The secretary, Mortimer Levering Lafayette, Ind., read the minutes of the last meeting, which was held at Omaha, it had been the policy of the association to have their meeting at the time of a large show, which enabled them to see sheep and also to take advantage of cheap fares.

The report for the last year was read, but at the end of the fiscal year was only \$11,300, only a partial report was given.

The meeting adjourned at 1 p.m. to assemble at the call of the Executive.

JOHN COLE DROWNED. Stumbled and Fell into the Water at Owen Sound. Relatives Near Wiaraton.

Owen Sound, Sept. 4.—A very sad drowning accident occurred here last night at midnight, when the workmen quit work at the C. E. R. docks.

Brisbane, Sept. 4.—The latest but still incomplete returns of the voting on the Federal Referendum bill show a majority of 3180 in favor of federation.

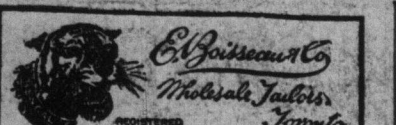
A BAD BLAZE, THIS. Fire Destroys 13 Business Houses and 25 Dwellings at Pinconning, Mich.

A By-Law to Reconstruct the Company's Charter Read Twice at York Township Council.

THE BOARD OF HEALTH MEETING

Other Interesting Items Gathered Yesterday From All Over the County of York.

Toronto Junction, Sept. 4.—(Special)—Mr. Mackintosh, a retired clergyman, who resides near the corner of Elizabeth and Bloor-streets, is confined to his bed with severe injuries and cuts about the head, caused by falling down stairs. He was retiring for the night with a lamp in his hand when about the top of the stairs he fell backwards to the bottom, almost striking his right ear and inflicting a deep laceration in the head.

In the death of Mr. Ed Kendall the Junction has lost one of its most promising young men. He was a musician and an average, and had devoted his life to music. His death was brought about by Mr. J. D. A. Tripp, to whom he owed much of his learning. The funeral takes place tomorrow to Prospect Cemetery.

The demand for houses continues, and to partly meet the demand the Toronto General Trusts Company have given instructions to fit up the upper flats of the James Block and divide out premises for dwellings.

Township Council.

Notwithstanding the fact that yesterday was a statutory holiday, the Council took the day in its literal significance and labored till nearly 10 o'clock last evening. The important portion of the meeting was further consideration of the application of the Toronto Suburban Street Railway Company for a renovation of their present charter, with extended area of operation. The agreement provides for the operation of a railway extending from the present limits of the company at Yorkville through and to the limits of the township, along Danforth-street, Weston, and the route allowance between the fifth and sixth concessions.

Provisions of Agreement.

The articles of the agreement provide for a limit of speed of 20 miles an hour, a 2c rate per mile and an extension of franchises of 20 years, or, if conferred in by the Legislature, 30 years. Exemption from taxation for ten years, renewable for another ten years, is also asked, while provision is made for allowing the City Council, for starting the extension, and two years from that date for completion.

The bylaw providing for the signing of the agreement was read twice and left for final reading till afternoon of Oct. 9 next.

Collector Allan Borge, ably assisted by Mr. W. G. McWilliams and Mr. Frank Turner, ratiocinated the deal yesterday, the councillors appearing very reticent to express any views on the different portions of the agreement. It is anticipated that the full text of the agreement will be published for the information of ratepayers.

A Bridge Tender.

Tenders for the erection of a steel bridge over the forks of the Don were opened and the award made to the Hamilton Bridge Company at \$1200. The highest tender was \$1250. Mr. Wallace asked for the location of the Woodbridge Fair in a double communication, but no amount was set aside for that purpose at yesterday's meeting. Mr. W. A. Coy of York Mills drew the attention of the Council to a dangerous bridge on old King-street in that place, and alleged that a horse owned by him had received severe injuries through falling through the damaged structure. A petition from W. Pinkerton and several others was read, asking better drainage for Chalmers and Lightburn-avenues, and the application will be advised upon by the Township Engineer.

Councillor Miller endeavored to rush the Junction school question, but was prevented by legal difficulties.

York Board of Health.

Councillor Brewster at the meeting of the Board at the Town Hall, Eglinton, yesterday afternoon. A complaint of a soap factory at the corner of Queen-street and Ashport-avenue was read from Mr. E. T. Davies. Mr. F. Capp, mayor of the factory, was present and promised to remedy the stench complained of, and on such conditions a permit will be given by the Council. Dr. Fage, M. H. O. reported two cases of scarlet fever and one of typhoid fever during the month.

North Toronto.

Mr. Walter Martin has purchased a residence on Pleasant-avenue, Deer Park, from Mr. John Burns for the sum of \$1200.

A Metropolitan car ran over a couple of cats yesterday on its route to Newmarket, killing one and severely handling the other. The car came out of the brush without a mark.

On the advice of his physician, Rev. T. W. Powell of St. Clement's, Kelliston, will relinquish his duties for a couple of months, taking a rest during the time of Muskoka. Councillor Armstrong proposed at a meeting of the Town Works Committee last night, opened tenders for the erection of a dwelling house at the waterworks and recommended the acceptance of that of Messrs. Fisher & Ramsay at \$1050.

Hagerman's Corners.

