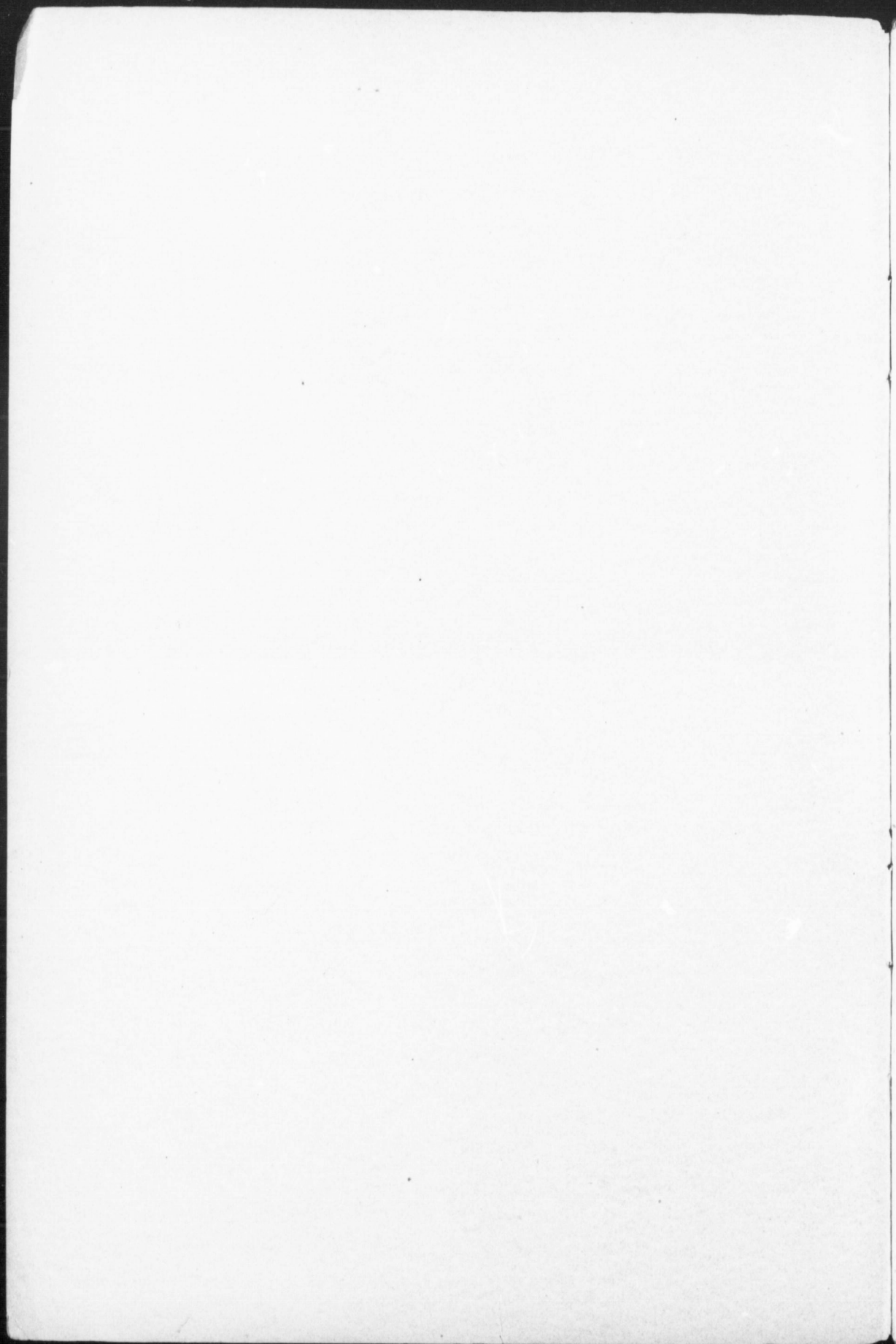

### 3. SACRAMENTS

Baptism is dispensed on the first Sabbath of each month. The Lord's Supper is dispensed on the first Sabbath of February, June, August, and December, in the morning, and on the first Sabbath of April and October, in the evening. Communicants are requested to bring their communion cards, as this is the only way of recording attendance.

