FIRST DAY.

WEDNESDAY MORNING, Sept. 10th, 1890.

THE THIRD GENERAL CONFERENCE of the METHODIST CHURCH met, pursuant to the resolution of the General Conference of 1886, and the call of the General Superintendent and Secretary, in St. James' Church, in the city of Montreal, on the 10th day of September, 1890, at 10 o'clock a.m.

The Rev. A. Carman, D.D., in the chair.

The President gave out the 514th Hymn, the Secretary read the 60th chapter of Isaiah, after which the Rev. Richard Whiting and Mr. E. D. O'Flynn led in prayer. The 109th Hymn was sung, a lesson from the New Testament, 2 Cor. 3 chap., was read, and prayer was offered by Revs. S. F. Huestis, J. J. Rice and T. W. Jolliffe.

The Rev. Dr. Ryckman, Sucretary of the last General Conference, laid upon the table the certified lists of the ministers and laymen elected by the Annual Conferences as members of this General Conference.

On motion of J. J. Maclaren, LL.D., seconded by Rev. Dr. Dewart, Resolved,—That the roll prepared by the Secretary from the official lists furnished to him be called, and a record of the attendance kept; that a pause be made at the end of each Annual Conference list for objections or corrections, and that the roll as thus settled be the roll of this Conference. Thereupon the roll was called, and one hundred and twenty-nine ministers and ninety-four laymen answered to their names.

In reference to a vacancy in the lay delegation of the London Conference, it was

Moved by Rev. J. R. Gundy, and seconded,—That Mr. W. B. Whitney, having signified his inability to attend the Conference, the name of Mr. R. J. C. Dawson, reserve delegate, be substituted for that of Mr. Whitney. The motion was adopted.

On motion of Rev. Dr. Stafford,

Resolved,—That the Secretary take note of changes in delegations as indicated by the Presidents of the Annual Conferences, and that the roll be corrected accordingly.

Pursuant to the above resolution, the name of J. J. Weddall, alternate, was substituted for that of H. J. Thorne, in the lay delegation of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Conference, and the name of G. H. West, alternate, was substituted for that of S. R. Parsons, lay delegate of the Manitoba and North-West Conference.

The bar of the Conference was fixed, the space within the pillars supporting the gallery.

On the ballot for Secretary, the Rev. S. F. Huestis was elected.

Resolved,—That the hours of meeting and adjournment for to-day be, adjournment at 12.15 noon, meet at 2 p.m. and adjourn at 5.30 p.m.

The Conference adjourned with the doxology, and benediction by Rev. Dr. Ryckman.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON, Sept. 10.

The Conference re-opened at 2 p.m.

After the singing of a hymn and reading of a Scripture lesson by the Secretary, prayer was offered by Revs. E. Evans and E. B. Moore.

The Minutes of the morning session were read, amended and confirmed.

The Rev. Dr. Carman, General Superintendent, then delivered the following address:

To the Ministerial and Lay Delegates of the Annual Conferences of the Methodist Church in General Conference Assembled:

REVERED AND BELOVED FATHERS AND BRETHREN,—In the good providence of God, gathered in this third General Conference of our united Canadian Methodism, this quadrennial council, court and parliament of the Zion of our love, how solid and satisfactory is the reason, how plain, positive and suggestive the occasion, of abounding thanksgiving to Him who rules on high and all the earth surveys! Surely our thought and feeling, like the welling up of living waters, like the fulness of the overflowing river, must rise to the devout Psalmist's appreciation and rapture in the expression of his joy in the Lord, and his gratitude to the God of his salvation: "The Lord is good to all, and His tender

mercies are over all His works." "The mercy of the Lord is from everlasting to everlasting upon them that fear Him, and His righteousness unto children's children, to such as keep His covenant, and to those that remember His commandments to do them." Who are we that we should be brought to this hour? Who is He that so far hath led us on and kept us by His love? What have we done to claim the divine favor or merit this divine regard? Why hath our God permitted us to meet, to serve one another in the Gospel as the Master hath taught us, and to have in solemn charge the sacred interests of His Church? How shall we best discharge the weighty responsibilities of the hour in brotherly love? What can we with divine assistance do, so that when the Conference is over and the years roll on, the greatest good shall come to our Methodism and to the Church of Jesus Christ? How shall we so direct the work, institutions, polity, discipline and ordinances of the Church as, by His Spirit, to secure peace within her walls and prosperity within her palaces; showing the Church of God to be what He lays on it to be, a source of light, a centre of saving power, a beauty and an excellency, a glory and a praise in the earth? How shall we be partakers of the labor, fellowship and joy of the blessed Trinity in the covenants of grace, in the triumphs of the Gospel, in the spreading glory and full and final establishment of the kingdom and dominion of Jesus Christ? How shall we enter into hearty sympathy with Him, the sceptre of whose kingdom is a sceptre of righteousness; who suffered for our sins, the just for the unjust, that He might bring us to God; who gave Himself for us that He might redeem us from all iniquity, and purify unto Himself a peculiar people, zealous of good works; who maketh us to be kings and priests unto God, heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ; who hath given some apostles, and some prophets, and some evangelists, and some pastors and teachers for the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ; whose is the promise of the Father, "I will pour out My Spirit upon all flesh;" and the everlasting covenant, "I shall give thee the heathen for thine inheritance, and the uttermost parts of the earth for thy possession;" "He shall see of the travail of His soul, and shall be satisfied "?

Brethren, we are the men to whom these things are the most glorious, the most tremendous realities. Not railways, not gallant ships, not banks and stocks, not rich stores and broad estates, not earthly governments and their great honor and power, not triumphs in art or arms, not even our own generation, or country, or home, or families, or personal advancement and ease, are the great verities of this assembly and this hour; but the purpose and spirit, the interests and enterprises, the forces and conquests of the spiritual, universal, and eternal kingdom of our Lord Christ, King of kings and Lord of lords, and all that this spiritual kingdom means in the physical, moral, social and political condition of mankind. We are the men to whom these things are great and enduring verities, or we have no business here. Above all earthly things they are to us the realities and the verities; or we have not conviction deep enough, or conscience well enough instructed for this important office and this holy work. What is it that we are at least twenty-five years of age, and have been members of the Methodist Church five consecutive years; or that we are duly constituted and ordained ministers of the Methodist Church?

These may be the disciplinary qualifications, and all important in their relation and place; but unless we have the best things these poor credentials attest, they are little more to us than the railway tickets that secured our honest delivery in Montreal. What we need now is the prayerful spirit, the brotherly forbearance and love, the single eye, the humble mind, the keen spiritual discernment that comes of use in divine things, the strong conviction of duty and utter self-renunciation in discharging it, the magnanimous Christly purpose, the entire consecration to God, the sauctifying grace and the baptism of power, the all-conquering faith in God and fidelity to Him, and submission one to another for Christ's sake. These capabilities are begotten of godly practice, do not mature in an instant, and unquestionably have something to do with the constitutional demand that we be each at least twenty-five years of age.

It will the more impress us with the responsibilities of the hour, if we survey the providential dealings of our God with us, and see how surely we shall render account to the Judge of quick and dead. Since our last General Conference many representative brethren, both in the ministry and laity, have been removed by death. Of those who stood in these places and held these precious trusts within their hands four years ago, from the ministerial ranks, there have passed on to their rewards in the Heavens, the venerable and sagacious Williams, the magnanimous and scholarly Nelles, the gifted and eloquent Hunter, the faithful and indefatigable Pickard, and the pious and noble Goodison. How my soul exults, as I think of their labors and their triumphs. The spirit flames within me and leaps on high to seize those things that are above, where Christ sitteth at the right hand of God, as I anticipate finding them again with the myriad host of conquerors, the saved of all the ages, in the blaze of endless day.

"Oh, may we triumph so, when all our warfare's past,
And dying, find our latest foe beneath our feet at last."

We believe in pardon through the blood, the washing of the regeneration, the godly life, the resurrection of the dead, and the reunion in Heaven. Of our beloved lay brethren that were with us sharing our conflicts, our sorrows, and our joys, there have gone on before the Hon. Senators Ferrier and Macdonald, Hon. C. R. Ayre, and brethren Dr. Gould, Webb and Schlenker; all in their places, loyal sons of our Methodism, pillars and living stones in the temple of our God. We sorrow with abounding hope; and in the glare and heat of the vineyard, wait the summons that called them to the restful shade, and to the land of life and beauty beyond the shadow. God help us to be faithful unto death, and give us also the crown of life!

Of my colleague, Rev. John A. Williams, D.D., I may speak a further word, that we linger a moment upon his memory, his work, and his inspiring example to the Church and to Christendom, before we are swept away from the devotional quiet of our opening session by the strong and diverse currents of Conference business. From the robustness of his constitution, and his natural vigor, he might well have been expected here to-day, though many others of us had fallen; but fierce disease in painful struggle smote that manly form, and it lay withered as a leaf stricken of devouring flame. the sorrowing ones, to the chamber of suffering, and to the grave; but in the Church of God we lift up our heads with thankfulness and joy. "He being dead, yet speaketh." How he loved our Canadian Methodism! How he loved our Canadian Methodism! What faith he had in it! and how faithful he was to it in all its interests! A typical Methodist preacher, fully persuaded in his own mind, rooted, settled, so as to say, like Saul of Tarsus, after he had heard and seen that Just One, "Paul an apostle by the will of God;" holding with an intense devotion the peculiar and spiritual doctrines of the Wesleyan evangelism; a profound and comprehensive theologian, well discerning what to include as the doctrines of covenanted mercy and saving grace, and what to exclude from this sovereign domain. A man thoroughly practised and deeply experienced in the polity of our Methodism, and especially in the relations and requirements of our itinerant system. His record is with us, and his reward is sure. Dignified and energetic as a presiding officer, we all shall miss his guidance in this Conference; and none will feel the lack of his assistance more than I. With the great issues that are upon us, and in the deprivation of so much of the fellowship that many of us have hitherto enjoyed, may we, in God's good providence, find compensation in the new associations of this Conference; and may there come upon us in power the Spirit of wisdom, of love and a sound mind.

On the death of Dr. Williams, under authority of Discipline, paragraph 126, there were duly called together the Special Committee of the General Conference, and the six other persons appointed by the General Conference, to consider the question whether a successor to him in the General Superintendency be at once appointed. It was decided by this joint body that owing to the nearness of the General Conference, and for other reasons, no appointment be made. The death of Dr. Williams took place on the 16th of December, 1889, and the joint committee met February 27th, 1890.

The vast amount of important business devolving upon this Conference will be in the main brought forward to our view in the reports of Boards and Committees, and probably in a state of completeness that will greatly facilitate the work of the Conference. The last General Conference, surveying the field with keener than episcopal eye, appointed committees on all conceivable subjects, from the punctuation and grammatical inaccuracies of the book of Discipline, to the Ecumenical Council of Methodism, and the unification and consolidation of all the Protestant There is such a profusion of committees, that upon some of the ground they lap and lie with the softness and richness and uselessness of waste velvet. Like the strata of autumn leaves, they may enrich the ground double or triple-fold. Something of an enumeration of the Boards and Committees - first of the regular and general, then of the special and exceptional-may afford to some extent, a field plan of our work, and possibly suggest a thought as to the most expeditious and effective way of accomplishing it. Reports must come in from :-

- 1. The General Conference Special Committee.
- 2. The Court of Appeal, both the Preliminary Court and Full Court.
- 3. The Committee on Transfers, both the Interim and Annual.
- 4. The General Board of Missions and the General Secretary.
- 5. The Book and Printing Establishments, East and West.

The Educational Institutions: (a) Those that are immediately the property of the Church and fully under its control; (b) those that are proprietary in character and partially under the direction of the General Conference; (c) those that are more immediately under the management of the Missionary Board, all of which should report fully to this body.

In addition to these purely Connexional Boards and interests, there are certain other matters that were left for the time being to the Annual Conferences and to local control—such as the Children's Fund, Sustentation Fund, and Local Church and Parsonage Aid Funds—which should be reported on here, that the General Conference may know how other funds are affected thereby, how they are respectively accomplishing their purpose, and whether the ends contemplated have been fully served, or may be better served by other plans and agencies. It is the business and duty of this body to look over the entire ground, harmonize its schemes, economize its resources, and adopt the surest methods to the best ends.

Furthermore, there are many matters of special concern devolved by the last General Conference upon special committees, which must claim

our attention during this Conference. Reports should come :-

Add to this enumeration such matters as the number and boundaries of the Annual Conferences, the length of the term of the pastorate, the appointment of the General Officiary of the Church, the composition of the Stationing Committee, the constitution of the Transfer Committee, the regulations of the Superannuation Fund and Supernumerary Ministers' Fund (East), the condition of the General Conference Fund, and the general revision and adaptations of Discipline, and others of a similar character, and any one will see that we have business enough in hand, that there is no place for trifling in either spirit or work, that great questions are pending, that the decisions of this Conference are to be mighty for weal or woe; and that, therefore, we have constant need of the guidance of the Holy Spirit, of honesty and simplicity of purpose, of fidelity to our Church and to the truth as it is in Christ Jesus. We must make up our minds to be diligent in business, fervent in spirit, serving the Lord, and in the fear of God to abide as best we may till business is done. I am ashamed to say it; but from the last General Conference, men went home early in the session, simply because they were homesick, like boys caught the first time at college.

Let us keep before our minds the following aims; every member of the Conference can further them, and they may help us to better and speedier results: (1) Appoint committees with a view to fitness, experience and efficiency, and not with a view to personal aims and sectional policy. (2) As soon as possible get our committees into working order, and bring forward as rapidly as we may into their hands all reports, memorials, and other matters to be allotted to their consideration. (3) To lay out Conference sessions and committee work, and have the committees of such numbers, and such distribution of the membership of the Conferences, as to give every man work on committee, and afford the committees proper time well economized—say Conference sessions two periods of the day, mornings and evenings, placing the public meetings in the evening, or some similar arrangement, leaving a compact morning or a compact afternoon for committee work. (4) Let the committees do their work thoroughly in committee, bringing in well considered and carefully prepared reports, avoiding thereby lengthy and perplexing discussions, and obtaining maturer and wiser measures. As in parliament, our work may be done mainly in committee, and bring to the Church valuable experience that never will be gathered in debate on the floor of the Conference. (5) Make legislation distinct—first reading, second reading, third reading, or their equivalent—so that no responsibility as to the sense of the law and no discretion as to its meaning be left with the Editors of Discipline after Conference. Note what is repealed as repealed, as plainly as what is enacted as enacted. (6) Adapt legislation, provision to provision and measure to measure, so that court fit on court and committee on Conference. Here may be a good wheel, there a fine shaft, but the question is, how will they work together? How are the Transfer Committee and the Stationing Committee related? Do they ever hitch and jolt? How the District Meeting and Annual Conference in judicial procedure? Is there a trial and an appeal? Is the District Meeting in this regard like the spleen in the human body—use not known? (7) Occupy the early days of session with most important matters, that we be not driven into a corner of confusion at the close. Out of such a press there

These observations may be wretchedly commonplace and plain to every one, and certainly would not have been made if in the past they had not, with much damage and loss, been disregarded. Complications have arisen out of difficulty in reconciling General Conference action, and the best intentioned editing possible, where legislation is ill-jointed and discretion is allowed, may not leave the law what the legislative body designed. When the present law on the Transfer Committee came out of the last General Conference, and was gathered into the Discipline, it quite astonished its framers; for the simple reason that they had not looked after repeals as well as after enactments and interpreting clauses. And this is not the only instance in the history of the world where neglect or refusal to repeal discolors a whole law and beclouds its administration. Clear, decisive, well arranged, well adjusted legislation is our duty, and it greatly contributes to the peace and prosperity of the Church. Measures, rude, crude, ill digested and ill adapted, will breed, multiply and aggravate troubles. The very object of the meeting of our quadrennial parliament is to improve our law, and work into the book of Discipline and our executive economy the benefits of administrative experience.

Having said so much upon procedure in a general way, I may, perhaps, be allowed to advert to a few topics of interest to us, and lay my views on them before the Conference. And first, a word as to fidelity to the Constitution, the primordial nature and law of the General Conference itself. The General Conference in the basis of union is clearly and purely a delegated and representative body. Every man that stands upon this floor is a representative; and the body, as a whole, has no powers but those delegated or given to it by the Church at large in the contract of union. The General Superintendent, the constitutional chairman of the body, is not a member of the body, and has no vote in it; and justly so, for he is not a representative. We have a strange arrangement by which the General Superintendent, whose term of office is expiring, not by election, but by legislation, becomes a member of the General Conference, representing no one and having no co-ordinate layman; in both respects disregarding the character, destroying the balance, and violating the very constitution of the General Conference; as though a legislature, with usurpation surpassing that of the Long Parliament, should appoint members to itself; while on the other side of this strange arrangement, unique in the history of the world, when the incoming Superintendent is elected from outside the General Conference, while he himself does not thereby become a member of the General Conference, he carries in with him a layman who does become a member of the General Conference; so if perchance restoring the balance of ministers and laymen in the General Conference, yet wholly destroying the constitution of the Annual Conference delegations, which are to have one in ten as the basis of representation. I confess I am jealous of these principles of representation and delegation and rights of Annual Conferences, the electorate, and the constituent assemblies in the Church's behalf, and would not in these fundamental and all-important matters see them disturbed. The General Conference, like our House of Commons, is strictly and wholly representative, and

should, whether in regular or special session, be so preserved as the surest bulwark against all mere officialism, all dangerous centralization, all hierarchy. Anything like an ex-officio membership in this body, and everything counterworking fair election and representation, and responsible and renewable delegation, is repugnant to my ideas of a General Conference. Indeed, as in civil and parliamentary affairs, I regard this the very palladium of our rights, and the most effective check of anything and everything like hierarchical assumption; the purity, equality, and entirety of representation of the proper constituent bodies in the General Conference, and as provided for in the basis of union. There is much said of the danger of centralization of power in the official positions of the Church, while there seems an unaccountable disregard of the very foundations on which these official positions rest, and from which they receive their authority, law and direction. If the crane give way at the wall, the crash is more terrible than if merely the chain break that carries the stone. Firm base and strong fastenings have as much to do with the efficient use of mechanical power as the tackle at the point of application. It might be poor policy to watch and hold and pound the ropes and swivel at the end with the load, when the trouble is in loose stones and shaking timbers at the start. So it might be poor policy to restrict or curtail the vigor of a doctrine or the usefulness of a position, when the true and sure safeguards and correctors are the integrity and stability of the fundamental law. Equal, pure representation is, in these matters, our safety and our strength.

What was that great apostasy, which, early uniting the temporal and spiritual power in the usurpations of the gigantic antichrist, the abominable man of sin, made even Paul in vision tremble, grew in stature century by century, ultimately overshadowed Europe and all the earth, lifted itself on high to dethrone the Christ of God, and is yet lifting up itself in all lands, and mightily in our beloved Canada, so far as it may, stiffening in cold paralysis and burying in deadly shade the brightness and warmth of divine doctrine, the pulsations of freedom and the joyous youthful national lifewhat was it but growing disregard of the command of the Holy Ghost affecting the election of stewards and deacons as ordained in the Primitive Church, and the preservation of elective, free, equal and fraternal assemblies, with all their disadvantages and ills, for ecclesiastical government throughout the generations of men? What was it but the abandonment of the divine, scriptural and apostolic plan of the essential equality in the ministry, presbytery and episcopacy in spiritual matters, and the full employment of the laity in the temporalities and polities of the household of faith? What was it but the erection instead of this scriptural and apostolic ministry and episcopacy, a post apostolic, post-scriptural, historic, diocesan episcopacy, after the manner of a secular ruler, and with the beginnings of usurpation of temporal power? What was this great apostasy but the withdrawal of the temporalities from the elect laity, the disownment of the divine equality and perpetuity of the episcopacy in the presbytery, the perversion into historic diocesan episcopacy; then the ex-officio councils from provinces and empires; then the mighty struggle for the mastery of prelates, nuncios and cardinals, and then the full and final triumph of the Papacy, the pontificate and primacy of Rome? Brethren, we better hold on to our constitutional elections, authorized in

the Word of God and vindicated in the history of the Church; our safeguard, under God, against priestly ambition, against prelacy, primacy and

Let us search the Scriptures, for in this matter also they testify of God. "Look ye out among you seven men of honest report." Elect seven men full of the Holy Ghost and wisdom whom we may appoint over this business, the business of the temporalities. To the whole pastorate and through the whole pastorate at Antioch was the commission given. "Separate me Barnabas and Saul for the work whereunto I have called them." In the constitution of the first council at Jerusalem they determined, "elected," that Paul and Barnabas, and certain others of them should go up to Jerusalem unto the apostles and elders about this question; and again in that council, it pleased the apostles and elders with the whole Church to send chosen, "elected," men of their own company to Antioch with Paul and Barnabas, namely, Judas surnamed Barsabas, and Silas. chief among the brethren. The Church is a brotherhood, the family of God; and the better even men calling themselves Christians learn this lesson, the more scriptural and effective will

ecclesiastical government become.

Under these views I direct attention to the special session of the General Conference, provided for in Discipline, par. 125: "The General Conference Special Committee shall have power to call a special session of the General Conference at any time, which shall be composed of the members of the last regular General Conference, all vacancies having been filled according to the usual modes of election." The question is, What constitutes a vacancy? How is a Conference essentially legal unless the Annual Conference balance be preserved? And if the occasion of call were serious contentions betwixt Annual Conferences, or great questions upon which Annual Conferences had taken sides, how could difficulties legally be adjusted with that balance disturbed? Does the transfer of a General Conference representative from one Annual Conference to another constitute a vacancy in the delegation of the former Conference! If transfer does not make a vacancy, what becomes of the balance of Conferences, the constitutional basis of one in ten, and the rights of Annual Conferences, of which we hear so much? If transfer make a vacancy, then many of the most valuable members of the last General Conference lose their membership, and in the temper of our Church are debarred very likely the possibility of re-election. Transfer eight or ten General Conference delegates from the other Conferences to the Toronto Conference, have you a well and constitutionally arranged General Conference, though special legislation favor it? The same principles operate in the removal of the membership of laymen from one Annual Conference jurisdiction to that of another. These questions have arisen during the Quadrennium, and I am thankful under all the circumstances we were saved the practical test of the administration, which has been to regard the election as made for the four years, and therefore as the easiest way out of the difficulty and the best way to close the door against other difficulties, to declare in case of transfer there is no vacancy.

In my humble opinion, the special session, or what I would regard as better, the special General Conference, whenever a necessity, should not depart from the representative and proportionate lines of the regular

Conference, and should wait until after new elections in the first ensuing Annual Conferences. This enables the Church to deal with a question as it stands in the crisis of the call. I am not sure, but this very fidelity to the Constitution would have saved us much money, delivered us from strife, and greatly advanced the common interests in the stirring times through which, as a Church, we have recently passed.

The principle I am now unfolding has also its application to our representative Committees and Boards; such as the Book Committee and the Sabbath-school Board. The Book Committee is of a most strictly representative character, and the proportion of the Annual Conferences therein most definitely marked. However, in these cases also we have been accustomed to regard the appointments as made for the Quadrennium, and not affected by transfer, though the representation of one Annual Conference on the Committee might thereby be doubled, and of another, obliterated.

In the constitution of the General Board of Missions, provision is made for the annual revision of the representative section of the Board as well as for the preservation of its connexional character, so that on the one hand, the interests of the Annual Conferences are guarded, and on the other hand, the connexional bond, administration and vigor are maintained. It might not be amiss, and would possibly be more in harmony with our spirit and work, if our Connexional Committees and Boards were fully, as practicable, conformed to this model.

Following the General Conference itself, it is the natural order to con sider those General Conference or Connexional Committees that lie in between the General Conference and the Executive, Annual or Pastoral Conferences, and various Executive Boards. I refer to such intermediate and connexional bodies as the Court of Appeal, the Transfer Committee and the Stationing Committee. And first as to the Court of Appeal. My recommendations here may be rather Hibernian. The first is to abolish, the second to reform. Personally, I do not see that this Court serves any good purpose. Whoever knew any one in church trials, where the strife costs little or nothing, cease his strife as long as there was a door of appeal open ? and for that matter in spirit and life far beyond? But say you: Superintendents, Presidents, Boards and Conferences must be kept to law; and how is that to be done without the Court of Appeal? Is it done with the Court of Appeal? The experience of the past Quadrennium is not a very decided affirmative. Appeals to this Court are allowed only on questions of jurisdiction and law, and those mainly affecting Annual Conferences. The questions that have arisen are largely questions of ministerial character, questions in which sympathies and partialities are often mightily aroused, so that the poor barriers of the Court of Appeal have not withstood their overflowing force, since there are neither civil nor ecclesiastical pains and penalties, but only moral bonds and fasten-My preference is to throw the whole responsibility of examination of ministerial character upon the proper court in the Annual Conference, give it full powers both over fact and interpretation of law, and require that every case be fully and finally disposed of every year, as is plainly implied in the Annual Conference. On the other hand, administration would likely be as safe this way as any other, even if in our circumstances not so uniform; for an Annual Conference would feel in honor bound to

protect its own honor if not the vital interests of the work of God; and on the other hand, every case would be closed up in some way at the Annual Conference, and not kept hanging and dragging throughout a Quadrennium. On the matter of interpretation of law, or even of verdict upon facts, the General Conference might constitute a Court of Appeal within the Annual Conference itself, and have all the courts complete their work with the session. To secure so far as possible uniformity of administration even with our numerous and rapidly exchanging Chairmen of the Annual Conferences, which feature of our economy aggravates the difficulty under review, it would greatly contribute to have each General Conference review the administration of the Quadrennium as recorded in the Journals of the Annual Conferences; so that, while revising no case, and modifying no case, even where law has been disregarded or jurisdiction exceeded, the declaration of the General Conference thereupon would determine the law for the future, while not disturbing the decisions of the past. Appeals upon questions of law and jurisdiction without retrospective power could be allowed to the General Conference itself.

As to the other side of my Hibernicism, should the Court of Appeal be continued with something like its present functions, I would think it an improvement to make it larger, divide it into two sections-East and West-something in the order of the Book Committee, each capable of determining cases within its own range of Conferences, say upon the visit of the General Superintendent thereto; with a fair representation of the Annual Conferences in the original appointment, and with a power to fill vacancies, properly placed; the two courts to be combined into one, say at the General Conference, or whenever either court may require it, for the adjudication of cases that the sections themselves, or either of them, may for connexional reasons not think it prudent to settle alone. On the whole, I would arrange fully to trust the Annual Conferences, and hold them responsible to the General Conference alone. They should have my fullest confidence and I would preserve their rights intact. This General Conference is the great parliament and court that must preserve at least our external unity and administrative consistency and uniformity; and if its representative character, as before urged, be faithfully preserved, and it keep itself true to compacts, leagues and covenants, there will likely be as little trouble as may reasonably be expected in human affairs.

The arrangement of a preliminary Court of Appeal as it has been in the past, 13, I think, wholly unsatisfactory; for contestants, as a rule, will not stop at the door. They are bound to see all that is for them in the arena of strife, if not in the temple of justice. The action of each section should be final for that section; unless at the discretion of the court itself it is for connexional reasons handed on to the full court, or to the General Conference.

Further, the court being continued, its jurisdiction should be extended to cover not only cases of jurisdiction and law, but motions of order and other acts that divert or defeat law, or have that design and tendency. As it is purely a court in the interests of connexionalism and uniform administration, its province should be commensurate with its requirements and limited thereto.

THE TRANSFER COMMITTEE.

Whatever expedients may be adopted for interim and emergency exchanges of ministers or probationers betwixt Conferences, they should be, as at present, prompt and inexpensive. But while we are a connexion, and while it is claimed and admitted that facility of transfer is in the interests of the connexion, cultivating the connexional spirit, strengthening the bond and increasing the aggressive power of this unity, it seems under our present constitution impracticable, as some would suggest for economy's sake, to avoid the annual meeting of the Presidents in Transfer Committee, or at least so many of them as are immediately concerned in the exchanges of the year. For in cases in which a direct exchange betwixt two of the Conferences may not be advisable or practicable, a circuitous route of exchange betwixt three, four or even five Conferences may restore the balance and be on the who'e highly beneficial. Again, the annual review of the field as to the requirements of Conferences, especially the remote and weaker ones, in men adapted to their work, by the Presidents interested not only in their own Conferences, but as loyal and intelligent connexional men in the welfare of Methodism at large; and thus providing for all the Conferences, lightening the overburdened, supplying deficiencies, and guarding as well as may be both connexional and personal considerations, must be productive of great good; and when faithfully and unselfishly done by all concerned, must send the thrill and joy of a glorious brotherhood throughout our entire communion. If not so done, we need not wonder if circuits would be set looking out for themselves, and men for themselves; and the Transfer Committee, instead of proving a great power in our aggressive evangelism, and a noble promoter of our connexional unity, should be degraded to a disturber of the peace of the Church, a recorder of ambitions, or at the best, a moderator of discontents. The great safety in both the Transfer Committee and the Stationing Committee is that the people on the one hand, and the ministers on the other, be both fully persuaded that these committees are acting unselfishly and faithfully in the interest of the cause of God. Our disciplinary provisions and regulations should keep that end steadily in view. And, certainly, we should have no so ill-adapted legislation as to make very easy, indeed quite probable, repeated conflicts betwixt transfer and stationing power. myself, I am confident we shall hear very little of lay representation in the Stationing Committee - a measure I may honestly say I could by no means favor, except it had become a manifest necessity to correct greater evils or to maintain invaded rights-if we secure both in constitution and spirit the greatest disinterestedness and impartiality possible to Christ-like men in ecclesiastical administration. Genuine personal consecration to God and His work, both in ministry and laity, will help mightily in these matters; impartial arrangements and common sense will do the rest.

THE GENERAL SUPERINTENDENCY.

I now turn my thoughts and ask your attention to the subject of the General Superintendency in its present condition, its relation to the Church, and to the General Conference Fund. There may be almost indelicacy in my touching it at all; but here as elsewere, by divine grace, I hope to do my duty faithfully before God and the brethren. I ought

to be as anxious to get at the true interest of the Methodist Church in this as in anything else, as earnest as any to ascertain what is best in this

regard, and as much concerned as any in what is done.

It will be borne in mind that in the formation of the Basis of Union, the great principles involved, and the questions on which the concessions of that solemn compact were made, were: (1) The freedom of the pastorate and the independency of the ministry in purely ministerial affairs; (2) equal lay representation and joint lay and ministerial action in various Conferences and Courts; (3) a vigorous connexionalism, unitedly directed energy and uniform administration of discipline, and the agency for their better accomplishment, the itinerant General Superintendency. can be no doubt that the most effective operation of these principles, all found in the Christian Church of the first centuries, is secured by their proper adjustment, that is, by their mutual restraint, impulse and direction. All in each of the uniting bodies in some degree, and each in all, though given various emphasis and prominence, unity of polity and spirit was obtained by fraternal concessions; and possibly can only so be maintained till our Church government, which is by no means the most important element in church life, like a mighty engine with well-balanced parts, shall to the greatest advantage economize and expend its force, and afford us a product the highest and the best. No one would now think of violating the compact in the essentials of lay representation or in the proper relations of the pastorate; so I presume there is but one mind regarding the covenant as affecting a positive connexionalism and its appointed agency. Among true men, acting in good faith, I am justified in this presumption. We would do ourselves no honor playing like boys at game of "dodge," or like dubious financiers at "kite flying," when it is simply "rub and go." As men of God, and leaders and legislators in the Church of Christ, surely as much may be demanded of us as of statesmen and patriots in civil affairs, that we look the facts and conditions of things in the face, and frame our measures on the solidest and broadest grounds of intelligence, honesty and the general weal. If we are to have a pastorate, a succession of ministers, we want it independent within its spiritual sphere; manly, consecrated and free. If we are to have lay representation, it must be accorded respect, confidence, responsibility, dignity and effect. If we are to have a General Superintendency, it should be made veritable and vigorous. We can waste neither time nor money on parade, superfluous machinery, friction or farce.

