolidated Statutes of Upper Canada :

I. That there shall be raised, levied, assessed and collected, upon all the rateable real and personal property in the Township of Raleigh, the sum or rate of 4 mills on every dollar thereof, for the aforesaid County purposes ; the sum or rate of One mill on every dollar thereof, for the aforesaid School purposes, excepting the property of certain Roman Catholic supporters of separate Schools ; the sum or rate of Three mills on every dollar thereof, to meet the current expenses of the Township of Raleigh, for the year of our Lord 1866 ; the sum or rate of One Dollar upon the harbinger or owner of every dog or bitch entered upon the Assessment Roll of the Township of Raleigh for the year A.D. 1866.

II. That if the above sums of money so raised and collected by the said rates shall exceed in any case the amount so required for the said purposes respectively, the Treasurer of this Corporation shall pass such excess to any deficiency that may arise, to any or either of the other purposes mentioned in this By-law ; and if no such deficiency shall happen, then all such excess, if any, shall be kept by the Treasurer and appropriated to the general purposes of the Township under the direction and control of the Council thereof, as all the public moneys which may come into his hands.

III. That the Clerk of this Municipality is required to levy a Special Rate over and above all other rates, against the estate, real and personal, of any such School Section with in this Municipality, on the request of the Trustees, who shall furnish him, on or before the First day of August, with a written statement signed by such Trustees, of the amount of money to be raised, levied, assessed and collected by this Council for Common School purposes in such School Section, such a rate *pro rata* on all the rateable property in such School Section as will amount to the sum of money required by such Trustees for the aforesaid purposes, together with the sum of Five per cent. on said amount of money, to defray the expenses of levying and collecting the same.

IV. That the Collector is hereby authorized and required to collect, according to law, the Special Rates levied on the freeholders and householders of such School Section, the sums of money opposite their respective names, and to pay the amount so collected on or before the 14th day of December next—after retaining the sum of Five per cent. as his fees—to the Secretary-Treasurer of such School Section, whose receipt, with the Corporate Seal attached, and deposited with the Treasurer of this Corporation, shall be his acquittance for the sums so paid.

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V. It shall be the duty of the Collector of this Corporation to pay over all moneys collected by him, to the Treasurer of this Corporation every two weeks, (excepting the special School Rates).

VI. That the Collector shall be allowed the same fees as are now allowed to Bailiffs of the Division Courts for all property seized, appraised, advertised and sold by him, by virtue of his office.

No. 147—A BY-LAW

To Repeal the By-law Numbered Twenty-Two, and the First Clause of By-law Numbered Twenty-Eight, of the Consolidated By-laws, published in 1865.

PASSED THE 28TH DAY OF AUGUST, 1866.

Be it therefore Enacted by the Municipal Corporation of the Township of Raleigh, assembled under and by virtue of the Act, cap. 54 of the Consolidated Statutes of Upper Canada :

I. That the By-law numbered 22, and the first clause of the By-law numbered 28, of the Consolidated and published By-laws in 1865, be and the same are hereby repealed.

No. 148--A BY-LAW

To appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Dollars for the Improvement of the Roads and Bridges in the Township of Raleigh.

PASSED THE 28TH DAY OF AUGUST, 1866.

Be it therefore enacted by the Municipal Corporation of the Township of Raleigh, in Council assembled, under and by virtue of an Act, cap. 54 of the Consolidated Statutes of Upper Canada :

I. That the sum of Four Hundred Dollars be appropriated for the improvement of the Roads and Bridges in the Township of Raleigh, as follows, viz :

To the First Rural Road Division, the sum of.....	\$80 00
To the Second do. do. the sum of.....	80 00
To the Third do. do. the sum of.....	80 00
To the Fourth do. do. the sum of.....	80 00
To the Fifth do. do. the sum of.....	80 00

II. Each Councillor is hereby authorized and empowered to expend the same in his respective Division, and to grant orders on the Treasurer of this Corporation to parties working therefor, stating what work has been done for each amount.

