The Present Situation.

CHICAGO, Oct. 11 .- T. P. O'Connor, whose weekly cable to The Tribune on British political matters, says that the Tories are beginning to funk a general election, and the Liberals, on the other hand, are equally afraid there will not be a general lection, and the Irish now join in demanding an early appeal to the country. 
WOOD PULP DUTY FREE

But Not if it Comes From Ontario or Quebec Crown Lands. WASHINGTON, Oct. 17.—Woodpulp, mechanically ground, imported into the United States from anywhere in Canada except Quebec and Ontario proada except Quebec and Ontario provinces, is free of duty until otherwise directed, according to a decision by the United States treasury department. If produced from pulp wood cut on private lands in Quebec and Ontario, it is admissible free of duty.

But if produced from pulpwood cut on crown lands in either Quebec or Ontario, it is assessable at one-twelfth of one cent per pound, and in the case

of one cent per pound, and in the case of Quebec, there is added a countervalling duty of 25 cents per cord as the equivalent of the export tax.


