SCIENCE MAN DOWN WITH SMALLPOX

'Ernie' Simpson Had Mingle's Freely With His College Mates Up to Friday Night.

There will be some sore arms at the University of Toronto this week and for some time after owing to an enforced vaccination of all the students in attendance.

On Friday night a suspicious case, which afterwards proved to be smallpox, was discovered in the person of "Ernie" Simpson, a fourth-year science man, who was removed to the smallpox hospital.

President Loudon handed out the following statement on Sunday night: As a suspicious case of smallpox, which has occurred in the person of a science student of the University of Toronto, the Provincial and local health and university officials have carefully considered what steps had best be taken in connection with the matter, and have decided to require that all students attending the university be forthwith vaccinated, and that laboratories in which the student in question worked be properly fumigated, and to expedite this and vaccination will attend at the university and all affiliated institutions for such purpose at hours to be hereafter appointed.

Simpson had been complaining for a week, and on Friday night had his dinner in the university dining hall. He had been mingling with the students up to the time of his removal, at 8 o'clock, to the Isolation Hospital.

On Saturday afternoon, Simpson was removed from the Isolation Hospital to the Swiss Cottage Hospital, where smallpox cases alone are treated. The case, which had been under observation since Friday night, was diagnosed as smallpox by the attending physicians.

Simpson roomed on Isabella-street, and took his meals at the University. The ambulance took him from Isabella-street.

The house on Isabella-street has not yet been quarantined.

SMALLPOX ON BOARD. Lake Michigan Arrives at St. John With Two Cases.

St. John, N.B., March 9.—The steamer Lake Michigan arrived this morning from the Tyne on her maiden voyage. She sailed Feb. 22 for St. John, and coasted at Barry. Two cases of smallpox were aboard.

The ship's doctor and Dr. G. H. Williams, who accompanied her, went out with the Canadians on Monday, and is returning home, attended by the Canadian medical authorities.

A few days later, when the ship was in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, it was reported that the epidemic had been completely conquered, and this late battle comes as a surprise.

DANGER TO LONDON PARADES. Prevalence of Smallpox May Cause Some Curtailment.

London, March 9.—The report that if smallpox does not abate this spring the proposed coronation procession through the streets of London will be abandoned, and that the only street pageant will be the going and coming of the King between Buckingham Palace and St. Stephen's on Coronation Day, is not unlikely. Certainly the smallpox returns keep up alarmingly, and it would be difficult to expect a coronation with vast crowds for an all-day procession if the epidemic is on.

THE KING AND QUEEN. London, March 9.—The King and Queen were entertained over Sunday at Lord Mount Edgumbe's country place, where the foundations date from the reign of Mary, and where the battery overlooking the sea was built for defence against the Spanish Armada, and subsequently repaired with guns from a captured French frigate. The King and Queen will celebrate on Monday the anniversary of their wedding by a dinner party at Marlborough House.

MORE POWER TO BANKS. Washington, March 9.—Chairman Fowler of the House Committee on Banking will introduce a bill to transfer from the government to banks the responsibility of protecting the necessary gold reserve, and the burden of furnishing gold for export, to provide a currency, to lower the average rate of interest, and to engage in international banking.

WOLVES FOLLOWED HER. St. Cloud, Minn., March 9.—On rural delivery route No. 13, a woman, Mrs. C. Allen, was followed by two large wolves for a distance of four miles, the wolves crossing a road and the woman carrying a dog. The wolves were shot by the team, but making no attempt to attack.

HANDWRITING BY PHONE. Paris, March 9.—The telegraph, an instrument which transmits messages by telephone, has just been used in the Central Telephone Office of Paris. Experiments were conducted over the Paris-Lyon line, and, except for a slight tremor, due to induction, were perfectly successful.

NEXT SATURDAY. Next Saturday a deputation of the Canadian Pacific Railway trustees will wait upon the management at Montreal and present their claims for more wages and a working boat. Several hundred of the truckmen from Toronto will accompany the deputation.

DR. SPOULE'S QUESTION. Ottawa, March 9.—Dr. Sproule will enquire in the House as to whether the Dominion government has received from the War Office an offer of a commission of three per cent. on all purchases for the British army made in Canada, as is to be allowed in the case of purchases made in Australia.