No. 149—A BY-LAW

To prevent Swine from running at large, North of the Great Western Railway, in the Township of Raleigh.

PASSED 28TH AUGUST, 1866.

WHEREAS it is expedient to prevent Swine from running at large in the

hereinafter described portion of the Township of Raleigh, *Be it therefore enacted, &c.*,

I. That from and after the passing of this By-law, it shall not be lawful for any Swine to run at large in that portion of the Township of Raleigh North of the Great Western Railway; and it shall be lawful for any person resident therein to impound any pig or pigs when found running at large therein.

NO. 150—A BY-LAW

To divide the Township of Raleigh into Three Electoral Divisions, to establish Polling places therein, and to appoint Returning Officers therefor.

PASSED OCT'R 1ST, 1866.

Be it therefore enacted by the Municipal Corporation of the Township of Raleigh, assembled under and by virtue of an Act, cap. 54 of the Consolidated Statutes of Upper Canada :

I. That the Township of Raleigh be and is hereby divided into Three Electoral Divisions, known and described as follows :

The First Division shall contain and consist of all that portion of the Township of Raleigh North-west of the centre of the Eighth Concession; and that the polling place be the School-House in School Section numbered 12; and that William Holmes is hereby appointed Returning Officer for said First Division.

The Second Division shall embrace and contain all that portion of the Township of Raleigh between the center of the Eighth Concession and the center of the Fourteenth Concession; and that the polling place be the Town Hall; and that John Jenner is hereby appointed Returning Officer for said Second Division.

The Third Division shall consist of all that portion of the Township of Raleigh not already embraced in the first and second Divisions, and that the polling place be at Henry Pardo's house in Deal Town, in School Section numbered 9, and that Alex'r Goulett is hereby appointed Returning Officer for the said Third Division.

NO. 151—A BY-LAW

To make provision for Draining certain Lands in the Township of Raleigh, hereinafter named.

Whereas, a majority of the resident owners of lots numbered 15, 16, 17, 18, 19 and 20, in the 1st or front concession: lot 19 in the 5th concession, western boundary, and lot 20 in the 2d concession, eastern boundary line; also, a majority of the resident owners of lots numbered 148, 149, 150, and to the centre line of lot numbered 151, on Talbot Road, have petitioned the Municipal Corporation of the Township of Raleigh that the lots of land above described may be drained;

And whereas the Council, being of the opinion that it would greatly benefit those portions of the Township to drain said lots, have ordered survey to be made, and received reports thereon, with plans and estimates of the cost of said drainage, amounting in the first-mentioned locality to \$230, and in the second and last mentioned locality to \$374 91c.—

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Be it therefore enacted by the Municipal Corporation of the Township of Raleigh, in Council assembled, under and by virtue of an Act, cap. 54, of the Consolidated Statutes of Upper Canada,

I. That the lots of land hereinbefore described in the first mentioned locality, shall be drained in accordance with the plan and estimates of the same, drawn by Arthur Jones, Esq., Provincial Land Surveyor.

II. That the lots of land numbered 148, 149, 150, and the east half of lot No. 151, Talbot Road, shall be drained in accordance with the plan and estimate of the same drawn by Sherman Malcolm, Esq., P. L. S.

III. That there shall be raised, levied and collected, along with the ordinary assessments of the present year, the sum of Six Hundred and Four Dollars and Ninety-four cents, for the purpose of paying the costs of said draining and the expenses incidental thereto, upon the several lots of land aforesaid, in proportion to the benefit to be derived therefrom by each lot, as set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed, and forming a part of this by-law—subject, nevertheless, to an appeal by the parties in each case—and provided always, that should the estimate in any case exceed the amount of costs, a reduction on each be made in proportion to the assessment on each lot.

IV. That Messrs. Dolsen and White are hereby appointed a committee to let the cutting and finishing of the drain in the first mentioned locality, in accordance with the plan and Surveyor's report of levels taken by him.

