

I am really giving away no secret when I say they are virtually controlled by German syndicates and have been for years.

This is straight from the shoulder talk. We do not know what impression it made upon the Dominion Government, but it should have set them thinking.

But you say that Mr. Hewins was simply one member of parliament and that he might be talking wildly. You may naturally want to know what the British Government had to say in reply to these statements.

Well, in the debate we are reporting, Sir Hon. Mr. Rindeman, president of the board of trade, replied for the government and he did not deny that the nickel deposits of Canada were owned and controlled by the German trust.

Long before the war commenced it was a matter of common knowledge that the International Nickel Co. was under German control. It was known at Sudbury, it was known in New York, it seems to think the British Government knows more than it has told about this concern.

PARIS, Aug. 1.—A French official statement says: "Operations of the army of the east from July 18 to 21: The advanced Serbian posts repulsed on July 21 Bulgarian detachments which held the heights at Jovvil in the basin of the upper Mogienca, and on the 25th occupied the village of Sborako, where they installed themselves, notwithstanding the enemy bombardment. On the 26th they advanced north of Pofar and Strupino, after an engagement in which the Bulgarians were compelled to retreat, abandoning ten dead. The Serbian losses were two killed and three wounded. On the rest of the front there was an intermittent cannonade, at times violent on both sides of the 'Vardar Valley'."

Tragedies to Be Averted

Far more terrible than even the first dreadful reports to be expected are the results of the great forest conflagration on the northern district of the T. & N. O. Railway.

It is not to be forgotten what the cost has been of these results, and how near disaster the entire allies have often been during the past two years.

The Government has announced thru the minister of lands, forests and mines that steps are now to be taken to investigate conditions and see what settlers actually need.

There was a similar disaster in 1911, when nearly 200 lives were lost. At that time we pointed out, as we had been doing for years previously,

ACTION AGAINST WARD BEGUN BY BRADLEY

Former Leaf Files Claim in Bronx Supreme Court for His Salary. NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—An action has been begun in the Bronx Supreme Court by William J. Bradley, former manager of the Brooklyn Federal League Baseball Club, for salary for 1916, amounting to \$7500. Bradley, a former third baseman of the Cleveland American League Club, jumped the Toronto Club to the Feds in 1914. According to Bradley, the Feds entered into an agreement with him in January, 1914, to employ him for three years at a salary of \$7500 a year, payable in semi-monthly installments of \$325. In February, 1914, the Federal League, with the consent of Bradley, assigned the contract to the Brooklyn Club, with which Bradley played for the seasons of 1914 and 1915, and received his salary as per contract. The papers on file in the case state that in March, 1916, the Brooklyn notified Bradley that they would no longer continue his employment under the contract, which, he says, still had a year to run. Bradley, thru his attorney, John M. Ward, former star pitcher of the old Providence Club and the Giants, asks judgment against the Brooklyn Club, a corporation, for \$7500, with interest. Claude Cooper, a former Giant, who jumped to the Feds at the same time as did Bradley, and received a three-year contract at \$7000 per year, also has filed suit for his 1916 salary.