### 4. SUPPORT.

Pews and sittings are free, although, as far as possible, allotted to the families and persons who attend the church. Any who have not secured sittings are requested to make application for them to the Treasurer, Mr. William Campbell, or to any member of the Seat-Letting Committee, on any Wednesday evening before or after prayer meeting service.

The congregational expenses are met by voluntary contributions, given for the most part weekly, by envelope. All who have not adopted this system are earnestly requested to do so, by applying to the Treasurer for envelopes. It is suggested that each contributor shall take his or her supply of envelopes home, keep them in a safe

place, use them regularly with due regard to the dates printed thereon, seal them securely, and write the amount enclosed in every case on the face. Each contributor who follows these suggestions can ascertain, by a simple examination of the envelopes remaining on hand, precisely how his or her account with the church stands at any time, and they are asked to make such an examination periodically, and supply any omissions which may have occurred by reason of absence or otherwise.

#### 4. MISSION SCHEMES.

All are expected to contribute to the Mission Schemes of the Church, such as Home and Foreign Missions, French Evangelization, etc. Envelopes for monthly contributions are provided, and may be obtained from Mr. Charles D. Gordon, 58 Nassau Street. Over and above the regular contributions, members of the congregation are supporting Rev. N. H. Russell, B.A., in Central India. These objects are commended to the generosity of the members.

#### 6. DISTRICTS.

The congregation being divided into districts, with an Elder in charge of each, members are particularly urged to make known to the Elder of their District any case of sickness or other circumstance requiring attention. Members are particularly requested to give notice of change of address just as soon as it occurs.

Synopsis of Minutes of the Annual Meeting  
of the Congregation.

---

The annual meeting of the congregation was held on the evening of Monday, January 17th.

After devotional exercises had been conducted by the pastor, Mr. C. B. Petry was requested to act as chairman, and Mr. A. D. Crooks as secretary to the meeting.

The report of the Session was read by Dr. McTavish, who moved its adoption, seconded by Mr. Gibson. Carried.

On motion of Mr. Creelman, seconded by Mr. Crooks, the report of the Managers was adopted.

The Committee from the Session and Board of Managers, appointed at the special meeting of the congregation held on November 3rd, 1897, to consider the financial question submitted on that occasion, presented the following report :

"Your Committee beg to report that the estimated receipts and disbursements on congregational account, including the cost of maintaining the district mission work for the ensuing year, indicate a deficiency of about \$500, and that, in order to continue the present scale of expenditure, it will be necessary to increase the income by the said amount.

"The Committee accordingly recommend that the Board of Managers be specially requested to adopt definite measures without

delay to secure a sufficient increase in the weekly offerings to enable them to meet all the congregational expenses.

"The Committee further recommend that the importance and necessity of accomplishing this result shall be clearly represented to individual contributors, who are to understand that if they cannot otherwise increase their weekly offerings they may consider the propriety of doing so by rearranging the scale of their subscriptions to church support and missionary schemes, respectively, allowing in future a larger share of the total amount than heretofore for congregational purposes."

Reports of the results of the work carried on during the year by the various organizations of the Church were presented, and it was decided that these, in addition to the reports of the Session and Managers, should be printed in pamphlet form and distributed among the members of the congregation.

The following gentlemen were elected to act on the Board of Managers for two years : Messrs. A. R. Creelman, A. D. Crooks, A. I. Forster, George F. Burns, A. H. Crawford, Dr. Wm. Graham, Thomas McMillan, Jr., and Donald Bain, and for one year N. T. Wilson.

Votes of thanks were unanimously tendered to the members of the choir and to the auditor for valuable services rendered during the past year ; also to the ladies of the congregation for the pleasant social preceding the business meeting held under their auspices.

Mr. John Ferguson was reappointed auditor for the ensuing year.

On motion of Dr. Wishart, seconded by Mr. MacEwen, the Board of Managers were authorized to appoint members of the congregation to fill vacancies occurring on the Board during the year.