V. That Messrs. Slade and Dillon are hereby appointed a committee to let the cutting and finishing of the drain in the second and last mentioned locality in accordance with the plan and report furnished to this Council by Sherman Malcolm, Esq., Provincial Land Surveyor, of the same.

VI. That this by-law shall be published in the Chatham Banner newspaper for three months before the final passing thereof.

NO. 152—A BY-LAW

To Fix a Place for the Nomination of Candidate for Reeve and Deputy Reeve and Councillors for the Township of Raleigh.

PASSED NOV. 17, 1866.

Whereas, by Act cap. 51 of the Annual Statutes of 1866, the nomination of candidates for the above mentioned offices is required to take place at noon on the last Monday but one in the month of December; and whereas it is requisite to fix such place by by-law:

Be it therefore enacted, by the Municipal Corporation of the Township of Raleigh, in Council assembled, under and by virtue of an Act 29 and 30 Vic., cap. 51 of the Annual Statutes of Upper Canada,

I. That the nomination of candidates for the office of Reeve, Deputy Reeve and Councillors shall take place at the Town Hall in said Township, at noon on the last Monday but one in the month of December, annually.

NO. 153—A BY-LAW

To Grant Authority to the Trustees of School Section No. 4, in the Township of Raleigh, to borrow the sum of \$300, for the purpose of Erecting a New School House.

PASSED NOV. 19, 1866.

Whereas, the Trustees of School Section numbered 4, in the Township of Raleigh, have made application to the Municipal Corporation of said Township to grant them authority to borrow the sum of \$300, for the purpose of erecting a new School House, to be paid in three annual instalments, at ten per cent. interest per annum;

And whereas it will require the sum of \$120 to be raised annually for a period of three years, for paying the debt and interest created by this by-law; and whereas the amount of the rateable property in said School Section (Roman Catholic supporters of Separate Schools excepted), according to the last revised assessment roll, amounts to \$19,870;

And whereas it will require an annual special rate of six and one-tenth mills in the dollar, in addition to all other rates to be levied and collected in each year, for paying the principal and interest of said debt;

Be it therefore enacted by the Municipal Corporation of the Township of Raleigh, in Council assembled, under and by virtue of the Acts caps. 54 and 64 of the Consolidated Statutes of Upper Canada,

I. That it shall and may be lawful for the Trustees of School Section numbered four in the Township of Raleigh to raise by way of loan, and at a

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rate of interest not exceeding ten per cent. per annum, the sum of three hundred dollars, to be paid in three annual instalments, from any person or persons, body or bodies corporate, who may be willing to advance the same.

II. Should the Trustees effect said loan, it shall be the duty of the Clerk of the Corporation of Raleigh to levy on the Collector's roll the above rate of six and one-tenth mills in the dollar, annually, for a period of three years, on the assessable property in said School Section, or a sufficient rate to pay off the said debt, interest and Collector's fees.

III. It shall be the duty of the Collector to collect the same and pay it over to the Treasurer of the Township of Raleigh, whose duty it shall be to pay the amount over to the order of this Corporation.

IV. That the Collector shall be allowed the sum of five per cent. for collecting the above rate.

NO. 154—A BY-LAW

To provide for the Paying of the Members of the Council for their Attendance at Council Meetings, and Mileage.

PASSED 18TH FEBRUARY, 1867.

Be it therefore enacted by the Council of the Municipal Corporation of the Township of Raleigh, in Council assembled, under and by virtue of an Act, 29th and 30th Vic., cap. 51, of the Annual Statutes of Upper Canada,

I. That the Councillors of the Township of Raleigh shall be entitled to receive for each day's attendance in Council the sum of \$2, and five cents per mile for every mile necessarily traveled to and from the place of meeting.

II. That any or all by-laws of the Township of Raleigh repugnant to this by-law are hereby repealed.

NO. 155—A BY-LAW

To determine the Amount of Rent to be paid by any party or parties using the Township Hall.

PASSED 18TH FEBRUARY, 1867.