Happily here, as in civil governments, the providence of God has so arranged matters, that often financial considerations, when others fail, bring men to their senses. The General Conference Fund, two-thirds of which goes to support the General Superintendency, is heavily in debt. On this fact permit me to make two or three observations: (1) It is a marvel to me that this fund has done even so well as it has, when I consider, on the one hand, the quite pardonable lack of interest in it because of its distance from the personal sympathies of pastor and people, and on the other, the time of year generally set apart for the appeal in its behalf; a season when half the giving power of leading churches is not within arm's length of the collection plate. How would the Pastorate Fund, the Superannuation Fund, or the Mission Fund fare under such treatment? (2) When the last General Conference found itself in comparatively easy

(3) The same Conference, with best intent, and for what no doubt appeared sufficient reason, withdrew from the fund considerable support which it had previously enjoyed, and to which without tortuous or indirect reasoning it would appear to be entitled. The labors of the General Superintendency have gone largely for the benefit of the Mission and Education Funds, and, therefore, might not be a wrongful participant in the proceeds. (4) The last General Conference, with a profusion that would have been extreme folly, had not the circumstances of the time in its judgment rendered it supreme policy and wisdom, commissioned a disproportionately large supervisional and departmental staff, which was by no means illiberally provided for; so that by as much as there was heavy expenditure and unusual pressure in other directions, by so much the General Conference Fund could more easily than others be left to suffer. That the fund is not in a more deplorable condition than we find it to-day must be largely due to the diligence of the Treasurer, and a considerable spontaneousness in the liberality of our people.

This condition of affairs has, of course, intimately to do with the question of the appointment of a successor to the late lamented Dr. Williams, as well as with other regulations concerning the office. Were my preference in the matter asked, I should promptly and decidedly say, I prefer an associate or associates in the office. I recognize the unspeakable value of counsel in the affairs of the Church; and I think also this mutual support of godly judgment is in the order of things, and better for the Church, the House of God. Various propositions, likely only tentatively, have been in the air; such as, (1) "Make the Departmental officers General Superintendents within restrictions and have one General Superintendent at large." My soul recoils at even the suggestion; it smacks too much of the archbishopric. I avow myself so thoroughly Wesleyan, after Mr. Wesley himself, and I believe so thoroughly scriptural on the equality of order of ministers or presbyters, that Presbyterianism is vastly more acceptable to me than prelacy or anything like it. Again it is queried, Why not make the Departmental officers General Superintendents within territorial limits? This again, though perhaps more saving, would be diocesan, and a violation of the compact of the Basis of Union, which calls for an itinerant General Superintendency.

The danger is now we shall swing from one extreme to the other. The departmental and supervisional staff has been large; there is a possibility of undue contraction. We have had two General Superintendents, a General Secretary of Missions, a General Secretary of Education, and a Superintendent of Missions in the North-West; five men engaged in the affairs of the entire field, besides the Superannuation Fund Treasurer, and other treasurers who also must have an eye throughout the Possibly in a Church of our dimensions there might have been such a union of the general supervision with the connexional departmental requirements, as would have saved both men and means. The departmental work must be done; and in my view, the opening empire of the great North-West requires special and personal attention. Could there have been three General Superintendents with those departments attached that are consistent with the office; perfect peers with all ministerial brethren in orders, and with one another in office; jointly a board

of consultation and action, as might be thought expedient in the interests of the Church; and separately each, while in charge of a department, in full authority in any part of the field; placed under law by the General Conference, and while administering law, held amenable to law; mutually helpful as such men would naturally be, itinerating like their brethren, and yet with residences arranged, say for a quadrennium, at such points as Toronto, Montreal and Winnipeg, from my point of view I think I can see how there would have been both great economy and efficiency. There would have been two men less than in the past, and a well-nigh corresponding saving of money; there being thereby actually no need of a call upon the Church for a General Conference Fund, except for absolutely General Conference purposes. The time for all this may have gone by, or perhaps, in the judgment of wiser men than I, never came. But personally, I am of the view that, with much prayer and thought, this whole business should be put upon some more satisfactory basis. The dignity of the Conference and the welfare of the Church demand it. For me, I am eager to know the mind of Christ, and in all things to serve the brethren and gladly do their bidding to the glory of God. And the mind of my brethren has a great deal to do with me in determining the mind of Christ. In spiritual and ecclesiastical concerns I can go a long way toward saying, "Vox Ecclesiae, vox Dei." But it is scarcely creditable to any of us that a sacred office should be in any degree regarded in the light of a suspected or enforced sinecure, and occupied for merely personal reasons with a design it shall lapse with a certain term of personal tenure. Unlike the man in the Scriptures, "I can dig, to beg I'm not ashamed," when God lays it upon me; but with you I prefer to be a party to a more honorable modus vivendi than is implied in any such apparently strained relations. If any wait for my death, I died in this regard before the union. My one anxiety is that we know the will of God, and do it. In the midst of solemn compacts and tremendous issues, with the common desire for steadiness of polity and excellency of government, we join in the prayer that God, even our own God, may bless us, may lead us to the best conclusions for His own glory, and the welfare of His people, in this and in all matters; that the spirit of strife and distrust be removed; and that the spirit of mutual confidence, of brotherly affection and co-operation, of ready personal sacrifice and full devotion to the Church and her precious and indispensable interests, possess and actuate us in every deliberation and every decision.

OUR EDUCATIONAL WORK.

In the present critical state and relations of our Church University in these Central Conferences, all feel the supreme importance of calm deliberation and godly decision in so momentous and far-reaching interests. So vast, so weighty, and now so well understood and so clear a responsibility of this Conference is this matter, that I may not venture to deliver any opinion upon it, or utter any words other than to pray that abiding in the meekness of wisdom and in brotherly love, we may be led by the spirit of power and of love and of a sound mind. The welfare of the country in some regards is involved in our action, as well as most intimately and in many respects the safety and prosperity of the Church; whereupon we may not draw up to it otherwise than with the most

serious concern and the most earnest prayer. God save us in such an hour as this from the pride of opinion, the zest of centention, and from the struggle for personal and sectional triumph. We all desire the present and perpetual prosperity of our beloved Methodism; the Lord take away confusion from our counsels and give us the single eye; the Lord command His blessing upon us which is life forevermore, and

grant us peace.

While not feeling it incumbent on me, however, to say from the peculiarity of the case, more of this our most urgent educational interest, I may without prejudice direct your attention to other parts and other aspects of this work. Whatever may be best for Victoria University and for the Church in regard to them at this juncture, we all agree it would not be wise to pervert the policy, withhold or lessen the resources, or mar the efficiency of our other colleges and schools that may, with God's blessing, be doing well under the soundest policy and most healthful relations for them, and accomplishing for the Church in their measure and way as good a work, it may be, as Victoria herself. Even in the tidal sweep of a Federation movement here in the West, nothing must be done to unsettle the firm foundations of the noble educational fabric of the brethren in the Maritime Provinces. On the other hand, something must be done to strengthen the hands of the brethren bearing the burdens of this department of toil in Manitoba and the North-West. In our legislation they will unquestionably be accorded their proper share of the Educational Fund, as it is desirable also that this fund should be increased for all recipients.

In this relation the General Conference will likely be memorialized regarding the claim of Albert College, Belleville-called by Chancellor Burwash the right arm of Victoria University—furnishing well-nigh one half of the successful matriculating classes of that University, engaged largely in the preparation of candidates for the ministry, and affording home life with efficient culture to multitudes of our youth. This institution, Albert University, at the time of the union, was receiving an annual contribution, of say \$2,000, from the Circuits of the Methodist Episcopal Church, which support was, of course, wholly cut off by the union. Hence, though the College has proved self-supporting, the debt through interest has so increased as to become not only an embarrassment but positive ruin, if not speedily lightened or removed. This institution, doing such a work, and having surrendered such an annual income in 1884 in the interest of the common Educational Fund, will, I am sure, be regarded an honest applicant to be ranked with fellow-laborers and a rightful claimant upon the Educational Fund. Further, it should be considered that the occupation of the field by the Federation canvass has largely precluded the possibility of canvass for the other institutions that, like Victoria University, are owned by the Church, and must look to it The General Conference should look carefully into the whole matter and over the entire field, and make such arrangements as shall prevent unnecessary hurt or loss coming to any of our schools. The reports will show that they all are doing good work; and their way should be opened to enlarged influence. We, all of us, have only one thought in this regard, to make all our schools and colleges of all kinds and grades efficient in their work and true to patriotism and Christianity. In the

East and in the West, from Newfoundland to far-off Japan, we would have them shining with a steady lustre, faithful witnesses to truth and liberty, to Methodism and Protestantism, to humanity and to God.

PROHIBITION.

The last General Conference appointed a Standing Committee of twenty-two members from Ontario, Quebec and the Maritime Provinces, "to employ every available and legitimate means, both civil and religious, to secure from our legislators a general prohibitory law." The report of this Committee will be of interest to the Conference, and likely form the basis of future action of a very decided character. The glorious Gospel energy, like the power of trade, in pushing the iron track across the continent, must cast up the highway and gather out the stones. "The valley must be exalted and the mountain and hill made low; the crooked paths must be made straight and the rough places plain." That is, the Church of God must remove obstruction after obstruction in preparing the way of the Lord, and making straight in the desert a highway for our God. As the farmer must fight and destroy the enemy of his crop, as well as prepare the soil and nurture his plant; so must the Gospel messenger and the Gospel ministry uproot and overthrow all obstacles and break down all opposition as well as sow the pure seed of the Word, train the tender shoot, administer the revivings of grace and love, and strengthen the things that remain that are ready to die. In this aspect of His work Christ came not to send peace on earth, but a sword. The great moral, social, public and political obstructions to the spread of the Gospel kingdom must be removed. And since they are moral, developing the manners and customs of men, regulating the fashions and habits of the masses, the most potent helps or hindrances of true religion; social, inwrought into the very texture and framework of society; public, recognized openly as the necessary condition and common heritage of all; and political, embodied in public sentiment, institutions and law; they must be removed, in the government of God, by the moral, social, public and political forces under the impulse and direction of divine power, wisdom and grace. If Christianity cannot meet this case, it is not fit for this fight, and we need another religion. But Christianity, the system of the lowly Nazarene, does meet the case, and has set out to conquer the world. Christianity is moulding and must mould public sentiment, till it finds its embodiment in political institutions and civil law, till the kingdoms of this world become the kingdom of our Lord and His Christ. Human slavery has gone down in Christian lands before the law, sometimes in blood; polygamy in like manner has been cast out; ancient monsters, like sutteeism and child-widowhood in India, flee in terror to their hiding places before that avenger of wrong, an advancing public opinion and an improving administration and law. And now in this and other lands seizure is made upon the traffic in alcoholic drinks to-day, perhaps as dire a foe as Christianity has over all the earth. The thousand years are in progress; the angel of the covenant is binding that old serpent, the devil; the Church militant is in the field and must, if she prove true, accept the dangers and issues of the conflict. A score of times has she turned to flight before her enemies; a score of times has wild ruin and

defeat broken her squares and swept down her ranks. God grant our Zion valor and wisdom in a day like this, adding courage to our faith.

What hindereth that we have not in this onset put to flight the armies of the aliens? Much every way; love of money, love of ease, love of power, love of strong drink; the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eye, and the pride of life, and the fell spirit of party strife, over them all and handling them all for its own purposes, when it is not itself handled by a yet mightier spirit; for there are many antichrists. Does any one here doubt, that if the vote of the Methodist Church in this Dominion were solid for Prohibition above all considerations of political party, that it would be but few years till Prohibition stood strong, the law of the land? Does any one doubt that if the Christian and public sentiment of our people-others remaining but as they are, which they would not if we were braver and better-were such that we were a unit on this and every great moral reform, that the public men and the public institutions of the country would be long in shaping their course accordingly? And should not our Methodist people be solid for Prohibition above any consideration of political party? Does any one doubt that if the Presbyterian Church were solid for Protestantism and civil liberty with a voice clear and strong above all partizan strife, that aggressions upon civil liberty would soon cease? And should not the Presbyterian Church be solid for civil liberty? What is the Church of Christ here for, if not in intelligence, freedom, piety and loyalty to Christ, to be solid, compact, united upon such issues? Perhaps we ought to find as high a style of true manhood, and as noble models of patriotism and good citizenship, in the Methodist Church as elsewhere. And yet am I right before God and my country, before conscience and history, if a sin is less a sin in my sight when allowed or committed by the party I prefer, than when allowed or committed by the party I might denounce? This spirit of partizan strife blunts the private and the public conscience, lowers the standards of morality, and hinders, and often defeats, the cause of our loving Redeemer. It even sometimes divides our Methodist societies, and interferes with the support of a heroic pastorate. In the very Prohibition issue now under consideration it tosses a great moral reform about like a football, and opposes religion and the cause of God. As a Church of Christ we may well disown it and its bitter fruits. The clarion voice of conscience must sound in notes high and clear above the din of party strife. The trumpet of the Divine Word must call men back to duty. The Church of God has been in Egypt; the Church of God has been in the wilderness; the Church of God has backslidden and revolted in Canaan, and lain in captivity in Babylon; the Church of God, by spiritual and political unfaithfulness, was plunged into the thick darkness of the mediæval apostasy, whose chills are yet upon her limbs, whose shadows are yet upon her vision, and whose fears are yet in her heart. And history may yet repeat itself. What immunity from guilt has treachery to-day? What covenant of security is pledged to cowardice, indolence and faithlessness? A moral uprising, an assertion and vindication of conscience, is demanded by the country and We must have it if we are to secure the Prohibition of the Liquor Traffic. Whence is it to come, if not from the House of God? The men that break with their party for patriotism, for civil liberty, for moral reform, will, of course, be denounced as fanatics and characters of a worse

type; for the parties, as in the time of our Lord, have had a long discipline in epithet and abuse. But with Moses and Elijah, with the Nazarene and the Apostles, with Luther, Knox and Wesley, we must expect these things, and triumph in them and do our duty. And the grace of our God be upon us to make us sufficient for these things.

Other themes were adverted to: as the formation of the Epworth League, the Superannuation Fund, the lessons of gratitude and humility, of trust, hope and courage, to be learned from the review of the statistics of the Quadrennium, and the evident tokens of divine favor, notwithstanding much unworthiness, division of sentiment, and consequent uneasiness and debate. "Yet out of all the Lord hath brought us by His love. In personal consecration, in seeking the mind of Christ, and to be filled with the Spirit, in the unity of the brotherhood, the fellowship of the Gospel, and submitting ourselves one to another in the fear of God, difficulties shall be removed, power bestowed, joy imparted, success assured, and the Conference upon which we are now entering made the most blessed and fruitful of good of all in our history."

The Secretary nominated Warring Kennedy, Esq., and Rev. E. I. Badgley, LL.D., Assistant Secretaries, and the nominations were confirmed by the Conference.

Moved by Rev. Hugh Johnston, D.D., seconded by Dr. Willmott, and Resolved,—That until this body adopt rules for its own government, the Rules of Order be those of the last General Conference, as printed in the Discipline.

Moved by Rev. A. B. Chambers, LL.B., seconded by George Wilson,—That a nominating Committee be appointed as follows: Montreal, Bay of Quinte, Toronto, Niagara, Guelph and London Conferences, each two ministers and two laymen, and one minister and one layman from each of the remaining Conferences, viz., Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, Newfoundland, Manitoba and North-West, and British Columbia. The motion was adopted.

Resolved,—That the Conference adjourn for fifteen minutes, to allow the several Annual Conferences to meet and elect representatives for the Nominating Committee.

Whereas, in the sincere opinion of many friends of Victoria University, events have transpired during and subsequent to the last General Conference, which have led them earnestly to desire an expression of the judgment of this Conference on the principle of Federation, prior to the final settlement of this vital question; and whereas, after the most exhaustive discussion of the subject during the entire Quadrennium, it is believed that this Conference is fully informed and prepared to vote without further discussion or delay: Therefore, be it resolved, that this Conference reaffirm the decision of the Conference of 1886 on the Federation question, and inscruct the Committee on Education to lay before the Conference such recommendations as may be deemed necessary to give effect to the decision of this Supreme Court of the Church; and, be it further resolved, that the principle of Federation shall have no application to the Mount Allison University, in the Maritime Provinces.

"Whereas the Basis of Union adopted by all the Churches which united to form the Methodist Church of to-day, laid down an educational policy which contained the following clause: 'It is recommended that the United Churches adhere to the traditional policy of Methodism in regard to education, believing that the best interests of the Church and of education imperatively demand that our colleges and universities should be under the fostering care of the Church.'

"Therefore resolved,—That this General Conference continues to believe it to be in the interests of education and of Methodism that the principle of Independence, as regards our universities, should be maintained."

We recognize in the Evangelical Association an important and influential factor in the work of our common Methodism, and shall hail with satisfaction any movement which, in the providence of God, shall tend to secure a closer union between them and us, believing, as we do, that the cause of Christ is best subserved by united action on the part of those who are one in faith, and usage, and methods of operation.—Carried.

Moved by Rev. J. E. Howell, M.A., seconded by Rev. F. E. Nugent, That this Conference instruct the Church Union Committee to name a committee to be appointed by this Conference, whose duty it shall be to meet any committee that may be appointed by the Canadian Conference of the Evangelical Association to arrange a scheme of union to be submitted to the authorities of both Churches, and that said committee be instructed to nominate a fraternal delegate to the next Annual Conference of said Evangelical Association.—Carried.

"If an Annual Conference accepts and stations a minister under protest that the transfer is illegal, does the act of accepting and stationing said minister legalize the act of transfer?"

The Rev. Dr. W. Williams moved the adoption of Report No. 2, as follows:-

Memorials from the Toronto, Montreal, Manitoba, and Nova Scotia Conferences were laid before it, and also from ten Quarterly Boards, praying for the extension of the pastoral term to four or five years.

A memorial from the Bay of Quinte Conference was also received, praying that no change be made in the present limit of a minister's stay on

Two districts ask that no change be made without first consulting the Quarterly Boards of the Church.

After careful consideration of the matter, your committee recommends the General Conference to enact such legislation as will permit a minister to remain on his circuit for four years.

Resolved,—That whilst three years shall be considered the general limit of the pastorate, yet when such exceptional circumstances arise as, in the opinion of two thirds of the members of any Annual Conference, expressed by ballot, make it desirable to extend any pastor's term, such minister may be continued on any circuit for a fourth year.

Moved in amendment to the amendment by Rev. J. S. Williamson, seconded by Rev. Dr. Aylesworth,—That the limit of the term of ministerial service, as prescribed in par. 3, page 63, be three years—except when the Quarterly Board, during the third year of such ministerial term, by a three-fourths majority of all the members of such Board, shall request the return of a minister a fourth year, and such request has been approved by the Annual District Meeting; then the Stationing Committee shall have power to station a minister on the same charge for a fourth year. And also, when a Quarterly Board fulfils the above conditions during the fourth year of such ministerial term, then the Stationing Committee shall have power to restation the minister on the same charge for a fifth

At 9.30 p.m. it was resolved that the vote be now taken.

The ruling of the Chair was asked by G. W. Beynon, of the Manitoba Conference, as to whether this was a violation of the Restrictive Rule, par. 114, sec. 2. The Chair decided it was not.

J. J. Maclaren, Q.C., asked the ruling of the Chair whether it did not require a three-fourths vote under sec. 2 of the Basis of Union, page 265, third line from the top, affecting the privileges of the laity. The Chair ruled that it did not.

Minter, fraternal delegates from the British Methodist Episcopal Church in Canada, who addressed the Conference; whereupon it was moved by Rev. H. S. Matthews, seconded by Rev. T. W. Jolliffe, and

Resolved,—That we have listened with pleasure to the greetings of the British Methodist Episcopal Church in Canada, and to the interesting addresses of Rev. W. Hawkins and Rev. T. W. Minter, the representatives of that Church to this Conference. We do not forget that during

the stirring times in the history of this country, our colored brethren were faithful to our institutions, and loyal to the British Crown. We beg to assure these honored brethren of our deep interest in the prosperity of their Church, and wish them God speed in their noble work of saving souls and advancing the best interests of the Church of Christ.

Howell,—That the Report of the Committee on Tobacco be amended by the addition of the following:—We recommend that immediate steps be taken to petition the Dominion or Provincial Legislature for a law prohibiting the sale of cigars, cigarettes, and every other form of tobacco to persons under sixteen years of age.—Carried.

Moved, in amendment to the report, by Rev. Dr. Burns, seconded by Ald. Boustead,—That, whereas the attention of this Conference has been called to the great and increasing evils arising from the use of tobacco, especially among the young people of the present day; and whereas, our young people naturally and properly look to their leaders in the Church for example and advice on this and other important questions; therefore, be it

Resolved,—That this Conference asserts its strong disapproval of the use of tobacco as hurtful to the physical constitution, and especially injurious to the young. We earnestly recommend that every member in our Church be urged to be a total abstainer from its use; and alarmed by the growing use of tobacco by the youth of our country, we earnestly recommend that those in our Sabbath-schools, in the educational institutions of our Church, and in the ministry, shall be total abstainers; and we further recommend that our people use all their influence to have the teachers in our public schools and higher institutions set the example of abstention from its use.—Carried.

If any officer of the League shall fail to obtain such approval by a majority vote, the League shall be required to select an officer to fill the place of the officer so failing, who shall obtain such approval, under penalty of the forfeiture of representation on the Quarterly Board.

- 3. To amend par. 308, as to time of electing officers of schools, subsec. 1. Adopted. (See Report.)

Sub-sec. 2, as follows:—The Superintendent of the Circuit shall non-nate for the office of Superintendent of the school one or more persons, one of whom, if more than one be nominated, shall be elected by ballot.

It was moved in amendment by A. J. Donly, seconded by W. Bowman,—That the Superintendents of the Sabbath-schools be elected by the Committee of Mangement.

On motion of Rev. John Learoyd, the previous question was ordered. The amendment of A. J. Donly was put and lost.

"Your committee feel that, for several reasons, it is a matter for regret that these moneys have not been utilized for the purpose for which they were appropriated, a purpose so in accordance with the best interests of the Indians themselves, alike from a worldly and from a religious point of view, and so in keeping with the policy and object of our missionary labors among them. And they regret to add that they have been unable to discover any sufficient reason why our Church has not, before this time, been in possession and control of an Industrial Institution in full operation, such as was contemplated by these appropriations."

On motion, item No. 4 of the report was adopted as amended.

Item 5 was adopted.

Item 6, which reads as follows, was struck out:--

Your committee recommend that, in view of all the circumstances, the General Conference appoint a committee to act in conjunction with the Mission Board, which committee shall be specially charged with the duty of arranging all affairs which may arise in relation to the above matters between the Government and the Church; and they would suggest that such committee be composed of the Secretary of Missions, the Hon. James Aikins, the Hon. W. E. Sanford and Geo. A. Cox, Esq.

Your Committee having carefully considered a memorial from the Newfoundland Conference, respecting regular periodic transfers from and to that Conference, do not deem it wise that the prayer of the memorialists should be granted, but they recommend that the special attention of the Transfer Committee be called to the necessities of the men and the work in Newfoundland in a note appended to paragraph 129 of the Discipline.
 - 8. Your Committee recommend that the following be added to clause

4 of the aforesaid paragraph 129, viz.: "except where the exigencies of the work positively demand it, and in any such case the transferred man shall have the right to be returned to the Conference out of which he was taken, after the lapse of the number of years included in two pastoral terms; and any such minister, whose transfer without his own consent is contemplated, shall receive notice thereof at least one month before the meeting of the Transfer Committee."

The report was laid over.

Moved by the Rev. H. S. Matthews, seconded by Rev. Dr. Potts,

Whereas, the Bowmanville and Uxbridge Districts of the Toronto Conference were transferred to the Bay of Quinte Conference by vote of this General Conference; and whereas, several members endeavored to speck on the question, but had not the privilege of doing so; and whereas, there is considerable discontent and irritation in consequence of said transfer; and whereas, this Conference has appointed a commission to examine into the matter of the boundaries of Annual Conferences and report to the next General Conference:

Be it therefore resolved,—That the transfer of these Districts do not take effect until the first day of September, 1894.—Lost.

On motion, the Rev. Dr. Lathern was granted leave of absence at the close of this afternoon's session; also Rev. Wm. Williams, D.D.

On motion, the list of delegates present and absent at the call of the roll on Monday, and ordered to be printed, was, on reconsideration, laid on the table.

Conference closed with the doxology, and benediction by Rev. Dr. Lathern.

Tuesday Evening, Sept. 30

The Conference re-opened at 7.30 o'clock, the Rev. Dr. Carman in the chair.

The Minutes of the afternoon session were read and confirmed.

The Rev. T. G. Williams, D.D., moved, seconded by Rev. George McRitchie, a reconsideration of the appointment of the General Conferenc Special Committee.—Lost.

The Report of the Committee on Transfers was again considered, and on motion to adopt as a whole, it was moved by Rev. T. W. Jackson, seconded by Rev. P. Addison,—That should charges of a grave and serious character be preferred against any transferred minister during the time between the session of the Transfer Committee and the said transfer taking effect, the investigation of the charges shall be held and decided upon by the Conference to which said minister belongs at the time of such charges, and should the Conference so decide, the transfer shall not take effect.—Lost.

The report was, on motion, adopted as a whole.

I. Special resolutions were referred to us from Rev. Dr. Parker, asking that a change be made in the preamble to the order of ministration of baptism to infants; from Rev. Dr. Wilson, asking that the prayer which now precedes the ministration of said rite be made to follow the same; and from Rev. Dr Sprague, asking for a change in the wording of the same prayer. With regard to these, your Committee recommend:—

1st. That the following preamble to the order of baptism take the place of that now in the Discipline, page 181: "Dearly Beloved, —Forasmuch as our Lord Jesus Christ gave commandment to His Church to make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost; and whereas these persons present do bring this child and do now present him for Holy Baptism, we by this ordinance do recognize him as, through the grace of redemption, an heir of eternal life and a part of Christ's mystical body the Church; let us therefore pray for him that he may more and more be endued with heavenly virtues, and by the abounding mercy of God be kept faithful to the end of life, and attain to an everlasting reward."

Sub-item 2 adopted.

Sub-item 3, as follows, lost :-

"That on page 182, the clause beginning, 'Grant that whosever be,' etc., be omitted, and that the same be also omitted from the order of baptism of adults, page 188."

Sub-item 4 (1) adopted.

Sub-item 4 (2), as follows, lost:—

"Ques.—Do you therefore solemnly engage to fulfil these duties so far as in you lies, the Lord being your helper?"

Sub-items 5, 6 and 7 were adopted.

Section II. On Reception of Members, adopted.

Sub-items 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 9 were adopted.

Sub-items 7, 8, 10, as follows, were lost:—

Sub-items 1, 2, 3 and 5, as follows, were not adopted:—

2. That on page 227, lines 8 and 9, the words "and a thousand-fold more children of hell by our sinful practice" be omitted.

- 3. That on page 228, line 10, the words "wretched sinners" be omitted.
- 5. That on page 228, all from beginning of line 23, "O blessed Jesus," etc., down to the word "death," in the first line of page 229, be omitted. Sub-item 4 was adopted.

Section VIII. Sub-items 1 and 2, as follows, were not adopted:

- "In harmony with a memorial of the Nova Scotia Conference, your Committee recommend that provision be made by our Book and Publishing House to insert in new editions of our hymn-book the responsive portions of the Liturgy and Covenant service, and that pending the issue of such new editions, folders be prepared, of suitable sizes for insertion in the hymn-books now in use.
- "With regard to a memorial from Grace Church, Winnipeg, and also a special resolution moved by Rev. Dr. Douglas, that a uniform order of service be laid down for use in all our churches, your Committee recommend that no change be made in the present rules for the order of public service."

The report as amended was adopted.

The consideration of the Report of the Committee on Statistics was resumed.

On motion to adopt the schedule recommended by the Committee, the following persons were appointed a special committee to prepare the schedule and make such changes as are necessary to harmonize with the Discipline, viz.: Wm. Johnston, Rev. T. W. Jackson and Rev. Dr. Briggs.

The report as amended was adopted.

The Report of the Committee on Insurance of Church Property was taken up.

Department has thought proper to discriminate against Protestant Indians in the annual distribution of gifts by the Government, and that we refrain from giving any other deliverance from this General Conference on the subject, except that we counsel the Indians to give fair and intelligent consideration to such offers of settlement of existing difficulties as may be made.

- 2. In cities and towns where there are two or more churches, a committee, to be designated the Church Extension Committee, and composed of the Superintendents and Recording Stewards of the Circuits and Missions within the limits of said cities and towns, shall determine the advisability of the erection of a new church or churches in localities not already formed into Circuits or Missions, and without the sanction of said committee no new church shall be erected. The Chairman of the District within whose bounds it is proposed to erect a new church shall call the committee at the request of the Superintendent of any Circuit or Mission concerned, and when thus convened the committee shall elect its own chairman.
- 3. Your Committee also recommend that paragraph No. 258 of the Discipline be amended by adding after the word "District" the words "or where two or more Districts are affected, it shall be the duty of the Chairmen jointly."

The Report on Returns of Boards and Committees was adopted.

The Report No. 3 on Temperance was adopted as a whole.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ANNUAL CONFERENCES.

Your Committee beg leave to report as follows:--

I. That paragraphs 4, 8, 9 and 10 of the memorial from the Toronto Conference be referred to the Committee on Discipline; paragraph 6, to the Judicial Committee; and paragraph 7, to the Sabbath-school Committee.

II. That the memorial from the Rev. J. S. Ross be referred to the Committee on Discipline.

III. That paragraph 2 of the memorial from the Centenary Church, Hamilton, be referred to the Judicial Committee.

(1) That memorials from Alliston, Bracebridge, Bright, Fingal and Ancaster Quarterly Official Beards; Brampton, Collingwood, Walkerton, Norwich, Milton, Toronto East and Toronto West Districts; and from the Guelph Conference, respecting the election of lay delegates to Annual Conferences directly by Quarterly Official Boards, and to the General Conference by District Meetings, were given the fullest consideration. Your Committee find that, while it may be advantageous to make the changes asked for in certain instances, yet the best interests of the entire Church would not be so well served as under the present arrangements, and they would therefore recommend that no change be made.

(2) Concerning the notice of motion by Rev. Dr. Sprague, seconded by Rev. C. H. Paisley, "That the name of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Conference be changed to St. John Conference," your Committee recommend that no action be taken in the matter.

That Bowmanville and Uxbridge Districts be taken from Toronto and added to Bay of Quinte Conference.

(4) That in the matter of stationing ministers and the composition of the Stationing Committee, memorials received from the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Conference and Brownsville Circuit, also notices of motion by the Revs. J. McAlister and A. B. Chambers, referred to us, were considered in their various bearings upon the Church as a whole, and your Committee recommend that no changes be made.

(5) In the matter of the memorial relating to the formation of an additional Conference in Manitoba and the North-West Territories, your Committee recommend that when there are thirty-five ordained ministers in the North-West Territories, and the majority of the Districts shall ask to be set apart as a Conference, the General Superintendent, with the consent of the Manitoba Conference, shall proceed to organize said Conference.