## Report of Session.

---

While the general work of a congregation is very much the same from year to year, yet each year has its own special record and its own peculiar features. The essential weakness of a report, largely of spiritual work, is this, that it can scarcely even touch upon some of the holiest and most important ministries that have been rendered during the year. But our true record is on high.

Changes have taken place during the year. Old friends have gone, from whom we have parted with deep regret, and new ones have come, whom we cordially welcome. Our beloved fellow-elder, Mr. Daniel McIntosh, has removed with his family to Manitowaning. His removal has left a large blank, not only in our Session, but in all the active work of the congregation. We will follow them with our prayers and sympathies, and wish them every blessing in their new home. Mr. Garnet H. Meldrum, who has given so much valuable service in various departments of the Church's work, has, through a most honourable promotion in business, been required to take up his residence in Montreal. While we heartily congratulate him upon the honour he has received, we miss greatly his ever-willing and most unostentatious service.

The work of the Sabbath School and Bible Class is very efficiently carried on by a band of devoted teachers and officers, and every effort is put forth to deepen an interest in the Word of God. In July Mr. George Anderson, on account of important public duties connected with the Government, felt obliged to resign the position of Superintendent, which he has so faithfully and efficiently filled during the past thirteen years, and Mr. Theron Gibson has been appointed by the Session as his successor.

The work of the Elizabeth Street Mission goes on with unabated interest, and, as the reports will show, has a loyal and devoted band of workers.

One pleasant feature of the missionary interest is the presence amongst us again of our missionaries to India, Mr. and Mrs. Russell, who are home on furlough. We trust their visit may be helpful in the best sense both to them and to us.

The choir is rendering excellent service, and the new Book of Praise is giving an impetus to that important part of our worship.

As usual, death has left not a few vacant places in our membership. Early in the year we were called upon to mourn the death of Mrs. Jennings, who may truly have been called, in more ways than one, the mother of the congregation. We miss her kindly, genial presence and unceasing interest in every good work. One by one the living links binding us to the early history of the congregation are being severed. Another, who was with us only a short time, but greatly endeared himself to all who knew him, was Mr. Charles Hume. He was a brilliant student, having graduated with highest honours in medicine, but, what was far better, he was a most consecrated Christian. Not only in his own home, but in homes of poverty and suffering, where he ministered help and healing, many a tear has been shed over his early removal.

At the close of the old year and the beginning of the new one we were greatly saddened to hear of the sudden death of two of our former members, Rev. William Burns and Mrs. James Donald. They were both very highly esteemed amongst us, and filled their different stations in life in a manner worthy of the Master, who has called them home to a blessed rest and reward. Miss Clara Burns, Mrs. McNichol, Miss Lizzie Reid and others have finished their course and gone to receive the crown of glory that fadeth not away. To all the sorrowing relatives we extend our deepest and most prayerful sympathy.

During the year 87 new members have been added to the roll, 20 by profession of faith and 67 by certificate. The removals are : 9 by death, 31 by certificate and 34 by retirement from the roll. This makes a net gain of 13, so that the present membership is 668.

The sacrament of the Lord's Supper has been well attended during the year.

The sacrament of baptism has been administered to five adults and eleven infants.

### Report of Managers.

---

In presenting the report and accounts for the past year in the usual form, the Managers feel assured that the congregation will rejoice with them in the very favourable results achieved in that period. Notwithstanding the adverse balance of \$225 with which the year opened, the receipts have proved sufficient to meet the general congregational expenses and leave the small balance of \$20.68 on hand. A payment of \$600 has also been made on account of the mortgage against the District Mission property, taken over by the congregation a year ago, and the floating debt has been reduced by the sum of \$734, making a total gain during the past twelve months of \$1,580. This result is a matter for thankfulness, and a clear proof of the existence of an admirable spirit of loyalty to the interests of the church on the part of the members generally. Several exceptional subscriptions to the mortgage and floating debts are included in these figures, and the general revenue was supplemented by other special subscriptions, which made it possible to close the year with a favourable balance.