WHEREAS certain applications have been made by various parties for the use of the Township Hall;

And whereas it is right and just that any party or parties using the same for their own private benefit or pleasure should be compelled to make some remuneration for the use of the Hall;

Be it therefore enacted, by the Council of the Municipal Corporation of the Township of Raleigh, in Council assembled, under and by virtue of an Act 29 & 30 Vict., cap. 51 of the Annual Statutes of Upper Canada,

I. That any party or parties wishing to use the Township Hall for their own private benefit or pleasure, shall pay the sum of \$2 for every evening that they may feel disposed to occupy the same, together with all damages that may accrue from their neglect or willfulness.

II. That A. Pardo is hereby appointed to collect the fees, make fires, &c., for which he shall be allowed 50 cents for each time, and he shall at the end of each year report to the Council the amount received by him, the number of times he has let the Hall, and pay over all moneys collected.

NO. 156--A BY-LAW

To Amend a By-Law, Numbered Thirteen, of the By-Laws Consolidated in the year 1865, to Define the Limits of the different Statute Labor Divisions in the Township of Raleigh.

PASSED 18TH FEBRUARY, 1867.

Be it therefore enacted, by the Council of the Municipal Corporation of the Township of Raleigh, in Council assembled under and by virtue of an Act 29 and 30, Vic., cap. 51, of the Annual Statutes of Upper Canada.

I. That for and notwithstanding anything contained in By-law numbered thirteen of the By-laws consolidated and published in the year 1865, the portions of the Township of Raleigh heretofore known as lying in the County Statute Labor Division, and not belonging to any Division in said recited By-law, be, and the same is hereby attached to the Divisions to which the lands adjoin; and the Statute Labor shall belong to and be laid out under the directions of the Overseers of the respective Divisions to which the lands are attached.

 NO. 157--A BY-LAW

To appoint and to confirm the appointment of certain Municipal Officers of the Township of Raleigh, and to provide for the Salaries of the same for the year 1867.

PASSED 18TH FEBRUARY, 1867.

WHEREAS it is necessary that the Municipal Officers appointed by this Corporation in each year, should be appointed under the seal thereof:

Be it therefore enacted by the Municipal Corporation of the Township of Raleigh, in Council assembled, under and by virtue of an Act 29th and 30th Vic., cap. 51, of the Annual Statutes of Upper Canada:

I. That A. D. Lewis, nominated by the Reeve, and George Coutts, nominated by the Council, are hereby confirmed in the office of Auditor, and that their salary shall be the sum of \$6 each, and no more.

II. That Robert Slade is hereby confirmed in the office of Assessor, and it shall be his duty to complete and return his Roll to the Clerk not later than the Fifteenth day of April next, and that his salary shall be the sum of \$60, and no more.

III. That Martin Dillon is hereby confirmed in the office of Collector, and he is hereby required to enter into bonds on or before the meeting of this Council in the month of May, himself in the sum of \$4,000 and other good freehold securities to the amount of \$8,000; which bonds shall require him to collect all rates levied on the Collector's Roll, and to pay over the same to the Treasurer of this Corporation in manner following, that is to say:— On his receiving the Collector's Roll he shall commence to collect the rates, and shall pay in all money received by him for taxes at least every two weeks, and shall finally collect and make the return to the said Treasurer, as required by law. Salary, \$50, and no more, except what is allowed for School per centage. And it shall be the duty of the Collector, on settling with the Treasurer, to make a report of all the taxes he has received in Bank notes or other current funds, and to pay over the same, under a penalty of the forfeiture of his salary.

IV. That Arthur Jones, Esquire, P.L.S., is hereby confirmed in the office of Township Surveyor.

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V. That Robert Ritchie is hereby confirmed in the office of License Inspector, and that his salary shall be the sum of \$20, and no more.

VI. That the following persons are hereby appointed Commissioners for the respective Rural Road Divisions, viz: Richard Jordan, for the 1st Rural Road Division; Michael Kearns, for the 2nd Rural Road Division; Martin Drew, for the 3rd Rural Road Division; Thomas Jenner, for the 4th Rural Road Division; John A. Little, for the 5th Rural Road Division.