(7) The memorial from the Nova Scotia Conference, in the matter of Annual Conference collections for the expenses of ministers and laymen was duly considered, and it was decided that the Annual Conferences interested should determine the basis of such disbursement.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BOOK AND PUBLISHING INTERESTS.

Your Committee beg leave to report as follows:

We respectfully recommend the following changes in the constitution of the Book Committee:—

lst. That clause 339 be amended by inserting the words "of the committee," at the close of the first line, and the words "and Japan," before the word Conferences in the fourth line; also the words "and Japan," before the word Conferences in the last line of clause 341, and the sixth line of clause 353. And also that the word "quarterly," in the 9th line, clause 361, be changed to "half-yearly."

2nd. That clause 363 be so amended as to provide that the editor of the Methodist Magazine and Sunday-school periodicals shall be under the control of the Book Committee, in the same manner as the other officers of the Publishing House.

Regarding the Report of the Western Section of the Book Committee, we report as follows:—

3. That having examined the Report of the Western Section of the Book Committee, we cannot but express our pleasure at the very satisfactory condition of its affairs; our appreciation of the fidelity, diligence and financial ability with which the business of the Book and Publishing House has been managed during the past Quadrennium, and recommend the Conference to adopt the Report and print it in the JOURNAL of the Conference

4. That we learn with pleasure that the Christian Guardian retains its position as one of the leading religious journals of our country, and continues to exert a potent influence for good in the homes of our people; and that its net profit for the Quadrennium was nearly \$23,000.

5. Also that the Methodist Magazine and our Sunday-school periodicals retain their high standard in the departments of literature which they represent; and we appreciate the ability and fidelity with which the editors have conducted these connexional journals.

6. We also recommend the continuance of the arrangements of the last General Conference for the grant of a sum not to exceed \$1,000 per annum for assistance to the editor of the Guardian.

7. The Report of the Eastern Section of the Book Committee was also read, and was ordered to be printed in the Journal. Your Committee rejoice to learn that there has been a substantial increase in the volume of business, amounting to about \$16,000 for the four years.

The Eastern Section place on record their high appreciation of the fidelity, diligence and ability with which the Book Steward and Editor have discharged the arduous and important duties connected with their respective departments.

8. Your Committee recommends that the grant of credit to the Eastern Section of the Book Committee of \$10,000 without interest be

9. Regarding a memorial from Bright Circuit, in the Niagara Conference, concerning the prices of books to local preachers and exhorters, we recommend its reference to the Book Committee.

10. The memorial from the Manitoba Conference, regarding the establishment of a branch Book Room in the city of Winnipeg, and the publication of a Church paper for that Conference, we recommend to be referred to the Book Committee.

11. A memorial from the Bay of Quinte Conference, requesting the publication of a cheap edition of our Church Hymn-book, we also recommend to be referred to the Book Committee.

12. Regarding the resolution of the Rev. Hugh Johnston, asking for the publication of a "Hymn and Tune Book" for our Church, we recommend as follows: That the question be referred to the Book Committee, with instructions to proceed with the publication of such a book.

13. On the memorials from the Bay of Quinte Conference, the Cannington District and St. Thomas District, with reference to the reduction of the subscription price of the Guardian; and from the St. Thomas District, as to the publication of a cheaper paper to take the place of the Guardian in the homes of our people, your Committee respectfully report: -"That having examined carefully the proposition to reduce the price of the Guardian, and having considered the propriety of publishing a separate paper as a reprint of parts of the Guardian," we recommend the following:--

Sub-sec. 1. That no change be made in the price of the Guardian, and that every effort be made to increase its efficiency and circulation.

REPORT OF THE WESTERN SECTION OF THE BOOK COMMITTEE.

The approach of the time of the assembling of the Chief Court of the Methodist Church brings to the Western Section of the Book Committee the pleasant duty of reporting the operations and condition of the Book and Publishing House at Toronto. The term since the meeting of the last General Conference has been one of enlargement, extension and general prosperity. The constant and rapid growth of the business rendered imperative the necessity to secure larger and more commodious premises. This has been done, and in such manner as to furnish accommodation for all our Connexional offices, bringing them into convenient proximity to each other. The business itself has been largely extended. Under the feeling of duty to spread as widely as possible the periodical and other literature of the Church, as well as what is healthy and useful in the publications of other Houses, a still more aggressive policy has been adopted. Not only have the established agencies of the Church been kept in use, but every corner of the land has been visited by special agents to extend the trade. The increase in the sales herein reported will show the gratifying results. Though large profits have by no means been made a principal object, yet, by careful management, a very good return has been realized.

The constant growth of the Church, and its extension into the new settlements of our country, will furnish a continually increasing constituency with wants which it shall be the effort of this establishment to reach and supply, and so contribute largely to the righteousness which exalteth a nation.

By the information furnished from week to week respecting the progress of religion at home and abroad; by its wholesome lessons for the conduct of life, adapted to all classes; by its earnest advocacy of all our connexional enterprises; and by its effective vindication of the doctrinal teaching and practical methods of our Methodism, it has been a potent influence for good in the homes of our people, and has promoted the interests of every department of our work. Wherever the Guardian is read by our people they are brought into more intelligent sympathy with our missionary, educational, publishing, and evangelistic work.

Owing to circumstances, arising out of local feeling and differences of opinion on some burning questions, the path of the *Guardian* during the past four years has not been uniformly smooth, nor the condition of things favorable to the extension of its circulation. But in spite of unfavorable circumstances, and some fluctuations in the circulation, it has faithfully held on its way, and made a good record for the Quadrennium that has just closed, the profits earned by the paper being in advance of those of any former period.

THE METHODIST MAGAZINE.

Notwithstanding the keen competition of numerous high class maga zines, both British and American, which have an immense circulation, it is gratifying to report that our own Methodist Magazine not only holds its own, but that it has during the Quadrennium made substantial progress in circulation, and has exhibited continuous improvement in literary character, in religious influence, and in artistic illustration. In the sixteen years of its existence, it has proved its value as a medium for discussing important problems of religious and social progress, especially of problems affecting our own Church and country. It has distributed over half a million numbers of one hundred pages each (including insets), or over fifty million pages of wholesome, instructive, religious family reading throughout the Dominion. In an age when frivolous and pernicious literature so largely abounds, this is a consideration of much importance. It has found readers also in almost every State of the American Republic, in Great Britain and Ireland; and even in Ceylon, India, China and Japan. It is something to the credit of Canadian Methodism, that when so many attempts to establish a Methodist monthly in the large and wealthy Methodist Episcopal Church of the United States have failed, that of the much smaller and poorer Methodist Church in Canada has been so successful. Nor is this credit lessened by the fact that many endeavors have been made in Canada to establish a monthly magazine on purely secular lines, all of which have been fruitless; while the Methodist Magazine, which is frankly denominational and avowedly religious in its purpose and character, was never so strong nor exhibited such vitality as to day. No other Canadian magazine has ever attempted such copious and high class illustration or such mechanical excellence in letter-press; and we know not any other country, with an English-speaking population so sparse as our own, which has undertaken such an enterprise. It has assisted also to develop the literary ability of the writers of Canadian Methodism, and, as an organ common to the entire Church, has been a tangible bond of union among its widelysevered parts, from Bermuda to Japan. THE SUNDAY-SCHOOL PERIODICALS.

In this department of our Church work, a very remarkable development in production and in numerical circulation has taken place. That circulation has increased from a total of 103,729 on March 31st, 1882, to 194,076 on March 31st, 1886, and to 252,566 on March 31st, 1890. But these figures do not represent the aggregate circulation, as many schools are not open in March. These papers are nearly all stereotyped, and are printed so close to the estimated requirements that sometimes

two or three editions are required to meet the demand.

These papers have also greatly improved in mechanical excellence and in style of illustration. There is scarcely a hamlet in the Englishspeaking parts of the country where they do not penetrate. From their cheapness, and by their distribution through the Sunday-schools, they reach many who possess no other religious reading, and in many cases no other reading of any sort. They do not lay claim to very high literary art. They are adapted to the comprehension of the humblest. But they bring the Word of Life to many by whom the voice of the living preacher is seldom heard. They are of much assistance to scores of thousands of faithful Sunday-school teachers in the instruction of the young people committed to their care. They focus upon the selected lessons all the light that can be concentrated from various sources, so as to be a continuous commentary, by some of the best Biblical scholars living, brought within the reach of the most remote, the poorest, and the humblest of those self-denying teachers, and of the scholars under their These papers are permeated throughout with sentiments of loyalty to Methodist doctrine and practice; with loyalty to Queen and country; with implacable hostility to the twin evils, intoxicating liquors and tobacco; with love for pure, sound, wholesome literature; and, above all, they are filled with those holy teachings which make wise unto salvation. They furnish important vantage ground for moulding, in large degree, the future of the Church and nation, by influencing toward piety and godliness, in the most susceptible and formative period, the minds of the young people of Methodism. Of these papers, over 160,000 pages are printed for every working-day in the year. The influence of such a stream of directly religious teaching proceeding from the press is incalculable—only the Great Day shall reveal it.

It is a gratifying fact that the cheap foreign periodicals, which once had a large circulation in our schools, have in very large measure been superseded by our own papers, which, for their size and character, are among the cheapest in the world. The following are the details of the

On reporting the removal of the establishment to the new premises now occupied by it on Richmond and Temperance streets, it seems an opportune occasion to give a short sketch of the origin and growth of the business to the present time.

At the meeting of the Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church in Canada, held at Ancaster, September, 1829, a Committee was appointed to take into consideration the propriety of establishing a religious newspaper, under the direction of Conference, and to devise ways and means for accomplishing the same. The Committee was composed of the following:—Franklin Metcalf, William Ryerson, Philander Smith, David Wright, James Richardson, Thomas Madden, and Anson Green. They reported:—

- "1. That it is the opinion of your Committee that a weekly paper sould be established under the direction of the Conference, of a religious and moral character, to be entitled the *Christian Guardian*.
 - "2. That the place of its location be the town of York.
- "3. That the sum of \$700 is sufficient to purchase all the apparatus for a printing establishment.
- "4. That the sum of \$2,050 will meet the annual expense of such a paper.
- "5. That the annual income of the office will be at least \$2,800, leaving a balance in favor of the office of \$750 annually.
- "6. That stock to the amount of \$2,000 be raised by dividing it into 100 shares of \$20 each, half of which to be paid immediately, and the

remainder subject to the call of the persons who may be appointed to superintend the publishing of the paper; the said stock to be repaid with interest as soon as the avails of the concern will admit of it.

"7. That the members of the Conference do take up the shares among themselves; but if all be not disposed of in that way, that they use their influence with their friends to have the remainder taken up immediately.

"8. That a Committee of five persons be appointed annually by the Conference to superintend the publishing of the paper and other printing that may be done in the office, and that the General Superintendent of our Church and the preacher in charge of the station at York, be ex-officio members of said Committee, three of whom shall form a quorum for transacting business.

"9. That the Conference appoint an Editor, or Editors of the paper annually, by ballot, without debate, who shall be responsible for his or their conduct as Editor or Editors, to the Publishing Committee in the

interval of Conference.

"10. That the Editor be appointed an agent to procure the apparatus

and materials necessary for commencing the paper.

"11. That the price of the paper be 12s. 6d. currency per annum if paid in advance, or 15s. if not paid previous to six months from the time

of receiving the first number, exclusive of postage.

"12. That all our ministers, travelling and local, be agents to the paper, and every agent who may procure fifteen subscribers, and use his best endeavors to make collections and obtain subscribers annually, shall be entitled to a paper gratis.

" (Signed) F. Metcalf, Chairman."

This report was adopted by the Conference, and Egerton Ryerson was appointed Editor and Franklin Metcalf Assistant Editor, and the following were appointed (in addition to those already ex-officio members) the Committee to superintend the printing establishment:—James R. Armstrong, William Patrick, James S. Howard, Esq., Thomas D. Morrison, M.D., and Barnabas Brennan.

According to Resolution 10, Egerton Ryerson was appointed agent to procure apparatus, etc., and he was furnished with the following

certificate :-

"This may certify that the bearer, Rev. Egerton Ryerson, is appointed agent for procuring a printing establishment for the Canada Conference, and he is hereby commended to the Christian confidence of all on whom he may have occasion to call for advice and assistance for the above purpose.

" WILLIAM CASE, Superintendent.

" JAS. RICHARDSON, Secretary.

" Ancaster, U. Canada, Sept. 4, 1829."

On the 21st November, 1829, the first number of the Christian Guardian was published "in March Street, north of the new Court House," "Egerton Ryerson and Franklin Metcalf, Editors." It was an eight-page paper, $13\frac{1}{4} \times 10\frac{1}{4}$ inches, three columns on a page.

On the 19th December, 1829, this advertisement appears:

This appears to have been the first book published at the office. On the 11th September, 1830, the following appears:

" FOR SALE AT THIS OFFICE.

Excellent Bibles and Testaments, printed by the British and Foreign Bible Society, at very low prices; Methodist Hymn-Books and Watts' Psalms and Hymns, of different qualities and sizes; also Sunday-School Hymn-Books of different kinds, and a small assortment of Sabbath-school books. We hope to obtain a larger supply shortly."

Thus they began to sell books.

On January 22nd, 1831, a list is published in the Guardian of "Books on sale at the Guardian Office." There are seventy-nine different books, including Bibles, Testaments, Hymn-Books, Catechisms, Commentaries, Biographies, school books, etc.

In the Minutes of 1833 (when the union with the English Conference took place, and the Church assumed the title of The Wesleyan Methodist Church in British North America), will be found:—

"Question 12-What are the arrangements of the Conference with regard to books?"

"Resolved—1. That a Depository of Books be established at York, and that a Book Committee be appointed, consisting of the Chairman of the York District, the Superintendents of York Station and the Yonge Street Circuit, Brothers William Case, Joseph Stinson and Egerton Ryerson, who shall have power to order books from Great Britain and the United States, to examine accounts, and otherwise manage the concern.

"2. That the Book Committee render to each Conference a detailed account of the state of the concern.

"3. That Brother Egerton Ryerson be appointed Book Agent.

"4. That no preacher shall order or in any way procure books for sale, except through the Book Agent or Committee.

"5. That the preachers be respectively held responsible for all books they order, and that they be allowed a discount of ten per cent. on all such books."

Thus the sale of books already begun was formally recognized and rranged for.

In 1835, Matthew Lang is appointed Book Steward, and Ephraim Evans, Editor. Also, the same year, William Lord and Egerton Ryerson (President and Secretary of the Conference) delegates to attend the American General Conference in Cincinnati, in May, 1836, in order to negotiate on the claims of this Conference upon the New York Book Concern. In this, according to living testimony, they were not successful, the American brethren merely promising them special discounts on their purchases.

In 1837, Ephraim Evans was again appointed Editor, and John Ryerson was appointed Book Steward, and extended regulations for the management of the concern were formulated and published.

The Establishment, which began its operations in March Street, had several removals before it became settled in its own building at 9 Wellington Buildings, King Street.

On 15th January, 1831, the *Guardian* informs us: "The *Guardian* Office is now removed to a new brick building over the store of Mr. J. R. Armstrong, King Street; place of entrance between the stores of Messrs. Armstrong & Strange."

In November, 1832, it was removed to Jordan Street, a few doors south of King Street; and on the 16th July, 1834, the Guardian appeared

dated from Toronto Street, west of the jail.

On 12th April, 1838, a deed was executed (vellum 2 feet 2 inches × 2 feet 5 inches —2 pages) by Grant Powell, John W. Gamble, and D'Arcy Boulton, on behalf of the magistrates of the Home District, to Ephraim Evans, granting for the sum of £700, Lot No. 9, North side of King Street, Court House Square, 27 feet 5¾ inches on King Street by 156 feet to a roadway. And on 16th July 1840, Ephraim Evans conveyed to John Ryerson, of Toronto; Roley Hyland, Streetsville; Hamilton Biggar, Stamford; Henry Wilkinson, Prescott; John Beatty, Cobourg; Alexander McNab, Township of Toronto; and David Wright, Markham, the same piece of property, and the deed sets forth that it had been purchased by Ephraim Evans on behalf of the Wesleyan Church for the accommodation of their Book and Printing Establishment.

On this lot, according to the condition in the deed, a brick building was erected, and on the 8th November, 1838, the plant and stock were removed to it, and the business commenced there, with Egerton Ryerson,

Editor, and John Ryerson, General Book Steward.

The resolutions of Conference in 1837, with regard to the Book Room, indicate a purpose to enter more largely into the business, and having now premises of their own, larger and more suitable and central, the work took a new start on a larger scale, and has gone on extending from that time till now—a period of more than fifty years—and to-day the Concern occupies a foremost place among the Publishing and Book-selling Houses of the Dominion. During the period alluded to, viz., from 1838 to 1889, that of the occupancy of their premises on King Street, the following were elected to the offices of Book Steward and Editor:—

At the General Conference of 1874, when the union with the Wesleyan Methodist New Connexion Church in Canada was formed, the organ of that Church, The Evangelical Witness was amalgamated with the Christian Guardian, the Rev. Dr. Dewart was re-elected Editor of the Christian Guardian and the Rev. David Savage was added to its staff until the next Annual Conference, or longer, at the option of the Book Committee --he continued until 1875.

Rev. W. H. Withrow was, in 1874, elected Assistant Editor of the Christian Guardian He within that year, with the consent of the Book Committee, commenced to edit the Methodist Magazine, and another arrangement was made for the Guardian. In 1878 he was elected Editor of the Magazine, and at the Union General Conference (when the Methodist Church in Canada, the Episcopal Methodist Church in Canada, the Primitive Methodist Church in Canada, and the Bible Christian Church in Canada, became one Church with the title of "The Methodist Church") he was re-elected Editor of the Methodist Magazine with the addition of the Sunday-school periodicals, and so continues till this time.

At the same Union General Conference the Canada Christian Advocate, the organ of the Methodist Episcopal Church in Canada, was united with the Christian Guardian, and the Rev. S. G. Stone, the Editor, was elected Associate Editor of the Christian Guardian, which office he held till 1886.

For a number of years the premises on King Street were felt to be too small for the operations of the Concern, already large and rapidly growing. every inch of ground had been utilized, and that both in cellar and attic, and many consultations were held as to the best method for obtaining increased accommodation, without any conclusion being arrived at, until the building and site of the well-known Richmond Street Church was, after a forty-four years' term of great usefulness, offered by its trustees for sale, the business changes in that part of the city having made it a difficult matter to keep up a congregation there. purchased for a little over \$30,000, and additional buildings having been The church was erected, making the cost of the whole \$116,370.29, the establishment was removed to these beautiful quarters on the 1st September, 1889.

THESE NEW PREMISES

are situated on Richmond Street West, in close proximity to Yonge Street. Toronto's main artery, and have a frontage of 100 feet, and running 176 feet through to Temperance Street. The church building stood in the centre of the block. Both frontages have been fully built up with handsome structures of four storeys high. The Temperance Street frontage contains several of the manufacturing departments, as well as the wholesale trade department, and an entire flat at present available for rental. The whole of the old church structure was retained, and is now a building of four storeys, including the basement, which is one of the airiest and best lighted press-rooms in the Dominion. The ground floor contains the offices of the institution and a magnificent stock room. Over this, on what was the level of the church gallery, beams and columns, with heavy floor of joist, form the compositors' room-a truly noble room. Over this and above the old church ceiling has formed the sheet room, an indispensable adjunct of a publishing house. The Richmond Street extension of 100 feet frontage, on the ground floor is divided into three

stores, one of which is occupied by the Concern as its retail book store, the other two being rented as offices. The centre is taken up with entrance to the upper part of the building, the first floor of which contains the whole of the connexional offices, an arrangement that fills a long-felt want.

The two upper floors are fitted up with offices for public rental, except a roomy comfortable Board-room, now generally used for all connexional purposes. The upper part of this building is reached by a hydraulic elevator, in addition to comfortable and roomy flights of stairs. The entire structure is known as Wesley Buildings.

The officers of the institution now are:

REV. WM. BRIGGS, D.D., - Book Steward

REV. E. H. DEWART, D.D., - Editor Christian Guardian.

REV. W. H. WITHROW, D.D., Editor Methodist Magazine and Sundayschool periodicals.

The King Street property was sold for \$39,524.86 net.

The Richmond Street property cost—land and buildings—\$116,370.29. This change of property has been the principal cause of a large increase of Assets (increase, \$162,881.43) and of Liabilities (increase, \$109,172.68) at the close of this term. This increase of Liabilities is more than covered by the following Special Assets:

The latter two items yielding interest at a little higher rate than that paid on the increased Liabilities, and the parts of the building not in use for the purposes of the Establishment itself—amounting to about one-third—yielding a gross rental of about \$4,900, which will net nearly \$3,000 per annum, or more than 7 per cent on one-third the value of the entire property.

The remainder of the increase of Assets, after deducting the above items of \$120,870, is spread over the whole establishment, largely consisting of new machinery for the manufacturing department, and is not remarkable, when it is considered that the net profits of the Concern were \$78,775 for the term.

THE SUPERANNUATED MINISTERS' FUND.

In the last Quadrennial Report it was stated: "During the Quadrennium the House has contributed \$10,000 to the Superannuated Ministers Fund. This is double the amount granted during the term ended 1882."

The present Report is that the amount of 1886, viz., \$10,000, has this term been more than doubled, as the amount granted is \$22,000.

THE MONTREAL BOOK ROOM.

Notwithstanding the disadvantages of location in a community where the large majority is Roman Catholic, and of the intensely keen competition of the trade, our Montreal Branch is showing gratifying symptoms of vitality and progress. The sales have increased during the Quadrennium \$4,412.52; and the net profits, after making deductions

REPORT OF THE EASTERN SECTION OF THE BOOK COMMITTEE.

The Eastern Section of the Book Committee begs to present the following report:—

When, four years ago, your Committee entered upon its duties, the outlook for the Book Room and Wesleyan was not very promising; but we are gratified to say that we are able to report an improvement in both these departments, as compared with the last quadrennial statement.

For instance, in the report to the last General Conference the deficiency of assets, as compared with liabilities, was \$1,675.15; add to this, old subscriptions due Wesleyan for several years that could not be collected, and written off in the following year, \$750; making a total of \$2,425.15. This deficiency has been reduced to \$1,439.02, which is an improvement during the Quadrennium of \$986.13.

In reference to the Wesleyan, your Committee may say that, while during the first year of the reduction of the subscription from \$2 to \$1.50 the paper went behind about \$500, through the increased number of subscribers and the more prompt payment of subscriptions it has been brought up to a practically paying basis. In view of prospective arrangements for reduced cost of printing, we consider the outlook for the paper to be still more hopeful for the future. The present circulation is 3,350 copies.

With regard to the Book Room, your Committee may say that the financial statement shows a very substantial increase in the volume of business, amounting to about \$16,000 during the four years. The actual improvement in the four years may be seen from the fact that while the previous Quadrennium showed a net loss of \$636, that just closing shows a profit of \$1,874.53, being a relative gain of \$2,510.53.

The Committee desire to express its view that this gratifying improvement is in part due to the action of the General Conference in authorizing the Toronto Book Room to grant a credit of \$10,000 to the Eastern Book Room without interest; and we would therefore recommend the continuance of the credit, more especially in view of the fact that this amount scarcely equals one year's business between the two concerns

We append a financial statement, showing in detail the business of the Quadrennium and present condition of the concern.

In conclusion, the Committee desire to place upon record their appreciation of the fidelity, diligence and ability with which the Book Steward and Editor have discharged the arduous and important duties connected with their respective departments.

REPORT OF STANDING COMMITTEE ON THE CELEBRATION OF THE CENTENNIAL OF METHODISM IN CANADA.

Pursuant to Resolution, page 129 of the Journal,—"That the question for the arranging for the observance of the Centennial of Methodism in Canada be referred to the General Superintendent and the Conference Special Committee," the General Conference Special Committee appointed the following as the Committee on Centennial:—General Superintendent, Revs. Dr. Johnston, Dr. Parker, Dr. Stafford, Dr. Stone, J. F. German, D. L. Brethour, S. J. Shorey, E. Roberts, and T. W. Jolliffe; the Hon. John Macdonald, W. W. Robinson, J. N. Lake, Ald. Boustead, and James Mills.

The Committee has held two meetings during the Quadrennium, and at the last meeting, held on the 20th December, 1889, the following resolutions were adopted:—

First. That the celebration begin with a public meeting, to be held in Montreal during the session of the General Conference.

Second. That the Annual Conferences of 1890 be requested to arrange for meetings and celebrations to follow the meeting held by the General Conference.

Third. That the object of these meetings be (1) Thanksgiving to God and the education of our people in our history, doctrines and polity.

(2) The raising of funds by contributions and subscriptions, to be distributed as follows: (a) One half the gross amount secured within the bounds of each Conference to be available for its own Sustentation Fund. (b) Of the remaining half, a portion shall be applied toward the extinction of the debt of the Union Church Relief Fund. (c) The balance shall constitute a Church Extension Fund, to be under the control of a

Central Committee, to be appointed by the General Conference.

Fourth. That papers upon the subjects indicated below, and historical sketches of the several branches of the Methodist Church as they existed before the union, be prepared and published in a volume, to contain about 300 pages, and to be called the "Centennial Volume of Canadian Methodism."

5. That voluntary offerings be received, and that each Annual Conference shall raise a fund, to be applied as such Conference shall direct.

6. Amended as follows:—"That each delegate to the Ecumenical Council shall pay his own expenses."

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH AND PARSONAGE AID FUND.

Your Committee beg leave to report as follows:-

Your Committee had before them no report but the financial statement of the receipts and expenditures of the past four years; and while it appears the Fund has not accomplished all that the last General Conference had anticipated; and while the attendance at the meetings of the Committee during the four years was confined to three or four brethren, whose time was too fully employed elsewhere to give the attention to this Fund which it deserved; your Committee is of the opinion that the Fund is of such value and importance, and may be made of such great service in the extension of our work in the newer fields of labor, that a vigorous effort should be put forth, and the intentions of the General Conference, in its organization, should be carried out.

We would recommend,

1. That the moneys loaned by the Old Church and Parsonage Fund of Manitoba and the North-West be called in as fast as possible, on such terms as may appear to the Committee to be equitable and expedient; and that the Superintendent of Missions for the North-West be instructed to assist in the carrying out of such settlement on the best possible terms, and subject to the approval of the Committee.

2. That all applications for loans in the North-West must be endorsed by the Superintendent of Missions, in addition to the Quarterly Board, the Superintendent of the Circuit, and the Chairman of the District.

6. That the Committee be composed as follows:—Ministers: Dr. A. Sutherland, J. F. German, J. H. Starr and W. J. Maxwell; Laymen: J. N. Lake, J. B. Boustead, Dr. W. W. Ogden, Dr. J. B. Willmott and H. J. H. Fudger, with the General Superintendent as chairman.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN UNION.

Your Committee beg to report as follows:—Fraternal salutations, expressed by resolutions, were exchanged between the General Conference of 1886 and the Provincial Synod of the Church of England, in session at the same time in the city of Montreal.

Before the close of that Conference a second communication was received from the Provincial Synod asking the General Conference to appoint a committee to meet with the committee that had been appointed by the Synod, and such committees as might be appointed by other Christian bodies, for the purpose of considering the possibility of an honorable union between the Protestant Churches of this country. In accordance with that request your Committee were appointed.

Your Committee met the committees of Anglican and Presbyterian Churches in the lecture-room of Association Hall, Toronto, on April 24th, 1889, at 8 p.m. To the great regret of the Committee, two of the most valued members had been removed by death—the Rev. Dr. Nelles and the Rev. Dr. S. J. Hunter. Of the remainder, the following were present:—The General Superintendents, Drs. Carman and Williams; Dr. Ryckman, Dr. Harper, Dr. Dewart, Dr. Stewart, Dr. Burwash, Dr. Gardiner, Dr. A. Sutherland, Dr. D. G. Sutherland, Rev. Wm. McDonagh, the Hon. J. C. Aikins and Judge Jones.

On meeting with the committees appointed to represent the other Churches, your Committee found themselves associated with clergymen and laymen of the highest official position, and of the most commanding influence in their respective Churches—a fact which may be taken as indicating their apprehension of the gravity and importance of this movement for union.

The joint committee held four sessions, at the first of which, the Rev. A. Sweatman, Anglican Bishop of Toronto, presided; at the second, the Rev. Dr. McMullen, Moderator of the Presbyterian General Assembly; at the third, the Rev. Dr. Carman, General Superintendent of the Methodist Church; and at the fourth, the Rev. C. Hamilton, Bishop of the Diocese of Niagara. Three Secretaries were appointed—one from each of the Churches represented.

The first question discussed by the joint committee was that of Incorporate Union. A very brief paper, having the form of a resolution, but not intended as such, was offered to the Committee by the Rev. Principal Cavan. Its adoption would have affirmed the principle of Incorporate Union, and would have pledged the Committee to efforts to secure it. The paper was discussed at length, but was not submitted for adoption. No expression was given by the Committee as to the desirableness, or otherwise, of the unity that had been under consideration.

The next subject of discussion was, "The amount of unity already existing in doctrine, worship, and modes of action, between the three bodies." This subject occupied the time of the committee until very near the close of the Conference, and included papers by Anglican brethren on the "Holy Scriptures," and on "Creeds." The last matter that engaged the attention of the Conference, was a paper on the "Historic Episcopate." It was read merely, not discussed. No attempt was made throughout the Conference to formulate a "Basis of Union." With the

It may be added that the Anglican portion of the joint committee seemed to be strongly and unanimously in favor of Union. In both the Presbyterian and Methodist sections there did not seem to be the same coincidence of thought and opinion. However, nothing could exceed the courtesy and kindliness of spirit, language, and discussion that prevailed throughout the entire Conference. In an important sense, "it was good to be there."

Your Committee beg to report further that both the Anglican and Presbyterian representatives intimated their intention to move their respective Churches to reappoint their committees and make arrangements for subsequent Conferences.

Your Committee, therefore, recommend that this General Conference appoint, or reappoint, its section of the joint committee, with instructions to attend any similar Conferences to which they may be invited, in order that the Methodist Church may be represented in such negotiations as may be undertaken with a view to Union among the Protestant Churches of this country.

It remains to be said that since the Conference of the joint committee in Toronto, the Anglican Synod has held another annual session, at which the following resolution was adopted:—

Resolved,—That a joint committee of both houses on Christian Union be appointed, to hold itself in readiness to confer with similar committees that may be appointed by other Christian bodies for this purpose, upon the preliminary basis embodied in the Lambeth resolutions.

That part of the resolutions passed by the Lambeth Conference which sets forth the necessary basis of negotiations for Union is as follows:—

In the opinion of this Conference (the Lambeth Conference) the following articles supply a basis on which approach may, by God's blessing, be made towards home reunion:—

1. The Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments, as containing all things necessary to salvation, and as being the rule and ultimate standard of faith;

2. The Apostles' Creed as the baptismal symbol, and the Nicene Creed as the sufficient statement of the Christian faith:

3. The two Sacraments ordained by Christ Himself—Baptism and the Supper of the Lord—ministered with unfailing use of Christ's words of institution, and of the elements ordained by Him; and

4. The Historic Episcopate, locally adapted in the methods of its administration to the varying needs of the nations and peoples called of God into the unity of His Church.

Your Committee would submit to the General Conference that the adequacy or inadequacy of the Creeds mentioned as a doctrinal basis may be a proper subject of discussion in any future negotiations that may be held, and especially that the Historic Episcopate must be defined in harmony with the teachings of the New Testament regarding the constitution of the Christian Church and the identity of the New Testament bishop and presbyter.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH UNION.