MAN JUMPED FROM THE BAY

muel Miller, a Retired Farmer, Ended His Existence on Sunday Morning.

NO CAUSE GIVEN FOR RASH ACT

Left a Note Disposing of His Property—Came Recently From Markdale.

Samuel Miller, 52 years of age, a retired farmer, formerly of Markdale, ended his life yesterday morning by leaping into the waters of the bay from the Bertan Engine Works Co.'s docks. The body was recovered and will be taken to Markdale to-day for interment. No reason is given for the man's deliberate suicide.

Coroner Arthur Jukes Johnson investigated the circumstances surrounding Miller's tragic death and deemed an inquest unnecessary.

Miller came to Toronto with his wife and daughter three months ago after selling his farm and homestead at a good figure. He secured comfortable apartments at 332 West Adelaide-street, and almost daily since his arrival in this city was engaged in looking for a suitable dwelling for himself and family. He was in the city yesterday, and when he retired was in good spirits. Yesterday morning he appeared more than ordinarily cheerful. He went out a little after 9 o'clock, and about an hour later was seen by Thomas Thompson, caretaker of the steamer Kingston, and John White, 13 Renfrew-place, watchman of the steamer Montreal, now in course of construction, looking about Miller's docks. Thompson and White noticed nothing unusual about Miller until they saw him take a leap and jump as far as possible out into the water. 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TEN LIVES LOST IN A FIRE

MOTHER AND 9 CHILDREN

Whole Family, With the Exception of the Father, Wiped Out Early Sunday Morning at Malene, Quebec—He Escaped By Jumping From an Upper Window.

Malene, Que., March 9.—One of the most dreadful holocausts that have been known in this part of the country occurred here this morning, resulting in the loss of ten lives.

About 6 o'clock a servant girl, returning home from work in the village, discovered the lower part of the house of Mr. Arthur Bouchard to be in flames. The lower part was used as a grocery store, and the upper part as a dwelling house. The girl managed to arouse the family.

Bouchard immediately jumped from an upper window and was about to be followed by his wife, but she was evidently overcome, as she fell in her attempt to escape and perished together with her nine children, six boys and three girls, the eldest being a boy of 14 years, and the other children as follows: 12 years, four boys, aged 10, 9, 8 and 7 years; two girls, 6 and 4, and a boy 2 years.

The house was a wooden building, and had just been newly painted, and was very easy to the flames.

Mr. Bouchard, the only member of the family to escape, is almost demoralized with grief, and cannot give a very clear account of the terrible catastrophe.

Bouchard arose about 5 o'clock and started a fire in the kitchen and then returned again to bed. It is thought the fire caught in the kitchen. A coroner's inquest will be held to-morrow. It is not known yet whether the children were awakened or perished while asleep.

ANXIETY FOR ALLAN LINER

HURONIAN LONG OVERDUE

Left Glasgow for St. John, N.B., on February Eleventh and Has Not Since Been Seen—Etsuria Arrives in Tow at Horta, Azores.

St. John, N.B., March 9.—Great anxiety and fear are now being felt at the continued absence of the Allan Liner, Huronian, which left Glasgow for this port Feb. 11 to load hay and freight for South Africa. Strange to say, the big steamer, which was lighted, has not been reported by any craft. Some are of the opinion that the Huronian is lost, but the Allan people think she is disabled only.

1.15 a.m.: A steamer arrived this morning and anchored below Partridge Island. It is thought probable it is the Allan Liner Huronian, which is long overdue. The only other steamer expected is the Parthenia, from Glasgow, Feb. 26.

ETRURIA IS SAFE. Horta, Azores, March 9.—The Cunard Liner Etsuria arrived here to-day in tow. The Etsuria anchored at 6 o'clock this evening. All on board are well. She had a comparatively uneventful passage, except for the breakdown which occurred during the dinner hour of Feb. 29. When this occurred the Etsuria had only just finished speaking by wireless telegraph with the Cunard Liner Umbria. After the accident was discovered the Etsuria called the Umbria to assist her for one hour, but without success.