VII. It shall be the duty of the aforesaid Commissioners to see that all moneys appropriated from time to time by the Council for the improvement of the Roads and Bridges in their respective Rural Road Divisions, are properly expended on the Roads and Bridges for the purposes for which they are granted, as far as practicable; to grant certificates to the parties doing the work, stating what work has been done and where performed, which certificate shall be in the following form, viz:

"To the Clerk of the Township of Raleigh:

"I hereby certify that _____ has done and performed under my orders. (here insert the nature of the work) at (so much per rod, yard or foot, as the case may be) amounting in all to the sum of _____ Dollars, on the line of Road between (Lots or Con., or both, as the case may be.)

"Given at Raleigh, this — day of —, 1867. Commissioner R. R. Div. No. —."

And the said Commissioners shall, on or before the last meeting of the Council in each year, send in a Report of all moneys expended by them, with any suggestions on the improvement of the Roads and Bridges in their respective Divisions; and the said Commissioners shall be allowed the sum of five per centum on all moneys properly expended and reported on.

VIII. That for and notwithstanding anything contained in the By-laws numbered 10 and 15 of the Consolidated By-laws of the Township of Raleigh, published in the year 1865, it shall be the duty of the said Commissioners to attend to all the duties enjoined on the Overseers in said By-laws Nos. 10 and 16 as aforesaid, with regard to the removal of obstructions from streams and water-courses in the Township of Raleigh, which duties are hereby transferred from the Overseers to the said Commissioners, who shall be entitled to the same fees, and liable to the same penalties as set forth in the hereinbefore recited By-laws with regard to the duties of Overseers.

IX. That the following persons are hereby appointed Overseers of Highways in the different Statute Labor Divisions, viz:—

XI. That the following persons are hereby appointed Fence-Viewers, viz: In the First Rural Road Division: Charles Clark, Oscar Dolson and Ninian Newkirk. In the Second Rural Road Division: James Holmes, William McLean and Thomas D. Williams. In the Third Rural Road Division: James King, Charles Watts and Robert VanVrankin. In the Fourth Rural Road Division: Stephen Russell, Samuel Toll and George Bennett. In the Fifth Rural Road Division: Francis Goulet, Junr., and Joseph Thompson.

XII. That the appointment of the above-named persons to the offices of Auditors, Assessor, Collector, Surveyor, Inspector, Commissioners, Overseers, Poundkeepers and Fence-Viewers, shall continue till their successors are duly appointed and sworn into office, according to law.

XIII. That the appointment of the Collector and the Inspector of Licenses shall be in force as soon as those officers have lodged with the Clerk of this Corporation the necessary bonds, duly approved by the Council.

XIV. That any person neglecting or refusing to take the Declaration of Office or Qualification within twenty days after their appointment, and being notified of the same, shall be liable to a penalty of not less than One Dollar nor more than Ten Dollars, to be recovered in the usual manner on the complaint of the Clerk, before any Justice of the Peace having jurisdiction in the Municipality.

XV. That in case any or either of the above-named persons shall be disqualified from serving in the afore-mentioned offices of Overseers of Highways, Pound Keepers, or Fence Viewers, or shall die, or shall be discharged from any of the said offices, or that any of the said offices shall become vacant in any of the Rural Road Divisions, it shall be lawful for the Councillor in such Rural Road Division in which such vacancy shall occur, to appoint another officer to such vacant office, and such appointment shall be valid and effectual on serving the Clerk of the Corporation with a notice in writing signed by the Councillor of the Rural Road Division in which such appointment shall be made of the same.

No. 158—A BY-LAW

To repeal all By-laws heretofore made in the Township of Raleigh with respect to the Sale, by Retail, of Spirituous Liquors therein; to limit the number of Tavern Licenses to be granted in the Municipality, and to make more effectual provision for the same.

PASSED 18TH FEBRUARY, 1867.