Your Committee on Church Union beg to report, that the following communications were laid before it, viz.:-

1. Report of Committee on Christian Union

2. Letters from Rev. Provost Body, Secretary of Church Union Committee.

3. Report of Fraternal Delegate to the Evangelical Association.

4. Resolutions passed by the Conference of the Evangelical Association.

Your Committee recommend :--

1st. That this Conference desires to place on record its devout thankfulness to our Father in heaven for the increasing indications of the spirit of unity among the Protestant Churches of this country.

2nd. That this Conference most heartily approves of the action of the committee appointed four years ago, as presented in its report of the meeting held with the representatives of the Anglican and Presbyterian

Churches in the city of Toronto.

3rd. That this Conference would be greatly gratified if an organic union of the P otestant Churches could be effected; and finds the first three resolutions of the Lambeth Conference, referring to negotiations for union, fairly satisfactory; but insists that the fourth, referring to the Historic Episcopate, must be defined in harmony with the identity and essential equality of the office of Presbyter and Bishop.

And further submits that the adequacy or inadequacy of the Lambeth resolutions as a doctrinal basis would be a proper subject of discussion in

future negotiations.

In reference to the Presbyterian Church, your Committee rejoice to learn that some measures have been adopted, and some progress made during the past Quadrennium in the direction of union, and is strongly of the opinion that the time has come when some practical steps might profitably be taken to bring about a better understanding in reference to the work on mission fields, and that an amicable arrangement might be made between the two Churches which would prevent any unseemly rivalry, and the unnecessary expenditure of men and means, especially in the sparsely settled Districts of Nipissing, Algoma, Manitoba and the North-West.

With regard to the Evangelical Association of Canada, your Committee rejoice to learn that although no definite steps have been taken towards union, yet the most friendly relations have existed between their Church and our own.

The Committee appointed by the last General Conference on union with the above Church has not been called to meet during the last Quadrennium; and, whereas the Evangelical Association still desire the way to be left open for negotiation, your Committee recommend the Conference to appoint a special committee, consisting of the following, viz:-the General Superintendent, Dr. Griffin, Dr. Hunter, Rev. G. A. Mitchell, Rev. J. E. Howell and Thos. Hilliard, Esq., to meet any committee that may be appointed by the Canada Conference of the Evangelical Association, to prepare a basis of union to be submitted to the Conferences of both Churches.

Your Committee recommend that the following address be accepted as an expression of the views of this Conference on the subject of Christian Union; that it be printed in the Journal, and published in the Connexional organs as an open letter to all Protestant Churches.

The General Conference of the Methodist Church of Canada, to all the followers of Christ everywhere, who desire the "Unity of the Spirit,

in the bond of peace," greeting :-

With all sincere Christians, we desire to see a closer union among those who labor for the universal prevalence of Christianity. We feel the urgency of the command, "Preach the Gospel to every creature," and we are painfully satisfied of the sad fact that the dissensions and divisions of Christendom tend rather to emphasize denominational interests at home, than to spread a knowledge of Christ among the teeming millions abroad. That two-thirds of the human family have yet to hear of the Saviour is enough to rouse His followers to the necessity of urgency in the adoption of any and every measure calculated to hasten the spread of the Gospel. The utilization of all available forces for foreign service is strongly demanded. That can be secured only by the rational and harmonious arrangement of our resources at home. We rejoice in the manifest signs of the times; in the willingness exhibited by many to merge their minor differences for the sake of the common good; to remove the emphasis from ideas that for generations have been almost rallying points, if by such concessions more united action could be secured.

It is not to be expected that any would sacrifice what they considered truth, essential truth, even for the sake of union. Truth must be retained at all hazards. But the great mass of ritual, ordinances, and discipline, adopted on the ground of Christian expediency, but not appointed by divine authority, as absolutely binding on all parts of the Church in all ages, might well be subjects of modification, or change; if such modification would tend to bring closer together those who should stand shoulder to shoulder as members of a common militant body. We rejoice in believing that a consensus on all the essential elements of our holy religion is possible, even now, among several of the larger bodies of Canadian Protestantism. And this Church holds itself ready to confer with the representatives of all Christian bodies desirous of a closer union, and to co-operate to its utmost ability in the endeavor to secure that end.

From the very origin of this Church, in the days of our fathers, up to the present time, the ministrations of our pulpit have been marvellously blessed by the manifestation of the Holy Spirit, in the conversion of souls, until we have been forced to exclaim gratefully and often, "What hath God wrought?" From this, and other considerations to us equally valid, it may naturally be inferred that no movements looking to union can hope to be successful with us that would call in question, either directly or indirectly, the validity and Scriptural authority of our ministry. Methodism claims for its ministry the divine anointing, the seal of the Spirit These have been graciously vouchsafed to us; and in this do we rejoice. But we claim no more for ourselves than we most cheerfully concede to sister Churches. The good hand of the Lord has

different Churches together must admit at once and unreservedly the validity and equality of the ministry of the contracting parties.

We would suggest as a tentative and educating measure the occasional interchange of pulpits, and the recognition of a common brotherhood at the Lord's table, among those who seriously aim at Christian union. This has been practised among several of the Protestant Churches, with the most gratifying results. Among those who exchange pulpits, and who meet together in ministerial associations, there is a constantly increasing conviction, that the central truths of Christianity are dearer to them than mere shibboleths, and that there is a nobler work than the mere emphasizing of denominational peculiarities. To all such the Methodist Church extends its hand, and opens its heart; and sinking, as far as may be necessary, customs based on mere expediency, would join in giving emphasis to the "name which is above every name."

Hoping that these statements may aid in placing our Church fairly and fully before our Christian brethren everywhere, and inviting all to a

closer union in the bonds of Christian love, We subscribe ourselves your brethren in Christ.

REPORT OF THE COURT OF APPEAL

The Court held only two sessions during the Quadrennium; the first extending over two days, January 11th and 12th, 1888, and the second on the 3rd of September, 1890.

At the first session the following appeals were heard and determined:—
1. An appeal by the London Conference against the transfer of the Rev. J. W. Annis, M.A., to that Conference, on the ground that there was no vacancy, and it could not legally be made under par. 129, 12 of the Discipline, as claimed. The Court held that there was, in this case, no decision of the General Superintendent on a question of law within the meaning of par. 128, 3c, and there was no appeal to this court. That inasmuch as the President of the London Conference had ruled that Mr.

Annis was a member of that Conference, and that decision was not appealed from, the Conference had acquiesced in it. The Stationing Committee had also stationed him. The appeal was consequently not allowed.

2. An appeal by the Rev. E. S. Rupert, of the Guelph Conference, against a decision of that body. A minister of that Conference having been charged with a violation of the Seventh Commandment, was found guilty by the Committee of Trial. This finding was confirmed by the Conference, which decided to place his name on their Minutes in answer to Question 15 of par. 152 of the Discipline, hence the appeal. Objection was taken that proper notice was not given to the Conference, and that the case was not appealable. The Court held that the only notice appellant had to give was to the General Superintendent, under par. 128, 6, and found that verbal notice had been given to the Conference in addition. It further held that the case was appealable under par. 139; that as the Committee and Conference had found the accused guilty of an offence falling under par. 229, it had exceeded its jurisdiction in imposing a different penalty from that prescribed in the Discipline, and the Court had jurisdiction under par. 128, 3c. The appeal was, therefore, allowed; and it was declared that under par. 229 the accused should have been deposed from the ministry and expelled from the Church, and the Minutes amended accordingly.

3. An appeal by the Rev. E. B. Harper, D.D., against the finding of a Committee on a charge respecting an alleged invasion of the St. Vincent Circuit, Toronto Conference, by the Superintendent of the Woodford Circuit, Guelph Conference. Objection was taken that the Committee was not one, under par. 284 of the Discipline, on Conference Boundaries, but one appointed to try specific charges against a minister. The Court held that the objection was well founded, and that it had no jurisdiction to

entertain the appeal.

At the second session, the following appeals were heard and determined :-

4. An appeal by the Rev. John Shaw, D.D., against a decision of the Rev. J. A. Williams, D.D., General Superintendent, while presiding in the Toronto Conference. In May, 1888, the Quarterly Board of the Metropolitan Church, Toronto, appointed two laymen to attend the Annual District Meeting on account of the Rev. John Shaw, D.D., and Rev. W. H. Withrow, D.D., belonging to that Circuit. The Chairman of the District ruled, that as these ministers were not in the pastoral work on the Circuit, the laymen were not entitled to sit in the District Meeting. In the Annual Conference, a complaint of maladministration of discipline was brought against the Chairman. The General Superintendent ruled that the Chairman had properly decided. An appeal was taken from this decision. The Court held that as these two ministers were in the active work, and appointed to that Circuit by the Stationing Committee, the Quarterly Board had a right to send the two laymen to the District Meeting, and allowed the appeal.

5. An appeal by the Rev. T. M. Campbell, of the Guelph Conference, from a decision of the President on a question of law in the Conference, having been heard by the Rev. Dr. Carman, General Superintendent, after the death of the Rev. Dr Williams. The appellant was dissatisfied, and claimed that the surviving General Superintendent could not exercise the judicial powers laid down in par. 128, 3g, of the Discipline. The Court considering that par. 116 provides for the election of one or more General Superintendents, and that while the last General Conference elected two, the committee named in par. 126 had the right to decide whether a successor to the late General Superintendent should be elected; and inasmuch as that body decided not to elect a successor, the Rev. Dr. Carman had a right to hear such an appeal as if he had been alone elected General Superintendent by the General Conference. The appeal was consequently not allowed.

- 6. An appeal by the Rev. E. S. Rupert, M.A., against a decision of the Guelph Conference, declining to receive the decision of the General Superintendent rendered under par. 128, 3g, in an appeal under par. 128, 3a and c, in which the General Superintendent held that the Conference had exceeded its jurisdiction in indefinitely postponing the question of the passing of a sentence which this Court had held it should pass. The objection was urged before the Court that one General Superintendent could not hear and decide such appeals. The Court, following its own decision in the preceding case, held that the surviving General Superintendent had jurisdiction, affirmed his decision, and allowed the appeal.
- 7. Appeal by a minister of the Niagara Conference from a decision of a special session of the ministerial members of that body, expelling him for the offence of bigamy, and from the decision of the President in not allowing a motion in amendment of the sentence. The General Superintendent having heard the appeal, sustained the Conference and the President, and dismissed the appeal. This action was affirmed by the full Court.

Report No. 2. That, in reference to the memorial of certain members of the Church in Winnipeg, and the motion of Dr. J. J. Maclaren on the selection of Church sites, your Committee recommend that the following paragraph be added to the section of the Discipline on Churches, page 115, viz.:-

When it is proposed to erect a new church within the bounds of any circuit or mission, the Superintendent of such circuit or mission shall notify the Chairman of the district, indicating the proposed site; and the Chairman shall notify the Superintendent of any circuit or mission affected thereby; and if objection be made, and the parties cannot agree, then the difficulty shall be settled by arbitration.

In reference to the memorial re the St. Lawrence camp ground, your Committee, being advised that another committee of this Conference had considered and reported on the matter, make no report.

Your Committee beg leave to report as follows:--

1. We recommend that all paragraphs relating to the Board of Examiners, and regulations relating to the examination of Conference students and probationers, be consolidated in one place or under one chapter, viz., par. 149, 171, sub-secs. 2 and 3; 172, sub-sec. 3, and 181; and any other paragraphs which may be added by this Conference.

2. That Superintendents of Circuits report to the Secretary of the Board of Examiners immediately after the third Quarterly Meeting the names and addresses of all candidates coming up for examination in the Preliminary Course.

3. That a manual be printed for the use of candidates and probationers, giving full directions for their guidance in their course of study, and all questions relating to the same; and that Revs. Dr. Burwash, Dr. Shaw, Dr. Stewart and Dr. Ryckman be requested and authorized to prepare and publish the said manual.

4. In the matter of the memorial of the Toronto Conference, as to probationers meeting during the year for "instruction and drill upon their various studies, after the manner of the Itinerant Club of the Methodist Episcopal Church of the United States," we very strongly recommend that Annual Conference Boards of Examiners arrange for such gatherings, to be held so far as the circumstances permit.

5. In the matter of the motion relative to certificates from Albert College, we beg to report that in our opinion no action is needed, as such certificates coming from one of our connexional institutions are provided for in Discipline, par. 18%, sub-sec. 2.

6. We recommend that par. 149 (page 59) be amended by changing Provincial into Provincial Teachers' Certificates of the first or second class. All of which is respectfully submitted.

Report No. 3.

1. In the matter of the resolution proposing the insertion in the course of study of a suitable work on the relation of Christianity to socialism, we recommend that probationers extend their reading so as to be conversant with the various social problems of the day; but that at present no examination be required in this department, in view of the enlargement of the curriculum in other directions.

3. On the memorial from the Nova Scotia Conference, asking that doctrinal standards be formulated suitable for oral examination, we are of opinion that our Church Catechisms may fully serve the purpose in view.

4. We recommend that par. 172, 2, be amended by erasing the last sentence and substituting therefor, "He must have a certificate of having completed his Preliminary Course. He may, however, be received on probation in case he has not passed in the subject of Greek, provided that his standing as a probationer shall not be given until at college, or in Conference examinations his requirements in Greek be met."

5. We recommend that in par. 181, sub-sec. 11, the words commencing "but prior to being recommended," to the end, be erased, and that the substance thereof be stated at the end of the college curriculum, as per appendix annexed.

6. We recommend the following changes in Discipline:---

(a) Par. 149, 7th line, after "candidates," erase "to be presented to the Annual District Meeting," and insert instead, "and probationers who shall present them to the Annual District Meeting, and shall be prepared to submit them at any time to Conference or college authorities when required to do so."

(b) Par. 171, 2, 4th line, substitute "results" for "character."

(c) Par. 171, 3, 5th line, after "Secretary," erase remainder, and insert "of each Conference or College Examining Board to give a record of standing in each subject, and for this purpose every probationer shall forward to the Secretary his certificate for entry of additional subjects to his credit in time to submit it to the Annual District Meeting."

(d) Par. 171, 7, 2nd line, after "probationer" insert "except as

elsewhere provided."

(e) Par. 181, 9, change to read, "Graduates in Arts who shall complete the course prescribed for them, shall be allowed one year on their probation."

(f) Par. 181, 12, 5th line, change to read "By the faculty of the

University or College."

(g) Par. 181, 15, 2nd and 3rd lines, change to read "Victoria University, Mount Allison University, the Wesleyan Theological College, or at Wesley College, Winnipeg."

7. We recommend that Rev. W. I. Shaw, LL.D., Rev. J. S. Ross, M.A., and Rev. A. M. Phillips, B.D., be authorized to prepare a form of Certificate of Examinations which shall serve in all the Conferences.

In case of text-books being out of print, the Principal of the French Methodist Institute, with the Principal and Registrar of the Wesleyan Theological College, are authorized to designate equivalents for them.

V. SPECIAL COURSE FOR MISSIONARIES.

Native Japanese, Chinese and Indian candidates for the ministry shall pursue such course of study as the Conference Board of Examiners may frame, it being understood that, as far as possible, the work prescribed shall harmonize with the ordinary course of study.

English-speaking candidates for Indian mission work in the Manitoba and North-West Conference may take House's Cree Grammar instead of Greek.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CIVIL AND RELIGIOUS LIBERTY.

Your Committee beg leave to report as follows:---

Your Committee had placed before it the resolution of Rev. Dr. Lathern, asking for the appointment of a Committee of Privileges; and a motion from the Rev. A. C. Courtice in regard to public provision for education, and would submit for the adoption of the General Conference as follows:—

Our civil and religious liberties are a heritage transmitted to us by the sacrifices of our honored forefathers. For them, we feel devoutly thankful to the Father of mercies. We regard any invasion of those liberties with grave apprehension and deep solicitude. On the one hand, we claim no rights for ourselves which we do not cheerfully accord to our fellow-subjects; and, on the other, we will not submit to any stealthy or open encroachment upon this invaluable possession without the most vigorous protest and the employment of all rightful means of resistance.

Your Committee would, therefore, recommend that the General Conference appoint a Standing Committee of Privileges, etc., to watch parliamentary legislation and government action during the Quadrennium, and, if necessary in any emergency, to co-operate with other Protestant bodies for the maintenance of civil and religious rights and privileges, such committee to be composed of two members-one minister and one layman-from each Annual Conference, and to be formed into Western and Eastern sections, and all needful business to be conducted, as far as possible, by correspondence.

The constant aggression of the Romish Church, and especially its recent assumptions, we regard as a sufficient justification for this recommendation. Its encroachment upon the civil and religious liberties of the Protestants of this Dominion, is manifested in the incorporation of the Jesui's in 1887; in the passing of the Jesuits' Estates Act in 1888, in the preamble of which Act there are statements which accord to the Pope of Rome—a foreign potentate—a recognition of rights and privileges which is an invasion of Her Majesty's supremacy, in the payment out of the Provincial Treasury the sum of \$400,000 to the representative of the Pope, to be divided according to his wishes; and in the action of the Dominion Government, which, by a large majority, refused to take steps to secure the disallowance of said Act.

This encroachment upon the rights and liberties of Protestants is still further manifested by the authority which the Roman Catholic hierarchy of the Province of Quebec has acquired, enabling it to divide parishes in such a way as to be prejudicial to the municipal and civil interests of the Protestant minority; and in the intolerance and injustice inflicted on the Oka Indians.

In addition to the appointment of the said Committee of Privileges, your Committee would, therefore, recommend the General Conference to

1. Against the interference of any Church in the affairs of the State, and its efforts to make the State subservient to its own interests; and

2. Against any grants from the public funds for the endowment or support of any purely ecclesiastical or sectarian institutions.

In regard to the Oka Indians, your Committee report that it has received information from the Rev. W. Scott, representing the Indian Department, and from Chief Timothy, representing the Indians. After careful consideration, it seems to your Committee that the lands claimed by the Indians were originally given in trust to the Seminary of St. Sulpice, to be used for the benefit of the Indians in their civilization, education and religious instruction. As those Indians are British subjects, and, as it is a fundamental principle in the British constitution that no person shall be wronged, oppressed or persecuted for his religious belief, or his mode of worshipping God, therefore, your Committee maintain that it is the duty of the Dominion Government to see that the Indians are not subjected to inconvenience or disability because they have seen fit to renounce Romanism and accept Protestant Christianity.

While the offer of the Government, as presented by Rev. W. Scott, is not destitute of a measure of liberality, when considered merely from the financial standpoint, yet there are some things which have no equivalent in money.

Rev. W. Scott, is merely from the we no equivalent The Indians are warmly attached to the place of their birth and to the inheritance made sacred by the memories of their forefathers. Your Committee regard it as a wrong and a cruelty, incapable of vindication, to compel them to leave the homes of their childhood and the graves of their ancestors simply because they became Protestants. Your Committee would, therefore, recommend that the General Conference protest against the wrongs and persecutions inflicted upon the Indians, and repudiate and condemn the recent action of a Minister of the Crown, who, in the exercise of the functions of his office, has seriously trespassed on the civil rights of the Protestant Indians of Oka, by threatening to withhold their share of the scanty pittance which, as a part of the Oka people, they have heretofore received, and that this whole matter be entrusted to the Committee of Privileges, or to a special committee to be appointed, whose duty it shall be to guard the Indians against unrighteous interference.

With reference to public education, your Committee rejoice in the liberal provision made in all our Provinces for the cause of education, but regrets the existence of differences of public policy in the various Provinces. It cherishes the hope, both on patriotic and religious grounds, that our educational system, though under provincial management, will yet become a uniform and national system, and remain thoroughly Christian throughout the Dominion. It is of the opinion that it is the duty of the State to provide educational facilities for the whole people; and that it is of the utmost importance to guard against the growth of religious bigotry in the work of public instruction. It, therefore, most heartily approves of the policy which looks toward the establishment of a system of purely unsectarian schools in all the Provinces of the Dominion, and expresses its gratification that the said system has been adopted by the Legislature of the Province of Manitoba.

Your Committee would recommend the General Conference to request all the Annual Conferences, in their Educational Anniversaries, to give prominence to the public school system, as well as to the denominational interests, and to impress upon our people two things of vast importance, viz.: 1st, The use of the Holy Scriptures in Public and High Schools; and 2nd, The employment of those teachers only who have a good moral and religious character. In this way, we may hope that the youth of our land will grow up under the hallowing influences of truth and righteousness, and our Canadian people become strong and prosperous.

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON CONSOLIDATION OF TREASURERSHIPS.

Your Commission appointed by the General Conference of 1886, to consider and report upon the propriety of consolidating the management of the various Connexional Funds, as far as the treasurership of the same is concerned, beg to submit the following facts and recommendations:-

1. During the Quadrennium, four meetings of the Commission have been held, at which the questions involved in the proposal were carefully

2. We find that the following are the Funds which it is proposed to place in charge of one General Treasurer:

The Missionary Fund.

The Superannuation Fund.

The Educational Fund (c)

(d) The General Conference Fund. (e) The Union Church Relief Fund.

(f) The Church and Parsonage Aid Fund.

(g) Any other Funds which may be established by the General Conference and assigned to this management.

3. In submitting such a proposal, three results are aimed at. (1) The highest efficiency of administration; (2) Economy of management; (3) Separation of financial from secretarial duties, in order that the Secretaries may devote their undivided time to the general work of their respective departments. Whether these results can be reached or not, may be inferred from the information presented in this report.

4. Under the present system the staff employed and the cost of man-

Note .- At present, one half of this amount is paid out of the Educational Fund, and one-half out of the Federation Fund.

The Union Church Relief, and the Church and Parsonage Aid Funds have heretofore cost the Connexion nothing for management, but it can hardly be expected that brethren will be found in the future who can afford to give the necessary time and labor to this work without remuneration. And the same may be said of the General Conference Fund.

5. It will be seen by the foregoing statement that the actual cost of management of all these Funds in the items of salaries and rent during the past Quadrennium has been a little over \$11,000 per annum; but if the present system be continued, and remuneration given for work which has hitherto been done gratuitously, the annual cost will be somewhat

Under the plan of consolidation it is proposed that there be one Treasurer for all these Funds, with such clerical assistance as may be found necessary; that the work be done in the rooms now occupied by the Missionary Society; that the various Funds contribute pro rata to the expenses of the Treasurer's Department; that the various Boards or Committees retain control of their respective Funds, but that a Joint Committee, representing all the Boards, be appointed to deal with matters of expenditure which belong to all the Boards in common, and not to any one exclusively.

6. It is also proposed that there shall be a Secretary of Missions, and a Secretary of Education as at present, and that such provision be made for the secretarial duties connected with the other Funds as the General Conference may deem expedient and necessary.

Along the line proposed two methods would be open to the General Conference. First, to elect a General Treasurer who, as a salaried officer, would give his entire time to the duties of the office; or secondly, to elect, as at present, some prominent layman as General Treasurer, with provision for the appointment of a salaried deputy or cashier who, under the direction of the General Treasurer, would be responsible for the office work connected with the management of the several Funds, such assistance being provided as may be found necessary.

- 7. In either case the salaried staff would be approximately as follows:—
- (1) General Secretary of Missions.
- (2) General Secretary of Education.
- (3) Treasurer or Cashier.
- (4) Clerk in Treasurer's office.
- (5) Stenographer and General Clerk.

It is our opinion that such a staff would be adequate to the work required, and the changes proposed would effect a saving of say \$2,000 a year, or upwards.

- 1. That the following Funds be placed in charge of one Treasurer, namely:-
 - (a) The Missionary Fund.
 - (b) The Superannuation Fund.
 - (c) The Educational Fund.
 - (d) The General Conference Fund. (e) The Union Church Relief Fund.
 - (f) The Church and Parsonage Aid Fund.
 - (g) Any other Connexional Funds that may be ordered by the General Conference.
- 2. That each Board or Committee having the management of Funds represented in the foregoing arrangement, shall appoint from among its members one or more representatives, to form, with representatives from the other Boards, a Joint Committee, to be known as "The Joint Committee on Connexional Funds," the proportion of representatives to be as follows:—Missionary, 5; Superannuation, 3; Educational, 2; General Conference, 1; Union Church Relief, 1; Church and Parsonage Aid, 1.
- 3. That the Joint Committee shall have authority to appoint a Cashier, who shall discharge the duties of Treasurer of the various Funds.
 - 4. To fix the location of the General Offices.
- 5. To determine what assistance shall be employed in the Treasurer's Department.
- 6. To fix the remuneration to be paid to the Cashier and his assistants, and the amounts necessary for all other expenses of the Treasurer's Department; also the proportion to be paid by the various Funds repre-
- 7. To define the duties of the Cashier, and to see that the same are duly performed.
- 8. To require the Cashier to furnish bonds, or other acceptable security, of such amounts as it may determine, for the safe custody of the Funds committed to his charge.
- 9. To determine in what bank or banks moneys belonging to the various Funds shall be deposited.
- 10. To direct and require the Cashier to sign all cheques and notes, and to endorse all acceptances in connection with any of the Funds, and to direct and require that all such cheques and notes shall be countersigned by the Secretary of the Fund concerned.
- 11. To determine by whom cheques and notes shall be countersigned in the case of Funds embraced in this scheme but not represented by a

HAPTER II.

- 2. Page 22.—Part I., let section III. read as follows: "The duty of a minister and probationer—Matter and manner of preaching—Visiting from house to house."
 - 3. Paragraph 61.—Remain as at present.
 - 4. Paragraph 62.—Remain as at present.
- 5. Paragraph 63.—A minister or probationer should use all the means of grace himself, and urge the use of them on others, such as:

 - 4. Fasting and abstinence.
- 5. Christian Conference. Ministers should manifest an interest in the spiritual welfare of each other by speaking freely to each other upon the subject of personal religion. They should take great care not to despise each other's gifts or speak lightly of each other, defending each other's character in everything as far as is consistent with truth.
 - 5a. Omit paragraphs 69, 70 and 71.
 - 6. Next insert paragraphs 72 and 73 as 64 and 65.
- 7. Paragraph 66.—It is by no means advisable for us to preach in as many places as we can without forming any societies. We should endeavor to preach most where there is the greatest number of quiet and willing hearers, where there is most fruit. We ought diligently to observe in what places God is pleased at any time to pour out His Spirit more abundantly, and at that time to send more laborers than usual into that part of the harvest.
- 8. Paragraph 67.—We can further assist those under our care by instructing them in their own houses. Family religion is wanting in many homes. What avails public preaching alone? We must, yea, every minister and every probationer must instruct the people from house to house. Let this be done, and that in good earnest.

"150. When vacancies occur in the delegation before the meeting of the General Conference, by reason of death, resignation or other cause, the reserves of the respective Annual Conferences shall have precedence in the order of their election, and be notified thereof by the President of

At the first, second and third Annual Conferences succeeding a General Conference, all vacancies in the delegation by reason of death, resignation, transfer or other cause, shall be filled according to the rules in the preceding paragraphs, further ministerial and lay reserve delegates being elected to succeed those who have been taken to fill vacancies, or who have been advanced to a higher place on the list."

That the General Conference Special Committee be authorized to insert a clause, or section, in the Model Deed, to prevent the loss of our church property, arising from members of a Trustee Board combining to allow payments on mortgages to lapse, or arising from any breach of trust on the part of a Trustee Board, and to secure the necessary legislation therefor.

2. That the General Conference Special Committee, as it may deem expedient, be authorized to secure the necessary legislation incorporating in the Model Deed the items of the Reports of the Judicial Committee, the Committee on Discipline, and all reports of committees or commissions

adopted, affecting the Model Deed.

78. Regarding the various proposals to amend the Model Deed, the Committee would call attention to the fact that any change in the Deed will require legislation, and they are not prepared to advise immediate action on that line; but they are in favor of the following changes, and recommend that they be embodied in the first legislation which the Church may seek to obtain :--

1. To provide greater facilities for the removal of Trustees who do not perform their duties, as prayed for by the Toronto Conference.

2. For power to reduce the number of Trustees to any number not less than five, where the number is found to be too large, in accordance with the motions of the Rev. J. Kay and Rev. W. Kettlewell.

3. To insert the words "or on his ceasing to be a member thereof," after the word "church," in line 34, in accordance with the motion of A. J. Donly.

79. The Committee do not recommend the adoption of the memorials and motions referred to them which are not included in the foregoing recommendations.

80. That the regulation relating to the amalgamation of missions, on page 114 of the Journal of the General Conference of 1886, as amended by this Conference, recommended by the Committee on Missions, be inserted in the Discipline.

81. Amended by a motion, that the Chair nominate a committee of five, to be associated with the Secretary of Conference, to edit the Discipline.

11. Your Committee recommend that the Report of the Board of Regents and Advisory Committee be received and filed. With regard to the subject therein presented, and also presented in a number of resolutions referred to us, the Conference has already taken final action.

12. Your Committee recommend further the following resolution:-

* To have, when present, a seat with members of the Board and a right to tender advice.

Re FEDERATION.

Regarding the resolution of the General Conference re-affirming the decision of the General Conference of 1886, respecting the Federation of Victoria University with the University of Toronto, which has been referred to this Committee, we recommend that the Board of Regents be authorized and directed to take all the steps necessary to erect college buildings, complete the said Federation, and remove Victoria to Toronto at as early a period as may be found practicable. And further, that the Board of Regents be authorized to obtain any legislation necessary to give effect to the decision of the General Conference on this subject.

13. We recommend the following amendments to the Constitution of

the Educational Society, Discipline, page 125:--

That section II. be amended by striking out the words "higher mission schools" from the 3rd line.

That section III., page 126, be amended by changing "two," in the first

line, to "one."

That section VII. (299, page 127) be amended to read as follows:—"The Treasurer of each Annual Conference shall, immediately at the close of his Conference, or not later than the 15th of July following, transmit to the General Secretary, and to the Secretary of the Board of Management, an audited statement of his accounts for the year. He shall also remit to the General Treasurer three-fourths the amount available, viz.: (a) The net amount raised by his Conference, and loans repaid by students, retaining the other fourth to be disbursed under the direction of the committee of his Conference. (b) This portion of one-fourth shall be disbursed by said committee as a loan fund in loans, without interest, and secured by notes payable within ten years to the Treasurer of the Annual Conference Committee, and to defray expenses of Conference examinations; (c) in payment of fees of twenty dollars to each student, which fees shall be a grant and not a loan.

The General Treasurer shall disburse the funds received by him, first, for the payment of expenses authorized by the Board of Management.

Secondly, for aiding the institutions in which our ministry are educated, in the following proportions: Victoria University (including Albert College), 50 per cent.; the University of Mount Allison College, fourteen per cent.; Wesleyan Theological College, Montreal, eighteen per cent.; Wesley College, Winnipeg, eighteen per cent.

14. Paragraph 300 of Discipline shall be amended by adding the following as No. 3: "Undergraduates of Victoria or Toronto University shall be appointed to Victoria; those of McGill, to Wesleyan Theological College. Other students in the Central Conferences shall be equally divided between Victoria and Wesleyan Theological College. The students of the Western Conferences may be appointed to Wesley College, and those of the Eastern Conferences to Mount Allison University." The same section shall be further amended by adding the following as No. 4: "The Treasurer of each Annual Conference shall keep a book in which shall be entered the amounts of notes given by students, and the time when they fall due."

16. We recommend the following substitute for sub-section 9, page 81, of the Discipline, and part of sub-section 11, page 82:—

Probationers who in one of our Connexional Institutions have proceeded to the degree of B.D. or B.A., with full theological options, including Homiletics, shall be allowed two years on their probation, provided that in every such case the candidate shall have spent six months in circuit work during his college course. Other graduates in Arts shall be allowed one year.