Throughout the year it was recognized that the weekly offerings were proving insufficient to meet current engagements. It was therefore resolved to confer with the Session in the hope that a solution of the difficulty might be found, and accordingly, meetings were held with that object. These yielded, at least, two distinct results—the appointment of a committee through whose instrumentality the sum of \$600, in special contributions, was received, as already mentioned; and the calling of a congregational meeting to devise, if possible, some plan to equalise the income and expenditures, and render unnecessary, in future, such appeals as have been customary during the past few years. The congregational meeting was duly held in November, but no definite action was taken other than the appointment of a committee to consider the questions involved, and report to the congregation at the annual meeting.

Comparing the figures for the past year with those for the year 1896, it will be seen that in the year 1897, the weekly offerings are less by \$34, and the expenditure also less by \$55 than in the previous year. There have been a number of changes in the regular contributors during the year under review; several valued members and their families have left the congregation, and others have cast in their lot with the Central Church. The effect of these removals and additions is shown in the list of weekly offerings given, as usual, in the next paragraph.

There are now on the contribution list the names of 231 members and adherents giving weekly the sum of \$86.77, against 224 giving \$88.37 reported a year ago. The amounts contributed are as follows:—

The plan introduced at the beginning of the year to liquidate the floating debt by monthly envelope offerings of equal amount with the weekly offerings of each contributor, was fairly well adopted by the congregation. It is gratifying to find that the sum of \$734.67 was subscribed principally in this way, and if the effort be continued, the remainder of the debt, which now stands at \$1,498, may be paid within a year, or two years at the outside. The Managers regret the loss, through removal from the congregation, of two esteemed colleagues, Messrs. R. W. Spence and G. H. Meldrum, the latter of whom rendered valuable service as Secretary of the Board for a number of years, and subsequently as Treasurer.

The property belonging to the congregation, consisting of the Church premises on Grosvenor Street, and the District Mission building and lot on Elizabeth Street, has been kept in good order and condition, all necessary repairs having been made throughout the past year. As the heating apparatus and roofs of the Church will require attention during the ensuing year, an outlay of two or three hundred dollars will probably be found necessary.

The following Managers retire by rotation and are eligible for re-election:—Messrs. Crawford, Creelman, Crooks, Forster, Hedley and York. Three others have left the congregation—Messrs. Meldrum, Spence and Young—so that it will be necessary, at the annual meeting, to elect nine members to serve as Managers, eight for the ensuing two years, and one for the ensuing year only.

## The Sabbath School.

The year has been one of considerable anxiety to the teachers. Shortly after our last annual meeting our Secretary, Mr. John T. Burgess, was obliged to leave us for a change of climate on account of his health. We regret that this change has not accomplished what was hoped. In the month of July our Superintendent, Mr. George Anderson, having received an important appointment as Trade Commissioner to Japan, tendered his resignation. A few months later Mr. Thomas Young, Assistant Superintendent, moved to the City of Montreal, and required us to relieve him of his office.

In the months of April and November the present Secretary-Treasurer and Superintendent assumed their respective duties, and in

December Mr. John MacEwen was elected to the office of Assistant Superintendent.

Early in December a social meeting was held, at which the teachers and scholars presented Mr. Anderson with a valuable set of books as an expression of their appreciation of his long and faithful services as Superintendent, covering the past thirteen years.

We have also been subjected to some changes in our teaching staff. Mr. Thomas Young moved to Montreal, Miss Bayne to Nova Scotia, Miss Anderson to Ottawa as Mrs. Buchanan, Mrs. Brown to Westminster congregation as the wife of Rev. John Neil, the pastor. While we regret the loss to us of these valued servants of the Lord, we trust they will continue in the good work, and be more blest than ever in their new fields of labour. Their places have been filled by Mrs. Stevenson, Miss Jennings, Miss Macdonald and Mr. F. W. Fraser.

The attendance of teachers has been very good. Miss Mather and Miss West were present 52 Sundays; Mrs. Crombie and Miss Ross, 50 Sundays. Number of scholars on the Roll (94 girls and 79 boys), 173. Average attendance during year, 116; average attendance during ten months (except July and August), 126. Teachers and officers, 28. Average attendance during year, 24; average attendance during ten months (except July and August), 26.

