The institution is doing all that can be done to help the sick and maimed children of the Province of Ontario—all who seek admittance.

It is dependent for support upon the charitably inclined.

In answer to enquiries as to the terms on which persons may leave money by will to The Hospital for Sick Children, a correct form is herewith given.

The Hospital is an incorporated institution, under the direct supervision of the Ontario Government—and can legally receive any amount of money which may be given or bequeathed.

The Hospital can also take by gift, devise, or bequest, any lands or tenements, or any interest therein, the annual value of which does not exceed \$15,000, provided the gift, devise or bequest is made at least six months before the death of the person making the same.

The clause in the will may be in the following form :

"I GIVE, DEVISE AND BEQUEATH TO THE HOSPITAL FOR SICK CHILDREN AT TORONTO, THE SUM OF.....DOLLARS," and also, if lands be given, this clause to read: "I GIVE AND DEVISE TO THE HOSPITAL FOR SICK CHILDREN AT TORONTO, THE FOLLOWING IN LANDS (describing them)."

In cases where death is apprehended within six months, and when therefore the devise of lands would probably fail, it will be advisable to put the bequest in this form:—

"I GIVE AND BEQUEATH TO THE HOSPITAL FOR SICK CHILDREN AT TORONTO, THE SUM OF.....DOLLARS, TO BE RAISED AND PAID OUT OF MY MONEY AND PERSONAL EFFECTS."

The corporate name of the Hospital is, "The Hospital for Sick Children," Toronto.

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THE HOSPITAL FOR SICK CHILDREN.

Annual Report of the Trustees.

The Trustees of the Hospital for Sick Children beg to present the Twenty-second Annual Report of the institution. The year has been a satisfactory one. The work accomplished in the efforts of the institution to relieve the suffering of ailing little children and the interest taken by the public in the objects of the Hospital are gratifying to the Trustees.

The income of the Hospital has increased during the past year. The ordinary donations amounted to \$12,660, an increase over last year of \$2,543. These, with a special donation of \$12,000, given for the purpose of improving the land and buildings on College Street and The Lakeside Home for Little Children on the Island, a bequest from the estate of the late John Tucker, of \$18,000; another from the estate of the late Hart A. Massey, \$5,000; a third from the estate of the late Henry Goulding, \$250; a fourth from the estate of Robert Gilmour, \$200; \$2,000 from the Grand Lodge of Freemasons of Canada; and \$500, the first half of \$1,000, from the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Canada; making a total of \$47,860.

These contributions enabled the Trustees to reduce the debt of the Hospital so that instead of a liability on the 31st December next of \$95,000 as in 1896, the gross debt will not exceed \$70,000. This reduction in debt decreases the amount to be paid on interest, and this, with a reduction of the rate from $5\frac{3}{4}$ to $4\frac{1}{2}$, will further lighten the burden that the trustees have had to carry.

The equipment of the Hospital and The Lakeside Home for Little Children has been kept up to the highest standard of efficiency. The excellence of both institutions is shown by the fact that in the building of other hospitals in the different cities of this continent our Hospital on College Street has been visited by committees who have the building of new hospitals in charge, and by architects, who testify to the completeness in plan and arrangements for the work in both our institutions.

In the donations it is to be noted that the Sunday-schools and Churches have doubled the amount of their subscriptions in the previous year, and it is just possible that this year, when the work of the Hospital is placed before these faithful friends, who have always been interested in the work, a large increase may be anticipated in the donations from this source.

The receipts of money from pay patients has decreased some \$300 (this includes all patients who pay a charge of \$2.80 per week and over), while the

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Cot Account, that is, the amount sent in for the support of cots, has increased about \$750.

This year the City of Toronto, recognizing the large amount of work done by the Hospital, increased its annual contribution from \$5,000 to \$7,500, while the grant from the Ontario Government reached the sum of \$8,258, being about \$300 in excess of the previous year.

The assets of the Hospital amount to \$212,740, all of which is invested in lands, buildings and furniture, etc., while the liabilities amount to \$62,767.

The Lakeside Home for Little Children has been greatly improved by the widening of the front verandahs, affording large and airy spaces for the children and adding much to the utility of the building. The building is now lighted with gas manufactured by a plant placed at a distance from the building. There was also erected this summer, through a special donation, a pavilion on the lake shore for those children who may be unable to play or take an airing on the beach.

The work of the Hospital during the past year is as follows: There were 92 patients at the beginning of the year; 470 were received during the year and 476 discharged, leaving 86 in the Hospital on the 30th Sept., which is the end of the Hospital year. Of the 476, there were cured 312, improved 109, unimproved 30, and there were 25 deaths. 444 of the patients were from the City of Toronto and 118 from other places. 258 surgical operations have been performed during the year. The number of cases treated at the Outdoor Department were: Medical, 2,600; Surgical, 1,533; a total of 4,133.

The per capita rate for 1897, excluding interest, is 71.87c.; with interest it would amount to 86.41c. In 1896 the per capita, without interest, was 63.13c., and with interest 78.90c. The increase in the per capita for maintenance is due to increased price for fuel, etc., and for the reason that the infectious department of the Hospital was open for about eight months during the year, and, as a consequence, the Hospital was for short periods closed for the reception of patients, which would make a difference of some \$700 in the receipts.

Properly speaking, the amount paid for interest on the mortgage should be included in the gross expenses in making up the per capita cost, but for the purpose of comparison with other Hospitals the interest, although given in its proper place, does not enter into the calculation.

It is to be regretted that out of Hospitals for Children in the world only a few give the cost per head. Indeed, were it not for Burdett's useful annual publication, issued in London, England, it would be impossible to arrive at the average daily cost of many of the Hospitals.

In the earlier part of the year the verandahs in connection with all the wards were enclosed with glass, and the facilities of the Hospital were thereby materially increased. Indeed, no addition to the Hospital building has been more satisfactory than the enclosure of these verandahs. They are used as school-rooms in connection with the wards, and as play and sun-bath rooms for the convalescent patients. Consequently, in the main wards the children who are confined to their beds have greater rest and comfort from the fact that there is less noise in the wards, for even sick children can sometimes be noisy. These verandahs had also to be heated, which considerably increased the cost of fuel.

The Trustees have also provided a Bacteriological Room, and annexed to this is an X-Rays apparatus, which has been particularly useful during the

past twelve months. This department has been a great convenience in the work of the Hospital, and has given the staff an opportunity of making cultures without sending out of the building.

The average stay of children in the Hospital during 1896 was 55.30 days ; during 1897, 56.57 days. As the Hospital was closed for admission we suffered a loss of about 1,500 days, which increases the average stay.

The students' fees have increased during the year. A greater interest is being taken by the students of all the medical schools in the work of the Hospital.

The ordinary expenditures of the Hospital have been confined to work actually required. The item for insurance this year is heavier than the former year, because this year the payment made was for three years. The extra expenditure on buildings and furniture in connection with both institutions was made in accordance with the requirements of the special donation made for that purpose, the terms of which could not be varied.

The statement as given and the explanations cover the work of the Hospital during the past year. While it is pleasant to note the fact that the debt has decreased, it must be remembered that special donations and bequests do not fall into our hands every year. Therefore, to bring the debt down to an amount which can be handled with ease, a considerable amount of energy on the part of those interested in the work is absolutely necessary.

It costs about \$2,400 per month to meet all the expenditures of the Hospital, and this expenditure is to a certain extent uncontrollable.

Administration has to be provided, nurses have to be lodged, boarded and remunerated ; drugs, medicines and surgical instruments and appliances have to be purchased, and the many incidental expenses necessary to hospital work have to be met in order that the work of the institution may be carried on with due regard to the highest efficiency.

In 1896 there were 123 children from 88 places in the Province of Ontario, outside of Toronto. This year there are 118 children from 83 places.

In 1896 there were 54 cots supported. This year there are 53.

The list shows 25 fatal cases during the year. It will be noted that 14 of the little ones who died were 7 days and less in the Hospital. It is safe to state that, at least, six more of the fatal cases were brought to the Hospital when hope of life was almost *nil*.

There were 236 surgical operations in 1896 ; in the year 1897 there were 258.

The medical report shows 312 cases absolutely cured out of 476 admitted, while 109 out of 476 were improved and only 30 unimproved. The rules of the Hospital only permit the admission of children between the ages of two and fourteen years, yet in cases of the minimum age where immediate operation was necessary, such cases have been admitted.

The rule regarding the minimum limit has not been strictly adhered to, that with regard to the maximum age of fourteen years has been specially enforced by notification to the staff that no children over that age, under any consideration, be admitted.