17. We recommend that Wesley College, Winnipeg, be permitted to take the necessary steps to secure legislation for conferring degrees in divinity.

18. Resolved,—That the General Secretary of Education and the Secretary of the Board of Management of the Educational Society, be hereby requested and authorized to correspond with the Treasurers of the Annual Conferences, with a view to securing uniformity in the administration of the Fund, in harmony with the provisions of the Discipline.

19. Whereas there is a most glaring and humiliating evil in the recognition in our Church records, written and printed, of academic titles which are given by inferior or fictitious educational institutions and which are discreditable to the men who assume them as well as to the Church, if they be officially recognized: it is, therefore, an instruction to the Examining Board of each Annual Conference to determine what titles shall be recognized in the records of the Conference.

20. We recommend that the memorial from the Trustee Board of the Metropolitan Church, Toronto, re Victoria University be referred to the Board of Regents.

The duties assigned to me were defined by the last General Conference

in the following resolution:

"We recommend the General Conference to appoint a Secretary of Education, whose duty it shall be to take charge of and promote the scheme of College Federation, and to further the interests of the Educational Society.'

To the work assigned in the latter clause of the resolution, I shall

confine the first part of my report.

At the time of the last General Conference the income of the Educational Society was \$11,954. The progressive interest in the great work of Christian higher education has been steadily maintained and increased during the Quadrennium, as will appear from the following comparative statement :--

The importance of this work to the future of our Church, and also of our country can hardly be over-estimated. By this means scores of young men, called of God to the work of the ministry, are annually furnished with the training necessary to their great work. But of equal, if not greater importance, is the fact that hundreds of cultured young men and women go forth every year from these academic halls to become influential members of society, and not a few of them, to become pillars in the Church of God, and leaders in all good works. With increased intelligence and more thoroughly trained minds, these young people, who are the hope of the future, must bring to their work not only better methods, but also broader conceptions of Christian duty, and a more permanent, because a more intelligent, consecration to the service of Christ.

The second department of work assigned to me by the General Conference, was the raising of an endowment and building fund for Victoria

University, in order to the effective completion of Federation.

Until the close of the Conference year of 1886-7, the claims of Elm Street Church upon my time precluded any systematic organization or canvass through the country generally. My attention was, therefore, directed mainly to the City of Toronto, and by the close of the Conference year subscriptions were secured amounting to the sum of \$130,000.

At the Conference of 1887, a systematic plan was adopted to cover the entire field within the Province of Ontario. About \$250,000 were apportioned to the Conferences within these limits, and the apportionments were generally accepted by the Conferences at the sessions of that

vear.

Very encouraging subscriptions were obtained at several of the Conferences, and hearty sympathy was accorded to the movement by the great majority of the ministers and laymen present. Either at the Conference or at a meeting of the Conference Special Committee shortly after, a distribution of the amount accepted by each Conference among the several districts was made, and arrangements effected for holding district conventions throughout our work.

During the following year, with the assistance of several brethren, lay and clerical, a convention was held in each principal district in the Province of Ontario. In connection with each convention a public meeting was held, and subscriptions secured, thus largely effecting a canvass of the principal centres. The result by the first of May, 1888, was a subscrip-

tion list of \$195,000.

This form of work was continued at the following Annual Conferences, and up to the month of October of that year. At that date a meeting of the Board of Regents with the Advisory Committee appointed by the last General Conference was called, and it was decided that, if by the first of May, 1889, the sum of \$100,000 cash should be secured, and the subscription list should be advanced to, say, \$250,000, the Board should take into consideration the propriety of proceeding at once with the buildings, and other steps towards Federation.

Pursuant to these resolutions, I addressed myself first to the completion of the canvass in the City of Teronto.

Sermons were preached in all our churches in the city in the month of December, and subscriptions solicited by committees of influential laymen, the result being an increase in the subscription list of over \$20,000.

When the Board and Advisory Committee assembled on the 2nd of May, 1889, the subscription list stood at \$250,613.25, of which \$108,112.62 had been placed in the hands of the Treasurer in cash and accepted bank paper.

At this date an injunction was served upon the Board of Regents restraining them from further proceeding in the matter of Federation, and rendering further progress in the matter of securing subscriptions or cash payments exceedingly difficult.

The subscription list at present stands at nearly \$270,000.

During the past year the University has lost one of its best friends, and the Church one of its most devoted members, in the decease of the late Wm. Gooderham. By the provisions of his will, a further sum of \$200,000 is now available for the Federation fund. The amount named at the last General Conference is thus fully provided for, though the terms of Mr. Gooderham's will require a slight increase of estimate which can easily be covered in the near future should this Conference so order.

In making this report, we cannot but express our gratitude to the great Head of the Church, who has sustained us in a work of unprecedented difficulty and perplexity, and has brought us to so satisfactory a point in this great educational movement. We have also to thank our brethren in the ministry of our Church in the Conferences and many noble laymen for their co-operation and sympathy in this work. Without their help the success realized would have been impossible.

We cannot but refer also to the wonderful spirit of liberality which God hath poured upon the Church in this movement. Thirty subscribers consecrate nearly \$150,000 to this work, in sums varying from \$1,000 to \$30,000. The legacy of the late Mr. Gooderham is the largest ever left to our Church for the work of God, and involves a corresponding responsibility.

And among the nearly 4,000 minor subscribers there are hundreds who have given according to their means with a princely liberality.

It is therefore with strong faith in the future of our Educational work that this report is respectfully presented for your consideration.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF VICTORIA UNIVERSITY.

In accordance with the provisions of the Charter of Victoria University, the Board of Regents beg to submit to the General Conference of the

Methodist Church the following report:-

It is our first and painful duty to record the well-known fact that at the close of the first year of this Quadrennium the Rev. S. S. Nelles, D.D., LL.D., for thirty-six years at the head of the institution, was removed from his life-work after a brief illness, having just completed the sixty-fourth year of his age. We cannot but here pay a last tribute to his great executive ability, his brilliant talents in the pulpit, on the platform and in the University lecture-room, and his untiring zeal and supreme devotion to the great work of his life. The record of these is one with the history of the University itself. Following him there have also passed from our Senate chamber to rest and reward, Dennis Moore, Esq.,

Wm. Gooderham, Esq., the Rev. J. A. Williams, D.D., Hon John Macdonald, R. I. Walker, Esq., and D. C. McHenry, M.A. These at our last General Conference were still in the full work of active life. Four others, already retired through the infirmities of age, but long intimately associated with the history of our University, have also closed their earthly career-Wm. Kingston, M.A., the Rev. E. Wood, D.D., the Rev. R. Jones, and the Rev. S. Rose, D.D. But two living links remain to connect us with the founders of the institution, the Rev. Ephraim Evans, D.D., of London, who was one of the first Agents, and the Hon. Billa Flint, of Belleville, one of the first Trustees.

Though deprived of the wise counsel and able co-operation of these venerated men, the Board of Regents have used their best efforts to secure the highest efficiency in the work committed to their care, and they hope not without success. Four years ago the entire staff in Arts consisted of seven professors with one in Theology. We have now eight professors in Arts and three in Theology, who also each carry one Department in Arts work. We are thus able to offer our students in the Departments of Languages and Literature and of Philosophy advantages quite as complete as any other Canadian University, while those of Mathematics and Science have been maintained as in the past.

The appreciation of this work by the youth of the country will appear from the following tabular statistics of the past four years :-

These statistics represent a continuous and healthy growth throughout the Quadrennium, as will appear from the increased averages. The average attendance of students in Arts for the four years has been 183, an increase of 37; the average number of matriculants, 55, an increase of 10; and the average graduates in Arts, 24, an increase of six, or more than thirty per cent. above the preceding periods, or any other four consecutive years in the history of the University.

This advance has been made by considerable effort on the part of the Faculty of Arts and the Senate of the University, as well as of the Board of Regents. The staff has been increased from eight professors in Arts to twelve, including an associate professor absent in Europe, and the professor of New Testament Exegesis. These men have all had the advantages of extensive post-graduate studies in Europe, or in the best Universities of this continent. Many of them are men of mature experience in educational work, while the younger men have brought back to us the highest honors of the best German Universities. Your Board can, therefore, speak with the fullest confidence as to the high character of the advantages offered to the youth of our country in this institution of the Church.

This important extension of our teaching staff has involved an increase of annual expenditure of some \$2,500 a year. In the meantime our ordinary income has increased by \$4,300, and is within \$432 of meeting the cost of maintenance this past year. It will thus be seen that the Board has advanced the efficiency of the institution as rapidly as the means at their disposal will admit. As will be seen, our present income from ordinary revenue is \$20,291.44. Our expenditure for maintenance is \$20,733.38.

Corresponding to this extension of our teaching staff, the Senate of the University have endeavored to extend and perfect the curriculum of the degree of B.A., which now affords instruction in the following departments of study:—

The work in the Faculty of Law consists entirely of examinations for the degree of LL.B., and the post-graduate degree of LL.D. Twenty-one students are pursuing this course, and the work is rendered more efficient by the appointment of a salaried Secretary.

In the Faculty of Medicine, the Board of Examiners has been strengthened by embracing representatives of all affiliated schools, as well as of graduates in the general profession, and the reputation of the University is carefully guarded by their painstaking work.

From this summary of the work done, we may hope for a continuance of that moral and financial support, and of that patronage of our University which has been accorded to her in the past; and can assure the Church that no pains will be spared to make the work done as fully worthy of her confidence as our means will permit.

In regard to the moral and religious character of our work, the past four years have been eminently satisfactory. The high Christian tone of the great majority of the students has helped the weak and held in check the very few who might otherwise have wandered, and nothing beyond an occasional word of advice has been necessary to maintain satisfactory discipline. All our social means of grace are maintained in the highest efficiency, and while the spiritual life of all has been helped, not a few have, for the first time, been led to full decision for Christ. Special care has been taken at that critical point when, under the influence of scientific and philosophical studies, the mind passes into a new and higher intellectual life, to guide that life into the theistic conception of the universe as the ultimate truth of all philosophy, as well as the solid foundation of moral and spiritual life, and we know of no instance in which our labor in this behalf has failed.

On the subject of the Federation of Victoria University with the University of Toronto, referred to this Board for executive action by the last General Conference, we have prepared and submit a report in connection with the Advisory Committee appointed by the General Conference. The Rev. Dr. Potts, the Secretary of Education, has also prepared a full report of the progress of his work in securing the necessary funds.

As the General Conference entrusted to the joint body the duty of considering all questions of general policy as to the time and manner of carrying Federation into effect, the work of this Board was limited to the following matters :---

1. To arrange with the Secretary of Education the financial details of his work, and the form of subscriptions.

2. To select a site for the new location of our University in the city of Toronto, and to make necessary arrangements for securing the same.

3. To secure plans and estimates for the necessary buildings.

4. To take the necessary steps to place our University in federation according to the terms of the Federation Act, when advised by the joint body to do so.

5. To let contracts, and proceed to the erection of the necessary

buildings.

At a meeting held on the 16th of September, 1886, the necessary details of the work of the Secretary of Education were arranged. At an adjourned meeting held two days later, committees were appointed on site and building, plans and estimates.

As a result of the work of these committees and of this Board, we

have to report as follows :---

1. An engagement from the Government of Ontario has been secured, guaranteeing us a site situated in the University Park, Toronto, facing the head of St. Mary's Street on the east, and bounded by the extension of Czar Street on the north; about five acres in extent. The terms are as follows: The annual rental while we continue in federation is one dollar. Should we remove from federation, the site is to be retained at a rental to be fixed by arbitration, or may be purchased at a valuation to be fixed by arbitration now, and the valuation to be made at date of our negotiation, viz.: the early part of 1887, and the land to be valued for academic purposes. An arbitration has been held for the purpose of determining this value, but as the arbitrators had not full instructions, their work has not been completed.

After some preliminary attempts at securing plans by competition, the Secretary of the Board visited a number of American Universities which have been recently furnished with modern buildings, and submitted sketches to the Board of a group of buildings, including a main building for lecture-rooms and offices, a residence for sixty to a hundred students, a chapel and a library with provision for seminary work. Wm. G. Storm, Esq., R.C.A., C.E., was appointed architect and submitted plans of the main building and an outline of the residence. Tenders for the main building have been obtained, warranting the Board in saying that it can be completed for about \$135,000. The material is Credit Valley stone, and the building will be in every way creditable to our Church and

modern in all its provisions.

In the month of October, 1868, we were advised by the joint body that in their opinion "the proper steps should be forthwith taken to place Victoria University in federation with the Provincial University as soon as the continuance of our degree-conferring power could be secured till the date of removal to Toronto." We were further advised to let contracts and proceed with the erection of the buildings on the first of May following, if \$100,000 in cash could be secured from the subscription list.

After considerable deliberation on the first point as to what body could constitutionally give the required notice, it was decided to ask the concurrence of the Senate in the required notice. A meeting of the Senate was accordingly convened, and that body declined to concur

On the 2nd day of May, 1890, a meeting of the Board, at which thirty one members were present and answered to their names, was convened to receive further communication from the Secretary of Education and the joint body as to the work

VICTORIA UNIVERSITY.

At this point, before any action was taken by the Board, an injunction from the High Court of Justice restraining the Board from giving notice of Federation, from removing the University from the town of Cobourg, and from the erection of buildings in the city of Toronto, was served upon the Chairman of the Board. This injunction was obtained at the suit of the town of Cobourg, as donors to the College of five acres of land, in the year 1857; of Andrew Hewson, and J. V. Gravely, and Wm. Kerr, as subscribers to the Faraday Hall Fund, and all other funds in connection with, and for the support of, Victoria University; and of Wm. Kerr and Henry Hough, suing on behalf of themselves and all other members of the Senate. The claims of the plaintiffs were fourfold: 1. Alleged contract with the town of Cobourg in 1857. 2. Alleged contracts with the subscribers to Faraday Hall in 1874-5, and other funds of the University. 3. Legal objections, denying the right of the Board to remove from Cobourg. 4. A claim on behalf of the Senate, that the Senate alone has the power to pass upon the question of the surrender of the degree-confering power and the federation of the University with the University of

Upon the service of this injunction, B. M. Britton, Esq., Q.C., was appointed our solicitor for this action, and a committee appointed to confer with him in all necessary matters. C. Moss, Esq., Q.C., was also retained

At a preliminary hearing, before the Honorable the Chief Justice of the Court of Common Pleas, the injunction was continued on the ground that the Senate should concur until the case could be tried on the other three grounds. Immediately on this decision, a meeting of the Senate was called in the city of Toronto, and the assent of the Senate to Federation obtained, though fifteen members protested against the legality of the meeting. On laying this action of the Senate before the Court, with a view to dissolution of the injunction, our application was refused, on the ground that a meeting of the Senate in the city of Toronto was illegal.

The final hearing of the case was commenced at the Fall Assizes in the town of Cobourg, November 8th, 1889, and continued and completed at Osgoode Hall on the 12th of that month, before the Honorable Justice McMahon, of the Court of Common Pleas. The case was afterwards argued; judgment was delivered on the 9th of August last, dissolving the injunction on the three first issues, subject "to the rights of the plaintiffs, the town of Cobourg, to damages by way of compensation for the five acres of land deeded to the College, and also to the rights of the other plaintiffs and those on whose behalf they sue-subscribers to the Faraday Hall Fund-to a refund of the amount subscribed and paid thereto." The costs of the action on these two points were awarded against the

On behalf of the Senate, the injunction is continued "until a proper meeting has been called, and a resolution has been passed based upon a proper vote assenting to the scheme of Federation.'

The former part of this judgment, based upon a most able review of the whole case, fully sustains the right of the action of the last General Conference which, in its estimates, had provided for exactly what this judgment requires.

The facts which we have above narrated have prevented our reporting to the Conference the full consummation of the work committed to us at the last General Conference. We have only been able to remove a most formidable preliminary obstacle, and with the aid of the able Secretary of Education to secure a large part of the necessary funds.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF MOUNT ALLISON COLLEGE.

The Board of the University of Mount Allison College beg leave to present the following Quadrennial Report. The calendars for the past four years show an increase in the number of students, the aggregate of which for the several branches of the Institution are given below:—

At the University proper, the average attendance during the four years was seventy-five, an increase of eighteen on the previous Quadrennium. The enrolment for 1889-90 was ninety-eight. The total number of graduates to present date is as follows:—

Of these, forty-three graduated during the Quadrennium under review, an increase of twenty-one as compared with the number graduated during the preceding four years.

Careful attention has been given during the Quadrennium to a revision of the Arts Curriculum, so as to adapt it more perfectly to the changed demands of the times as recognized by the older universities in Europe and America. Our Faculty of Arts now numbers eight well qualified Professors, an increase of two since our last report.

With great pleasure your Board calls attention to the handsome gift of \$7,000 to his Alma Mater by the Rev. Ralph Brecken, M.A. Of this sum, \$1,000 have been expended for the enlargement of our library, which is now one of the best college libraries in the Maritime Provinces; \$1,000 have been appropriated for the purchase of additional apparatus in the department of Physical Science; and the remaining \$5,000 constitutes a foundation for scholarships, for the aid, under judicious regulations, of students needing financial assistance. This timely gift, added to former bequests for similar purposes, enables us to assist worthy students to the amount of about \$600 annually.

The Rev. C. Stewart, D.D., Dean of the Faculty of Theology, whose religious oversight of the spiritual interests of the students, and whose indefatigable labors in connection with all that pertains to the welfare of the Institution deserve our warmest recognition, makes the following report:—

THEOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT.

The work of the Theological Department of the University during the past four years has been prosecuted with hope, and with some considerable degree of success. The annual attendance of probationers from the

three Maritime Conferences has been higher than before; and this, together with the presence of several young men who have been taking the undergraduate course, and others as special students, has raised the number of those preparing for the work of the Christian ministry to an average of twenty-five per annum.

In Systematic Theology the text-book has been Pope's Outlines, but special care has been given to a large discussion in the class-room of correlated views of Christian Doctrine. A course of lectures on Biblical Introduction has also been given. Classes have been at work on Church Polity and the Discipline of the Methodist Church, on Homiletics and on Pastoral Work. The students have likewise been enabled to take advantage, as they were prepared for it, of class-work in Hebrew and in the Greek of the New Testament, in Mental and Moral Science, and in the Christian Evidences.

Ten young men have been engaged on the preliminary course of study, and six have been reading in the course for the degree of Bachelor of Divinity.

All the young men have added practical work to their studies. They have preached in Sackville and surrounding circuits, and have conducted open-air and other evangelistic services. A spirit of earnest missionary purpose has been cherished among them, and this has been fostered by the fact that from time to time some of their number have gone into the regions of heathenism to proclaim the unsearchable riches of Christ. Three graduates of this University are now laboring in Japan, two have recently gone to Singapore, and one is engaged in educational work in South America.

The increasing demand for a thoroughly consecrated and wellinstructed ministry makes it imperative upon us to provide the best possible training for our candidates and probationers; and while a growing interest in our work is observable in our churches, it is nevertheless greatly to be desired that means may soon be realized to enlarge and strengthen this department of our work. A great opportunity awaits wise-hearted and liberal benefactors.

The Rev. B. C. Borden, M.A., Principal of the Ladies' College, presents the following report of that important branch of our institutions :--

MOUNT ALLISON LADIES' COLLEGE.

This institution, in entering upon the thirty-seventh year of its history, does so with prospects brighter and more encouraging than ever before. The large expenditures of the past four years have secured equipments and conveniences which, it is hoped, will enable the institution to provide with comfort for its increasing attendance.

During the Quadrennium a part of the mansard story has been finished and furnished; spring-water, leading to taps and bath-rooms, has been introduced into the building at a cost of about \$1,000; the students' rooms have been renovated and refurnished throughout; the heating apparatus has been in part renewed; the old pianos have been mostly replaced by new ones, an instrument has been placed in the building for pipe organ practice, and a new wing and outbuildings have been erected at a cost of \$3,300; thus making a total expenditure for repairs and improvements, including investments, of about \$14,000.

Three teachers have been added to the staff, thus increasing the amount of yearly expenditure for salaries by about \$1,600.

The attendance has been as follows: 1886-7, 140; 1887-8, 144; 1888-9, 141; 1889-90, 160; thus making an advance of thirty-three over the average attendance of the previous Quadrennium.

NEW CONSERVATORY OF MUSIC.

This increase in attendance has necessitated the election of an additional building for the use of the musical department. Measures have been taken for the erection of a Musical Conservatory, which shall furnish on the ground floor a large assembly room and gymnasium, and on the second and third flats thirty-two rooms for teachers and piano practice. This addition will involve an expenditure of about \$15,000. Of this amount, however, about \$10,000 have already been subscribed. The contract calls for the completion of the building by the 20th of December, 1890, thus securing to the school the enjoyment of the increased facilities it will afford for the second term of the current yerr.

MOUNT ALLISON ACADEMY.

The Academy is designed as a preparatory school for the University, and to give young men and boys a thorough business training. It is the oldest branch of the Mount Allison institutions, having been opened in 1843. Owing to the resignation of its late Principal, the staff of instruction has been recently reorganized, and there is the fullest ground of confidence that the excellent reputation which the Academy has won in the past will be not only retained, but that its prestige will be largely augmented. The total number of students in attendance upon Academy classes during the past year was ninety-one.

It is the sorrowful task of the Board to refer to the great loss sustained by our Church and our Educational Institutions in the death, since last General Conference, of two of its most prominent and devoted members-George H. Starr, Esq., of Halifax, and the Rev. Humphrey Pickard, D.D., first Principal of the Mount Allison Institutions. The memory of Mr. Starr will ever be cherished by the Methodists of the Maritime Provinces, as one of the most enlightened and generous contributors to all the enterprises of the Church, as well as to our educational

The death of Dr. Pickard must be regarded as an epoch in the history of Mount Allison. Appointed nearly fifty years ago to the Principalship of the Academy, at that time recently founded by Charles F. Allison, Esq., Dr. Pickard gave the energies of his youth and manhood and the wisdom of his more advanced years to building upon the foundation so wisely a d generously laid, a structure that would stand the tests of time. Under his fostering care the work grew and expanded until the foundations were laid of all the branches of the institution as they exist to-day. For more than a quarter of a century his was the controlling mind in the educational policy of our Church in the Maritime Provinces, and down to the close of his busy life he manifested an undying interest in its prosperity. It is to be hoped that a permanent memorial of his life and labors may be established in connection with the institutions whose interests he labored so earnestly and effectively to promote.

Before the meeting of the next General Conference the Mount Allison Institutions will have passed the fiftieth year of their history. Their record has been one unbroken progress, and of vast influence upon the social, moral and religious welfare of the country. At least 5,000 students have received their education in whole or in part at Mount Allison, and many of these are now filling the highest positions of usefulness and honorable influence in this and other lands. More than 200 Mount Allison students are engaged in the sacred work of the ministry. Our Ladies' College—the first founded of its class in the Dominion—has helped to train and educate nearly 2,000 young ladies to strengthen, purify and adorn the homes of our country. Such a record calls forth our gratitude to God, and demands recognition from the Methodism of the Dominion of the claims which the Mount Allison Institutions make for the continued sympathy and support of all who believe in the duty of the Church to carry on educational work under Christian influences. It is confidently expected that in connection with the celebration of the jubilee of the Mount Allison Institutions, in 1892-3, a successful effort shall be made not only to remove all debts, but to erect a new college residence, now greatly needed on account of the increased attendance of students; and to add to our Endowment Fund, so as to provide for the growing necessities and the healthy expansion of our work.

In relation to the future of the University of Mount Allison, your Board has watched with interest, not unmingled with anxiety, the agitation which has continued in the Western Provinces for several years on the subject of College Federation. Some alarm has been felt lest the results of this movement should injuriously affect the educational interests of our Church in the East. The Board desires to adhere to the policy laid down as the Basis of Union that our University and educational interests shall continue to be under the fostering care of the Church, and respectfully but urgently ask that, whatever action may be decided upon by the General Conference in relation to other educational institutions, nothing may be done, or left undone, by which the independence of the Mount Allison University shall be compromised; or through which the bond of fraternal sympathy which has up to the present hour bound us in closest union to the Methodism of the Dominion, shall in the slightest degree be

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF THE WESLEYAN THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE, MONTREAL.

To the General Conference of the Methodist Church:-

The Governors of the Wesleyan Theological College beg leave to report as follows:—

This Institution has reached, during the past Quadrennium, the highest point of success in its history, and a degree of prosperity beyond the expectation of its warmest friends.

As recommended four years ago, and approved by the General Conference, there has been a very important enlargement of the work of the Institution much beyond the meagre limits ordinarily pursued by probationers at college. A curriculum has been framed for a Licentiates' Course of three years, one half of which is taken from the University curriculum in Arts, and the remainder covers a very full course in Dogmatics, Apologetics, Hebrew, Greek, Latin and History. For many students, it has been pronounced by representative educationists as equal to a pass course in Arts, and by all its practical value is most highly commended. Compulsory attendance during the three years of this course is one of its special features, which secures thoroughness of work, and so tends to meet the demand of the Church for a superior course of training for probationers for our ministry.

In harmony with the powers given by Act of Parliament, the Senate of the Institution has also framed a curriculum for the degree of B.D., which, on comparison with similar curriculums of other theological seminaries in Canada, is found equal to any in extent and in practical value. Two students have already honorably completed this course, and quite a

number more are now pursuing it.

In view of this material enlargement of our educational work, the Board has found it necessary to increase the staff of the Institution. In addition to Rev. Principal Douglas, D.D., LL.D., Professor of Dogmatics and Homiletics, and Rev. W. I. Shaw, LL.D., Professor of Greek and History, the Institution has been so fortunate as to secure the services of the Rev. J. C. Antliff, M.A. (Edin.), D.D., as Professor of Apologetics and Hebrew, and of Rev. W. Howitt, B.A., B.D., as Professor of Latin and English. There are also engaged very competent lecturers in Elocution and in Vocal Music.

The growing influence and the very attractive advantages of the College are securing a rapidly increasing attendance. The number of students last year was forty-two, and this year sixty-two have applied for admission. The hope is entertained that to meet the growing demand for accommodation new buildings will ere long be erected on the very valuable and

large vacant ground owned by the College.

The finances of the Institution are in a comparatively satisfactory condition, and are free from debt, through the policy of rigid economy with which the administration is conducted. It is felt that to reward such a policy instead of offering a premium for increase of debt, as well as in view of the rapid growth and very great importance of the work done, the Institution has a just claim upon the Church for increased aid from the Educational Fund.

REPORT OF ALBERT COLLEGE.

The Quadrennium has been, under the blessing of God, one of prosperity in the history of this institution. The work has been prosecuted under financial embarrassment, and yet with a good degree of success. The average attendance has been about 170. During the college year just closed, 1889-90, 173 students were in attendance. It will be seen by reference to the Post-office address of the students, as shown in the annual announcement, that the College depends to a very small extent upon local patronage for support, but meets a want in the Methodist Church and in the country not provided for by any other institution.

Students have been in attendance from British Columbia, Manitoba, Michigan, New York and Vermont, in addition to Ontario and Quebec.

A very large number of candidates have been prepared for Junior and Senior Matriculation in Arts. Last year there were twenty-three in all: nine Senior and fourteen Junior. This number is under, rather than above, the yearly average during the Quadrennium. Already during the present year thirty-four students have enrolled for this work-twenty-six Junior and eight Senior.

In the departmental examinations for Second and Third-Class Teachers' Certificates, the success attained has been in a high degree satisfactory. In July last, out of six candidates for Second-Class, five were successful. It will thus be seen that Albert is doing a work unsurpassed, if equalled, by the most largely attended and best equipped Collegiate Institute in Ontario. A prominent feature of the College work is the preparation of candidates for the Conference Preliminary examination. Some six years ago, the first class, consisting of four persons, was prepared, and since that time the number in attendance has steadily increased. Last year there were twenty-seven in preparation for this examination, representing nearly every Conference, from British Columbia to Montreal. A number of these students are now in preparation for Matriculation in Arts.

The College also provides full diploma courses in Music, Fine Arts, Commercial Science and Elocution. These departments are well equipped, and have been largely patronized.

The College has been greatly blessed with a large number of earnest, Christian, young men, who have exerted a marked influence for good upon the religious life of the institution. A thoroughly organized Y. M. C. A. is maintained by the students. This association holds regular and special religious services, and each year they have been signally owned of God in the conversion of large numbers of young men. When it is remembered that the attendance changes largely from year to year, it will readily be seen that the institution exerts a widely extended influence for good upon

the young men of this country. The students are fully alive to the importance of Christian missions. The first Missionary Society at the College was organized among the young ladies in attendance by Mrs. Dr. Carman. It was soon followed by a similar society among the young men. Under the influence of Mr. Foreman and others, what is known as the "Volunteer Band" has been organized, consisting of those who volunteer for service in foreign mission work, should their way be opened. Under the direction of this band a Missionary Convention was held last year in the Bridge Street Methodist Church, at which Principal Grant, Mr. Kono and Mr. Livingstone gave addresses. It is intended to hold this convention annually. The students are now actively engaged in raising funds to send Mr. F. J. Livingstone as a missionary to Africa. Some \$400 have already been secured for that purpose.

The College buildings were enlarged and improved two years ago, at a cost of \$7,000. A mansard roof was added, giving increased accommodation, and the building was heated throughout by steam. There is now great need of still further enlargement. The College has been self-sustaining during each year of the Quadrennium. This has been accomplished, however, by the most rigid economy and by great self-sacrifice on

the part of teachers.

The general financial statement will be presented by E. D. O'Flynn, Esq., Bursar of the College. It will be seen by his report that the College has reached a financial crisis in its history. The Quadrennium has fully demonstrated the value of Albert to the Methodist Church; it has also clearly shown that the receipts from tuition and fees of students must be supplemented in some way, or else the College cannot be successfully maintained.

fully present its report :-

The Quadrennium just closed has been one of steady work and marked progress. The course of study has been considerably widened in several directions. A thorough English education is our first object. That has been made to include, in addition to the elementary branches, English Literature, History, Mathematics, through Plane and Spherical Trigonometry, Mental and Moral Science, Political Science, Logic, Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Physiology, Zoology, etc.; in a word, our course of study, as actually carried out every year, embraces all the English subjects embraced in university curriculums. We have reserved for special mention in this connection, the fact that the English Bible receives due prominence. The first lecture of the Principal, every day of the College year, being on that subject.

In languages, we have a four years' course in Latin, French and German; instruction in modern languages being always given by teachers who converse fluently in those languages. For pupils who look to self-

support, we have shorthand, type-writing, book-keeping, etc.

The Conservatory of Music is very complete, manned by professors from the best conservatories of Europe.

The Art Department is conducted by one of the best Art teachers in the country, and every Art pupil is under his personal instruction.

The College has entered on its thirtieth year. During its career it has registered several thousands of the daughters of our people among its pupils. It has graduated about three hundred young ladies in the regular College course.

As the Conference is not interested in our financial status, we present no financial report. The College has stood by its original compact with the Methodist Church. It has given to the Church all the advantages of a Church institution, whilst relieving the Church completely of financial responsibility for its management, and has never received one cent of assistance, directly or indirectly.

The Conference appoints its Governor and Principal, also part of the

Board of Directors.

The College was never so completely equipped as now, and we would earnestly invite the Conference to an examination of the work done in its The higher education of women under Christian influences is here fully realized. College life is a Christian Society, with its prayer-meetings, class-meetings, Bible instruction, etc., while every pupil is required to attend her own Church or place of worship.

As, by our Charter, the General Conference appoints the Governor and Principal, we would respectfully request that the Rev. Dr. Burns be

continued at the head of the Institution.

