ANOTHER FAILURE Has Sir Wilfrid Laurier administered a gentle snub to the Hon. Dr. Pugsley? It was only the other day that Dr. Pugsley's friends and representative members of the Liberal party here were in receipt of an appeal from him, urging them to labor for the success of the Liberal convention in this city on April 22nd.

Moreover, there was no general response to the call for a great convention, and the effect of a commonplace gathering of persons having axes to grind would be harmful, rather than helpful to the party cause. The convention is indefinitely postponed. Dr. Pugsley's latest effort to rally the party under his leadership has resulted in failure. Perhaps, as already suggested, he has been gently rebuked by his own leaders.

The important changes in the British cabinet are as follows: Mr. Asquith becomes premier and first lord of the treasury, in place of Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman; Mr. Lloyd-George succeeds Mr. Asquith as chancellor of the exchequer; Winston Spencer Churchill succeeds Mr. Lloyd-George as president of the board of trade; Lord Tweedmouth leaves the admiralty to become president of the council, in succession to the Earl of Crewe, who becomes secretary of state for the colonies in place of Lord Elgin; Reginald McKenna leaves the board of education to succeed Earl Crewe as first lord of the education; Walter Runciman succeeds Mr. McKenna as president of the board of education.

The school board took prompt action last evening in regard to the safety of school buildings. The citizens will expect the buildings committee to prepare its report without delay and the city council must then get busy. The new chairman of the board is to be congratulated on his attitude upon this question.

There will be a good deal of sympathy with the views of Mr. Monk relative to the bombing of immigrants and the desirability of greater care in selecting those who are to become citizens of Canada. Shiftless persons and convicted criminals are not wanted in this country.

ABOUT THE OLD TIMES.

There never was a man who respected his home and loved his wife and children more than Jack Dempsey, the Nonpareil. They were all the world to him, and when he won a purse by dint of hard fighting in the ring nearly all his winnings went to his home at Foxhead, Ore., where he died a lingering death, a victim of consumption. This game little fellow is buried near his old homestead, without a stone to mark his grave. In

his prime he was one of the most popular fighters this country has ever known. Billy Madden, once John L.'s manager, has a residence in South Brooklyn, where he lives quietly with his wife and son. Billy Myer, who fought McAvilife for the lightweight championship in 1892, has a splendid mansion in New Orleans.

A LETTER FROM LORD BRESFORD

Relative to Signalling Between Merchant Vessels and Tins of the Navy

Admiral Lord Charles Bressford has addressed the following interesting letter to Mr. T. W. Moore, Secretary of the Imperial Merchant Service Guild, in response to a communication forwarded to the gallant Admiral conveying the annual report of the Guild and expressing gratification at the many more close and friendly relationships now existing between the Royal Navy and the Merchant Service—Lord Charles being responsible for this to a great extent.

H. M. S. "King Edward VII," Channel Fleet, At Ballachullish, 27th March, 1908.

Dear Mr. Moore,

Thank you for your letter of the 26th March, and for the accompanying copy of the annual report which was adopted at the recent meeting of the Imperial Merchant Service Guild.

I find the report contains an immense amount of most interesting information concerning the merchant service of the empire, and am quite certain that the more the two great maritime services of this country, i. e., the military shipping and the mercantile shipping, are brought into close and intimate touch, the more it will be for the benefit of the country. The country depends upon each individual service for its existence—the mercantile service for the delivery of water-borne goods, and on the navy as an insurance that delivery shall not be interfered with during warlike operations. There can be no doubt that the late impulse to signalling between the two branches of shipping is doing a very great deal to bring the services more completely in accord together. I hardly ever pass a merchant ship now at sea without being able to communicate with her—clearly and rapidly, and on several occasions the initiative has come from the merchant ship. This is most satisfactory and verifies my prediction, that if once the matter was taken up and placed before the captains and officers of the mercantile marine in its true light, they would be the first to commend that their energy and enterprise in this direction has far exceeded the hopeful anticipations I held formerly.

general public that every member here is anxious to make the schools as safe for the children as possible.

After a large amount of routine business had been dealt with, Mr. Russell moved that the report on the condition of the schools be taken up at a special meeting.

Mr. Keefe asked the superintendent as to the condition of the primary grades in the buildings.

In reply, Dr. Bridges said that the rule of the board is to place the primary grade on the ground floor. In Winter street and Newnam street this had to be violated.

Mr. Russell urged that in Winter street something be done to alter the state of affairs as soon as possible.

Mr. Bullock thought the whole report ought to go to the buildings committee to get an estimate of the cost of the improvements and present the bill to the common council who could then be asked to furnish the money. He thought some of the recommendations extravagant.

Mr. Day thought many of the things recommended unnecessary.

Mr. Keefe, while admitting that some things in the report are very valuable, thought the effect was to leave the impression that these matters had not been dealt with in a businesslike manner by the board. He strongly deprecated this idea.

Mr. Coll endorsed Mr. Bullock's motion which was then carried unanimously.

The secretary was instructed to furnish the common council a report on the board's sinking fund.

Mr. Day, for the flag committee, announced that a contract had been entered into for poles for \$320.

Mr. Bullock said that the sum in the estimates was \$200 and the committee was instructed to keep within that sum. Mr. Bullock was added to the flag committee.

St. George's society asked that the flags be flown on April 23, St. George's Day, and suitable instructions be given in the schools. It was pointed out that this was done on Empire Day and the matter rested at that.