The Trust has always endeavored to do the greatest good to the greatest number of children, and have admitted those of both sexes over fourteen years ; but experience has proven that all patients over that age should be treated in a Hospital for adults. This resolve has been arrived at after a most careful consideration and consultation by those who are competent to give an opinion on the subject.

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The Hospital has ward room for 200 cots. The building was originally built for 165 cots, but since that time two wards of three beds each, used for newly-admitted patients, and six verandah wards, which will hold 29 cases in an emergency, bring the accommodation up to 200 beds.

The accommodation for nurses and domestics is so cramped that two wards and one corridor have to be divided up into bedrooms.

Even with the strictest economy, it requires no less than five officers, twenty-four nurses and twenty domestics to carry on the work of the Hospital. Twenty-five more children could be taken care of with the same number of attendants.

It is pleasant to hear from the Government Inspector, Dr. Chamberlain, and from officials of other Hospitals in Great Britain and the United States who have visited our Hospital and know the details of work, that the management is considered not only economical but efficient, as shown by the per head per day cost.

A prominent Hospital lady official from the United States, while on a visit to Toronto this summer, spent some hours in the College Street building. She declared that as a building it is perfect, that its sanitary condition is first class, and that after a close examination of the wards, dressing-rooms, lavatories, laundry, kitchen and store-rooms, its condition could not be excelled by any Hospital on either continent.

The present need of money for the Hospital can be seen by a glance at the balance sheets. The bank overdraft is \$12,000, an amount which will be increased during the next three months to \$20,000, and this sum with amounts that may accrue by 31st Dec., 1897, the Trustees are required to pay off before the end of January.

The thanks of the Trust are due to Mr. John Stark and Mr. E. B. Freeland, who have kindly audited the books of the Hospital for the past twenty-two years.

Miss Maria Buchan, Treasurer of the Hospital, has been most faithful in the discharge of the many onerous duties involved in the care of the finances of the institution.

The Committee of ladies in connection with the Hospital have been most attentive to their duties during the past year, and have added largely to the success which has attended the efforts of the Trust.

The work of the Hospital is ever increasing. At this writing, three weeks after the closing of the financial year, there are 112 patients in the building, and from the present outlook it is evident that the number will increase during the coming six months. The doors of the Hospital are open to every ailing child in the province, and the increased demands upon the services of the institution must not be lessened, but rather increased. This can only be done by aid from friends all over the province, thousands of whom can testify to the magnificent work which the Charity has accomplished during the twenty-two years of its existence.

Everyone can help in this grand work.

There is a pressing need for aid.

The demand comes from an institution which tries to give health, life and ease to sick little children.

In this request for aid we appeal to you, the reader of this report.

Your dollar will bless you in the giving.

Your giving will be a help to those who need help.

You can help the sick little children, the suffering ones, who lie in little cots as the hours drag into a weary day.

Thousands of children, who have been in the Hospital during the past twenty-two years, have cried to you for help.

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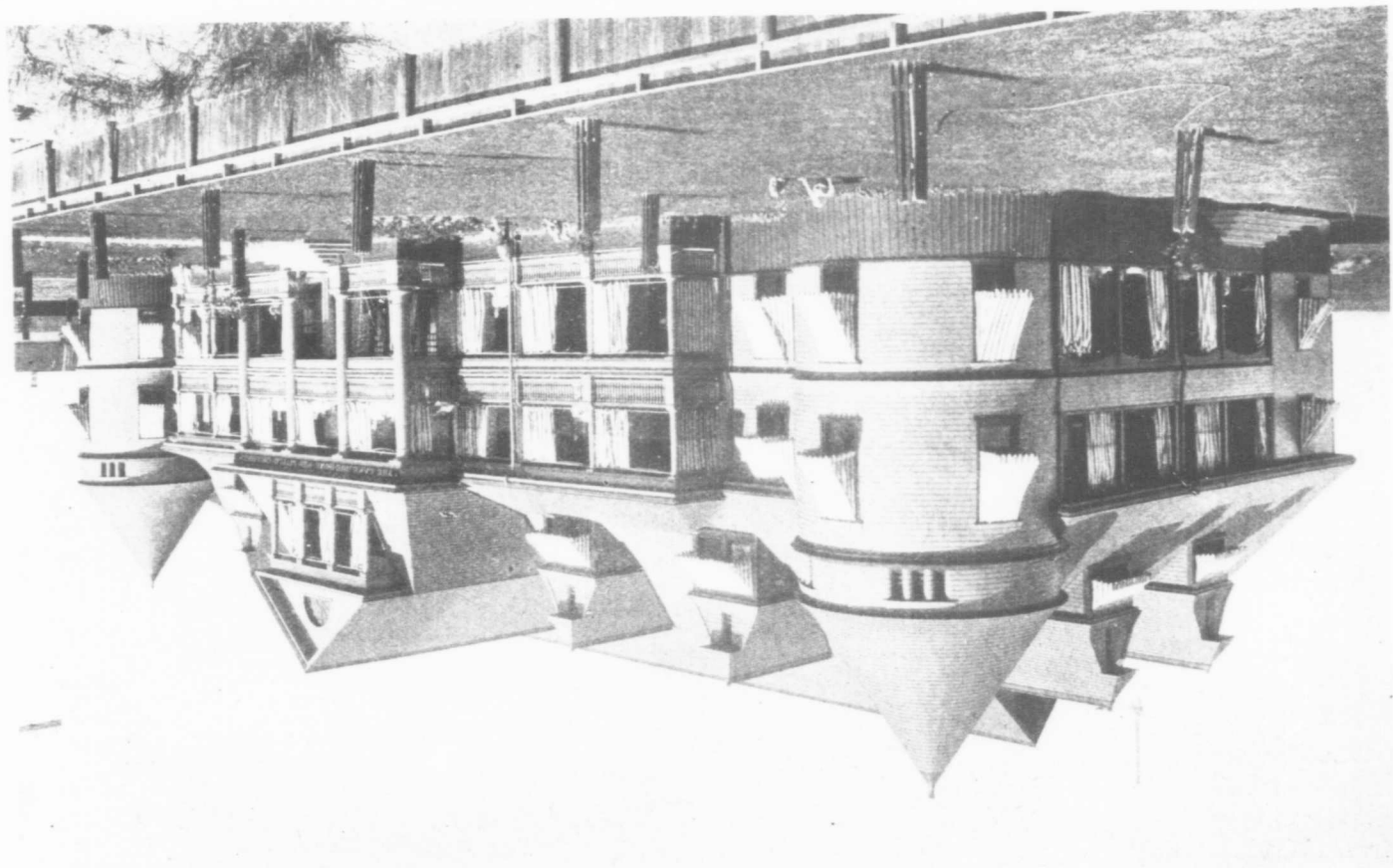
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A Group of Convalescent Children in the School Room of the Hospital.