Oppell Carried Off Redder. Upon examination it was found that the ship's propeller had broken off outside the tube, and that the rudder had been carried away by a propeller. The Etsuria then sent up rockets, which were seen by the British steamer Wm. Cliff. The latter was down at the anchorage in 30 minutes after the accident. ITALY HEARS DOUBLE CRISIS. To-Day May Be a Mighty Strike and the Fall of a Ministry.

SOCIALISTS HAVE WHIP HAND

Responsibility for Dealing With Situation Falls on the King's Shoulders.

London, March 9.—The grave situation in Italy reaches a critical point on Monday. That is the postponed date for the general railway strike and also for the decision of the fate of the government in the Chamber of Deputies.

It was the government's weakness in allowing Socialist propaganda, which was practically revolutionary for the last two years, which precipitated the double crisis. The authorities did not interfere with private strikes, but when a universal railway strike was ordered the government prepared to block the revolutionists' plans. Hence the withdrawal of the Socialist newspapers from the Chamber and the defeat of the ministry on the choice of a president for that body.

The question of confidence will be put to the vote on Monday, and without Socialist support the cabinet must finally retire. No compromise has yet been arranged. Grave fears of disturbance are expressed in the Chamber of Deputies, and it is evident that the king's qualities of the young monarch are about to be put to a severe test. The responsibility for dealing with the situation will probably fall directly on his shoulders.

That was the policy first decided upon, in view of the greater liability of the new rifle to injury thru neglect than the Martini. The Minister of Militia has, however, come to the conclusion to issue at once to the rural battalions the new arms, whether they have central armories or not.

MEANWHILE the construction of armories is practically being confined to the far east and extreme west of the Dominion. Buildings will be put up in the following places during the year: Kananaskis, N.S., cost \$4227; Baddeck, N.S., cost \$4227; N.B., \$7065; Dundas, Ont., \$3854; C. and Revelstoke, B.C., \$7070 each.

'MOBILISTS SEE K RELIEF. Movement Against Restriction to Twelve Miles an Hour.

London, March 9.—The automobilists of Great Britain have taken definite steps in their crusade against the unjust regulations which control the movement of automobiles on public highways. They went out to-day to insist upon a maximum speed under twelve miles an hour, no matter what the conditions are, is not only unjust, but a bit childish. In the crowded streets of London or the suburbs it is quite right that automobiles should not exceed this safe speed, but on the open and unfrequented roads such regulations are a direct invitation to automobiles to break the laws. Besides, with the latest type of automobiles going twenty or thirty miles an hour can be stopped in three or four times their own length.

MONTE CRISTO HEARD IN COURT OF CHANCERY NOT SO BIG. London, March 9.—Unltd millions are popularly believed to be hoarded up in the Court of Chancery, waiting for the next kin. From a document just issued by the Supreme Court it appears that these funds aggregate barely 1,000,000 (\$5,000,000). This sum represents more than thirty-two hundred separate accounts, one-half of which do not exceed \$150 (\$750) in value. The Monte Cristo case, valued at \$100,000 (\$500,000). The court solemnly warns everybody longing to explore this treasure house not to be lured away by the gross misstatements of gentlemen who have lists of heirs to unclaimed money.

SEVENTY MEN OUT OF WORK. Columbian Handle Co. Factory, London, is Destroyed.

London, March 9.—At an early hour this morning fire destroyed the Columbian Handle Company's factory, situated on the Grand Trunk Railway tracks, facing Adelaide-street, in East London. The building is owned and was occupied for a number of years by the Grand Trunk as a car wheel factory, but for the last three years by the Columbian Handle Company. The place was completely gutted, the roof and part of the wall falling in. The amount of lumber within the building used for manufacturing purposes made good food for the flames, and for a while it threatened to do the work of the firemen. The loss will be very heavy, and it is said the amount of insurance carried will not cover the loss. Seventy men will be thrown out of work. The origin of the fire is unknown.

CAPTAIN CASATI DEAD. African Explorer, Rescued By Stanley, Passes Away.

Rome, March 9.—Captain Casati, the African explorer, is dead.

