
MADRID, April 18.—For the third time in his reign, King Alfonso narrowly escaped today being the victim of an anarchist attempt against his Three shots were fired at the king this afternoon in the streets of the capital by a native of Barcelona, Rafael Sanchez Allegro, who was immediately overpowered. Accompanied by his staff he was riding along the Calle De Alcala on the way back from the cere-mony of swearing in the recruits when a man sprang from the sidewalk and seized the bridle of the king's horse with one hand, pointing a revolver point blank with the other. 
OTTAWA, April 13.—(Special.)—Rumors are flying about to the effect that the Liberals have discovered a way out of their present apparently hopeless position in the house, and that Hon. The government forces are quite confident that their position is impregnable, and that a division will cour early this week, and in no event later than Thursday. Whatever Mr. Pugsley's plan may be, the rank and file of the opposition are not in the secret, and appear to be frankly divided into warring facilitate the immediate passage of the naval bill thru both houses of parliament. The other section, apparently in the minority, favor creating a violent scene of disorder in the house which will attract attention in Canada and England alike and strengthen the hands of the senate.

every two hours from 6 in the morn-every two hours from 6 in the morning until 10 at night, and one meal at 2 a.m., makes ten feedings in twentyfour hours, because the interval be-tween meals is now two and a half four hours—that makes thirty ounces of food altogether. We know that fourteen ounces of this is milk, so add sixteen ounces of water to make up hours. He takes five ounces at each meal. At the fifth month the interval is three hours, which gives seven feedings of six ounces each. After this the thirty, and also one ounce of sugar month the night feeding is abolished If the baby cannot digest this and baby gets six meals between 6 in the morning and 10 at night. At the amount of sugar; add six ounces of seventh month he takes eight ounces The baby one week old takes from

at each meal, and has six meals in all. This formula continues until the changing of the diet to semi-solids. So

that at the seventh month the mother makes up 48 ounces of food and divides with six bottles of eight ounces each.