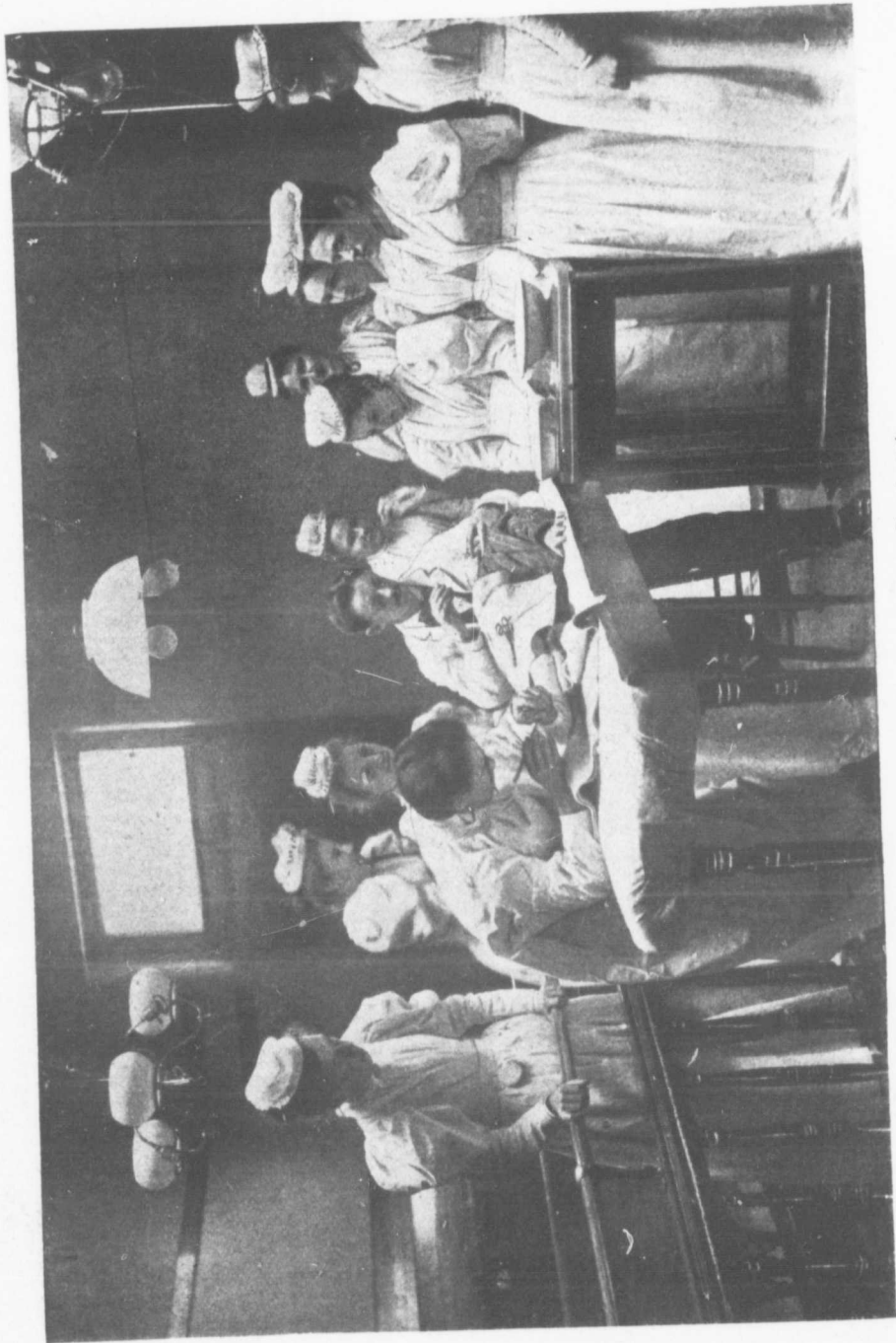

THEY WILL GET STRONG.

The Patients in the Sick Children's Hospital Removed to Convalescent Quarters in The Lakeside Home.

"Hi-yah—we're all going over to the Island," shouted a diminutive little fellow named Tommy, as he ran to greet The Telegram reporter at the Hospital for Sick Children on 17th June.

All was gladness. The white, wan faces beamed with smiles. They were going for a sail—going to their Island home. It had been talked about by the little ones for a month past. "As soon as the weather was fine," Nurse had said, and each morning the little chaps in the Boys' Ward looked out of the window on College street and studied the weather. So did the girls. One little fellow had heard about "Oid Probs," and to nurse he audibly wondered if fine weather could not be arranged for somehow.

How they had waited for that day. How they had longed for it. Nurse had soothed their pain, wiped away their tears and stopped their crying with stories of the Island home, the delightful breezes, the bright, sunny days, and the daily health promenade in the strength-giving air on the Island Point. And all were glad—all except ten or a dozen tots who were too ill to be moved, or who had to stay behind for the sad reason—"an operation must be performed, all the appliances are at the Hospital on College street."

Brave little sufferers there were. Big, strong men carried the more helpless ones to the ambulance. Did they feel pain? Yes, but if they winced, might not they be left behind. Not a wince. Everybody smiled.

The carriages drove up to the door. Each nurse gathered together four little charges. They were carefully handed to the cushioned seats. One child cried—just one—and it was because he feared the nurse might be left behind if she didn't hurry and get in. Seventeen carriages and two ambulances. What a picture! The procession wended its way along College to Yonge, down to King, along to Bay street, and down to the wharf.

Seated in the carriages, with mouths closed tight, never a word, and eyes wide open, the youngsters attracted the attention and claimed the sympathy of every passerby. And many watched them till the last laden vehicle had passed them by. No need to ask where came they from. Everybody knew. There is no institution nearer and dearer to the heart of Toronto than the big institution on

College street, big enough and able enough to cradle and nurse back to health and strength the suffering children of a whole city.

Down at the wharf the staunch little ferry of Clark Brothers awaited their coming. Attached to the ferry was an open launch, its floor softly padded with mattresses. And here the big boys were laid. They all had overcoats and wraps, for the day was not as warm as it had promised to be.

Rain threatened. A few drops fell. But Old Probs. was kind, and succeeded in keeping back the mirth-destroying dampness. Willing hands carried the helpless ones to the boats. A crowd gathered. And many were the expressions of sympathy as the seventy wee sufferers were being carefully tucked away for the brief lake voyage.

Out into the bay, through the western gap, and along the Island shore the ferry passed with its precious freight, while back in the city and at the hospital those who had loved and waited on the little ones awaited the telephone message that would announce the safe arrival of the ferry launch and its passengers.

And they waited with the same anxiety that friends await friends who are crossing the ocean.

The debarkation at the little wharf in front of The Lakeside Home was accomplished in good time, and that institution is to-day peopled with as happy a little throng of youngsters as ever Grim Disease tried to trouble.

Miss Brent, the lady superintendent, was assisted by the hospital surgeons, Doctors Steele and Embury, and by Mr. Gordon. The staff of nurses had each assigned to them a quartette of patients. The removal to their Island home was accomplished as usual without a single hurt or mishap. And everybody is glad.

OVER AT PARK POINT.

What was Seen at The Lakeside Home for Little Children—Story of a walk Through the Building.

"What is you writin'?" said a wondering, blue-eyed little child on Saturday afternoon, July 24.

"I am writing something to put in the paper that all the people may read. And I'll tell you what I'll do. If you tell me your name I will write that, too. What is your name?"

"Lily May," said blue eyes. She was one of forty-seven little girls who are spending their summer time over at The Lakeside Home for Little Children

at Park Point, the south-westernmost point of the Island.

Notwithstanding the occasional wind from the north-west the afternoon was warm and the sunshine was reflected hotly from the sand-strewn sidewalk leading to the Home. But once within its corridors and shaded verandahs the heat was forgotten as the refreshing air came sweet and pure and cool from off the blue waters sparkling in the afternoon sunlight without. The Lakeside Home is a distinguished landmark, especially from the lake on the south and west. As one approaches the building the architectural beauty of it is better appreciated.

The grounds are prettily laid out and the capacious lawns are kept fresh and green, while blooming flowers afford a pleasing relief to the eye. The main walk of the Island runs directly through the grounds. To the west another leads down to the Home landing where a pavilion is being constructed. Here the nurses and children may sit and enjoy the grateful coolness and see the steamers and white wings coursing across the water in all directions. Three boat houses and six bath houses are being built under the pavilion. For not only are the inmates of this beneficent institution cared for so far as disease and lameness are concerned, but every possible facility is afforded them for enjoyment. What they miss because their bodies are well nigh helpless is atoned for by blessings and benefits in other directions. Many a tormenting pain is forgotten and many a cruel dart of disease loses its power when the little child is made comfortable and happy in ways known only to the sympathetic and pitiful kindness of the spirit that pervades this place.

The lake shore at Park Point affords an excellent and safe beach for bathing. The sand is fine and so gradually shelving that danger is impossible. Here, by the hour, the little cripples, who go down twice a day, sit and build miniature hospitals from the sand and pebbles; those who are able are allowed to wade in the water or even bathe in it. Save for the bandages and crutches a visitor would take the company to be a picnic party rather than poor, little suffering children, whose lives must be cramped because they are not free to romp and wander as other children.

A ring at the bell of the main entrance brings to the door a uniformed attendant, who politely invited the visitors to enter and be seated in the comfortable and roomy reception-parlour while a message was taken to

Miss Brent, of the Hospital of the Lakeside Home.

Another building is built of wood and is comfortable. The caretaker is so situated where the shade of the trees is the cool breeze, giving a pleasant surprise. Of the 85 children, some are peevish or fretful and some are of a laughingly of the tree.

Another welcome, and the tour of the building is begun. At once the cleanliness and order of the place is noticeable. The capacious verandahs are curtained so as to keep out the heat where the sunlight might stream in. The shaded portions are open so that the cool breezes came gently stealing in, giving a sense of rest and comfort. Of the 85 children there not one was peevish or fretful; they all seemed so restless and content, many of them full of laughter—all of which tells eloquently of the treatment they receive.

Many of the sick children come from the poorest homes, where they receive no love, no care, to say nothing of inadequate medical and nursing attendance. Sometimes they come in such condition that drastic methods of purification must be theirs before they are allowed to enter the wards, where nothing unclean is permitted. It is a novel experience to them, but they enjoy it. In fact many of the children who leave the Hospital and the Home do so reluctantly, even though they return to their own homes. They throw their arms about the nurse, who has been friend and mother as well as nurse, and cry as if their hearts would break.

