In the opinion of the Russian government, Japan's legitimate interests in Manchuria do not exceed those of the United States or Great Britain or the other powers signatory to the peace protocol of 1900. For this reason Russia has declared her unwillingness to discriminate between the powers and enter into a special treaty with Japan.
