FOR A SCOTTISH HOME.

Various Societies Are Getting Together for That Purpose.

A Toronto company, with a capital of \$40,000, has been formed for the encouragement of love for the traditions, history and literature of Scotland on the part of Scotchmen settled in this country.

The corporate name is to be the Scottish Canadian Union, Limited. The movement is understood to be the outcome of a desire on the part of a number of leading Scotchmen in Toronto, to bring the different Scottish societies of Canada into some form of union or federation.

There has been quite a strong expression of opinion that a Scottish home should be established in Toronto, and that it should be the rallying point for all Scottish societies. The proposal was to erect a building of about \$25,000 value, to be controlled jointly.

One of the functions of this concern may be to give attention to forming a federation within a union of the existing Scottish societies. The Gaelic society has already a fine list of donations towards the construction of such a home.

Extending Temiskaming Railway. Commissioners' Report From Inspection of Work in Progress.

Messrs. C. B. Smith, chairman; J. L. Englehart, secretary; D. D. Murphy, Ontario member of the Temiskaming Railway commission, have returned from a trip over the line.

Mr. Smith said yesterday the work would be continued through the winter, laying out the line as far as possible. The section north of New Liskeard is 100 miles in length.

When the exact point at which the junction can be made is determined it is the intention of the government to extend the line to meet the Grand Trunk Pacific, which means a further extension of fifty miles.

Disputed Mining Claim. So Corporation and Prospector Appeal to Minister Cochrane.

Hon. Frank Cochrane, minister of lands and mines, listened to a dispute yesterday afternoon between the Lake Superior Corporation and Alois Goss, regarding the ownership of the Josephine mine, situated on a spur of the Algoma Central Railway.

Goetz claims the property because of discovery which was made by him, while the corporation claims it on account of a land grant to the Algoma Central Railway Company.