On the south verandah, first floor, were found 21 little girls of the surgical ward, in all stages and conditions of illness that requires surgical treatment. No one looking at them would dream of the knife in connection with these frail young bodies. They were all happy; some were playing with dolls, some were reading, others were having confidential gossip, a la their elders, and some gazed curiously upon the visitor. "Is he a doctor?" anxiously whispered one to her friend.

The children were taken to the Island June 17th last, later than usual this year, on account of the cool weather. They will be returned to the Hospital at the end of September. Of course The Lakeside Home population is somewhat of a shifting character. As children improve they are discharged; occasionally one has to be taken to the Hospital for a more serious surgical operation. All children who are sick are admitted to the Home, no matter about their nationality, creed or colour. The average daily number cared for is 85.

Not only the bodily and moral welfare of the children are cared for, but their intellectual powers are not neglected. Miss Sams, a Public school

teacher, cares for them in this respect. The school closed at the end of June and will re-open September 1st, in harmony with the general school term of the city.

On the 2nd floor verandah, opening out from the ward, were found 26 girls, some of them not beyond babyhood, in what is known as "The Girls' Medical Ward." There are many very small children at The Lakeside this summer, little, lovable, interesting toddlers who don't seem to miss even their own mothers, so tenderly and lovingly are they cared for here.

THE LAKESIDE HOME COTS.

In the Girls' Medical Ward at The Lakeside Home are the following cots: "The Adelaide Cot," supported by a sympathizer from Brockville, was occupied by a little girl two and a half years old, who came to The Lakeside on the 9th of July with infantile paralysis. She was a bright, lively child, and a great talker.

In the "Port Hope Ministering Children's League Cot" a girl eleven years of age lies all day, very quietly, and has always a smile for every one. She came into the Hospital on College street in the month of February, and was taken over to The Lakeside in June with the other children, where she is growing stronger every day inhaling the fresh air and enjoying the bright sunshine on the verandah here.

In the "Island Amateur Aquatic Association Cot, No. 2," supported by the I. A. A. Association, was a girl two years of age, who came into the mother Hospital with a very bad eruption on the face, but it was quite disappearing and it was expected that she would be able to go home in a few days. She was a serious little woman, but always happy and contented.

In the Boys' Medical Ward at The Lakeside:—"The Allan Norman Cot," endowed by Mr. and Mrs. G. A. McKenzie, was occupied by a baby two years of age, who came into the Hospital with eczema and bow legs. He is a most mischievous little chap and has to be watched carefully.

In the "Birch Cliff Cot," supported by Mr. H. L. Stark, was a lad nine years old with St. Vitus' Dance, and it was wonderful the progress this boy had made since he was admitted. When the children came from the Hospital on College street, a lad seven years of age with the same disease was put into this cot, but had been discharged since quite cured, both these cases being

favourable examples of what can be done for this disease.

In the "Gordon Cot," supported by Mr. F. J. Stewart was a baby one year old with hernia. He is known as "General Brock," because he bears a slight resemblance to the famous hero of 1812.

In the Boys' Surgical Ward at The Lakeside:—The "Island Amateur Aquatic Association Co., No. 1," was occupied by a bright little lad, 5 years of age, who is a great favourite with the other boys. He has been in the Hospital with deformed feet, but they are getting better rapidly, and it is expected that in a couple of months he will be perfectly cured.

Away in one corner a father was visiting one of his little girls lying helpless in her white cot while he held another sick one on his knee. It was a touching picture; and no wonder the man's eyes were tear-laden and his rough hands gentle as a woman's while he petted his darlings and, no doubt, whispered to them little words of cheer and hope.

In another corner a father and mother with two children came to visit their sick baby girl and that, too, was pathetic—that little family reunion about the baby's chair. One cannot write much about such things—they seem too sacred, and one feels as if those who read, not seeing the pity of it, might not understand. Every day such little incidents multiply themselves over at The Lakeside, and many a father and mother leaves the place thanking their Maker that kind hearts and generous hands bring Heaven's blessings to their sick children.

The north side of the building is the boys' side, and there they are, boy-like, in all degrees of boy-development. Perhaps the most interesting of the 88 boys is the King-baby, only ten months old—as pretty a baby as one wishes to see, but alas, who drifted in there—a waif. When only ten weeks old a serious operation was performed upon him and he stood it manfully, if the word may be allowed in connection with the baby, and is "as good and lively as he can be," to put it in the language of his nurse.

Out upon the verandah the boys were clustered in all stages of disease and deformity—happy, if a boy can be happy when he's tied down to a cot. Some of them were hobbling out over the lawn where the superfluous energy of the able-bodied boys is used to keep it clean.

In one of the wards an old, gray-headed man was devoting himself to a poor little fellow, too sick even to be out on the verandah. The contrast between the tottering, feeble old man and the sick boy with all of manhood yet before him—perhaps not before him, should he die—was most impressive to a visitor. The two ends of life, each burning low, each near death—this was one of the pitiful things that made the bright sunlight of that afternoon seem like a mockery.

With a few words to some of the little fellows, and their testimony that they were well cared for and getting along "all right, sir," we next were escorted to the top, or nurses' flat. The parlour, facing west, above the facade, has been extended by the addition of a verandah, and it is worth a walk to The Lakeside simply to sit there and take in the magnificent prospect. The view commands a wide sweep of water from the western channel around Humber bay, out along the horizon so far as the eye can see. The beauty of the view is well nigh incomparable. In all respects no better location for this Home, so fitly named "The Lakeside," could have been chosen. It is far enough from the city to be free from its heat and dust and turmoil, and yet it is easily accessible. A pleasant trip thither is by small rowing or sailing boats, which find good wharfage at Park Point.

In addition to the architectural improvements already spoken of, the Home has other improvements. It is now served with pure, fresh water pumped in from the Island water-works just east. A great deal of sodding has been done, and the grounds greatly beautified. The former pumping house has been converted into a room for the manufacture of acetylene gas, with which the building is lighted. The light is clear, steady and brilliant, and brings out the beauty of the interior with fine effect.

The fire protection, the heating and sanitary arrangements are perfect. Everything is in first-class order, instantly available, only the very best material has been used, and, though costly at the beginning, is cheapest in the end. The superintendency of the various departments is unimpeachable; the management is efficient and economical, and the generosity which has given to the citizens of Toronto and the public of Ontario and of the Dominion, an institution like this, cannot too frequently be commended.

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AN ATTRACTIVE AT HOME.

The Nurses of the City Hospitals Have an Outing at The Lakeside Home for Little Children at Park Point, Toronto Island

A happy thought prevailed in the mind of Miss Brent, the lady superintendent of The Hospital for Sick Children, while in charge of the summer annex of that institution, The Lakeside Home for Little Children at the Park Point, near the lighthouse, Toronto Island, when she sent out invitations to an "At Home" to the nurses of all the city hospitals, the General, Grace, Western and St. Michael's. It was a professional gathering in every sense of the term. There were over one hundred nurses present, representing those who were "off duty," and with them were ten or twelve of the young gentlemen who are resident doctors of the various city hospitals.

The nurses all wore the standard uniforms of their respective training schools, and the doctors were dressed in white duck suits. The nurses from the General Hospital wore dresses of light blue galatea, with white caps, and aprons. The Children's Hospital nurses, with their blue dresses of a similar shade, wore caps, aprons and kerchiefs. The Grace Hospital nurses wore caps and aprons with shepherd check dresses. The Western Hospital nurses wore dresses of blue and white check, with apron, caps and kerchiefs.

From three until six o'clock Wednesday, 15th September, the wide verandahs and lovely lawns of The Lakeside Home were filled with groups of nurses. The pretty scene was much enhanced by the bright flowers, planted in unique form across the entire width of the new lawns. Excellent music furnished opportunity for dancing, and the music was not only an attraction for the guests, but also for the hundred sick children, who looked so contented as the guests moved through the upper verandahs and wards, which contained the youngsters who are being benefited by their summer at The Lakeside Home.

The occasion was rendered more enjoyable by the presence of the lady superintendents, who have charge of the training schools attached to the city hospitals, Miss Snively, of the Toronto General Hospital; Miss Clarke, of Grace Hospital, and Miss Van De-water, lady superintendent of the Western Hospital; with Miss McCrea, assistant at the General Hospital, and Miss McKellar, of the Burnside Hospital.

The occasion was highly appreciated by the one hundred nurses, who for

three hundred and sixty-five days in the year, for three years, have charge of the patients, young and old, of the great hospitals of this city.

BROUGHT BACK TO THE CITY.

A Pleasant Trip from The Lakeside Home to the Hospital for Sick Children.

After a delightful summer season over at The Lakeside Home for Little Children, its inmates, some seventy patients, were brought over to the city on Wednesday, September 22nd, and safely conveyed to the Hospital for Sick Children on College street.

