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BYSTANDER ON THE WAR.

Prof. Goldwin Smith Writes Words
 Rather Stingingly to Americans.

At yesterday's Weekly Sun Prof. Gold-
 win Smith writes as follows:

At the beginning, and which it will
 not doubt preserve to the end. The hapless
 Spaniards are being helplessly slaughtered
 by an enemy probably not superior to them
 in valor, but inferior to them in
 mechanical skill and in all the scientific
 appliances and appliances of modern war.

Their ships and the walls of their
 forts are mere pasteboard to the artillery
 of the present day, for whose affairs, if
 it were not so miserable, would be fatal:
 it is like putting a log through a band-
 box. The enemy pays the Spaniards the
 compliment of delaying to invade Cuba,
 but this can only be an adjournment of
 their doom. Their situation is that of a
 man defending himself with a cogged
 against assailants armed with revolvers,
 and the multiplicity of assailants who
 to his natural feelings cannot help sym-
 pathizing with the weaker arm.

In the American war press and manifes-
 toes there is a sudden and general ces-
 sation of allusion to the story of the Maine.
 The President, who refused to answer
 the Spanish proposal of impartial inquiry,
 must have known that the story was
 false, and that it was absurd to suppose
 that the Spanish Government or authori-
 ties could have been guilty of anything
 so suicidal as the act with which they
 were charged. To suppose that the Span-
 ish Government could have been guilty
 of such a crime is to suppose that they
 were not men of sense and honor.

The fact is that the story of the Maine
 was a fabrication from the first. The
 stain which its employment will have
 upon the national character is to the
 Washington politicians, and the yellow
 journalists who got up this war a matter
 of very small concern.

ADDITIONAL WAR NEWS

Cuban Insurgents Won a Decisive Battle—Spaniards at Cavite Holding Out.

New York, June 8.—News has just reached the United States from this city of a victory achieved by the Cuban forces over a division of the Spanish army at Jiguani, Province of Santiago, on May 22. It was one of the most decisive battles which the patriots have gained in many months and the most important one since the war was declared by the United States against Spain.

A column of Spanish soldiers, 1300 strong, acting under orders from Havana to abandon the interior towns and advance towards the coast, evacuated the town of La Piedra, after having destroyed their forts and fortifications to prevent them from falling into the hands of the insurgents, and camped at Jiguani, where they expected to remain, awaiting further orders.

The Spaniards were surprised on the morning of May 22 by being attacked by a division of the first corps, belonging to General Calisto Garcia's command, under the leadership of Colonel Jose Ribal. The Cubans altogether numbered a little more than 1000 men, while the Spaniards had fully twice that number. The Cubans advanced in good order, being well equipped with the latest arms and ammunition and took the enemy completely by surprise. At the start the Spaniards scattered, but afterwards rallied and fought a desperate battle. They only succeeded in being able to retreat in regular order to the village of Palma.

After six hours' hard fighting at Palma the Spaniards raised a flag of truce and expressed themselves as being willing to lay down their arms. The Cubans, however, and the Cubans took as prisoners one Spanish colonel, seven captains and several other officers, besides 100 soldiers. The Spanish loss amounted to 70 dead, besides a large number who were wounded. Included in the Spanish losses were 28 officers.

The Cubans sustained a heavy loss, but it was considerably smaller than that of the Spaniards. It is estimated that there were 45 killed, including five officers of lesser rank and about 60 wounded.

The Cubans returned to Jiguani. There they recovered a large quantity of arms and ammunition from the deserted Spanish camp, together with provisions and supply wagons, which the enemy had been compelled to leave behind. The Spaniards, however, were sent to the headquarters of General Garcia's camp at Bayamo.

ACCOMMODATED TO MISREPRESENT.

Mr. George A. If the two Spanish officials, DuBois and Carranza, against whom not a single charge has been proved, are to be regarded as spies, what term are we to apply to the accredited agents of the United States, who have liberally stole the letters of the Spaniards. One thing is quite certain, if the Spaniards are expelled from this country the United States Government will be obliged to receive their passports at the same time. We are not, as a neutral nation, favor one side and deny the other. Surely our humane desire at the present time to truckle to the United States is leading us into dangerous paths. Now, when a despatch from the Governor-General to the late Spanish Ambassador has been, as Mr. Thompson asserts, stolen and an attempt is being made to remember the dignity and traditions of our race and give the Americans to understand that the Spaniards are not conservative, and too tied down to the narrow views of the denomination. The world's opinion is being used to create a false impression of the Spaniards in their report.

THE KILLED AT SANTIAGO.

Colonel Ordonez Slightly Injured—Two Officers Killed—Insurgents Using Dynamite.
 Madrid, June 8.—(10 a.m.) A semi-official Madrid, published here to-day purporting to give an account of the bombardment of Santiago de Cuba by the American fleet on Monday last. "The American army, under Admiral Sampson, has fiercely attacked Santiago de Cuba, and a bloody conflict has ensued. The Americans made three attacks on the Spanish marine and land batteries, which replied. As a consequence the Spaniards were repulsed with heavy losses, estimated at 1500 men. The American projectiles, however, sank the Spanish battleships, the Reina Mercedes, and the Despatch received from Havana, from Spanish sources, says: "The American fleet, on Monday last, made the last bombardment of Santiago de Cuba."

Containing, these reports assert that the damage done to the batteries of that town "is unimportant and is already repaired," adding: "The Spanish guns did not cease to fire an instant during the fight, and all the batteries are in condition to reply to the enemy's fire. During the second attack Colonel Ordonez was on board the Reina Mercedes, and personally assisted in working her guns. Everyone regarded Colonel Ordonez and General Linera as the heroes of the day."