During the Quadrennium the Board has lost by death three of its most valued members—three of the best known men in our Church—the Rev. Dr. Nelles, the Rev. Dr. S. J. Hunter, and the Rev. Dr. Rose. Dr. Nelles and Dr. Rose, having been identified with the College from its beginning.

ALMA COLLEGE.

REPORT AND MEMORIAL TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE.

The Board of Management and Trust of Alma College beg leave to present to the General Conference the following report:—

- 1. The College is entering upon the tenth year of its work with good prospects that the enrolment of students last year, the largest in the history of the school, will be considerably exceeded the present year, and with the promise for excellence of scholarship and increasing influence for good never so cheering.
- 2. The Board has endeavored faithfully to promote the objects aimed at in the founding and establishing of this seat of learning, namely: To provide an institution for the higher education of young women, where should be combined the best influences of home, church and school; where should be fostered a fervent Christian piety, a generous ambition for breadth and thoroughness of culture, and a high appreciation of the supreme place of the home in the well-being of the commonwealth; where the best educational advantages should be available to those of limited means as well as to those in affluent circumstances, and where the daughters of Protestants should find such excellence of facilities for procuring refined accomplishments in a thorough and practical education that no temptation might remain for patronizing convent schools. The fact that increasing numbers of Protestant girls from convent schools are in attendance at Alma College each succeeding year is encouraging proof of the success of the work in this particular.
- 3. The new building, contemplated in the report of 1886, was publicly opened 16th November, 1888, by the Honorable the Minister of Education for Ontario, and named "McLachlin Hall," after the former Secretary of the Board, the late Archibald McLachlin, as a recognition of the great and invaluable services rendered by him to the College. The McLachlin Hall greatly increases the facilities and efficiency of the school, providing, as it does, dormitory accommodation for seventy additional students, five class rooms, six piano rooms, a concert hall, capable of seating five hundred, and an art studio, said by competent judges to be one of the best lighted and equipped studios on the continent. These enlarged buildings present an imposing pile of commanding structures, harmonious, chaste and beautiful in all their lines and proportions, and will compare advantageously with any school structures in the Province for external beauty and internal convenience and comfort, while at the same time there is ample opportunity for continued growth and extension as future demands may require.

To the Members of the General Conference of the Methodist Church in Conference assembled.

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN:--

We, the members of the Board of Management and Trust of Alma College, beg leave to memorialize the General Conference of the Methodist Church as follows :--

1. Alma College, founded by the former Methodist Episcopal Church of Canada for the higher education of young women under religious auspices, was chartered by Act of Provincial Legislature in 1877, and opened for the reception of students October 13th, 1881. It was thus at the outset connexional in its character, and came into the Union holding the same relation to the Church that Victoria and Albert occupy. Its entire Board of Management is appointed by the General Conference with the exception of one representative appointed by each Annual Conference.

2. Starting with an attendance of forty pupils, the school rapidly grew from year to year, and in 1885 the Board of Management found it impossible to meet the demand for rooms, and McLachlin Hall was planned and completed for school purposes in 1888, at a cost of \$21,000, including buildings, furnishing, steam laundry and other improvements. Last year both buildings were filled, the enrolment reaching 214 students, with every prospect of a considerable increase this year, in which case the present buildings will be insufficient for the accommodation of students.

3. The aim of the founders, to furnish a thorough and practical education at the lowest possible cost, and thus extend the privileges of the school as widely as possible, has been kept steadily in view, and the policy of the management has been to combine in Alma College the benefits and influences of the Christian home, the thorough school and the evangelical Church, and offer its advantages at such rates as would remove all just excuse for Protestant patronage of convent schools.

We rejoice to know that every year since its opening Protestant pupils from convent schools have been among its students, and many scores have been in attendance who would otherwise have received their training under Roman Catholic auspices.

4. The institution came into the Union with a gross debt of nearly \$30,000, partially provided for in notes and subscriptions, a large percentage of which has not been and can not be collected. The union of the Methodist Churches, while destined to prove an ultimate advantage to the school in affording a larger constituency for its maintenance, was for several years indirectly a source of loss in a variety of ways. It chilled the ardor and enthusiasm of many donors and patrons who before the Union, under the promptings of church loyalty and of the pressing need of the school, were ready to labor and sacrifice therefor.

It removed the constituency in part or in whole from which ministers who had pledged large sums of money to Alma College expected to collect the amount of their subscriptions, and thus left many unable to pay the sums pledged.

It brought about a surplus of ministers, and, as a result, a large exodus of ministerial subscribers to the United States, from which the College suffered several thousand dollars in loss.

Whilst the immediate effect of the union was a loss of interest and zeal on the part of its former friends and a loss of financial support through its subscribers, these losses were not counterbalanced in any degree, for several years at least, by increased attendance. For three years subsequent to the Union the receipts and profits were less than before the Union.

Since the Union there has been expended upon McLachlin Hall, steam laundry, furnishings, etc., \$30,000. The debt at present upon the property is over \$49,000, and the available notes and subscriptions not above \$9,000, leaving a debt unprovided for of over \$40,000.

5. With the exception of \$12,000 subscription to the McLachlin Hall, nearly half of which was contributed by citizens of St. Thomas, the present Methodist Church has contributed nothing to Alma College. The investments in lands, buildings, furnishings and various outlays in connection therewith will approach \$100,000. Alma receives no aid from the Educational Fund, and has no endowment. It is self-supporting in the sense that its income exceeds its school expenditure. It may even be expected in addition to meeting its current expenses to pay the interest in part upon its debt. All sums for improvement of the property or payment of its debt must therefore, under present conditions, be derived from subscriptions and donations.

This, the Board of Management feel, is a just claim upon the Church, and the general public, and one that from the present conditions of the institution, cannot be delayed with safety to the school. It must be apparent to all that so large a liability menaces the very existence of the school, and must retard that growth and progress which should ever

characterize a prosperous institution.

6. The growing numbers and fame of the institution, the practical and solid character of its instruction, the large number of its students now proving the value of its educational training as a means of self support, the list of its graduates employed in schools and colleges, all speak encouragingly of the work already accomplished, and of its future prospects, and commend it to the churches as well worthy of support.

7. Among the pressing needs of the school at present we find the

following :-

(a) The erection and equipment of a Gymnasium for the physical

training of the students.

(b) The erection of an elevator to avoid the fatigue of stair climbing, and thus render the upper stories of the building equally available and serviceable to all.

(c) The introduction of electric lighting, which, in addition to the advantage of better light, and more agreeable and wholesome management, would prove a large annual saving in outlay.

(d) The better equipment of the Laboratory and Library.

These improvements would cost probably \$6,000, and, if once the debt were paid, might be provided for by profits of the school. The improvements might, it is true, be delayed—to the disadvantage of the school. The payment of the debt is imperative, and should engage the best consideration of the Conference.

REPORT OF THE ONTARIO LADIES' COLLEGE, WHITBY.

The Directors of the Ontario Ladies' College, Whitby, are pleased to be able to report continued and increasing prosperity. During the past Quadrennium the average daily attendance of boarders has been almost one hundred, ranging from ninety to one hundred and five; with an enrolment of boarders, each year, of about one hundred and thirty, and a total average enrolment of over one hundred and sixty. Our College buildings and grounds have been kept in such splendid condition that, to-day, they are more valuable than when first purchased for college purposes. Our furnishings and equipments have been steadily improved, our staff of teachers increased, and our educational work correspondingly extended. Young ladies desirous of preparing for first-class, second-class or third-class teachers' certificates, can find classes at present established in our College for these courses of study, as well as for the higher College and University examinations. We have four complete graduation courses in literary subjects; three in Instrumental Music, embracing piano, pipeorgan and violin; one in Vocal Music, and one in Fine Art. We have placed before us a high ideal in the matter of home comforts and literary and social advantages for our pupils, and have honestly endeavored to work up to our ideal.

Our close proximity to Toronto and our arrangement with the rail-way authorities for special trains to and from the city, afford our pupils the concert and lecture advantages of a large centre; whilst our beautiful location outside the city gives them the quiet and freedom from distraction so conducive to thorough scholastic attainment, as well as the extensive lawns and pleasure grounds so conducive to happiness and health.

During the Quadrennium the southern wing has been connected with the detached residence, thus providing additional accommodation, whilst a new Gymnasium has been erected and equipped, thereby providing for our pupils facilities for pleasant, healthful exercise, unsurpassed, if equalled, in Canada.

During the past few days we have enrolled the largest number of new pupils ever heretofore enrolled at the beginning of a Collegiate year. These pupils have come from as far east as New Brunswick, as far west as British Columbia, and as far south as Kansas.

Pursuant to our Act of Incorporation we desire the Conference to appoint seven ministers to our College Board, and would respectfully suggest the names of the following:—Rev. E. H. Dewart, D.D.; Rev. John Potts, D.D.; Rev. E. A. Stafford, D.D.; Rev. John Shaw, D.D.; Rev. J. F. German, M.A.; Rev. D. C. McDowell; Rev. George Leech.

REPORT OF WESLEY COLLEGE.

The Board of Directors of Wesley College, in this their first report to the General Conference, beg leave to submit as follows:—

More than fifteen years since, there was in operation in the city of Winnipeg a training-school, under the control and patronage of the Methodist Church of Canada. This school became incorporated as Wesley College, by Act of the Local Legislature, in February, 1877. For various reasons, however, work in connection with this institution was shortly after suspended. Yet the educational interests of the Methodist Church in this Province were not thus to die. In the year 1886, active measures were again undertaken, with a view to placing the College on a firm foundation. To further this end, the Act of Incorporation was amended in May, 1886, in such a way as to more clearly define the powers of the College and at the same time making such changes in the Board of Directors as time had rendered necessary.

This Board, it may here be added, is the one which still has the management of the College in its hands. The term of office of eighteen members, being one-half of the total number of members of the Board as it is at present constituted, has now expired, and it will be your duty to make what other appointments may seem to you best.

In August, 1888, the Rev. J. W. Sparling, M.A., B.D., was appointed Principal, and steps were at once taken to secure affiliation with the University of Manitoba, in order that Wesley College might be placed on a footing similar to that of the other denominational colleges of the Province, and thereby become entitled to participate in all the advantages and privileges of the University. This affiliation was effected before the close of the year, and work in all departments of the Arts Course, as required by University candidates proceeding to the B.A. degree, was at once entered upon. With the beginning of the second year's work, a department of Theology was also established, so that at the present time we are covering not only the whole of the Arts Course of the University, but also training young men who are candidates for the Methodist ministry in the course of study required by the Church.

The present staff of instructors, and the division of their work, is as follows:—

Rev. J. W. Sparling, M.A., D.D., Principal, Professor of Mental and Moral Philosophy and Lecturer on Pastoral Theology, Church History, etc. R. R. Cochrane, B A., Professor of Pure and Applied Mathematics, and

Lecturer on English Language and Literature.
G. J. Laird, B.A., Ph.D., Professor of Chemistry and Experimental

Physics and Lecturer on German.
Rev. A. Stewart, B.D., Professor of Systematic Theology, Old Testament Exegesis and Hebrew, and Lecturer on English and History.

T. J. McCrossan, B.A., Tutor in Classics. Ed. Bourgeois, LL.B., Tutor in French.

The last year's work has in every way been highly successful and satisfactory. Though this is but the second year of our work, the registered attendance is now thirty-five, as contrasted with but eight for 1888-9. Of these, five were appointed to attend College by the Manitoba and North-West Conference, of whom four have been pursuing the Arts course. In

all, eight students took the course in Theology, and the remainder were distributed over the Arts work of the University.

In competition with students from the other affiliated Colleges in the late University examinations, we can point with gratification to the fact that our students acquitted themselves very creditably, several of them taking leading positions on the class lists, and carrying off University scholarships. We had also this year the satisfaction of sending up our two first candidates for graduation, one of whom was a young lady.

Hitherto, lack of suitable accommodation has been a serious drawback. This difficulty has now, however, we are pleased to state, been partially overcome, a building fairly well adapted to college purposes, and in a desirable locality having been secured by the Board. It is not, indeed, intended that this shall be a permanent arrangement, the procuring of a home of our own is a matter of vital importance to our work, and must not be lost sight of. Already subscriptions to the amount of over \$14,000 to the building fund have been secured. No definite steps, however, will be taken until this fund shall have amounted to at least \$30,000.

The University of Manitoba has hitherto been merely an examining and degree-conferring body, after the model of the University of London. In November last, the Council of the University "formulated a scheme looking to the establishment of a teaching staff in connection therewith. By this it was proposed that the teaching of a limited portion of the higher Arts Course, now altogether in the hands of the various Colleges, shall be assumed by the University. Your Board is of the opinion that such arrangement would be manifestly in the interests of higher education throughout the Province, as well as of Wesley College, relieving it of a certain portion of its annual expenditure, and thus enabling it to do better work in the other departments not to be assumed by the University, and still to retain all the efficiency and advantages of a Methodist Arts and Theological College."

This scheme has been laid before the Local Government, and is at present under consideration. Just what action, if any, the Government will take in this matter, is at present very uncertain. In the meantime, however, in order to cope more efficiently with the course of study in the department of Natural Science, which has yearly been becoming more and more of a burden to the Denominational Colleges, combined action is being undertaken by St. John's (Episcopal), Manitoba (Presbyterian), and our own College. This, we believe, is a step in the right direction.

As to the financial condition of the College, the Bursar's report, hereto appended, will advise you; a few observations in a general way may, however, be permitted. You are, of course, aware that no endowment has been secured, and that we have not yet been able to rank on the Educational Fund as a regular claimant. Under the circumstances there has been no alternative, up to the present, but to rely upon the liberality of our people to supply the necessary funds for the establishment, equipment and maintenance of this most invaluable auxiliary to the operations of our Church. Had the devotion of our people to the cause of higher education been less conspicuous, had their loyalty to the Church been less enthusiastic, or had their liberality been less munificent, Wesley College could not have achieved the success that has thus far marked her course. action, and buoyed with the assurance that assistance would be rendered at the earliest possible date, the membership of the Manitoba and North-West Conference, few in numbers and of limited means though it be, readily assumed the task which they had most successfully accomplished. It will be readily understood that the somewhat extraordinary circumstances of the case excited and elicited a measure of liberality in this direction that could hardly be expected to continue without detriment to other important interests of the Church.

It has been a ground for objection more or less among our people, that while contributions to the Educational Fund have been asked and given; yet Wesley College has been unable regularly to participate therein. This objection, we feel assured, will presently be removed, and much needed assistance will be rendered out of the regular funds of the Church. Our great concern is that the measure of such assistance may be equal to our present and prospective needs. To remind you that the efficiency of the work must be directly relative to funds at our disposal is unnecessary.

We are just making a beginning. We stand in need of nearly all requisites deemed essential for the equipment of a college. To bring these to the status that may enable Wesley to compete successfully with the sister colleges in Winnipeg, will exhaust all the contributions and grants she is likely to receive from every source for some years to come. We refuse to think that there will be the slightest hesitation in according us the fullest possible assistance to enable us to accomplish our purpose of securing to Wesley College a position second to none in this country of magnificent distances and immeasurable possibilities.

The full extent of the work to be performed by this new institution may not appear at the first glance. It must be remembered that the Manitoba and North-West Conference is, and must, in the natural order of events, continue to be a missionary Conference. As a result of this, Wesley College will, as she has been doing, render valuable services to one of the most important departments of our Church work. You may not be unaware that the Colleges with which Wesley must compete, on account of their missionary character, are regularly and largely assisted from outside sources. The reasons for such grants seem to be based on the most obvious principles of justice and equity. So long as Wesley College continues to render to the missionary interests of our Church the valuable and important services she has been doing, it seems proper that the Society should recognize them in making such grants as may be deemed proper and needful.

The nucleus of a library and museum has already been created. Generous and unexpected contributions from various sources have come to us, among which we may mention, in particular, a donation of over 600 volumes, chiefly of Theological works, from the Rev. Geo. Young, D.D.; also of valuable geological reports from Capt. Young, of Winnipeg, a cabinet of minerals from A. Bowerman, Esq., M.A.; also a similar donation from Rev. Jas. McClung. It is hoped that the mention of these generous acts may induce others to make similar contributions.

Inquiries have been made by several of our ministers in reference to the adoption of a B.D. course in connection with our College. Our present position will be fully understood from the following sections of the University Act:—

"XXXIII. Incorporated colleges which are, at the time of the passing of this Act, affiliated to the university, or which may hereafter become affiliated, shall, with the sanction of the governing bodies of the denominations to which they belong, have the power of forming a separate faculty in theology for the examination in, and granting of, the degrees of bachelor of divinity and doctor of divinity; provided, that for the degree of bachelor of divinity, all candidates, not graduates of this or any other university, entering any such college, after the passing of this Act, shall be examined by the university in Greek, Latin and Mathematics, unless they have passed in those subjects in the previous examination; and such graduates shall have in the university the same rights and privileges as other graduates. 43 V., c. 31, s. 5.

"XXXIV. It shall be the duty of the presidents of the said faculties in theology to report respectively, from time to time, to the Chancellor of the University, upon the organization of such respective faculties, the granting of the degrees, and such other matters as the Chancellor of the University and the presidents of such faculties may have agreed to, for the mutual benefit of the said university and faculties. 40 V., c. 11,

In order to enable us to prepare candidates for and to grant this degree, should occasion demand, we, therefore, respectfully request your Conference to pass the necessary legislation conferring upon us this

REPORT OF THE NEWFOUNDLAND METHODIST COLLEGE ST. JOHN'S.

During the Quadrennium just closed this Institution has taken a position in equipment and influence far ahead of what has hitherto been By a supreme effort of practical faith on the part of the friends of Methodist education in the colony a splendid building has been erected, embracing not only an adequate array of class-rooms, laboratories and gymnasia for two separate male and female departments, but a beautiful public hall, seated for over six hundred people, and recently furnished, through the munificent and thoughtful bequest of the late Hon. Charles R. Ayre, with a superb concert hall pipe-organ, costing between three and four thousand dollars. In addition to the erection of this College building proper, the building formerly used for teaching purposes has been thoroughly refitted and altered as a boarding department, capable of affording residence for nearly one hundred pupils, and supplying a want long felt. At the commencement of the Collegiate year, in the autumn of 1888, the Rev. G. P. Story, who had been set apart at the Conference of the preceding year to preside over the boarding department of the Institution as guardian and chaplain, entered upon his duties, and has discharged them, during the two years which have since elapsed, with a success which has more than fulfilled the hopes of those who projected this new departure. By an arrangement with the Government, all the Methodist pupil-teachers receiving instruction at the Institution for public schools, whose parents do not reside in the city, board in the College Home, and are thus under the immediate oversight of the Chaplain, a very important fact in its bearing upon our public schools. By an arrangement of the Board of Governors, the children of ministers of the Conference receive admission to the College Home at greatly reduced rates, thus affording our hard-worked and ill-paid missionaries an opportunity of securing superior education for their families at a minimum of cost.

The teaching staff of the College consists of the Principal, R. E. Holloway, B.A., (Lond.), F.C.S.; the Vice-Principal, J. West, B.A., (Durham), assisted by one other male teacher in the College Department proper, and by a Lady Principal and two other female teachers in the female branch of that department. There are besides two female teachers in the Primary and Model School Department, making a total of eight teachers.

The total number of pupils in all departments is 328, of which number 80 girls and 90 boys belong to the College Department proper. The number of boarders in the College Home is 32.

The total cost of the buildings of the Institution amounts to \$45,000, of which over \$20,000 remains unpaid. It has cost very strenuous and self-denying efforts on the part of the promoters of the scheme and the friends of education, to carry the project thus far to conclusion; and both the importance of the work itself and the faith and courage of its supporters afford a strong ground of appeal for the sympathy and help of the

The Boarding Department has been, from the beginning, more than self-supporting, its income last year being \$4,090, and its expenditure \$3,760, leaving a credit balance of \$330; but the current account of the Institution generally shows a considerable debit balance for one past year,

owing in a large measure to the terrible scourge of diphtheria, which not only kept away many pupils, but led to the enforced closing of the schools for some weeks, thus entailing a heavy loss of fees. It is estimated that at least \$800 was thus lost to the Institution.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EMBARRASSED TRUSTS.

- 1. Your Committee has had under consideration the Report of the Union Church Relief Fund Committee, and desires to express its satisfaction with the manner in which the Fund has been administered during the Quadrennium, and recommends the adoption of the same and its printing in the Journal.
- 2. That, having carefully considered the memorial of Mr. E. S. Whipple, of the Niagara Conference, asking reimbursement for moneys paid on behalf of the Dundas, late Methodist Episcopal Church, and finding that the financial obligation did not grow out of the Union, it is recommended that the memorial be not entertained.
- 3. The memorial of Mr. John Milne, of the London Conference, touching an obligation assumed in respect of the late Methodist Episcopal Church at Chatham, has been fully considered, and it is recommended that an appropriation of one thousand dollars, in relief of the obligation, be made, on condition that the balance of the debt be otherwise provided for.
- 4. Touching the memorial of the Brockville District Meeting re the Indebtedness of the Trustees and Stockholders of the St. Lawrence Central Camp-Ground, it is recommended that as the relief asked for in the memorial does not come within the scope of the Union Church Relief Fund, no grant be made; nevertheless, we express our profound regret that loyalty to a connexional enterprise should have involved these brothers in financial ruin, and earnestly commend their case to the Christian sympathy and financial aid of the Church at large.
- 5. It is also recommended that in accordance with the intention of the late Union Church Relief Fund, further aid be granted the Trustees of the late Methodist Episcopal Church at Prescott, and that one thousand dollars be appropriated, on condition that the balance of the indebtedness be otherwise provided for.
- 6. Your Committee learn that there are certain obligations connected with Embarrassed Trusts, to meet which appropriations have been made by the Union Church Relief Fund Committee, thereby making the Church responsible for the same; and whereas on some of these obligations very high rates of interest are being paid, therefore be it

Resolved,—That this General Conference authorize the Treasurer to

borrow a further sum of money, not to exceed twenty thousand dollars, and at a rate of interest not exceeding six per cent., to give immediate relief to such cases of extreme embarrassment.

7. That collections on behalf of the Union Church Relief Fund be taken up in all our churches in the month of October of each year.

8. That the collections be immediately forwarded to the Financial Secretaries, and by them promptly remitted to the General Treasurer, and that each Conference appoint a Conference Treasurer to receive from the Financial Secretaries the balances paid at the Annual District Meetings.

9. That recognizing the valuable services, involving much time and travel, so cheerfully rendered without remuneration by the Treasurer, Mr. John N. Lake, this General Conference hereby tenders to him its hearty and sincere thanks for the important work accomplished by him in connection with the Embarrassed Funds.

10. It is further respectfully recommended that the following compose the Committee for the administration of the Union Church Relief Fund during the Quadrennium, viz. :-The Revs. Dr. W. W. Williams, Dr. W. J. Hunter, Richard Whiting, Wm. Kettlewell, J. R. Gundy and W. C. Henderson, M.A., and Messrs. John N. Lake, the Hon. W. E. Sanford, T. Thompson, George A. Cox and Daniel McLean. Also that Mr. John N. Lake be the Treasurer of the Fund.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON GENERAL SUPERINTENDENCY.

Your Committee beg leave to report as follows:-

That in view of the financial position of the General Conference Fund, and in view of the expression of opinion, as shown by the memorials sent to this General Conference, and in view of the competency of one General Superintendent to do the work, as manifested during the last year, we are of the opinion that one General Superintendent will be sufficient for the needs of our work. Therefore we recommend that the office vacated by the death of our late lamented Dr. Williams be not filled.

That the memorial from Uxbridge, referred to your Committee on General Superintendency, recommending "that the General Conference officers be ex-officio members of the General Conference," should be referred to the Committee on Annual Conferences.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON INDIAN AFFAIRS IN THE NORTH-WEST.

Your Committee, to whom was referred the memorial of the Manitoba and North-West Conference on Indian Affairs, having procured and considered all the evidence available, beg leave to report as follows:-

1. That, in view of the remoteness of the work from the Mission Rooms, and the more intimate knowledge of its details and peculiarities which must be possessed by the brethren resident and laboring in the country, the Central Board of Missions might get valuable information from a committee of those brethren; your Committee, therefore, recommend that the General Conference appoint an Advisory Committee for Manitoba and the North-West, whose duty it shall be to keep the Missionary Board informed on all matters pertaining to the establishment of Indian schools and industrial institutions, the opening of new missions and the closing of old ones; and it is recommended that, on all matters relating to the Indian work in that Conference, such Advisory Committee be consulted, so that the Mission Board may be in possession at all times of the fullest information for the carrying on of the work there. It is suggested that this Advisory Committee be composed of the President of the Manitoba and North-West Conference, the Superintendent of Missions in the North-West, the Rev. John McDougall, A. M. Peterson, Esq., and J. A. M. Aikins, Q.C.

2. Your Committee further report that, from the evidence before them, they are convinced that the civilization and Christianization of these Indians can only be accomplished by training their youth in agriculture and the arts of civilized life, and by bringing them in their early years under the operation of careful and continual Christian teaching. This is practicable only where as many as possible of the children are segregated from their people, and removed entirely and for years from their native habits and pursuits. We believe, therefore, that the best service which the Government of this country can render to these Indians

and to the country in that regard, is to establish and maintain for them as many industrial institutions as practicable, and to place these institutions under the control of such of the Christian Churches as will assume

the burden of their management.

3. Your Committee further report that several industrial institutions have been erected in the North-West, which are maintained by the Government, and which are placed under the control of different Christian denominations, but that, up to this time, no such institution has been placed under the management of our Church. They are glad, however, to be able to report that the Indian Department is at the present time engaged in the erection of buildings for the use of the McDougall

Orphanage at Morley.

4. Your Committee further report that, in the session of 1887, the Dominion Parliament appropriated the sum of \$10,000 for the establishment of an industrial institution in the North-West, to be placed under the direction of our Church; that this appropriation having lapsed, they, in the session of 1888-9, appropriated the sum of \$27,000 for a like purpose; that this appropriation having also lapsed, they, at their last session, appropriated the sum of \$25,500 for the same purpose. This last appropriation is now in force, but, if not acted upon, it will likewise lapse on the thirtieth day of June next. Your Committee recommend that it be an instruction from the General Conference to the Mission Board to take immediate steps to arrange for a site, and secure as soon as practicable the erection of the industrial institution, for the establishment of which the \$25,500 has been appropriated.

5. Having regard to the magnitude of the work which the country and the Church have before them, to the early history and extent of our Indian Missions in the North-West, and to the number of such institutions which the Government has been able to place under the management and control of other denominations of Christians, your Committee feel that the Government owes it to the Indians and to our missionary labors among them to erect further institutions beyond what are already contemplated, and to place as many of them under the care of our Church as

they do under the care of any other one denomination.

It is recommended that the requisite legislation be sought in order to amend paragraph 21 of the Model Deed, Appendix IV., Schedule B., Discipline of 1886, by the insertion after the word "church," in the eleventh line thereof, the words "or shall be absent from three successive meetings of the Board, of which due legal notice shall have been given, except for the cause of illness, or for such other reason as shall in the opinion of his co-trustees, expressed by a majority vote of said co-trustees, be deemed a sufficient excuse therefor;" and by the insertion after the word "distance," in the said eleventh line thereof, the words "locality or church," and by the insertion after the word "church," in the fifteenth line thereof, the words "absenting himself."

3. It is recommended that no action be taken upon the memorial of the Official Board of the Centenary Church, Hamilton, asking for more liberal provisions in the Model Deed with reference to the filling of our

pulpits.

4. It is recommended :-

(1) That paragraph 128, section 3, clause b, Discipline, be amended by striking out all the words after the word "law," in the second line thereof.

(2) That paragraph 136, Discipline, be amended by inserting at the close thereof the words, "He shall also hear and determine appeals from the decisions of Chairmen of Districts, within the Conference, on questions of law, notice of such appeal to be given within two weeks after notice of the decision appealed against."

(3) That paragraph 162, clause 7, be amended by adding thereto the words "and to hear and determine appeals from the decision of Superintendents of Circuits, within the District, on questions of law, notice of such appeal to be given within two weeks after notice of the decision

appealed against."

- 5. Your Committee, having duly considered the question referred to them, under the motion of the Rev. T. M. Campbell, with respect to the Guelph Conference, and the facts in connection therewith, in view of the fact that the ultimate decision of the Court of Appeal, finally settling the questions in controversy, was rendered at so late a date as the 3rd inst., and that as yet the Guelph Conference has not had opportunity for action in harmony therewith, while expressing their trust that that Conference will loyally accept and act upon the decision of the Court of Appeal, recommend that in the meantime no further action be taken by the General Conference.
- 6. With regard to the memorial from the Manitoba and North-West Conference, praying for authority to hold a new investigation in the matter of the late Nelson Brown, deceased, your Committee, having carefully examined the record of the various Committees of trial, District Meetings and sessions of the Annual Conferences, which dealt with the matter, together with the reasons advanced in support of the memorial, and the matters claimed to constitute new evidence, upon which the application for a reopening of the case is based, in view of the further fact that the Toronto Conference of the Methodist Church of Canada, which, in 1876, finally determined the case, had before it substantially all the evidence which now appears to be available, therefore is of opinion that there is not sufficient ground for granting the prayer of the memorialists.

7. It is recommended that the General Conference appoint a Commission to take into consideration the question of the titles to our church and parsonage property in Manitoba and the North-West Territories, under the Real Property Acts, commonly known as "Torrens Acts," in force therein, also in Ontario and other Provinces where such Acts are in force, and to ascertain what legislation, if any, it may be expedient to seek in the premises, and to report in case of urgency to the General Conference Special Committee, and otherwise to report to the next General

8. It is recommended that no action be taken in relation to Rev. Dr.

Henderson's motion to expunge paragraph 128 of Discipline.

9. The following substitution is recommended in place of paragraph 128, 3g, Discipline: 128, 3g. "When any of the above appeals is not from the decision of a General Superintendent, it may be heard and determined by the General Superintendents or one of them. If either party gives notice of dissent therefrom, the appeal shall be heard by the full court, otherwise the decision shall be final. The General Superintendents, or Superintendent, instead of hearing the appeal, may remit it at once to the full court. The decision of the latter shall in all cases be final."

10. It is recommended that the Report of the Decisions of the Court

of Appeal be printed in the JOURNAL in its present form.

11. Your Committee have carefully reviewed the rulings of Presidents of Annual Conferences exhibited in the annexed Schedule, and find them to be in harmony with the law of the Church, and recommend that they be printed in the JOURNAL of Conference. (also P. 17)

12. It is also recommended that, with a view to definiteness in the law, the following clause be inserted in the Discipline as sub-section (1) to paragraph 167 thereof: 167 (1). "No candidate for our ministry, and no person employed under a chairman with a view to becoming such candidate, shall be eligible for election as a lay representative to either District Meeting or Annual Conference."

REPORT OF THE GENERAL BOARD OF MISSIONS OF THE METHODIST CHURCH, FOR THE QUADRENNIAL PERIOD ENDING JUNE 30, 1890.