## The Bible Class.

As we present our report for the year just closed our hearts fill with praise and gratitude to God for all His mercies to us, individually and as a class, during the past twelve months. Not the least of His merciful providences has been the opportunity of meeting together for an hour on each Sabbath to study His holy Word.

With the exception of the usual vacation during July and August the work of the class has gone steadily on in the study of the life of Christ; and we trust that the closer view we have had of the teaching and example of our Lord while He walked with men on earth will ever be a source of inspiration and strength to us in our own daily life.

During the year several of our oldest and most regular members have left the class in order to take up active work for the Master in the Sunday School or at the Mission. We regret that they are no longer with us, but would not detain them from going forth to labour, and wish them God-speed.

Last June death removed from our midst Miss Clara Burns, who was for a number of years a member of the class, and most faithful in her attendance. The Master called her to Himself.

The average attendance has been as follows : Ladies, 19; men, 15. Total, 34. It will be seen that, while the attendance is fair, yet it has not been what might well be expected from a congregation the size of our own. Too many, we fear, who have the opportunity of joining in the study of God's Word are not taking advantage of it. Not only is it a privilege to search the hidden things of Scripture, that we may attain to spiritual knowledge and growth, but it is a duty, which Christ Himself has laid upon all His followers, that they may continually learn more of that message which He has left on record for them. God has given us His precious Word to be our comfort and rule of life. Shall we not, then, study it, that we may more exceedingly enjoy that comfort, and more fully understand what He would have us do? There are wells of truth in the Scriptures which, without careful study, are passed by and never tasted of. We earnestly invite all who can do so to take advantage of their privilege and join in the study of God's revelation for an hour on His own day.

We are pleased to report that, notwithstanding the extreme financial depression which we have experienced during the past year, our Treasurer is able to show a very creditable statement.

It is encouraging to observe the continued increase in missionary zeal as manifested by loyal support in maintaining the work of our Elizabeth Street Mission, attendance at missionary conferences and aiding in general missionary enterprise.

During the year Miss McIntosh, one of our zealous workers, has left us to take up mission work in the Indian School, Red Deer, Alberta, and at least six more have gone to engage in definite preparation for the foreign field.

It is most pleasing to us to hear the testimony of these concerning the benefit they have experienced from our domestic Mission in preparing for future service.

We note with considerable satisfaction that the Whitewood Mission, which we have been sustaining in the North-West, has grown into a settled charge, with very encouraging prospects.

The Rev. J. W. Muirhead, pastor, writes: "I wish to thank you on behalf of the Whitewood congregation for your kindness to us in the past. We feel very grateful, indeed. Through you we have had



regular services, and now that we take a step forward we hope you will continue your interest in us. We are no longer a mission station. We took our place on the augmented list January 1st, 1898, and hope to be self-sustaining in a short time. The congregation has been making wonderful strides forward of late years: the Sunday School reports sixty names on the roll; Session report ten members added during the year. The new church was opened last summer—a nice, plain, brick-veneered building, 30 by 50 feet. The ladies undertook the furnishing of it at a cost of over \$300, and gave us a very nice, comfortable church.”

It will be for you to consider to-night whether we shall take up a new home mission station or allow our special contributions to go into the ordinary fund for the present.

Mr. Thomas Young, our valued Secretary, left recently for Montreal, and was obliged to tender us his resignation. As the year was near its close, we deferred appointing a successor till to-night.

It has been a great source of satisfaction as well as profit to have had with us for the past five months our missionary to India and his wife, who are home on furlough. Mr. Russell's stirring addresses, one of which you will hear to-night, will, we expect, prove of great assistance in increasing our interest in and self-sacrificing spirit for the poor benighted souls in heathen darkness. Our hearts are saddened as we learn of the urgent need of more labourers in the foreign field, and know that so many thousands are saying, “Here am I; send me”; and our boards cannot send for want of money.

Let us all pray more earnestly and believingly for a great revival in Christian giving.