COMPANION OF EMIN PASHA. Captain Casati is best known as the companion of Emin Pasha, who was rescued by him in the Sudd. Stanley from a perilous position in Central Africa. Casati was one of the Italian officers of the Khedive's army, and was appointed to the command of the squadron of the Mountains of the Moon, and was a pioneer traveler in Uganda. He is now being rapidly opened up to European civilization. He was born in 1840. Stanley in his book "Darkest Africa," giving the narrative of the Emin relief expedition, has recounted the difficulties he had in persuading Casati to accompany him on the return to Egypt. The Casati and Emin rescue has been depicted in his book by his commands and made prisoners of their rebellious troops. They were extremely reluctant to abandon their posts.

WAR WITH JAPAN. Merchants Ordered to Leave Port Arthur by Russia.

Dated Shanghai, the correspondent of The Standard says that Chinese merchants coming from Port Arthur because preparations were being made there for a war with Japan.

DOG MAIL CARRIERS. Munich, March 9.—The military authorities in Bavaria are employing specially trained dogs to carry letters and provisions to the snowed-up garisons among the Bavarian Alps. These dogs are of the St. Bernard breed. The mountain garisons are often snowed in three or four weeks at a time, cut off from all communication with the outside world. A regular bi-weekly post has been established, ten dogs traveling together. All provisions of a heavy kind are in store in the garisons, but lighter delicacies are often lacking, and these, together with letters, are carried round the dogs' necks.

IRISH SOCIETIES TO PARADE. Ottawa, March 9.—The parade of the Irish societies of Ottawa, Montreal, Amherst and Hull will take place on Sunday, March 16. About 4000 persons will march. The Chicago Irish contingent could not make train arrangements, and will go to Montreal, where the parade will be on the 17th.

SLIGHTLY IMPROVED. The condition of Rev. Septimus Reed, pastor of the Church of the Redeemer, Hospital, William Yongin, aged 45 years, is reported to be slightly improved. It is feared, however, that he cannot recover.

WANT TO DAM THE NIAGARA

U. S. Congress May Invite Great Britain to Join in Restoring Lake Levels.

AN INTERNATIONAL COMMISSION

To Report on the Work—Would Raise Water in Lake Erie Two or Three Feet.

Washington, D.C., March 9.—Among the proposals to be reported to the House on Monday is one which relates to the building of a dam across the Niagara River at the outlet of Lake Erie.

The duty of this commission shall be among other things to report upon the advisability of locating a dam in the Niagara River at the outlet of Lake Erie with a view to determining whether such a dam will benefit navigation.

Should such an international commission agree upon the building of a dam, it will compel the building of a channel for deep-draught vessels around the shoals and rapids of the Niagara River, regardless of the cost.

The proposition is to raise the water two or three feet above the low-water level of the lake. That will give increased depth to all the ports of Lake Erie as far west, it is believed, as the Detroit River, without doing any damage, because it will merely raise the level of the lake to what it formerly was. When the water rises about that point it will flow over the dam thru the sluiceways.

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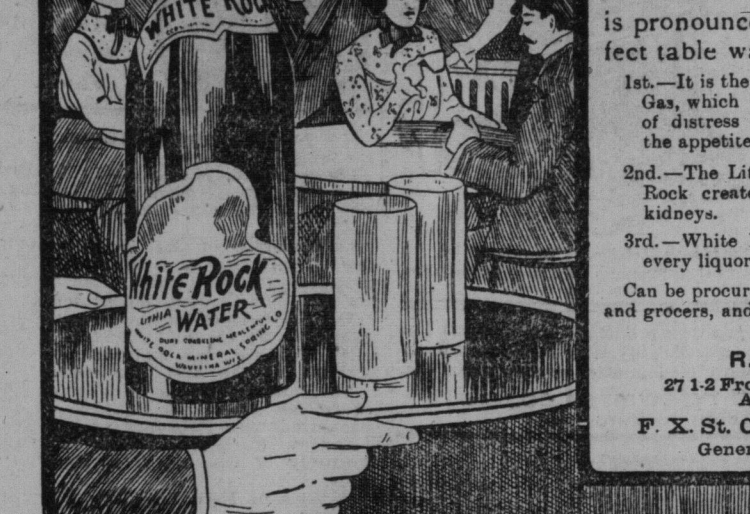