This number by no means indicates the number of sick and invalid children at the Home during the summer. The average daily attendance there was far greater. But the outing and the beneficent general treatment of the patients was such that many were sent away cured or so far helped on the way to recovery that they were discharged. It is calculated that over 200 children have benefited by The Lakeside Home this season.

The removal to-day was successful in every way, and the little invalids enjoyed the trip over, though loth to give up the Home that has been such a blessing and such an enjoyment to them. Instead of embarking them at Park Point, as hitherto, they were wheeled down to Hanlan's Point and then put upon one of the Toronto Ferry Company's large double-end steamers, the Mayflower, kindly placed at the disposal of the management by Messrs. Osler & Hammond. The pleasant ride across the bay was speedy and enjoyable.

At the wharf twenty carriages and the city ambulances were in waiting to receive the voyagers. The passage up Yonge street was an impressive one, as it always is, and attracted great attention from the crowds along that busy thoroughfare.

The management, assisted by Drs. Foster and Grahame, superintended the removal generally, while the eighteen nurses, in charge of the lady superintendent, looked after the more direct wants of the children.

There are about 100 patients in the Hospital at this time, and room for more is available. Much might be written of the inestimable benefit accruing to these helpless sick ones by their sojourn at the beautiful and comfortable home on the Island, and much of the tender care and skilful treatment accorded them in the Hospital in the city—but all this is now common knowledge, and always has its sequel in the relief and cure of the children.

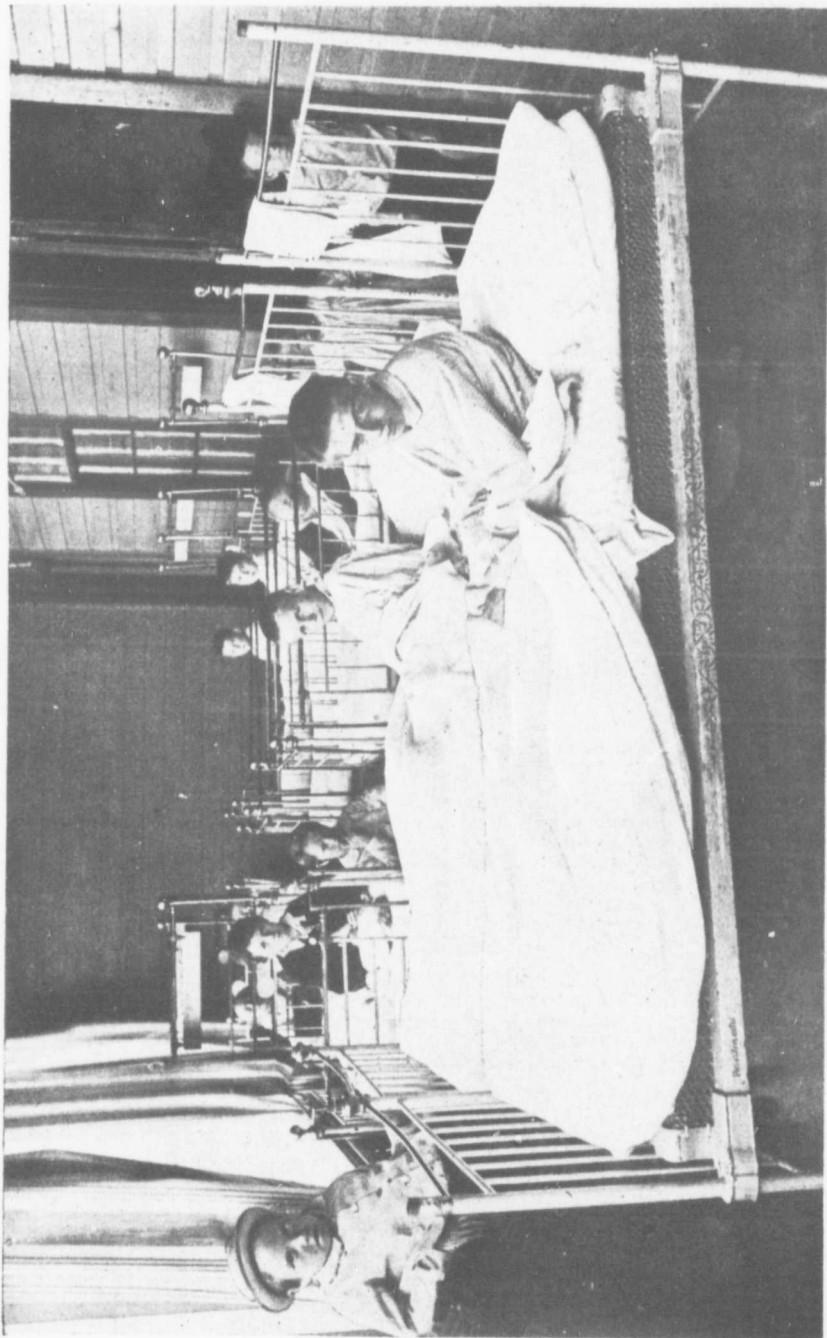

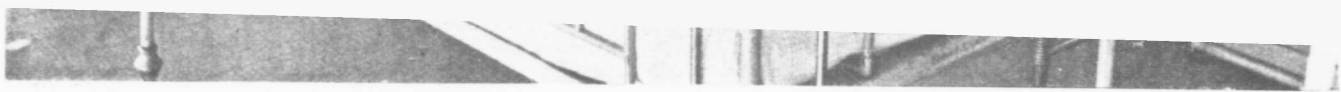

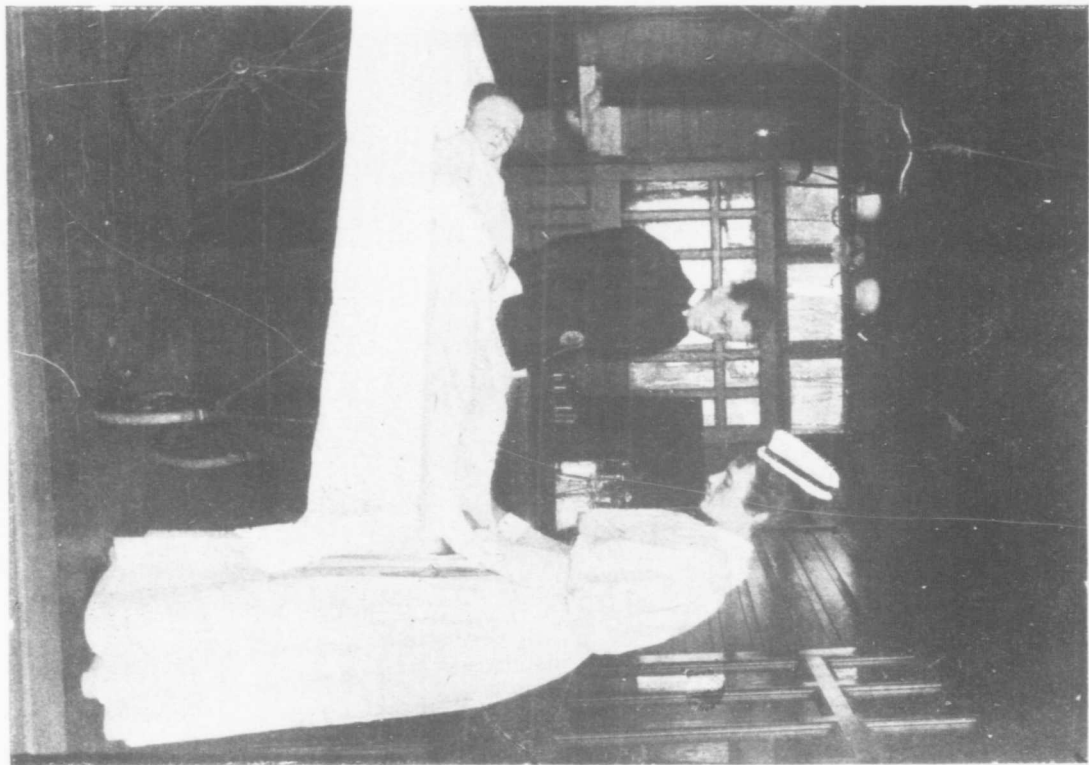

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WITH THOSE WHO CANNOT HELP THEMSELVES

An Hour in The Hospital for Sick Children

A Walk Through the Wards of the Great Provincial Charity on College Street — Something About the Children who Occupy the Cots and Beds.

Every Saturday afternoon from two until four o'clock The Hospital for Sick Children, the great Provincial charity on College street, that has in its care 600 sick children a year in its indoor department and over 4,000 in its outdoor department, is open to the public.