The General Board of Missions, while rendering grateful praise to God for the favor wherewith He has crowned the work of the Society during the past Quadrennium, presents this report with feelings chastened by the sorrow of bereavement. Since last we assembled on an occasion similar to the present, three distinguished members of the Board-Rev. John A. Williams, D.D., General Superintendent, the Honorable Senator Ferrier, and the Honorable Senator Macdonald, Treasurer of the Societyhave been called from labor to reward. Each of these beloved brethren maintained a blameless life-long connection with the Church of their early affection and choice, each one of them faithfully served his generation by the will of God; and each by unreserved consecration, by unswerving devotion to duty, or by abounding liberality in every good cause, has left a memory that will be a priceless heritage to the Church. will it be out of place, in this connection, to commemorate the departure of another, the late Wm. Gooderham, Esq., who, although not a member of the General Board, was always a generous supporter of the Society's work, and in the final distribution of his property, bequeathed a large

We feel assured, that while sympathizing with us in the loss sustained by the removal of these honored brethren, the General Conference will be gratified to learn that the vacancy in the Treasurership, caused by the death of the Hon. John Macdonald, has been filled, pending the action of the General Conference, by the appointment of the Hon. James Cox Aikins to that office.

With this brief but heart-felt reference to those who have passed from among us, the Board respectfully invites the attention of the Conference to the following statements and suggestions respecting the different

departments of the mission work of the Church:-

I.—THE HOME WORK.

The Department of Home Missions has continued to show, from year to year, good results in the extension of the work, the proclamation of the glad tidings to the needy, the conversion of sinners, the upbuilding of believers, and the maintenance of Gospel ordinances in localities where they would be unknown were it not for the help extended by the Missionary Society. The one drawback to the satisfaction of the Board is the fact that the resources of the Society do not keep pace with the actual requirements of the work, and that, in consequence, the stipends of the missionaries have been far below the modest minimum which we have sought to reach. Four years ago attention was called to this matter, and the hope was expressed that by due prudence in the multiplication of missions, the classification of dependent fields, and the institution of a sustentation fund, something would be done to relieve existing pressure, and give promise of brighter days to the toiling and sometimes discouraged missionaries. Although the hope has been realized only to a small extent, partly through the operation of Conference Sustentation Funds, the Board is convinced of the possibility of still further improvement, and would earnestly invite the attention of the Conference to methods whereby this may be accomplished.

With regard to the Domestic or Home work, the power of extension is very properly committed to the Annual Conferences. The general policy embraces two objects--first, to provide Gospel teaching and ordinances wherever the need exists, and which the people are unable to provide for themselves; and secondly, to advance the various missions, as quickly as possible, to the status of self-sustaining circuits. But this policy, so excellent in theory, is greatly hampered in practice. Extension of the work is not always measured by the needs of the people. Sometimes it is the outcome of a spirit of denominational rivalry, whose only justifying plea is that others are doing the same thing; and sometimes it is due to the mere desire of occupying more territory, without waiting to consider its effects upon missionary income, or the just claims of other parts of the field. The evil is further aggravated by a premature division and subdivision of missions, sometimes of independent circuits, without sufficient cause. It is not proposed that the authority of Annual Conferences to establish new Domestic missions shall be interfered with; but as the exercise of the right by all the Annual Conferences, to the extent of only three or four missions each in one year, means a serious pro rata reduction in the stipends of those ministers who are now stationed on Domestic missions, it is evident some general regulation should be adopted

A subject closely connected with the foregoing is the development of self-support in many of the Domestic missions. The amount of missionary money expended upon missions well able to support their own ministers, and upon others able to double or largely increase their contributions, would startle any one who took the trouble to inquire into the facts. And this money virtually comes out of the meagre stipends of men stationed upon purely missionary ground, where sparseness of population or the poverty of the people makes present self-support, or even a near approximation thereto, an utter impossibility. It is believed that a careful classification of all dependent fields, the visitation of those fields by duly appointed deputations, and the establishment of a Sustentation Fund, either for the whole Connexion or in the several Conferences, would greatly promote the spirit of self-support, relieve the Mission Fund of many unreasonable claims, and at the same time raise the general average of stipends on the Domestic missions to something much nearer the recognized minimum than obtains at present.

II .-- THE FOREIGN WORK.

The hitherto bright outlook of the work in Japan has been shadowed by the tragic death of one of our faithful missionaries, the Rev. T. A. Large, B.A., who was killed in his own house by armed burglars on the night of the 4th of April last. During a five years' residence in Tokyo, Bro. Large had endeared himself alike to natives and foreigners by his kindly spirit and courteous demeanor, while by the other missionaries he was regarded as a faithful worker and a trusted friend. His death, under circumstances so painful, is greatly deplored, and we can but trust that He who has commanded the light to shine out of darkness, will overrule this seemingly dark providence to the furtherance of His own cause in Another calamity, though of a very different kind, has befallen the mission, in the destruction by fire of the Central Mission Hall, which was rapidly approaching completion. This occurred in connection with an extensive conflucration by which several hundred houses were swept away. The walls of the Tabernacle suffered but little injury, however, and the work of reconstruction is progressing rapidly.

The chief event of the Quadrennium, in connection with the Japan work, was the formation of an Annual Conference, under the special provisions of the Discipline in regard to that country. This step, which had been greatly desired by the brethren, both native and foreign, was taken on the occasion of a visit of the General Secretary in the summer of 1889. The liveliest satisfaction was expressed by all the missionaries at this consummation of their wishes, and the result has been a decided impetus to the work, especially on evangelistic lines. It was hoped that the question of Methodist Union in Japan would have been ripe for action by this time, but although the missionaries on the ground seem to be quite ready for the step, we regret to observe that the authorities of the Methodist Episcopal Church and the Methodist Episcopal Church South have decided to postpone action for the present. The basis adopted by the Union Committee in Japan will be submitted with this report, and should it commend itself to the Conference, it might be advisable to

affirm the principle, and give authority to the General Board to take final action, if necessary, at any time during the coming Quadrennium.

During the past four years, repeated communications from Japan have urged the importance, or rather the necessity, of extending the work into provinces yet unoccupied. This matter was fully inquired into by the General Secretary during his official visit, and subsequently a detailed report of an exploring tour by Revs. Dr. Cochran and J W. Saunby, B.A., was laid before the Board. While recognizing the vast importance of the recommendations made by the Mission Council in Japan, the General Board felt that the claims of other parts of the field demand that greater prudence should be exercised in the matter of extending the work abroad. It was decided, however, that the city of Kanazawa, on the west coast, should be occupied, as this could be done without additional expense, except a small grant for necessary buildings. Beyond this, the only new mission authorized is in the town of Nagona, all other requests being deferred until this General Conference should indicate its judgment by instructing the General Board as to the policy to be pursued.

The results of the work in Japan, during the Quadrennium, have been highly satisfactory, as the following statement will show :-

A question of great importance has arisen in connection with our foreign work, which demands the careful consideration of this General Conference and of the ensuing General Board. For two or three years past some of our leading ministers and laymen, among whom may be mentioned our late General Superintendent and the late Senator Macdonald, have been asking whether the time had not arrived when the Church should cast her eye over the great field of heathendom, with a view of opening a new mission among some hitherto neglected people. It is generally known that Senator Macdonald included among his various benevolent bequests the sum of \$2,000 to found a mission in the Islands Guadaloupe and Martinique. Others have spoken of India; while others still have had their thoughts turned toward China, as at once a needy and a promising field. In this connection some providential indications may be noted. Several years ago, a lady in Kingston sent, unsolicited, to the Mission Rooms, a donation of several hundred dollars, with the request that it be kept until the Church was ready to begin a mission in China. Sometime later we were led by a clear providential call to open a mission among the Chinese in British Columbia, which has proved successful in a marked degree. Still later, two young men, both graduates in Arts, one of them a graduate in Medicine, the other pursuing the B.D. course in Theology, volunteered for the foreign field, and asked to be sent to one of the unoccupied provinces of China. About the same time, another young man, who is pursuing a medical course in order to qualify as a medical missionary, made a similar offer, and while expressing his readiness to go to any part of the foreign field where his services might be required, called attention to Assam, with its 20,000,000 of souls

The Board simply submits these statements without any recommendation, deeming it very desirable there should be a calm and unbiased consideration of the whole situation by the General Conference, and a deliverance given in regard to the foreign work that will be a guide to the Board in its future operations.

III.—THE INDIAN WORK.

This, more than any other part of our missionary enterprise, may be regarded as purely a work of Christian benevolence. Apart from contributions to the Mission Fund, there are no returns in kind for the money expended on these missions. Nor is it likely that, in this respect, there will be much improvement for many years to come. In the Indian work the Church ministers to a dying race, whose poverty and helplessness, no less than its spiritual destitution, appeals with touching pathos to our Christian sympathy. The amount expended annually on this department of our work is very large, but the results achieved in the conversion of souls and the civilization of entire tribes, has amply repaid the Church for her self-denying efforts. "The blessing of Him that was ready to perish" has come upon us, and this is a blessing "which maketh rich, and addeth no sorrow therewith."

About twenty-two per cent. of the entire income of the Society is expended on the Indian work, and as the demands for extension are very urgent, especially in British Columbia, it is not improbable that the expenditure will be still larger in the future. On the whole of Vancouver Island we have but one Indian Mission, and the working force is but one lady teacher and a native agent. On both the east and west coasts of the island there are numerous tribes as yet untouched by any evangelizing Their poverty is great, their ignorance profound, their moral degradation almost beyond description, and no man cares for their souls. For years they have been begging for teachers and missionaries, but no one has responded, and the Missionary Board has been compelled to turn a deaf ear to these appeals, because it seems impossible to reinforce the Indian contingent without reducing stipends or workers in other and equally important fields. But feeling the urgent necessities of the case, the Board appeals to the Church, by means of this report, through this General Conference, for such an advance in missionary contributions as will justify the opening of new missions among destitute Indian tribes.

An important phase of the Indian work, and one which demands serious consideration from this Conference, is that which relates to education. The schools established in connection with the various missions served a good purpose when nothing better was available; but it is thought by some that the time has come when our whole policy, in this respect, demands revision. From the ordinary day schools on the Reserves we obtain the minimum of results, because of the difficulties under which the work is carried on. Qualified and efficient teachers are hard to procure, for salaries are meagre and the isolation is great; regular attendance on the part of the children seems to be out of the question, for there is no home discipline, and the children are allowed to do pretty much as they please; and so long as they remain on the Reserves they cling to their mother-tongue, and make very slow progress in English. Moreover, all these schools are carried on in conjunction with the Indian Department

of the Ottawa Government, by which a part of the expenses are paid, and it is a question whether the Church does not lose more than she gains by this quasi connection with the State, even in educational matters. It hampers our freedom of action, renders the schools less efficient, because conducted under a divided authority, and is used as an argument to silence complaint when another Church is virtually endowed by a lavish expenditure of public money. Theory may contend for a system of local schools, on the English plan, where the benefits of a common school education would be brought to the children of every camp; but experience has her index finger pointed steadily in the direction of Industrial Institutes and Residential Schools, where the children can be separated entirely from the associations of camp life for a series of years, and instructed in such forms of industry as will enable them in after years to earn an honorable livelihood. To found and provide for the maintenance of these Institutes is the bounden duty of the Government, in carrying out the spirit of treaty stipulations; but the management may be assumed, with the consent of the Government, by persons appointed by the Churches, without involving such connection between Church and State as implies dependence on the one hand, or the bestowment of State aid on the other.

In the Report of the General Board of Missions presented to this Conference four years ago, complaint was made that the Church had not received fair treatment from the Dominion Government, especially in regard to Industrial Institutes in British Columbia and the North-West. After long and vexatious delay, a disposition is manifested to remove this cause of complaint so far as the North-West is concerned. present time work is in progress to provide better buildings for the Morley Orphanage, a site has been fixed upon for an Industrial Institute at the Red River Settlement, about midway between Calgary and Edmonton, and promise has been made of an institute in Manitoba for the especial benefit of the Indians around Lake Winnipeg, and those to the north and When these works are completed there will be fair provision for the children connected with our various missions, which is not the case at present. Concerning institutes in British Columbia, we cannot speak in similar terms. It will be remembered that, a few years ago, complaints were made by Government agents against some of our missionaries on the Pacific Coast, to the effect that they were stirring up the Indians against the Government on the land question. The complaints were promptly and emphatically denied, but of the denials no notice was taken by the Government. The Board felt that such action should be taken as would vindicate the character of our missionaries if they were innocent of the things laid to their charge, and at the cost of much trouble and inconvenience a mass of evidence was obtained, part of it given under oath, showing that always and everywhere among the tribes the missionaries had been the friends of law and order, and that the dissatisfaction among the Indians was caused by the injudicious conduct and broken promises of the agents of the Government. Armed with this evidence, a deputation from the Board of Missions waited upon the Dominion Premier and the Superintendent-General of Indian Affairs, and during an interview which lasted two hours, they stated the case for our missionaries, urged in strong but courteous language the claims of the Methodist Church respecting the institutes, and requested a redress of grievances in several particulars that

But we have yet to learn that the first step has been taken in accordance with our requests, and so far there is no move to place any

Indian Institute in British Columbia under the charge of our Church. In connection with this subject, there is a matter of some delicacy to which we felt constrained, in the interests of the Missionary Society, to refer. On more than one occasion, within the past few years, representations have been made and communications sent to the Government by private persons respecting our Indian work, without the sanction of the Board and even without its knowledge. Among others a letter was written to the Superintendent-General of Indian Affairs, complaining of the treatment accorded to the Methodist Church in the matter of Institutes, and inquiring into the cause of delay. To that letter a reply was sent which, as might have been expected, put the most favorable construction possible upon the action or rather non-action of the Government. The reply thus received was publicly used in at least two of the Annual Conferences, apparently with the object, first, of shielding the Government from any real or supposed blame in the matter of the Institutes; secondly, of locating responsibility for delay with the General Board and its officers. We submit that such proceedings are an unwarrantable interference with duties vested by the General Conference in the Board of Missions and its officers, and are calculated to embarrass the Board in its negotiations with

That there may be no ground for false impressions, the Secretary is prepared to submit the whole of the official correspondence, so that the Conference may judge if there has been any neglect of duty or of the

Before passing away from the subject of Indian Missions, we would call attention to the condition of affairs at Oka. It is not necessary that we should rehearse the story of persecutions to which the Indians at Oka have been subjected, the destruction of their property by mobs, the false arrests and imprisonment of some of their number, and the fact that the Government has not afforded them adequate protection; but we cannot refrain from calling attention to the latest phase of this affair, which appears in a letter addressed to the Indians from the office of the Superintendent-General of Inc. an Affairs, informing them that no further aid will be given to any Protestant member of the band unless they remove from the home of their fathers to the new reserve in Muskoka. as indigent members of the band are concerned, such removal may be said to involve only sentimental considerations, but to others it means the surrender of lands, to which they believe they have a just claim, for a mere fraction of their value. As the Protestant Indians of Oka are, without exception, Methodists, we submit that it is the duty of the entire Church to stand by them in any just contention; and as the matter respecting their claim to the lands has not been settled by any competent authority, we further submit that it is the duty of the Dominion Government, whose wards the Indians are, to have the question finally decided without further delay.

IV .- THE FRENCH WORK.

careful examination of a number of different localities, the place referred to was selected, a good site obtained, and a building erected capable of accommodating pupils of both sexes to the number of one hundred, including rooms for the principal and teachers, recitation rooms for the daily important work of the Institute we have the co-operation of the Woman's Missionary Society, which shares with us the working expenses, and pays interest on \$10,000 of the cost of the building. The opening of this Institute has been hailed with satisfaction, not only by those engaged in the French work, but by all who are interested in the evangelization of our French fellow-countrymen. Sufficient time has not yet elapsed to show what can be accomplished, but the Board entertain strong hopes that the new departure in connection with the French work will prove its providential origin by the results which follow. On evangelistic lines there is nothing new to report. The various missionaries are doing their best to sow the seed of divine truth among the people, cheered by the assurance that "in due season 'they' shall reap if 'they' faint not." Colporteurs, also, have been diligently at work in a number of localities, and by the circulation of the Scriptures and religious literature are preparing the way of the Lord.

V.—THE CHINESE WORK.

The indications which led the Board to begin work among the Chinese in British Columbia seemed to be of a marked providential kind, and the history of the work has been in harmony with its providential beginning Since the mission was begun, five years ago, there has been steady growth, and the membership now aggregates . A comfortable but inexpensive mission building has been erected in Vancouver, where the work is in charge of a native missionary, and at Victoria a building will be erected this autumn, which will give permanence to the mission and enable the missionary to work to better advantage. In Victoria there is also a Rescue Home for Chinese girls, which is carried on by the Woman's Missionary Society, with good results. Night schools are in operation at Victoria, Vancouver and New Westminster, and a beginning has been made among the Chinese at Kamloops. It is hoped that from among these strangers from the "land of Sinim" some will be raised up to carry the Gospel to their native land.

VI.-FORMATION OF NEW MISSIONS.

While the creation of our Domestic Missions rests, as already stated, with the Annual Conferences, custom, which in time comes to have the force of unwritten law, has relegated authority in the matter of the Foreign, French, Indian and Chinese work, to the General Board. As these departments are supported almost entirely by the Misssion Fund, it seems reasonable that, so far as extension of the work is concerned, they should be under the control of some Board or Committee in which all the Annual Conferences are represented. By tacit consent the General Board has been entrusted with this duty, and all new missions, in the departments referred to, have been formed by its authority. Hitherto the weighty responsibilities involved have been discharged with all the care and prudence the Board could command; but in view of the large

sums annually expended, the growing importance of the work in these various departments, the urgent and persistent requests for extension, especially in the Indian and Foreign fields, and the consequent danger of friction in regard to authority, it seems desirable that some general regulations should be adopted which will definitely locate the authority by which new missions are to be formed. In several cases steps have been taken by Annual Conferences which may ultimately involve the Missionary Fund in heavy outlay, to the detriment of other parts of the work, and we suggest the propriety of putting this whole question out of the region of dispute.

VII.—THE "MISSIONARY OUTLOOK."

This useful publication is holding on the even tenor of its way, spreading missionary information among the people, and helping to keep them in living sympathy with the work of the Society. Owing to the reduction in price and the supply of ministers without charge (both by order of last General Conference), the publication does not quite pay its way; but the balance sheet is steadily improving, and a moderate increase of the paying circulation would make the income equal to the expenditure. It might be well, at this juncture, to consider the propriety of enlarging the Outlook, with a view of giving greater variety of information, and making it still more efficient as an advocate of mission work.

Basis of Union unanimously adopted by the Joint Union Commission in regular session in Nagoya, Japan, Feb. 5th, 1890.

RESOLUTION.

Resolved,—That we consider a union of the Methodist bodies in Japan desirable.

CHAPTER I.

THE CHURCH—NAME—DOCTRINAL STANDARDS—GENERAL RULES AND RITUAL.

ARTICLE I .-- NAME.

The name shall be the Methodist Church of Japan.

ARTICLE II.—STANDARDS OF DOCTRINES.

The doctrines of the Methodist Church of Japan are declared to be those contained in the Twenty-five Articles of Religion and those taught by Rev. John Wesley, M.A., in his "Notes on the New Testament" and in the first fifty-two Sermons of the first series of his discourses published during his lifetime.

ARTICLE III.—GENERAL RULES, ETC.

The General Rules, as well as the Chapters on Membership and Means of Grace and the Administration of Discipline, shall be substantially as they are found in the Discipline of the three uniting Churches.*

ARTICLE IV .- THE RITUAL.

The Ritual shall also remain substantially the same, with the exception of the form in the Discipline of the Methodist Episcopal Churches for the Consecration of Bishops, which shall be adapted to use in the induction of the Sotoku into office.

CHAPTER II.

MINISTERIAL AND LAY OFFICERS.

A.—The Ministry.

ARTICLE I.—SOTOKU.

The chief officer of the Church shall be called Sotoku.

ARTICLE II.—ELECTION, INDUCTION, AND TERM OF OFFICE.

Section 1.—The General Conference shall elect the Sotoku by ballot in open session.

Section 2.—The Sotoku shall be inducted into office by appropriate religious services.

Section 3.—The term of office of the Sotoku shall be twelve years, with no re-election.

ARTICLE III. — DUTIES AND PREROGATIVES OF THE SOTOKU.

Section 1.—The Sotoku shall be chairman of the General and Annual Conferences, and of all Standing Committees belonging thereto.

Section 2 .- He shall travel throughout the field to exercise supervision, and see that the Discipline is enforced therein.

Section 3.—He shall have power to transfer preachers from one Conference to another within his jurisdiction.

Section 4.—He shall decide all questions of law involved in proceedings pending in the Annual Conference, subject to an appeal to the General Conference; but in all cases the application of law shall be with the Annual

Section 5.—He shall, in consultation with the Choroshi, station the preachers with the following provisions-viz., (1) If any one of the Choroshi shall appeal against any appointment made by the Sotoku, and his appeal be sustained by a two-thirds vote of the Choroshi, it shall prevail. (2) Should any foreign missionary feel himself aggrieved by his appointment, he shall have the right to present his case to a committee consisting of not less than six missionaries representing the uniting mission, which committee shall consider the case and dispose of it as may be deemed best in consultation with the Sotoku.

ARTICLE IV .- CHOROSHI.

The chief officer of the district shall be called Choroshi.

ARTICLE V.—ELECTION OF CHOROSHI.

The Choroshi shall be elected by the Annual Conference by ballot.

ARTICLE VI.-DUTIES AND PREROGATIVES OF THE CHOROSHI.

Section 1.—To act as Chairman of the District to which he is appointed and of all permanent committees belonging thereto.

Section 2.—To superintend the work within the bounds of his District. Section 3.—To attend, as far as practicable, all the Quarterly Conferences within his District, and when present he shall preside.

Section 4.—The Choroshi may have a pastoral charge.

ARTICLE VII .-- BOKUSHI.

The preacher in charge of a Circuit or Station shall be called Bokushi.

ARTICLE VIII.—APPOINTMENT OF BOKUSHI.

All preachers shall be appointed to their pastoral charges annually, but no preacher shall be allowed to remain more than five consecutive years on the same charge. Those appointed to positions in educational institutions and other special offices of the Church may be exempt from this limitation by permission of the Conference.

ARTICLE IX.—DUTIES AND PREROGATIVES OF THE BOKUSHI.

Each ordained pastor shall have jurisdiction within his charge and shall be chairman of his Quarterly Conference in the absence of the Choroshi.

ARTICLE X.—MINISTERIAL ORDERS.

Section 1.—Two orders of the ministry shall be recognized—Choro (Elder); Shitsuji (Deacon).

Section 2.—The preachers connected with the Annual Conferences shall be known as Elders and Probationers, including Deacons on trial.

Section 3.—No preacher shall be eligible to full membership in an Annual Conference until he shall have been on probation four years and been elected an Elder.

B.—Lay Officers.

ARTICLE XI.

The Lay Officers of the Church are Local Preachers, Class Leaders, Stewards, Trustees, and Sunday-school Superintendents.

ARTICLE XII.

The qualifications and duties of the Lay Officers of the Church shall be as declared in the Disciplines in the Uniting Churches.

ARTICLE XIII

Local preachers shall not receive ordination.

CONFERENCES.

A .- General Conference.

ARTICLE II.—MINISTERIAL REPRESENTATION.

The ministerial representation in the General Conference shall be composed of one delegate for every five members of each Annual Conference, to be elected by ballot by the ministerial members of the same at the session of the Annual Conference next preceding that of the General Conference. Provided: That no member of an Annual Conference shall be eligible to membership in the General Conference until he shall have been in full membership two full years.

ARTICLE III.—LAY REPRESENTATION.

The lay representation in the General Conference shall be elected by the lay members of the Annual Conference at the session next preceding that of the General Conference. Provided: That no layman shall be eligible to election who has not attained the age of twenty-five years and been a member of the Church for five consecutive years.

ARTICLE IV.—POWERS OF—RESTRICTIVE RULES.

The General Conference shall have full power to make rules and regulations for our Church under the following limitation and restrictions, viz.:—

1. The General Conference shall not revoke, alter, nor change our Articles of Religion, nor establish any new Standards or Rules of Doctrine contrary to our existing and established Standards of Doctrines.

2. The General Conference shall not change nor alter any part or rule of our government so as to do away with the office of Sotoku, nor destroy the plan of our Itinerant system or of our Itinerant General Superintendency.

3. The General Conference shall not do away with the privileges of our ministry or probationers for the ministry, of trial by a committee and of an appeal, neither shall they do away with the privilege of our members on trial before the Society or by a committee and of an appeal.

B .- Annual Conference.

ARTICLE V.--CONSTITUTED OF.

The Annual Conference shall be composed of all the travelling preachers within its jurisdiction who have been received into full connexion, and an equal number of laymen who have been elected as elsewhere provided for.

ARTICLE VI.-POWERS OF.

The Annual Conference shall review the reports of the District Conference in regard to the character of ministers and probationers for the ministry, and may reprove, suspend, deprive of ministerial office and credentials, expel or acquit, any against whom charges may have been preferred. The lay members shall participate in all the business of the Conference except such as involves ministerial character.

C .- District Conference.

ARTICLE VII.-COMPOSITION OF.

The District Conference shall be composed of all the travelling and local preachers within its jurisdiction and one lay representative from each Quarterly Conference.

ARTICLE VIII.—POWERS OF.

The powers of the District Conference shall be: (1) The examination of ministerial character. (2) Regulations in regard to probationers and candidates for the ministry. (3) Licensing of local preachers.

ARTICLE IX.

The examination of the character of ministers and probationers for the ministry shall be confined to the ministerial delegates of the Conference.

D.—Quarterly Conference.

ARTICLE X.—COMPOSITION OF.

The Quarterly Conference shall be composed of all the Travelling and Local Preachers, Exhorters, Stewards, Class Leaders, the first Superintendents of Sunday-schools, and the Trustees who are members of the Church within the pastoral charge.

ARTICLE XI.—POWERS OF.

The powers of the Quarterly Conference shall be substantially the same as defined in the Disciplines of the Uniting Churches, with the following modification: The examination of candidates for license to preach shall be conducted in the Quarterly Conference, but the granting and renewing of license shall be with the District Conference.

CHAPTER IV.

Joint Board of Finance—Central Educational Committee—Constitution of the First General Conference and Special Provision.

ARTICLE I.—JOINT BOARD OF FINANCE.

Section 1.—There shall be a Joint Board of Finance composed of twelve members, one half of whom shall be Foreign Missionaries and one-half Japanese ministers or laymen. The foreign members of this Board shall be appointed by the respective missions. The Japanese members shall be appointed quadrennially by the General Conference of the Methodist Church of Japan.

Section 2.—The Joint Board of Finance shall control and apply all funds appropriated by the various Boards for evangelistic or other connexional purposes.

Section 3.—But each mission shall have full and exclusive control of all funds appropriated by the Board which it represents, except such funds as may be appropriated specifically for connexional purposes.

Section 5.—The Joint Board of Finance shall annually prepare estimates for evangelistic and other connexional work. These estimates shall be submitted to the united missions for approval, after which they shall be forwarded to the respective Home Boards by the missions. The Joint Board of Finance shall prepare annually full reports of all disbursements for the missions, and these reports shall be transmitted by the respective missions to the Home Boards.

Section 1.—There shall be a Central Theological Seminary and a Central Higher College established at as early a date as practicable after the union is effected.

Section 2.—The Theological Seminary and the Central Higher College shall be under the management of a Central Educational Committee of eighteen, composed of foreign missionaries and Japanese members in equal numbers. That Committee shall be representative each of the negotiating missions electing its own representatives in its own way; the Japanese members of the General Conference in special session electing the Japanese representatives. Moreover the Committee shall have general advisory supervision over the entire educational work of the Church to

Section 3.—The Central Educational Committee shall in all cases recommend annually suitable persons for professorships in the Central Higher College and the Theological Seminary, the Sotoku confirming the appointment in Annual Conference.

Section 4.—The respective missions shall at such times and in such way as they may determine recommend annually suitable persons for work in the respective schools under their management, the Sotoku confirming the appointment in Annual Conference.

Section 5.—All school property hitherto acquired or that may hereafter be acquired shall remain under the exclusive management of the mission representing the Board appropriating therefor, provided that in case of the establishment of connexional institutions a proportional share of the expenses of the same shall be borne by the several negotiating missions, the proportion to be agreed upon at the time and approved by the Boards represented.

ARTICLE III.—CONSTITUTION AND TIME OF THE FIRST GENERAL CONFERENCE.

Section 1.—In case the Basis of Union is approved by the requisite majorities in the Quarterly Conferences and Annual Conferences of the Methodst Episcopal Church in Japan, the Methodist Episcopal Church South, in Japan and the Methodist Church of Japan, and by the General Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church in the United States and Methodist Episcopal Church South, in the United States, and of the Methodist Church in Canada, it shall be competent for the Annual Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church in Japan and the Methodist Church South, in Japan and the Methodist Church of Japan to elect delegates to the First General Conference of the United Church in the proportion of one out of five ministers in full connexion with an equal number of laymen elected in Annual or Special Conference, as the cas emay be, and these shall compose the First General Conference of the said United Church, with power to perform such acts as may be necessary to the final ratification of the union and all other acts which may come within the province of a General Conference.

Section 2-Time of the First General Conference.

In the event of the Basis of Union being approved, it is recommended that the First General Conference of the United Church be held in

Tokyo at such time as may be fixed by a Committee appointed for the purpose by the Uniting Churches in Japan.

ARTICLE IV .- SPECIAL PROVISION.

It shall be admissible for any Church or mission entering into this union whose ministers or laymen shall not be qualified according to the standards prescribed in Articles II. and III. of the General Conference Regulations, to elect from its Japanese members as many delegates to the First General Conference as there are foreign representatives entitled to election under the prescribed standards.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF MISSIONS IN MANITOBA AND NORTH-WEST CONFERENCE.

In presenting my first Quadrennial Report, I desire to bear testimony to the noble generosity, enthusiastic loyalty and pious devotion of our people, and the sacrificing spirit, holy zeal and heroic efforts of our ministers and probationers in the Manitoba and North-West Conference, and, on behalf of the Church, to record our gratitude for the results she has been enabled to achieve during the last four years.

Having completed my pastorate of the Brandon Church, pursuant to instructions I entered upon the full duties of Superintendent of

Missions at the beginning of the Conference year of 1887.

The generous additions made four years ago to the Manitoba and North-West Conference, together with the magnificent distances previously embraced within her boundaries, constitute a field of operations for your Superintendent that cannot be regarded as in any way circumscribed.

In attempting to execute, as far as I might be able, the instructions received from you, and what seemed to be in the best interests of the Church, I have visited once or oftener nearly every circuit and mission to ascertain from personal observation the exact state of affairs, to learn 1890]

the needs and prospects of each locality, and to render such assistance as I could to further the interests of the Church in every possible way; to devise methods that would ensure greater efficiency and larger results, and to acquire such information as might be helpful in laying larger and broader plans for the upbuilding of our beloved Zion, and for promoting the cause and spreading the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ.

It is perhaps needless for me to say that though, during my occupancy of office, I have travelled some 55,000 miles, yet it was impossible for me

to visit as many points as I would like to have done.

Opportunities have been afforded of visiting and holding meetings of various kinds as far north as White Fish Lake and Norway House, as far west as the Rocky Mountains, and as far east as the shores of the Atlantic.