As it therefore enacted by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Township of Raleigh, in Council assembled, under and by virtue of an Act 29th and 30th Vict., cap. 51, of the Annual Statutes of Upper Canada;

I. That from and after the last day of February, 1867, all By-laws heretofore made by the Municipal Council of the Township of Raleigh with respect to the sale of Spirituous Liquors, fermented or other manufactured Liquors, be and the same are hereby repealed.

II. That for the purposes of this By-law the year shall commence on the first day of March in each and every year, and end on the last day of February in the following year.

III. That this By-law shall come into force from and after the last day of February, in the year 1867.

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IV. That inasmuch as the population of this Municipality, according to the census taken in the year 1861, is the number of 3,750, the number of Tavern Licenses shall not exceed fifteen.

V. That it shall not be lawful for any person, either directly or indirectly, to sell by retail Spirituous Liquors, Beer, Ale, Cider, or other fermented or manufactured Liquors, within the Municipality, without first having obtained a License for that purpose.

VI. That no Tavern License shall hereafter be granted or issued unless upon petition to the Council, praying for the same, signed by at least thirty of the electors of the Municipality, and certifying to the moral character and fitness of the applicant to be entrusted with a license to keep a tavern, whereupon the Inspector may in his discretion grant a certificate to enable the applicant to procure a license, upon complying with the requirements hereinafter provided; and that the duty for Tavern Licenses shall be Twenty-five Dollars per annum, including the Provincial duty. Provided, that any person applying for a License to keep a Tavern, after the first day of March, he shall pay, exclusive of the Provincial duty, in the usual way, at the rate of Two Dollars per Month for the portion of the year unexpired.

VII. That Licenses may be granted for the sale, by retail, of Spirituous Liquors, in shops or stores, in quantities of not less than one quart, upon payment of a License duty of Twenty Dollars per annum; and that the person obtaining such shop license shall not allow any liquor sold by him to be consumed within his shop or store, or within the building of which it is a part, either by the purchaser thereof, or by any other person not usually resident within such building.

VIII. That before any of the above Licenses for a tavern or shop shall issue the applicant shall enter bonds to the Municipality, himself in the sum of Two Hundred Dollars, and two good and sufficient sureties in the sum of One Hundred Dollars each, such bonds to be conditioned for the payment of all fines and costs incurred for any offence against the provisions of this By-law, and for the performance and observance of all rules and regulations now made or hereafter to be made, by statute or otherwise for the good government of all places licensed to retail spirituous liquors, such bonds to be drawn by the Clerk of the Municipality, and to be filed in his office, for which said Clerk shall receive from the parties so applying to sum of One Dollar for each and every such bond.

IX. That the applicant for tavern or other licenses for the sale of spirituous liquors by retail, to be drank upon the premises, shall, upon depositing in the Clerk's office the necessary certificate from the Inspector, together with the Treasurer's receipt for the duty, or sum required to be paid for such license, respectively less the Provincial duty, and enter into bonds as by the said By-law required, be entitled to a certificate from the Reeve and Clerk of the Council, who are hereby authorized and required to grant such certificate, to the following effect, viz:—

WE certify that _____ an applicant for a Tavern License for the House known as _____ in the Township of Raleigh, has complied with the requirements of the law and of the By-laws of the Municipality of the said Township of Raleigh, and upon the payment of the Provincial duty thereon, is entitled to such license for the current year, from the first day of March, 18 _____ to the last day of February, 18 _____.

X. That all sums paid into the Treasurer's hands for Tavern and other Licenses, shall be applied to the general purposes of the Township.

XI. That it shall not be lawful for any person to whom any of the before mentioned Licenses may be granted, to sell or cause to be sold, or otherwise dispose of any spirituous or intoxicating Liquors, in or on his premises, or out of or from the same, to any person or persons whomsoever, from or after the hour of seven of the clock on Saturday night till the hour of eight of

the clock on Monday morning thereafter, and during any further time on the said days, and any hours on other days during which by any By-law of this Municipality the same, or the bar room or bar rooms thereof, ought to be kept closed, save and except in cases where a requisition for medicinal purposes, signed by a medical practitioner, or by a Justice of the Peace, is produced by the vendec or his agent, nor shall any such liquor be permitted or be allowed to be drank in any such places, except as aforesaid, during the time prohibited by this by-law for the sale of the same.