There is no greater or grander work for good being done in this city or province. As one strolls through the wards and looks at the sick little ones cared for by kindly hands, the heart goes out in sympathy for an institution that takes 600 sick children yearly into its cots and sends out 300 in perfect health, another 200 considerably improved, and a large proportion of the remaining number benefited.

Such, in brief, is the work of the Hospital, and as the year draws to a close those more immediately concerned—the trustees, the officials and the nurses—feel that, in reviewing the history of the twenty-second year of the Hospital, it is a record which is certainly not surpassed by any institution of a similar kind in the world.

At this writing there are 112 patients lying in the cots and beds which line the sides of the eight wards of the Hospital.

Some of these cots are endowed by a payment of \$2,000, while others are supported by a contribution of \$100 annually. In the first case the cot or bed is named in perpetuity after the donor or by a name selected by him or her. Where \$100 a year is paid the cot is named for the year only. It costs \$50 to furnish a cot or bed, and there are yet 50 cots to be furnished to make up the full complement of 200 beds in the building.

It is pleasant to walk through the wards, to chat with the little ones and

hear the nurses tell the stories of the different cases, or listen to the wise remarks of the tiny inmates who lie in the coverleted cots.

The ward that attracts most attention is the Boys' Surgical Ward, a room 60 feet long and 20 feet wide, with 18 beds.

In the "James Hervey Price Cot," maintained by Miss Price, of Eglinton, Ont., is an interesting lad called Frank, aged 7 years, who has been lying in his cot since the 11th of August with Potts' disease. Frankie is the "artist" of the ward. From his cot he has a good view of College street, and showed us a book full of his drawings from nature. The Yonge street fire hall, with its clock; pictures from the sign board on Mission avenue, and ships which he saw when over at The Lakeside Home this summer, were all quite cleverly done. Frank is now one of the happiest and most contented little children in the ward, although he made a hard fight against remaining in the Hospital the day he was brought in, crying bitterly and opposing the efforts of everyone to comfort him. He is a patient fellow, always ready with a smile for everyone, although he has to lie in his cot all day and be kept quiet.

A lad from East Toronto occupies the "Victoria Diamond Jubilee Masonic Cot," one of our new cots, founded by the Freemason Lodges of Toronto at the Jubilee service held at the Pavilion this summer. This lad, aged 8 years, was wearing a splint for a diseased knee, but he was able to walk round the ward, and told us that it was nearly better now, and that he would be going home soon.

Our "Exhibition Boy" is the posses-

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sor of the "Margaret Sinclair Robertson Cot." Almost every boy and girl in the city has heard of the lad, aged 8 years, who went to the Exhibition on School Children's Day with his older brother, and in running across the race track was knocked down by a trotting horse. Those who were eye witnesses of the accident and interested in the boy will remember how he was carried from the road apparently lifeless. He was attended to on the grounds as far as facilities afforded, but was taken at once to the Hospital for Sick Children in the ambulance. The accident was a serious one, a fracture of the skull and the left arm paralyzed. One of the surgical staff was at once notified, and that evening a skilful surgical operation was performed in the presence of the surgical staff of the Hospital and a number of the members of the British Association, who were then in the city and interested in the case. For nearly two weeks his life was despaired of, and it was only through the most loving care and watchfulness with which he was surrounded day and night, that he has now almost entirely recovered from his injuries. We found the little fellow playing with the other children who were able to be out of bed, and quite happy and contented. His reply to our enquiry as to his health was "Very well, thank you," and added that he was going home in a few days.

In the "East Toronto Cot," a lad aged 7 years, was lying with a broken leg. Nurse told us that he had fallen from a fence five feet high, while playing with a number of companions, and had sustained a severe fracture above the knee. He was a bright child, and it is expected that his leg will soon be perfectly cured, and that he will be able to go home.

The "All Saints' Alpha Cot," maintained by All Saints' church Sunday school, is occupied by a lad, aged twelve years, with spinal curvature, who told us that his nurse had to swing him every day so that his back would get strong. He tried to tell us how he used to look—"My shoulder was away up and the other down like this," and the lad straightened himself and seemed quite proud to tell us all about himself.

In the "Masonic Cot" a boy, aged nine years, was lying, who told us that a bicycle had knocked him down on Carl-

ton street one day as he was going home from school, and his leg was broken. "It was very sore at first, but is nearly all right now" he told us, and also said that the doctor had told him that he would be able to go home in four or five days. He is an intelligent lad and told the particulars of his accident in an interesting way.

The lad in the "Newsboys' Cot"—and every one knows Norman—came into the Hospital nearly two years ago, with club feet and infantile paralysis. He is six years of age. His deformity had existed from his birth. His feet are encased in plaster of Paris splints and he is able to get all round the ward by holding on to the cots and wall. The lad was sitting on one of the window sills, watching all that was going on on the street, and he said to us that he wished they would build a store near here, so that he might watch the men all day. This is a case where one can see gradual improvement, and hopes are entertained that he will soon be perfectly well and able to be discharged.

In the "Maria Louisa Robertson Cot" was a little lad of eight years, who came in with club feet in the month of June. The nurse told us that he had had three operations and that very soon he will be quite cured. He is very patient and does everything he is told to hasten his recovery.

In the "Birdie Cot," maintained by Mrs. R. H. McLelland, of Brockville, was Bertie, aged ten years, who told us that he was climbing a scaffold on a building on Simcoe street when he fell and broke his arm. The other lads in the ward who were able to be out of their cots were standing chatting to him and he seemed quite contented.

The New Year's Rally Cot, which is supported by the Toronto Methodist S. S. Union, is occupied by a lad aged eight years. Fair-haired little Peter, a most interesting child, came to the Hospital in the month of June with a deformed foot, which was quite turned towards the centre. A successful operation was performed and he has worn a plaster boot since. Peter stands up for his rights and will never allow any of the older boys to take advantage of him, but has always a little fist ready to engage in active service. Peter told us that his foot was nearly all right, and he was going home in a short time.

In the "Grand Lodge, A. F. & A. M., of Canada Cot," the cot which the Grand Lodge of Masons of Canada endowed this year is an interesting pa-

tient. He is 14 years old and lives in the county of Simcoe. He told us quite a thrilling experience he had with a cow when he was smaller, and how the cow kept him on the ground with her two horns on his head. This was the cause of the epileptic fits which the boy has had for a number of years. He seems a sensible lad, and said that he would like to be at home on the farm, but was glad to stay in the Hospital if he could be cured. An operation has been performed and he is improving every day.

The "Rolleston Cot," maintained by Mrs. Neville's school, 170 Bloor street west, Toronto, is occupied by a deformed boy, aged 7 years, who came into the Hospital at the beginning of the year with hip disease. It is a case which at once excites your pity. I was told quite a touching incident about little fellow when he was over at The Lakeside Home on the Island this summer. He was trying to go down to the lake shore, where the lads of his ward were, but the others were all getting ahead of him, when another lad, nearly as deformed as he, came back to assist him, and there the two little fellows trudged on, quite contented to be companions.

The "Royal Arch Mason Cot," one of the new cots this year, founded by the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Freemasons of Canada, is occupied by a 12-year-old lad, who was carried into the Hospital on the 4th of July with a diseased ankle, and was not able to walk at all. An operation was performed, and the diseased bone was removed, and he is going home in a few days with his foot perfectly straight. He told us that he had to use crutches over at The Lakeside Home, but that since he came back to the College street building he has not had to use them at all.

One could spend hours in the Boys' Surgical Ward visiting the different patients and hearing stories of their life in the Hospital. They have their hours of suffering and days of pain, but they are really patient fellows who bear their troubles bravely.

In one of the large beds facing College street, a lad lies with hip joint disease, having weights attached to keep his limbs straight. He gave us quite a graphic description of his life at The Lakeside Home this summer, how he could see the ships passing from his cot on the verandah, and how they watched for the Niagara boats and all the other steamers that

left the city every day. The balloons and the fireworks at the Exhibition in September were great sources of delight to the children on the Island.

Several interesting patients had just been discharged from this ward. The "Pet of the Ward" had just gone home to Brockville. He had been in the Hospital since April. He came in with club feet, both being turned in, a very bad deformity, but the day he went home it was a pleasant sight to see his limbs straight and strong like other boys. He went away with a large lunch under his arm, looking a merry chap, bidding good-bye to the nurses and his companions in the ward, and telling them that he was glad to go home, yet would like to stay with them for a while longer.

It is astonishing how fond of one another these boys become, and how some of them are missed when they return home. They told us about one of the cured boys who had just returned to his home, that he came in with his two forearms fractured, having met with an accident in falling from a beam in the barn at his home. The boys said he used to talk to them about where he lived, and how glad he would be to get back all right again.

