Conservative Papers Angry at Show of "Melancholy Weakness" Due to Balfour's Mismanagement. London, Aug. 14.—The House of Commons passed the factories bill to a third reading last night, after a heated debate, which arose out of the action of the government in withdrawing a clause, including the Nationalists strongly objected to official inspections of the cotton and woolen laundries, on the ground that such inspection would be subversive of the discipline it is necessary to maintain in reformatories conducted by nuns.

WANT NO SEPARATE SCHOOLS. Motion Before Winnipeg School Board to Dr. Avey Withholds Approval. MANITOBA LIQUOR BILL. No Decision From Privy Council Till End of November. Winnipeg, Aug. 13.—(Special.)—A London correspondent writes: "The sittings of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, London, have now ceased until November next. A reporter called at the Privy Council office on Saturday to enquire when the judgment of Lord Halsbury on the Manitoba Liquor Appeal Bill would be likely to be ready. He was informed that, as the appeal was one of the first importance, involving the right of the province to legislate for itself, it would require more legal consideration, and that probably the decision would not be made before the end of November." Of course no hint could be given as to which way the opinions of their Lordships tended. Whichever way it be, this much is assured, it will be the result of long and careful deliberation.

THE DOCK AND THE TRACKMEN

The management of the C.P.R. need not be surprised if they find the trackmen's strike in on. In fact it will take every day now forward until the Duke of York lands in Canada to catch up with the track and to get everything in first-class order before the arrival of the Canadian management seem to have the faculty of quarrelling or fighting when fighting is not in their own interest.

CONCENTRATION IN A NEW WAY

A Chicago merchant, who headed a movement to boycott department stores, is now promoting a scheme of competition. He found that people would chase after bargains in spite of any pressure of sentiment, and has now set about the question of how to do it in a combination, each retailer to be a department. Each man expects to draw a good many of his old customers to the new seven-story establishment, and the new concern will advertise lavishly. The expenses will be pooled and profits divided according to the amount of business done.

CAN LABOR BE TRANSFERRED?

A good deal has been made of the point that the workmen in some of the steel trust mills had signed contracts prior to the consolidation under Mr. Morgan's leadership, and were in honor bound to carry out the agreement. The question naturally arises, can a man's labor be transferred from hand to hand? The law is generally understood to provide that with a change of proprietorship all workmen are released, and must be re-engaged by the new firm. This understanding appears to have been broken when the men made an declaration to that effect, which so many have construed as "shaf-fers blunder." The strikers claim that the placing of such gigantic power in the hands of a single corporation or management menaces their future, and they may be excused for claiming that they are not likely to be bound by the contract.

ISLAND PARK