The harvest home conducted by the ladies of the Methodist Church on the grounds of Mr. Chris Hagerman was an unqualified success. The evening was all that could be desired and the music committee had made good provision for the entertainment of their guests. Addresses by several gentlemen and recitations by others contributed to the evening's pleasure. The ladies also provided refreshments with usual bounty, and the receipts, \$100, bear ample testimony to the popularity of the Hagerman Methodist Harvest Home.

Hon. N. Clarke Wallace will reply to Sir Richard Cartwright's recent speech at the West Toronto Junction Conservative meeting in Kilburn Hall, Toronto Junction, at 8 p.m.

A large number of Conservatives are going out to the meeting. Short addresses will also be delivered by W. F. Maclean, M.P., E. F. Clarke, M.P., and E. B. Osler, M.P. All Conservatives are invited to be present.

been withdrawn owing to the inability of the public prosecutor to charter, and he wanted to know whether the charge would be again changed. He challenged the public prosecutor to supply him with the particulars of the new charge, asserting that it was not right to detain his client 24 hours in jail.

Mr. Burger then declared that the affidavit upon which the charge against Mr. Takeman was based contained particular facts that would justify a charge of treason. The public prosecutor characterized this statement as an "absolute lie".

The proceedings were then adjourned to 10 o'clock.

MORE WARLIKE.

Boers Have Offered All They Can—The Matter Now Considered Hopeless.

London, Sept. 4.—Amid the crowd of conflicting despatches from South Africa regarding the Transvaal situation it is still impossible to say exactly what has happened. It seems evident, however, that President Kruger has withdrawn the five-year franchise which he had offered to the British Government on Saturday. According to this account, the Volksraad had only determined to reject the five-year proposal, but also to extend the franchise to Kruger visiting Cape Town, and resolved to make a claim to surrender the Orange River and the Transvaal to the British Government, both the Boers and the Burgers feel that they have offered all they intended to offer, and have now resolved to stand or fall by this decision.

Boer statements of this kind, coupled with the arrests at Johannesburg, speak loudly in favor of the British position. It is believed that the Boers will not be in a hurry to return to Johannesburg, and the Boers feel that the assurances of the State Attorney.

The Matter Now Hopeless.

London, Sept. 5.—The Johannesburg correspondent of the Standard says: "I came from an official who has been earnestly striving for peace that the matter is now hopeless. He believes that the British troops will be in Natal before the British troops arrive. He believes the Orange Free State will join the Transvaal, but that the Boers in Natal and the Cape Colony will remain quiet as long as the Boers are in the hands of the Cape Colony. The Boers have cut off the railway between the Cape Colony and the Transvaal and twenty thousand in the Orange Free State will take the field."

MACDONALD'S BODY FOUND.

A Lad of 17, Missed Since Aug. 28, But Found Drowned Yesterday.

Young Arthur Macdonald, who lived at 35 Ontario-place, left his home on Saturday, Aug. 28. When he did not return at night his parents made a thorough search of the police stations for him, but without success. In the next day the boy's clothes were found on the eastern bank, but even then Arthur's friends were confident that he would come home all right. A week passed with no tidings, and on Saturday last ex-Spokane made Canada a search for the body. The veteran constable's services were not required, however, for the remains received word yesterday morning that a boy's body was found washed up in the rocks near the Long Branch river range.

The remains were in an advanced state of decomposition and were almost unrecognizable for Thomas Sutton of 32 Ontario-place, who went out for the purpose, to identify the remains. A scar on the right hand left no doubt in the mind of Mr. Sutton and he was able to identify the body as that of Arthur Macdonald. The funeral will take place at 4.30 p.m. today at Mount Pleasant Cemetery.

The dead boy was 17 years of age. He was employed at the Cobban Manufacturing Co.

AMHERSTBURG CENTENNIAL.

A Two-Days' Celebration of the Change From Fort Maiden to Tecumseh's Fort.

Amherstburg, Ont., Sept. 4.—One hundred years ago to-day Amherstburg, the most southerly point in Canada, was laid out, and this morning the town began a two days' celebration of the centennial event. Amherstburg was known as Fort Maiden until 1845, when the name of the settlement was changed to Tecumseh's Fort. The town is one of the oldest, and to this day there are to be seen the remains of the early settlers of the Indian Colonial wars, of the war of 1812, of the rebellion of 1837-38 and of the garrisons of the regular troops stationed at Fort Maiden, which was years ago wiped out of existence. It was here that the British forces landed after their retreat from the Niagara. Here it was that the Indian chief Tecumseh did the cleverest work of his life when he tried to persuade the British to join the States army. The stone from which he addressed his people is still to be seen near Simon Fraser's house. In the shape of tomahawks and other Indian implements of war are still occasionally found in the old streets and yards where the ground is turned over.

THEIR DAY OF MISFORTUNE.

The ambulance removed him to the Emergency Hospital, where it was found he was suffering from a wound in the eye and bleeding from the nose. When he recovered sufficiently it was learned that he was Sam Hirstead, a scrap iron dealer of Goderich. It is supposed that while under the influence of liquor he fell and received the injuries. He was afterwards taken to a friend's home on Francis-street.

A FEW SEVERE FIGHTS.

The Amerc's Troops Had a Hot Encounter and Eventually Won After Much Suffering.