We next visited the "Girls' Surgical Ward," the head nurse taking us around and giving us particulars of each little patient in the cots, and those who were able to play in the play room.

In the "Cooke's Church Sabbath School Cot," which is supported by Cooke's Church Sabbath School, is a girl, aged five years, who is suffering from a severe burn on the hip. She had been playing with matches when her clothes took fire and before any one came to her assistance she was badly burned. She is happy and contented, lying all day in her cot playing with her dollies, who are nearly all sick, either with burns or hip joint disease. It was quite funny to see Mabel playing nurse and treating these dollies.

In the "Ella and Lily" Cot, supported by the Misses Gooderham, daughters of Mr. George Gooderham, corner of St. George and Bloor streets, a sufferer, aged 31-2 years, lies with dislocation of both hips. Before this girl can be operated upon, it is feared she will have to lie patiently in her cot for some time and get strong. She is so tiny that every one calls her baby, but she does not like it and cries until she is called by her proper name. Mary is a general favourite with all visitors and every one has a kind word for her.

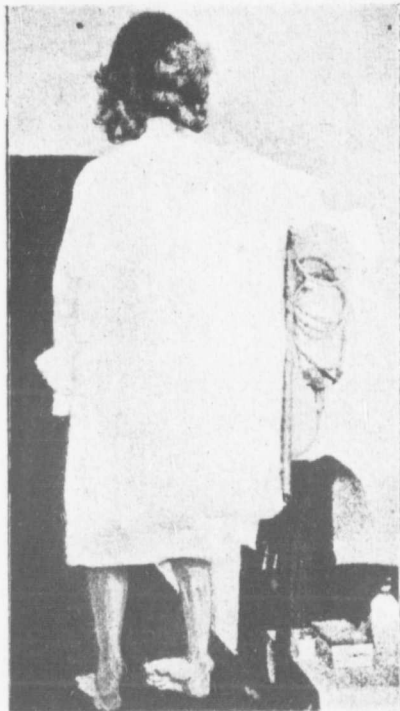

"The Lily Bacon Cot," supported by Mrs. John Bacon, of 63 Queen's Park, Toronto, is occupied by a little girl, aged 8 years, who is known as the "Chatterbox" of the ward. She was suffering from a severe burn on the face. She told us that she and her brother were watching the "cession" on Jubilee Day, when some fireworks were thrown by a boy and her clothes took fire, that a man took off his coat and tried to put it out, and that she had on her "very best Sunday dress, too."

In the "God is Love Cot," supported by Mrs. William Davies, jr., a little girl, aged 7 years, has been lying for nearly a year. Little Laura comes from Owen Sound, and is suffering from hip joint disease. She often tells the nurse to go and see her home, "a little white house just down the street," thinking she is still in her own town. So homelike has the Hospital become to this child that she lies perfectly contented with her surroundings.

The "In Memoriam" Cot, supported by Mrs. Wm. Davies, Jarvis street, is occupied by a little girl of 5 years from Muskoka, who came into the Hospital over a year ago with a crushed ankle, which has been very painful. She is a great favourite with every one, and is called "Little Kit." Little Kit can now walk with crutches, and it is hoped will soon be able to run about.

In the "Mary Helen Cot," supported by Mrs. John I. Davidson, of 53 St. George street, Toronto, is a girl aged 7 years, with hip joint disease and ear trouble. She amuses herself lying in her cot playing with her dollies, and is a gentle, loving child.

The girl 6 years old who occupies the "Mary Pollard Cot," which is endowed by a bequest of Mrs. Pollard, was able to be out of her cot. Gussie came into the Hospital in the month of August suffering from a fracture of the leg, having been knocked down by a bicycle. She said the bicyclist picked her up and they brought her to the Hospital. She was such a cute-looking girl and tried to show us how well she could walk, although she was shaky yet, but expected to be going home in a few days quite cured.

In the "Violet Cot," supported by his Honour Judge Ardagh, of Barrie, was a girl aged 7 years, suffering from an abscess on the lower lid of the eye; but the nurse told us that she would be able to go home soon, with her eye entirely cured.

In the "Richard Dunbar Cot," which has been endowed by Mrs. Richard Dunbar, is a girl of seven years old, who is suffering from blood poisoning, and who has had a number of abscesses. She is able to be out of her cot nearly all day, and is called the "Meddlesome Matty" of the ward, poking her nose into everything and getting into all kinds of mischief.

In the "Worts Cot," supported by Mrs. E. A. Smart, of 550 Jarvis street, Toronto, a girl of 10 years has been lying with hip joint disease since January. Mary has been one of the greatest sufferers in the ward, and through it all has been most patient and loving, endearing herself to all around her. The nurse told us several touching incidents about her little patient, how unselfish she was, always keeping half of anything she got to give to her nurse, and always trying to suppress her tears when she is in pain, so as not to give trouble.

In the "Cot in memory of Sarah McLelland Waddell," which is supported by Master R. M. Boswell, of Fergus, Ont., was a nice girl, aged 5 years, who met with an accident about two weeks ago. The street on which she lived was being repaired, and she fell and fractured her arm. The nurse told us that when she was having her arm set she did not seem at all afraid, but chatted to the doctor and those around her all about the accident.

In the "Margaret Cot," supported by Mrs. A. W. Baldwin, of Deer Park, is a girl of twelve years, who has been lying with hip disease for over a year and a half. Jennie is a great favourite with all the other little girls, and her word is considered quite an authority in the ward. She is a witty youngster, and it is amusing to hear her teaching the children around her to be polite and dictating to them about their plays.

The nurse in the Girls' Surgical Ward seemed like a mother to her patients, and the ward was like a home, where only love and kindness reigned.

An interesting case had just been discharged from the ward and gone home to Gananoque, a girl, aged 12 years, who came into the Hospital in June with a very deformed foot, and to-day we are in receipt of the following letter from Gananoque with regard to her:—"Winnie —, whom you so kindly offered to take into your Hospital for Sick Children, and who

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has been there for the past four months, has just returned home, cured of her deformed foot, and a proud child she is, now that she has got two straight feet. I thank you greatly for your kindness to this child."

The school room is situated in a room off the Girls' Surgical Ward, a bright, sunny department, where school is held during the week under the direction of the Public School Board, and is superintended by Miss Sams, who showed us specimens of the work done by the children, the kindergarten work being very well done. In connection with the school is a circulating library of 250 books, donated by friends of the Hospital, of all kinds of stories to interest both small and big pupils. The children are at present much interested in getting ready for a bazaar, and the dressed dolls, dollies' hats, and the numerous fancy articles made, deserve the highest praise. One lad in the Hospital trimmed a hat so cleverly that he was afterwards known as our "Worth," and visitors were much interested in this boy, who was so fond of millinery and fancy work.

Ward "J," or better known as the "Baby Ward," was next visited.

In "Little Will's Cot," supported by Mrs. Wm. Laidlaw, of the Queen's Park, is a boy who came in in the month of August with his feet all twisted and deformed. An operation had been performed and he is now getting on nicely. When he came into the ward at first he was known as the lad who never smiled, but now he can laugh, and is one of the happiest children in the ward.

In "The Toronto Police Cot," maintained by the Police Force of Toronto, we found a very sick boy, 2 years old, who has been in the Hospital since February. Eddie came in with club feet, but has been too ill to have the operation performed. He has, however, been improving every day, although at one time it was hardly expected that he could pull through. His parents are very poor, and this case strongly emphasises the fact, that since the opening of this charity, hundreds of poor children suffering from deformities and other diseases for which this Hospital exists, are able here to have the careful nursing and skilled medical supervision which it would be impossible for them to obtain in the homes from which they come.

In the "Victoria Skating Club Cot," supported by the "Victoria Skating

Club," Huron street, was a fat, little lad, aged 2 1-2 years, whom the children all like. Laughing Charlie comes from the Sunnyside Orphanage, and told us that his brother was coming to visit him to-morrow, and he looked as if it was a very happy event to look forward to. Charlie has been in the Hospital since August, with an internal disease, but is nearly better now, and will be going back to the Orphanage in a short time.

In the "Isabella Cot," supported by Mrs. W. G. P. Cassels, of 70 Grosvenor street, Toronto, was a little lad, aged 2 years, who is being treated for bow legs and who cannot walk at all. He is at present having massage treatment and it is expected that he will soon be quite better and able to go home. He is a happy, contented fellow, lying quietly in his cot all day.

In the "Orillia Cot," maintained by the "People of Orillia," Ont., is a boy 4 years old, from Orillia, who is suffering from a disease in the jaw bone and has his face all tied up in bandages. Willie was standing up playing in his cot, appearing happy and contented and seemed to appreciate and be reciprocating the attentions of the boy in the cot opposite to his.