XII. That a penalty for the first offence under the above 11th section of this by-law of not less than twenty dollars, with costs, or fifteen days' imprisonment with hard labor, in case of conviction, shall be recoverable from and leviable against the goods and chattels of the person or persons who are the proprietors in occupancy, or tenants or agents in occupancy of the said place or places, who shall be found by himself or herself, or themselves, or his, her or their servants or agents, to have contravened the enactment in the preceding section, or any part thereof. For the second offence a penalty against all such of not less than forty dollars, with costs, or twenty days imprisonment, with hard labor. For a third offence, a penalty against all such of not less than one hundred dollars, with costs, or fifty days' imprisonment with hard labor. And for a fourth or any after offence, a penalty against all such of not less than three months' imprisonment with hard labor in the common gaol of the County.

XIII. Any person or persons may be the informant or informants, or complainant, or complainants, in prosecuting under this By-law. All proceedings shall be begun within twenty days from the date of the offence.

XIV. That every tavern hereafter licensed shall contain, in addition to what may be needed for the use of the family of the tavern-keeper, not less than four bedrooms, with the suitable complement of beds, bedding and furniture, and one sitting room, separate from the bar-room, for the accommodation of travelers; and the keeper thereof shall at all times keep and provide good and wholesome provisions and drink for his guests; and shall also have adjoining, or attached to his house, a stable, secured with lock and key, with proper stalls for at least six horses, and a driving house, also secured with lock and key, sufficient to contain two wagons or carriages; and he shall keep his premises constantly supplied with a sufficient quantity of hay and oats, for the horses and cattle of travelers stopping thereat.

XV. That the keeper of every such tavern shall see that travelers resorting to his house are treated with attention and civility, and their horses and cattle properly fed, watered and cleaned; and that such horses and cattle, as well as such wagon, carriage, baggage, goods, and other things entrusted to his care, are taken proper care of; and he shall be held responsible for any hurt or damage which such horses, cattle, and other property may sustain from neglect on the part of himself or his servants.

XVI. That the keepers of taverns licensed to sell spirituous liquors shall allow no gambling, drunkenness, profane and indecent language, or riotous, disorderly or improper conduct, at any time in their houses or on their premises, nor shall they give or sell, or permit to be given or sold, any intoxicating drink to any intoxicated person, or to any minor, or to any Indian man or woman, nor shall they knowingly sell or give it to any other person to be conveyed to any Indian man or woman.

XVII. That every person licensed to keep a tavern in this Municipality shall at all times permit the visits of the Inspector for the purposes of his office; and shall exhibit over the door of every such tavern, in large letters the words, "Licensed to sell Wine, Beer, and other Spirituous or Fermented Liquors"; and every such tavernkeeper shall keep posted up in a conspicuous place in his bar-room a copy of this By-law, and such rules and regulations as may from time to time be adopted by the Council respecting taverns, under a penalty in default of complying with this section, of One Dollar, recoverable with costs on conviction before the Reeve or any Justice

of the Peace for this Municipality, upon the oath of one credible witness, one-half of which penalty shall go to the informer, and the other half to the Municipality.

XVIII. That every tavern, inn, and hotel, in which spirituous or fermented liquors or drinks are ordinarily sold, shall be closed during the days appointed for polling in the elections of Members of Parliament, in the same manner as it should be on Sunday; and no spirituous or fermented liquors or drink shall be sold or given during said period, under a penalty of one hundred dollars against the keeper thereof if he neglects to close it; and under a like penalty if he sells or gives any spirituous or fermented liquors or drinks aforesaid.

