Potsdam, Aug. 13.—The remains of the Dowager-Empress Frederick were interred to-day beside those of her husband in the mausoleum of Friedenskirche, near Potsdam. Between 8 and 10 o'clock this morning the bells of all the churches in Potsdam were tolled, with short intervals of rest. Shortly before 10.30 Emperor William, the other members of the royal family, and the visiting Princes assembled in the royal hall at the Wild Park Railroad station. The High Court officials, military dignitaries, Count Von Buelow, and other members of the cabinet, the Knights of the Black Eagle and the members of the Reichstag assembled at 10.25 o'clock in an adjacent hall. Soon after 10 o'clock the special train ordered by the Emperor to bring the invited guests from Berlin reached Wild Park station. Among the guests, the foreign ambassadors made striking figure, wearing their highest official uniforms. The United States ambassador, Andrew D. White, however, was attired in simple black. At 10.30 o'clock the signal was given that the funeral train was approaching. Conversation, which had hitherto been carried on in suppressed tones, entirely ceased and an air of great solemnity possessed the company. The train rolled in slowly and noiselessly. 