## The Ladies' Aid Society.

---

In presenting its seventeenth annual report the Ladies' Aid Society would gratefully record a year of earnest work among its members, and an increased attendance at the meetings, though it would gladly welcome a much larger number.

During the year fifteen regular and two emergency meetings have been held, with an average attendance of fifteen. Fifteen families have received assistance from time to time; six tons of coal have been distributed among nine different families, and the others have received new or cast-off clothing or provisions. In cases of illness, nourishment and medicine have been provided.

A number of garments and quilts have been sent to the Mission, where the plan of placing a small charge on them is still in force, as it seems so far the best-known way of helping the poor without destroying their sense of independence.

Death has removed one aged member of the congregation, who was supported at the Old Folks' Home; another member is still being cared for at the Aged Woman's Home.

We were sorry at the beginning of the year that Mrs. Campbell, who so ably fulfilled the duties of Secretary, our efficient first Vice-President, Mrs. Anderson, and Mrs. Jeffrey, who had been a most faithful and painstaking Treasurer for many years, were not able again to take office. We are glad that they are still able to be with us at our meetings, and give us the benefit of their wise counsel and experience.

In the passing away of Mrs. Jennings the Society lost a true friend, whose hand was ever ready to help, and whose heart never withheld its sympathy. The influence of her noble life is still about us, and her memory will always be cherished.

Once more we would thank our many faithful friends for their oft-repeated kindnesses. We look forward to our New Year with hopeful hearts, knowing that "Duty and to-day are ours; results and futurity belong to God."

“Jennings” Auxiliary, W.F.M.S.

On reaching the close of the seventeenth year in the history of the “Jennings” Auxiliary, W.F.M.S., the members have good cause for thankfulness.

While there seems to be an increasing interest in the work, it is a matter for regret that this increased interest has not found expression in increased contributions. The total amount contributed during the year was \$225.40; the amount last year was \$230.95. There have been twelve meetings held during the year, with an average attendance of twenty-seven members. At some of these meetings most interesting addresses were given by the following missionaries, viz.: Mrs. Mac-

kenzie and Mrs. Murray, from China; Mrs. Robinson, who had spent many years in Egypt; Miss Quinn, who has since been designated for work in the foreign field; also by Mrs. Jeffrey, our Secretary of work among the Indians of the North-West. Many interesting and instructive papers were also read at the meetings held during the year.

Our annual thank-offering meeting was held in October. The collection at that meeting amounted to \$73.30, being about \$20 less than in 1896. The sum of \$11.50, as well as a quantity of valuable clothing, were sent to the North-West.

The special ten-cent offering on behalf of the Foreign Mission Committee's deficit amounted to \$17.

There are eighty members on the roll as compared with seventy-six last year. Forty-five belong to the general society, eleven to the Auxiliary, and twenty-four are life members. One life member, Mrs. Theron Gibson, has been added during the year.

There are 119 contributors to the "Letter Leaflet," and an increasing interest is being taken in this monthly messenger.

There are fifteen "Scattered Helpers," who have contributed \$12.40.

Early in the year our Society lost an aged and highly esteemed member by the death of Mrs. Jennings, who for many years was our Honorary President. By the change in the name of our Society to that of the "Jennings" Auxiliary, as well as by her many virtues, Mrs. Jennings' memory will long be perpetuated in our midst. "Everywhere and always she bore the cause of missions on her heart, and was permitted to labour for her Master until the very close of her life."

Before concluding this report reference should also be made to the death of our young friend, Mrs. McNichol, who was long closely identified with the work of our congregation, and whose devoted life will long be remembered by those who were witnesses of her work for the Master, whom she so faithfully served. May we who are left a little longer be ever mindful of the great privilege we enjoy of being co-workers with our Lord, and go forward to the work of another year in humble reliance upon Him.

Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor.

In reporting the past year's work of our Society the officers feel that it has been one of real spiritual help to our members, and that all have enjoyed the fellowship of those united in the service of Christ. Our membership at present numbers 95 active, 9 associate, and 14 corresponding, making a total of 118.