XIX. That any person guilty of an infraction of any of the provisions of this By-law shall, upon conviction thereof before the Reeve or any other Justice of the Peace having jurisdiction within the Municipality, when any one such person can act, or before any two of them when two of them should act, forfeit and pay, at the discretion of the convicting Justice or Justices, when no specified penalty is hereinbefore mentioned, the sum of \$5 for the first offence; \$20 for the second offence; and \$50 for the third and each subsequent offence; and in default of the payment of any fine imposed under this By-law, together with the costs of prosecution, it shall be lawful for the convicting Justice or Justices to levy the same by distress and sale of the goods and chattels of the offender; and in case no sufficient distress can be found to satisfy the said fine and costs, it shall be lawful for the convicting Justice or Justices to commit the offender to the common gaol of the County of Kent for a period not to exceed thirty days.

XX. That all penalties imposed for the infraction of any of the provisions of this By-law (except where otherwise provided) when collected, shall be paid, one-half to the informer, and the other half to the Township Treasurer, for the general purposes of the Township.

DUTIES OF THE INSPECTOR.

It shall be the duty of the Inspector of Shop and Tavern Licenses,

1st. To take the Declaration and Qualification of Office required by law, and to enter into Bonds, to be taken by the Clerk, in the sum of Two Hundred Dollars, with one good surety in the sum of One Hundred Dollars, conditioned for the efficient discharge of his office.

2d. He shall, in the month of February in each year, visit the premises of all applicants whose applications have been sanctioned by the Council of the Municipality, at a meeting held for that purpose on the second Monday in February of each year, and after carefully examining said premises, shall, on finding the necessary accommodations, grant a Certificate addressed to the Clerk to that effect. Also, after visiting the premises of all applicants, shall send a report on the state of said premises to the Council, stating to whom he has granted Certificates, and to whom he has not, with the reason therefor, and any information or suggestions that may be useful for regulating the sale by retail of Intoxicating Liquors.

3. It shall be the duty of the Inspector, on receiving notice from any member of the Council, or other person, or on his being aware that any person or persons are selling liquor without License, or guilty of keeping a disorderly house, if he deems the evidence sufficient, he shall promptly make a complaint to the Reeve or some Justice of the Peace in the Municipality; or, if he deems evidence not sufficient, he shall forthwith visit the premises of the party or parties complained of, and, on his finding that they are selling intoxicating liquors without a License, or guilty of the violation of sections five and sixteen of this By-law, he shall then forthwith complain as above, which complaint may be made in the name of the Corporation of Raleigh—in which case the whole of the penalty shall go to the Treasurer of the Municipality.

4th. Any Inspector of Licenses may in his discretion (but subject to any By-laws of the Municipality) endorse on any License permission to the person holding the License to sell the liquors mentioned in his License at any place out his house, or to remove from the house licensed to any other house to be described in the endorsement, and situate within the Municipality. And such permission shall authorize the holder thereof to sell such Liquors in the house mentioned in the endorsement, during the unexpired portion of the term for which the License was granted, and upon the same terms and conditions. And any Bond or security which such holder may have given for any purpose relative to such License, shall apply to the house or place to which such removal is authorized.

5th. Any person interfering with the Inspector in the discharge of the duties of his office, shall, on conviction thereof, be liable to a penalty of Ten Dollars, with costs.

6th. On the Inspector refusing or neglecting to fulfill the duties as required by this By-law, or who issues a Certificate contrary to the provisions of this By-law, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall for each offence pay a fine of not less than Forty Dollars nor more than One Hundred Dollars; or he may be imprisoned for a period not exceeding thirty days; or, in the discretion of the Court, may be both fined and imprisoned.

VICTUALLING HOUSES.

Any person being desirous of keeping a Victualling House, it shall be the duty of the Inspector to visit such house, to ascertain if such person has the necessary accommodations, which shall be the same as those required for a Tavern; if he finds such party duly qualified, and having the requisite accommodations, he shall grant a Certificate, and on said Certificate, together with the Treasurer's receipt that the sum of Five Dollars has been paid, the Clerk shall grant a License, receiving from the Licensee the sum of One Dollar. And any person opening such a house without first obtaining a License, shall be liable to a penalty of Ten Dollars, recoverable in the usual manner before a Justice or Justices of the Peace.