In the "Thanksgiving Cot," supported by Mrs. Walter S. Lee, of 706 Jarvis street, is a sweet girl of 2 years, called "Violet," who told us in her baby way that she had fallen and broken her right arm. It is, however, nearly cured and she will be going home in a short time. Violet is a great little girl for climbing. This is her second fracture, for she came into the Hospital in the spring with her left arm broken, and was discharged with it cured in the month of June.

There were a number of interesting babies in this ward. There was one funny coloured boy, who makes everyone laugh with his sayings and doings. His temperature was being taken as we were in the ward, and he opened his mouth so wide that we laughingly told him he had not to swallow the thermometer. Victor came into the Hospital with crooked limbs, all twisted and deformed. He has had one operation and is now getting along nicely. The morning after the operation he found he could not rise, and told the doctor when he came to see him that they had tied his legs together so he could not get up.

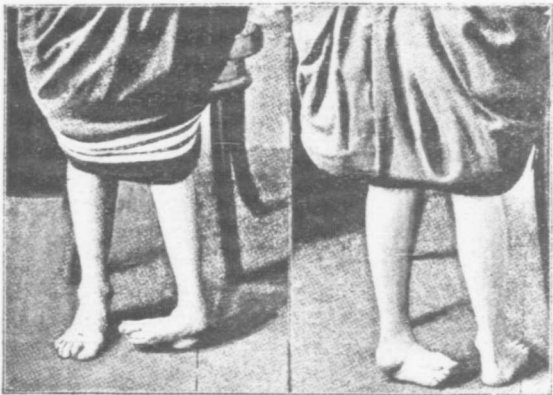

The deformity to the left foot (Figs. 1 and 2) had existed from birth and had never been operated upon before being admitted. In walking, the sole of the foot faced upward and backward, and the outer part of the foot was used as a sole. In this, as in the other cases, a large lump covered with thick skin had formed at the part of the foot used as a sole. When discharged, the foot had been placed in the correct position as shown by the cut (Fig. 3).

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One is always moved with pity towards the helpless babies, who can only lie and cry with pain, not being able to make you fully understand it all.

The last ward to visit was the Boys' Medical Ward, and in going to the lower flat we passed the bright sun bath room, which is always warm and sunny, and where the children love to sit and get a good view of the houses below.

The "Good Cheer Cot," which is supported by Hon. Chancellor Boyd, of 529 Sherbourne street, Toronto, is occupied by a child called Norman, three years old, who had just been visited by his mother. He is being treated for ear trouble, but will be going home in a short time, as he is almost cured.

In the "Boilermakers' Cot," endowed by the bequest of Mr. Neil Currie, is a boy of nine years, from the Protestant Orphans' Home, suffering from pneumonia. Jimmy was playing with some paper boats some one had made for him, and seemed quite happy and contented, fully appreciating the comforts of the ward.

In the "Tommy Cot," supported by Mrs. T. G. Blackstock, is a pleasant faced boy, six years old, who said, in answer to our enquiry, that his name was Willie, and that he was just "sick." Willie came into the Hospital this month with a severe attack of bronchitis, but is now on the road to perfect health.

A nice boy, aged four years, from the Protestant Orphans' Home, is in the "Dean Cot," which is supported by Mrs. George Gooderham, of 135 St. George street, Toronto. Arthur was chatting away quite merrily to a lad in the next cot. When he first came in, he was suffering from pneumonia, but is getting better now.

In the "St. Andrew's Church Institute Cot," and supported by that institution, is a sick boy, 4 years old, who came in two weeks ago with pneumonia, but he is improving every day. He has a brother in the ward, who is able to be out of his bed, and so comes to visit Charlie.

In the "Grummy Cot," supported by Mrs. D'Alton McCarthy, of 174 Beverley street, Toronto, is a lad, six years old, who came into the Hospital a few weeks ago. It was a case of having

tonsils removed, and he is going home in a few days quite cured.

In the "Independent Order of Odd-fellows' Cot," maintained by that Order, was a very sick boy of four years, who has had a severe attack of pneumonia. One of the house doctors was visiting the little fellow, and he told us that he had been called several times by the nurse, as the child had been so ill, but that now he was improving, and with care and attention it is hoped that he will soon get quite strong.

In the "B. Frank Bull Cot," supported by Mrs. T. H. Bull, of 86 Bloor street west, Toronto, a small lad, 10 years old, was lying, apparently quite happy and contented. This is also a case of pneumonia, and he had just been in a few days.

The "Newmarket Junior Epworth League Cot," is occupied by a boy, four years old, who has been suffering from eczema. Johnny was over at The Lakeside Home this summer, and has been very lonesome since he came back, as three of the children who were his special companions over there have gone home.

There were a number of interesting lads in the play room off the ward, and each one had something to say. A boy had just been admitted to the ward, who had been in the Hospital the early part of the year. A lively time is expected, as "Johnnie" is just full of mischief, and looking out for adventures. There were three or four big lads, who told us many incidents in their Hospital life, the smaller boys standing in a group, listening attentively. It is quite a study to spend a few minutes with those talkative lads.

We next visited the "Girls' Medical Ward," where there were twenty-five little girls.

In the "Ruth Lillian Cot," supported by Mr. Walter E. H. Massey, of 486 Jarvis street, Toronto, a sweet girl, 6 years old, was lying with rheumatism and heart disease. She came into the Hospital about three weeks ago, suffering acutely; but the pain had since much decreased, and she seemed happy and contented.

In the "St. Paul's Sabbath School Cot" was a nice child of 2 years, who came into the Hospital suffering from enlarged tonsils. She is now, however, nearly

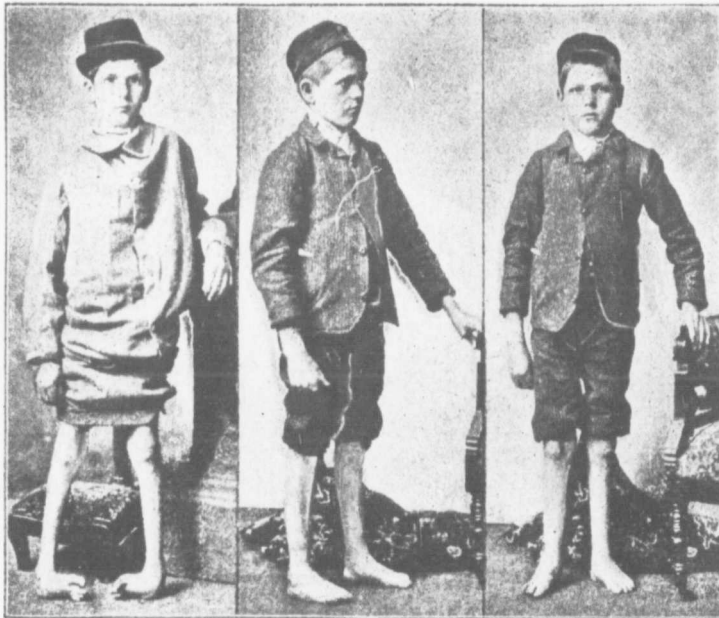

"The Ministering Children's League Cot" is occupied by the oldest patient in the ward. Bessie, who is 14 years of age, is rather delicate looking, and has been suffering from pleurisy and lung trouble; but she grows stronger every day. It was almost twelve o'clock, and dinner was being prepared. The girls who were able to get out of their cots were sitting around a small table in the play room with the cloth spread, and Bessie was serving the smaller children. It was quite a pretty picture, and one we shall not soon forget.

In the "Charlotte Lewis Cot," supported by Mr. Emilius Irving, of 554 Spadina avenue, Toronto, was a nice child, 6 years old, who looked quite contented, with a dolly on one side and a picture book on the other. Maggie has been in the Hospital nearly three weeks with a severe attack of pneumonia, and for three or four nights had quite a hard time. She

cried for the first few days she was in the ward, but now she seems quite happy, proving how kind words and loving care win over these little suffering ones.

In the "Consolidated Cot," which is supported by the Ladies' Committee of the Hospital, was a girl, aged 6 years, with very sore eyes, who has to stay in bed all day and undergo treatment to remove the inflammation, but it is expected that with good care and attention they will soon be quite better.

The "Canadian Children's Cot," supported by the children of Canada, is occupied by a patient who is 3 years old, suffering from an attack of pneumonia. One of the nurses was trying to get Irene to take some food, but she was crying and did not want to take it just then.

A short time after the children returned from "The Lakeside Home," quite a number were discharged from the Girls' Medical Ward. The lake breezes and bright sunshine at the Island had made them quite well and strong again.

The following cot has been added since the list of cots on page 16 was made up: The "Edward Mitchell Cot," founded by Mr. J. Ross Robertson.