We have been enabled to interest many of our members in active Christian work. The services in connection with the Elizabeth Street Mission have again been under the guidance of members of the Society. During the summer months an open-air service was held on Centre Avenue. At present one cottage prayer meeting is conducted on Elizabeth Street; others of our number distribute tracts or visit the homes of the people on Sabbath afternoon.



While the work at home receives attention, we also remember our foreign missions. The first Sabbath of the month is devoted to prayer for our missionaries and study of the fields. One of our number, Miss Bessie McIntosh, left us in November to take charge of an Indian school in Alberta, N.W.T.

To encourage systematic giving missionary envelopes are distributed to all our members, which are received monthly; and of our total receipts this year \$110.21 have been given for the support of our missionary, Mr. Russell.

The Presbytery's "Plan of Study" has as yet not been fully adopted, but at each of our prayer meetings a three-minute paper is given upon one of the Shorter Catechism questions.

During the year we were called upon to mourn the sad death of our much-loved fellow-worker, Dr. Charles Hume. In early youth the all-wise Father took him home, but not before his short but earnest and energetic Christian life and example impressed itself upon all of us. He clearly realized how much was to be done in a brief life-time, and used his opportunities to the best advantage.

"God takes our loved ones, but we lose not wholly what He has given;  
They live on earth, in thought and deed, as truly as in His heaven."

Owing to the activity of our Temperance and Good Citizenship Committee this year our Society received the banner presented by the Toronto Christian Endeavor Union for the greatest amount of work accomplished during the year.

At Christmas time the Society planned a pound offering, in which they were assisted by the congregation. Forty-five baskets of provisions were distributed among the needy families of our Mission, and many homes thus brightened.

The Junior Society still continue to meet at 10.15 on Sabbath morning. During the summer months it had discontinued, but re-organized again in the fall. They, too, visited the Mission homes at Christmas, carrying with them sunshine and Christmas offerings to forty-five little ones.

There was an entertainment held on Thanksgiving evening. Mr. George Anderson's views of Japan were shown, interspersed with sacred music. The attendance was good, and it was thoroughly enjoyed by all. It was with much regret that we were called upon in the autumn to bid farewell to our much-loved friend and co-worker, Mr. D. McIntosh. His loss to the Mission seems an irreparable one. We pray that the blessing of the Lord may very abundantly rest upon him and his family, and in the new field of labour to which he has been called may he have many precious souls for his hire, and when his work here is finished may he with joy hear the "Well done, thou good and faithful servant."

## SABBATH SCHOOL.

In presenting the seventeenth annual report of the Mission Sabbath School, we wish to express our deep thankfulness to God for His manifold blessings to us and to our work through the past year.

During the year we lost quite a number of our most valued workers and teachers, some of them having removed from the city, and others have entered into other fields of usefulness; but we are pleased to say that others have been found to take their places. Among those who have left us we would mention our former Superintendent and much-beloved friend, Mr. D. McIntosh.

Of the work among our scholars, we cannot speak definitely as to results.

Some of our scholars have during this year made confession of Christ, and quite a number have taken a deep interest in the study of God's Word, which gives us great encouragement in the work.

The number of scholars on the roll at the end of the year was 136. Average attendance during the year, 97. Average attendance of teachers, 19. Total average attendance during the year, 116. Our average would have been larger than the above only for Sunday cars and attractions at our parks and Island.

The annual picnic was held at Long Branch, June 12th, and our Christmas anniversary was held January 4th, at both of which the scholars, parents and friends had a time of social enjoyment. For these pleasant times the officers and teachers return most grateful thanks to the friends who so kindly aided them with money and refreshments; our cordial thanks are also due to the friends who sent us valuable books for prizes and the library, also to the Temperance Committee of Christian Endeavor Society for a supply of temperance papers.

It is with much pleasure that the workers of the Mission Sewing Class present their annual report, as their work has been characterized by a growing interest and a great improvement in the deportment of the scholars. Ten meetings have been held, with an average attendance of thirty. Our class list numbers sixty—the smallest class has been twenty-one and the largest forty-three.