Valuable information has thus been acquired of the whole work, Indian as well as white, which has aided in the work of rearrangement, extension and general management. In considering what may be brought under your notice in this report, it should be borne in mind that the territory embraced within the limits of the Manitoba and North-West Conference is still in a formative state, and that this condition of affairs must inevitably continue to a greater or less extent. This means that our people have been bearing, and must continue to bear, burdens peculiar to a new country. The expense of establishing municipal institutions, of opening school districts, of building roads, bridges and public buildings of various kinds, imposes a burden of taxation that will gradually diminish in the course of events, as the numbers increase among whom such burdens will be divided. All this comes at a time when the people are really least able to bear it, as they, too, are just making a start in life, and, whether possessed of much or little of this world's goods, see numerous opportunities in which to invest every dollar at their command in ways that promise a better foundation on which to build their hopes of future returns. A personal knowledge of these conditions enables us rightly to appreciate the conspicuous generosity of our people, and also to understand how great are the needs of the Church in every quarter. The Church has abundant reason for profound gratitude and thanksgiving for the marked success that has crowned her efforts during the Quadrennium in this particular part of her work. From a subjoined table, you will learn that, in 1886, there were only 74 circuits and missions within the bounds of this Conference; now there are 121, an increase of 63 per cent. A significant fact in this connection is the marked increase in self-sustaining charges. Of this class, in 1886, there were 11; now there are 46, an increase of 318 per cent. If we add four other circuits, which will ask removal expenses only for this year, the number of independent circuits will reach 50. From this gratifying comparison, you will learn that, though a large amount of new work has been undertaken, a surprisingly large proportion of the expense has been assumed by the people themselves. It is interesting to note that the 46 independent circuits now in the Conference have averaged a period of only four years and three months of dependence on the Missionary Society. Having undertaken to support their own ministers, the contributions of the people for this purpose are on a liberal scale, the average salary appropriated this year for married ministers being \$913, and that of single men, \$444. Nor are their sym-

pathies purely local. These fields now constitute important sources of connexional revenue; the Superannuation, Missionary and other funds of the Church having acquired permanent tributaries at a trifling financial

With additional men in the field, new missions and preaching appointments have been opened. In 1886, the number of these was 310, in

1890, 459, an increase of 48 per cent.

The number of churches in 1886 was 60; in 1890, the number is 95, an increase of 58 per cent. While this may be regarded as a creditable advance, it is scarcely equal to advances along other lines, and certainly falling far short of the requirements of the people. Where there are 459 preaching appointments, there certainly ought to be more than 95 churches.

Twenty parsonages have been built during the Quadrennium, making.

in all, 59, an increase of 51 per cent.

As a result of church and parsonage building, the value of connexional property has been handsomely increased. In 1886, the church property of this Conference was valued at \$161,240; in 1890, a conservative valuation places it at \$264,521, an increase of 61 per cent.

It should be explained that probably not more than twenty-five per cent. of this increase can be attributed to recent immigration. Personal visitation of portions of our vast territory hitherto unoccupied by the Methodist Church abundantly confirmed statements previously made that for lack of a more vigorous policy of extension, many of our people had been lost to our Church, and many more were in danger of following their example. Hundreds who had in other lands been members of the Methodist Church, but who had, since their settlement in the North-West, been without the service of Methodism and were either leading careless lives or worshipping with other Christian bodies, were, by the extension already referred to, again enrolled in the membership of the Methodist Church. The largest proportion, however, of the increase is the direct result of the devoted efforts of our ministers and people by the use of the time-honored means and methods peculiar to our Church.

The importance of Sabbath-school work has been fully appreciated, and there has been a gratifying advance in this department.

I would like to draw your attention to a financial aspect of the case, as presented in the following statistics. While the Church has during the last four years, from 1885 to 1889, paid out of her Missionary Fund \$53,455.76 for the support of Domestic Missions in this Conference, she has actually had returned from the white work of this Conference, in the form of contributions to the Missionary Fund, the sum of \$22,112.18, thus involving the net expenditure of \$31,343.58, or only an average of \$7,835.89 per annum.

Additional evidence of the willingness of the people of the west to help themselves, and consequently of the small cost of carrying on so extensive a work, is found in the amount paid per member on our Domestic Missions for ministerial support, compared with what is contributed by the same class of work in some of the other Conferences. Taking the column "Propose to raise," in the sheets furnished for the use of the Missionary Committee, and last year as a sample year, we analyze with the following results:—

It may be pertinent to ask when and where similar results have been achieved at such a cost? For reasons already suggested, there is ground to believe that the whole situation will continue to improve. Our people with the communities generally in that land are getting in a better position to contribute, and there is no reason to doubt that their liberality will increase with their ability. But while this is undoubtedly true, it is equally true that the cases demanding and deserving assistance will con-

stantly increase. If such aid be rendered, as it is hoped it will, in proportion to the real needs, it may fairly be assumed that increasingly gratifying reports will be received from this Conference in the years to come. It does not seem unsafe to predict that in the not distant future, if the cause of our Church be properly fostered and promoted, this vast territory with its numerous Conferences will become the best source of revenue she will enjoy. If we are true to the commands of our blessed Saviour, if we are true to the history and traditions of Methodism, if we would emulate the example of heroism of our fathers in Canadian Methodism, if we would prove ourselves worthy of the glorious heritage we enjoy, there will be no hesitation in deciding promptly to go up and possess this goodly land, in the name of the Lord of hosts, and if need be to make sacrifices to accomplish our purpose.

As already intimated, I have had the pleasure of inspecting most of the Indian missions, and the mission schools in connection therewith.

What has been accomplished by our self-sacrificing missionaries is deserving of all praise. The means at their command has thus far been limited, and consequently results have not been so satisfactory to themselves or to the Church, as all concerned could have wished. has ample evidence of what may be accomplished among these interesting but unfortunate people, and cannot shrink from her responsibility. There is reason to believe that the Government is prepared to acknowledge, in a tangible form, the important services being rendered to the State by the teaching and example of missionaries, and the valuable assistance derived therefrom in administering the affairs of the country. From statements of a more or less official character, it is learned that the Government will likely afford assistance commensurate with the extent and probable value of the work we are prepared to undertake, and thus facilitate administration; and by aiding in the evangelization of the Indians, discharge a recognized duty. It is hoped, that by an arrangement that may be mutually satisfactory, the Government will get ample returns for all the financial assistance they may render, while our operations may be very largely extended without any considerable further drain on the regular revenues of the Church.

Gratifying as are the results of our labors, as evidenced by a rapidly growing membership roll, by an improving financial condition, and by general prosperity in other departments, there is cause for special gratitude for the measure of spiritual prosperity with which God has been pleased to bless His people.

Our people are "a church-going people;" nor are they "forgetful to assemble themselves together" in the social means of grace. The prayer-meeting, the class-meeting, the love-feast, are well attended and highly prized. As a rule the sacraments of the Church are duly observed. Revivals of religion are looked for, and realized, and characterized by the presence of the Master in the conversion of sinners and refreshment of believers. Our people have not lost sight of the peculiar mission of Methodism—"the spread of scriptural holiness throughout the land." The solemn truth is universally recognized amongst us, that the possession of spiritual power is essentially necessary as a condition of success in the fulfilment of our mission.

ample and incontestible evidence that the old-fashioned plans have as yet found no successful competitors for the prosecution of the work. Perhaps no higher tribute to the wisdom (if indeed it was not inspiration) of John Wesley could be paid than the continuation and effectiveness of plans and methods devised by him over a century ago. It is eminently suggestive to find in a new country people from various parts of the world, brought together in an apparently fortuitous manner, unite in proffering these ideas and methods to the many more novel ones that have since been suggested.

It is my great pleasure to be able to inform you that the characteristics of Methodism in the North-West are the same that have been conspicuous throughout her glorious career wherever she has operated. want to add, that a Methodist of the old-fashioned type does not require to undergo any transforming or assimilating process to become a member of any communion in this infant Canadian Conference; and that any minister who has been accustomed to attain success by the use or the old and God-honored methods peculiar to Methodism in the past, will find that the qualifications he has thus acquired are precisely the ones best adapted to insure success with us.

Without anticipating the report of the Principal of Wesley College, I may be allowed a passing reference to the commencement of active operations by the Board of this institution. The difficulties of launching a college under ordinary circumstances are neither few nor small. Those which confronted our people in the North-West were of considerable magnitude. A man was found, in the person of Rev. Dr. Sparling, who was willing, on the call of the Church, to attempt a tack which would have deterred one of less faith, energy and persevering industry. has proved himself in every way master of the situation. Ably seconded by those associated with him in the professoriate, and supported by an undivided sentiment in the Church, expressed by magnificent contributions of money for the maintenance of the College, the work accomplished thus far has satisfied the expectations of the most sanguine, and begotten confidence as to the future of this institution, which is destined to play an important part in the education of scores of young men for the ministry of our Church.

With your permission, I will venture to indicate some of the difficulties that have been, and still are, hindrances to the development, expansion and complete success of our work in the North-West. among these hindrances are the want of competent men in sufficient numbers, and the lack of money. As to the first of these difficulties, I would like to say that the men now engaged, as well as those who preceded them in that field, have earned and merit all praise for their zealous discharge of duties under trying and often very discouraging circumstances. With singular constancy have they striven to advance the Master's cause, and have achieved glorious conquests in the name and for the glory of their great leader. In labors more abundant than some other denominations, whose efforts were seemingly better appreciated, accepting tangible and material tokens as evidence, they have apparently counted all things but loss in their desire to bring the blessings of salvation to their fellows. But the field, white to the harvest, was all too much for them. More gleaners were needed.

The Macedonian cry, however loudly raised, elicited only the feeblest

response. The great majority of them who might be expected to lend an attentive ear to, and willingly obey the command to preach the Gospel to every creature, are apparently disinclined to conclude that the mandate was delivered for their guidance. Too many of them, judging from their willingness to stay away, have pared down the declaration of the illustrious founder of Methodism to read: "That portion of one of the older Conferences that seems to hold the greatest attractions I prefer to have for my

parish."

We cannot think that the heroic ardor and noble courage, with which the founders of Methodism in Canada were inspired, has not been transmitted to those who are with us to-day. Noble and grand as even such men as Evans, Rundle, McDougall, Geo. Young, and others whose names might be mentioned in their company, we believe that there are not wanting in our midst to-day men, whose names are unknown to fame, possessed of like Christian valor and a like missionary spirit. Such men we have not, up to the present time, been able to get in such numbers as the work demands. The great need is for men of ability, possessed of a true missionary spirit; men ready to do and dare, and, if necessary, to suffer for the cause of Christ; men of sound constitution, of intellectual attainments, of willing mind, of Christian experience, filled with love to the Master, are much needed to promote and extend the work. Other fields at a distance may lend their enchantment. The novelty of other countries and new surroundings may, and sometimes does, possess powerful attractions. The experience of pioneering at home among Englishspeaking people, with some, does not afford a promise of glory and distinction that some perhaps covet. But surely the desire to bring the blessings of salvation to a fellow-countryman ought, if rightly considered, to be keener and more compelling than to spread the Gospel in foreign lands. It is a lamentable fact that many who have gone out from Methodist homes are to-day without the means of grace it is our duty to provide. It is painfully true that the classes I have mentioned, and many others, feel to-day that they are being denied the ministrations of the Church that should be provided. Men are needed to provide for the wants of these classes, to gather in those who have aimed at less favoring surroundings than those enjoyed in their former homes, wandered away from the fold, and to seek and to save those that are lost.

As I have already intimated, the addition to the number of our preachers during the past few years has been a considerable one. I have been instrumental in bringing in about one-third of the entire number engaged in pastoral work, at the present time, in the Conference, and it is a pleasure for me to report to you that most of them are doing efficient work, and rejoice that their steps have been thus guided. I would like to add that there is a strong hope indulged by many that some plan may be devised and adopted, as a result of which the denials and privations may be minimized as much as possible in affording more remunerative salaries. Human nature in the ministry is found to be remarkably like to that in other men, and it is difficult to restrain a measure of dissatisfaction when the remuneration is largely disproportioned to the labor performed and sacrifices endured. Perhaps, if this inequality were fairly adjusted, there

would be less difficulty in securing volunteers.

difficulty to which reference has been made. It is undeniable that our missionaries cannot be expected to live as did the pioneers of Methodism in the older provinces of Canada.

They are obliged to maintain themselves in a proper fashion wherever sent. When a young man may be contemplating going to the North-West, he will not unnaturally consider the question of finance. He will inform himself as to the salary he may be allowed, and the probable cost of moving, etc., and will perhaps be deterred from carrying out his heart's desire to embark in a work full of attractions, through a dread that financial embarrassment may overtake him. And if at this interesting stage he learns that his possible income is liable to a reduction of perhaps thirty per cent., and if simply a candidate, he will be required to pay his own removal expenses, he will need to be full of faith or courage, or both, to fortify him in the decision to undertake an enterprise surrounded with so many difficulties. Yet, as you have already learned, about one-third of those now in the pastorate in this Conference went out subject to such conditions, of whom more than one-half have actually paid their own removal expenses.

In a very general way I have given you some of the outlines of the success that has been achieved in the North-West. You will likely have inferred, and with very good reason, that much more might have been accomplished with a greater number of men and more adequate supplies of money. It would be a much more difficult task for me to indicate the possibilities of the future, or for you to estimate with any measure of accuracy what magnificently glorious results the Church will shortly rejoice

in, if we properly discharge the obligations of the hour.

The Church has at her very doors a field of operation second to none

in the promise it affords.

You do not need to be told that we do not begin to occupy that great territory in anything like an effective manner. There should be no hesitation or delay in occupying at once every available point. Possessed of valuable resources, it will not be doubted that very rapidly the land will be peopled with teeming thousands. The prediction frequently made that Manitoba will, at no distant date, become the Premier Province of the Confederation, seems to rest on certain grounds of fulfilment, and long before that day shall have arrived, the present limits of the territory, now embraced within the bounds of this Conference, will be carved into numerous important Provinces. Those who may be inclined to think this prospect overdrawn, must bear in mind that it is the confirmed opinion of scores of men well informed, and generally regarded as the most reliable and far-seeing in our midst. It will be becoming, then, for us to consider the situation with all gravity and with a due sense of the solemn obligation that now rests upon us. Surely we do not need to be exhorted by being reminded of what has been done under such an inspiration at other times and by other men; nor will we stop to conjecture what the non-sainted heroes of Methodism would have done under similar circumstances. The time for action has fully arrived, and we are now met for the purpose of counselling with each other as to the best means to secure the largest possible results.

If the Church henceforth does what she can, success, victory, conquest, are as sure as the eternal promises of God. Time forbids my going into greater detail, however meagre this report is. Let us unite in our ascrip-

tions of thanksgiving and praise to Almighty God for the wondrous blessings He has been pleased to pour out upon us. Let us look to Him for wisdom and guidance in this momentous period of the history of our Church. Let us pray that He will give each of us to feel our individual responsibility; to realize the obligation that rests upon us, and that we may be enabled to discharge every duty that is imposed.

May the missionary spirit in larger measure descend upon us! Then shall we go forth in His name conquering and to conquer, and we may confidently anticipate in the future more glorious results than have crowned

our labors in the past.

QUADRENNIAL REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

Having been honored by this the highest court of our Church with recognition as one department of its economy, and having received much encouragement and help in the prosecution of its specific work, it is but fitting that some statement should be presented by the Woman's Missionary Society of the steps taken during the past four years.

It is a cause for thanksgiving that advancement has been the record of each year, in membership, in means, and in missionaries, and that not one of the latter number has been removed by death.

Total amount received by our General Treasurer during the Quadren-Amount since organization, nine years since, \$113.864.88.

In looking over our various mission fields, there is much reason for gratitude and encouragement.

JAPAN.

The work in Japan has extended so, that in addition to our large and prosperous school in Tokyo, there are two others situated in Shizuoka and Kofu. Nine young ladies have been sent to this land during the four years. Our first missionary, Miss Cartmell, returned in 1887 on account of ill health; and our second, the greatly afflicted, but greatly honored Principal of our Tokyo school, Mrs. Large, is now at home on

Токуо.

In 1888 the attendance at the school in the capital was so great that the original building had to be replaced by a larger one, which, with the one erected in 1886, affords accommodation for five or six teachers, one hundred and fifty (150) boarders, and one hundred (100) day pupils.

The curriculum is considered equivalent to that for a third-class certificate in the schools of Ontario, and it must not be forgotten that the studies have to be pursued simultaneously in both Japanese and

Instruction in the Bible has been given daily, and every means used to bring the young people to the knowledge of the "truth as it is in Jesus." God has been true to His promise, giving the increase in good measure. In 1886-87 fifty confessed Christ, making sixty-five native Christians in the school. In 1887-88 the Holy Spirit was unusually manifest, so that the number of baptized disciples became one hundred and twenty.

So many having already been brought into the fold there was not a very large addition in 1888-89, but there was a very marked and beautiful development of the Christian character, and many instances were given of the influence of the children in their homes, bringing the truth to bear upon the hearts of the parents. Some of the girls took notes of the sermons and expositions which they had heard, and in their vacation would read them to their friends.

Each year the current expenses have been met by the native receipts, sometimes leaving a surplus, and only requiring the Society to meet the cost of buildings, the salaries of the ladies, and the support of five or

In 1888-89 there were eleven graduates in the Japanese course, and at the Christmas closing of 1889 the first graduate in English received her diploma. This young lady is still pursuing her studies, and also taking part in evangelistic work.

SHIZUOKA.

Four years ago a donation of \$1,000 was made by two ladies in Toronto for the opening of a school in a new locality. Shizuoka was selected. The interest of native gentlemen was secured, and they offered to supply a building and meet all expenses except those connected with The building being found inadequate, they the lady missionaries. erected a new one in 1887-88, and this institution is managed by two of our representatives in connection with a committee of foreign and native gentlemen.

Kofu.

Seeing the success of these schools, a request came to our ladies to open a similar one in Kofu, which was done in 1889. The buildings have been supplied by the Japanese, but other expenses are met by our Society except those covered by fees. Two of our ladies are stationed here, and, being surrounded by many adverse influences growing out of the present unsettled state of the Empire, and the antagonism of the Buddhist priests to Christianity, have a special claim on our sympathy and prayers.

EVANGELISTIC WORK.

Running parallel with this educational work in Janan, there has been the evangelistic, consisting of the training and employment of several Bible-women, work in Sabbath-schools, sewing-schools, with religious instruction, etc.

A course of reading is laid out for these Bible-women, on which they are examined by the native pastors, and they are instructed every week by the ladies who have charge of this department, in some portion of Scripture, which they in turn distribute in their house-to-house visitation. Thus these women become skilled in individual Christian work, and through them many are induced to attend the preaching of the Word, and are better prepared to understand it than they otherwise would be.

It may be only proper to say that the work in Japan could not have been so rapidly extended but for special donations having been given for this purpose in varying sums of \$1,600, \$1,100, \$300, \$100, \$50, \$25,

FRENCH.

During two years of the past Quadrennium a very successful boarding school was carried on by the Woman's Missionary Society at Actonvale, about fifty-five miles from Montreal. A goodly number of French-Canadian girls, many of whom were of Roman Catholic parentage, received instruction here, and we rejoice to be able to state that one year the close of the school found teachers and pupils all trusting in the "One Mediator between God and man, the man Christ Jesus.'

When the French Institute in Montreal was projected, it was proposed that the Woman's Missionary Society unite with the parent Board, and by paying a fair interest on \$10,000 for a number of years, a larger building could be erected, thus securing accommodation for a girl's

This Institute was opened in October, 1889, and a large proportion of the students have been girls, the Woman's Missionary Society bearing its share of the expenses.

It was considered wise to discontinue the school at Actonvale, and concentrate our efforts in the Institute. Much good is anticipated from this enterprise.

In addition, two day schools have been carried on in this city, and partial support given to a dissentient school. Two Bible-women have also been employed.

INDIAN WORK.

Our efforts in this department have extended to three different localities. The Crosby Girl's Home at Port Simpson, B.C., mainly supported by this Society, has continued to be the shelter and safeguard of about twenty Indian girls and four boys, who have there received instruction in household duties, and training in moral and social obligations, while having the benefit of the village day-school in their studies.

The building having become old and unsuitable, our Society made an appropriation for a new one, but its location has not yet been settled. When it becomes an accomplished fact, it is hoped that a larger number will be reached, and that the two ladies in charge will not, in addition to their comparative isolation, have to contend with the depressing influence of inconvenient and uncomfortable quarters.

McDougall Orphanage, Morley, N.W.T.

This Institution is wholly maintained by annual grants from the Government and the Woman's Missionary Society, except a few occasional private donations. No responsibility, however, is assumed as to its man-

Periodical visits are made by the Government Inspector, and satisfactory progress reported.

Many more than the score of boys and girls who have occupied the Home might be lifted to a purer and nobler life if a larger building were provided, thus affording facilities for the prosecution of industrial pursuits; and we are glad to hear that one is about being erected by the Indian Department.

Advised by the British Columbia Conference, Chilliwhack, B.C., was chosen for the site of the two-and-a-half-story building, which our Society erected in 1889, at a cost of \$3,500.

Three ladies here have charge of about thirty children, and very cheering reports have been received of the progress already made, not only in their studies, but in their readiness to accept Christian truth, and their quickness in learning to sing the "songs of Zion."

The idea is strengthening, that to accomplish the highest results among the Indians, the children should be removed from the degrading influences of camp-life, and be brought wholly within a Christian atmosphere, where lessons of industry, cleanliness and mutual helpfulness shall be constantly given and exemplified.

The more these Christian Homes can be multiplied, the stronger becomes the hope that this aboriginal race may be lifted from a state of continual childhood to that of manhood.

Why should these people be different from all others? Cannot some plan be pursued whereby instead of receiving supplies of food and clothing from either State or Church, these roamers of the forest may first have impressed upon them the responsibility of working, that they and others may live, and then, in order to do this, have implements put in their hands with instruction how to use them?

We know this is already done in part, but we hope for the day when the one system shall have been substituted for the other.

CHINESE WORK.

It now remains for us to speak of the fourth division of our operations, viz.: among the Chinese of Victoria, B.C.

Through the liberality of the Board of Missions, a comfortable building was provided, when ten or twelve girls, rescued from the basest slavery, have been sheltered, maintained and taught. During the past year there have been nine inmates. Several of these have professed faith in the Lord Jesus and have been baptized. Some have been married. The younger five are pursuing their studies; two of them attending a public school and taking a good stand among their English fellow-pupils.

The late Senator Macdonald remarked to one of the officers of our Society, after visiting the school last year, that if the Woman's Missionary Society had accomplished nothing more than the good resulting from their mission among the Chinese girls, it was worth all it had cost the Church.

Two ladies are here in charge, and it is hoped that access may be found to the poor women and children existing in their crowded, comfortless rooms, and who never come within hearing of the Gospel.

In all our fields we have a noble band of Christian young women, brave and self-denying, gifted and consecrated, whose delight is in working for the Lord whom they love. Their teaching and example coincide, and we rejoice to know that in four of the languages of this earth, praises to our Redeemer shall be sung by many through their agency under the blessing of God. It is a joy to be co-workers with Him, and we esteem it a great privilege to be thus honored.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS.

Report No. 1.

Your Committee have had before them a large number of memorials, resolutions, etc., to which they have given careful attention, and in reference to which they report as follows:—

1. We recommend that this admirable and encouraging report be published in full in the Guardian and Wesleyan for the information of our people.

2. A memorial from the Trustees of Regina Church in regard to

indebtedness. We recommend its reference to the General Board of Missions for consideration and relief if practicable.

3. A memorial from the Palmerston District, endorsed by the Guelph Conference, urging that in future provision be first made for the Home Missions so that each married missionary shall receive a stipend of not less than \$600; and several other memorials bearing upon kindred topics, were discussed concurrently and dealt with as follows:—

1. Distributions first to Domestic Missions.—We call attention to the facts: (a) That there are certain forms of expenditure, such as rent of Mission Rooms, publication charges, and wages of school teachers, interest and discount, etc., which must be paid in full. (b) That it is very difficult to man the Indian Missions effectively, even with salaries paid in full. (c) That the General Board of Missions has repeatedly given long and anxious consideration to this very matter, without being able to see their way to adopt a change. In view of these facts, we cannot recommend the change proposed.

2. That the basis of grants to rural and city missions be the same.—We recommend that this request go to the General Board, as they have full information on the subject; and we recommend that the formation of missions in towns and cities that will be claimants on the Missionary Fund be avoided, unless in very exceptional cases.

3. A memorial that rent be allowed on Domestic Missions where there is no parsonage.—Recommended that as there is now provision for aiding in the erection of parsonages by substantial grants from the mission funds, we do not think it desirable to return to the former methods of grants for rents.

4. That only one first-class fare be allowed as travelling expenses to agents of the Society.—We find, as a matter of fact, that agents of the Society travel now at less than the rate mentioned, and that the greatest care is exercised in the matter of travelling expenses, hence no recommendation is necessary.

5. That no further grants be made from the Mission Fund to the Super-

annuation and Supernumerary Funds.-That the grants to the Superannuation and Supernumerary Funds have been made in view of the fact that the claims of superannuates who have been on mission fields, should be provided in whole or in part by the mission funds. It seems reasonable therefore that this grant should be continued.

6. That there be no extension of the Foreign or Indian Work until Home Missionaries get a minimum of \$550 each, including board and fuel. We are of opinion that in view of the rapid and unavoidable increase of Pomestic Missions, especially in the North-West, it would not be advisable to make the proposed rule absolute; but re recommend that the General Board be strongly urged to act in the spirit of the proposal as far as can

be done without ignoring a manifest providential call.

7. That ninety-five per cent. of all increased contributions be hereafter retained for Home Missions .- Your Committee are of opinion that such a decision might injuriously affect the income of the Society, inasmuch as the appeals made from time to time for increased contributions have been on the line of sending the Gospel to the heathen, and we have reason to believe that a large portion of the givings of our people are prompted by sympathy with that object. At the same time, in view of the pressing needs of the domestic work, we recommend that during the ensuing Quadrennium forty-two and a half, per cent. of the total amount which the General Board decides to appropriate in each year be granted to Domestic Missions instead of thirty-eight and one-tenth per cent. granted last year and that arrangements for the rest of the work be made in view of such per centage.

4. Resolution of Rev. T. M. Campbell respecting expenditure of management, etc.—This matter was exhaustively considered, and Mr. Campbell was heard at length, after which the following resolution was adopted:-

"That this committee after having heard and carefully weighed the statements made in regard to the expenditures in connection with collection and management of our missionary funds, and having considered the comparison instituted between this outlay and that connected with the management of similar funds in other Churches, is of opinion that there is no true analogy in the case, our methods of work being so entirely different that no fair comparison can be made. We find that in the statements presented by Mr. Campbell several items, such as interest and discount, publication charges, expenses of circuit anniversaries, are included, which do not strictly belong to the cost of management, leaving the real cost to be as stated in the annual report. We are also of the opinion that in the administration of the funds the strictest economy consistent with efficiency has been practised, and we see no way in which any material saving can be effected except by the missionary meetings being held earlier in the year and the money collected promptly forwarded to the Treasurer, thus effecting a saving in the discounts which have been necessary under our present system.

5. The Quadrennial Report of the General Board of Missions was

considered, and the following recommendations are made:-

(1) That that part of the report referring to the death of several honored brethren, some of whom were officers of the General Conference, be referred to an appropriate committee to formulate a resolution, which shall appear in the printed JOURNAL of General Conference.

of several Conference, tion, which (2) The development of self-support in the Domestic Work.—That the General Conference recommend that whenever practicable Chairmen of Districts visit the missions on their Districts at the first Quarterly Board Meeting for the year, and endeavor to induce greater liberality in support of the Domestic Missionaries, and wherever possible lead them to a self-sustaining position.

6. FOREIGN WORK.

(1) Methodist Union in Japan.—Whereas the subject of Methodist Union in Japan has been for some time before the Churches, and a basis has been drafted which has received the assent of a Joint Committee in Japan representing the missions of the Methodist Episcopal Church, the Methodist Episcopal Church South, and the Methodist Church (Canada); and whereas it may be necessary within the ensuing Quadrennium to take action in the premises,

Resolved,—That we affirm the desirableness of a union of the Methodist Missions in Japan on equitable terms, and that the General Board of Missions is hereby empowered to take final action in the premises during the Quadrennium, should circumstances render such action necessary.

(2) Extension in Japan.—Respecting a proposal to extend the work in

Japan, your Committee recommend as follows:---

That while it is the duty of the Church to watch the leadings of Providence and be attentive to every providential call, we are of opinion that the needs of the Japan work should hereafter be met, as far as possible, by the training of native pastors and evangelists, and that enlargement of territory should not outrun to any great extent the supply of such laborers. We are also of opinion that the present dimensions of the work in Japan are about as great as the Society has means to support, and that during the ensuing Quadrennium the Board of Missions should act with great prudence and caution in regard to any extension of the work.

7. Your Committee having carefully considered that part of the Quadrennial Report which refers to a bequest of the late Senator Macdonald to found a new mission in the Islands of Martinique and Guadaloupe; and to certain indications of a providential call to enter China; also the resolution of Rev. G. R. Turk, respecting a new mission in Brazil or the

Congo Free State, report as follows:-

(1) That inasmuch as the French language is universally spoken in the Islands of Martinique and Guadaloupe, and the Church has hitherto been unable to find a sufficient number of qualified agents for the French work in the Province of Quebec, it does not seem to us that the time has come to enter that particular field. Nevertheless, we deem it advisable that the General Secretary should obtain all possible information respecting the population of the islands referred to; and should also ascertain from the executors of the will of the late Senator Macdonald whether any period is fixed when the bequest will lapse if not utilized by the Society in the way intended.

(2) Respecting the opening of a new mission in some foreign land, your Committee are impressed by the fact that the thoughts of many persons in our Church have been simultaneously moved in that direction. Some have urged the Board to take immediate action, some have offered gifts in money, while several educated and gifted young men have volunteered for personal service in the foreign field. All these seem like providential

indications which should be heeded, lest, being disobedient to the heavenly vision, the curse of a barren faith should fall upon the Church. It is not desirable that the sympathies of our people, as they reach out to the great field of heathendom, should be chilled and repressed; but neither is it desirable that in our eagerness to occupy new territory we should cripple the forces already in the field. We, therefore, recommend that this whole question be relegated to the General Board, with instructions to gather all available information and watch closely the leadings of Providence; and if at any time during the Quadrennium the way seems clear in regard to men and means, the Board be authorized to move in the matter of a new Foreign Mission in such place as the providence of God may determine.

9. In view of the formation of Annual Conferences in parts of our work which formerly were Missionary Districts, covering the territory of the Indian, Chinese and Foreign work, it seems desirable that an understanding should be reached in regard to the formation of new Missions in these departments, so as to avoid misunderstanding in regard to authority. We,

therefore, recommend the adoption of the following:—
(1) That no new mission in the Indian, French, Chinese or Foreign work be formed without the concurrence of the General Board first obtained, and in this matter the Board shall act only on the recommendation of the Annual Conference within whose bounds the proposed mission is located. Where there is no Conterence jurisdiction, the Board may act independently, also in cases of emergency which arise during the year.

(2) New schools in any of the aforesaid departments shall be authorized only by the General Board, on the recommendation of the Annual District Meeting.

Report No. 3.

1. Respecting the memorials of Victoria and Albert Colleges' Missionary Societies to be recognized as branches of the Missionary Society, your Committee recommend as follows:—

(1) Students of any of our colleges may organize themselves into societies, in affiliation with the Missionary Society, under the title of Auxiliary Missionary Societies, and they shall collectively be known as "The Collegiate Auxiliary Missionary Society."

(2) For the purpose of the society as above, they shall have power to frame a constitution not inconsistent with the constitution of the Missionary Society.

(3) Such societies shall work in harmony with the authorities of the Missionary Society; and if at any time the said societies should decide to send a missionary or missionaries to a foreign field, it shall be with the concurrence of the General Board of Missions.

(4) They shall, year by year, report their income and expenditure to the General Board of Missions

institute at Red Deer, your Committee greatly regret the long delay that has occurred in the inception and completion of these important works; and also regret that no provision has been made for the much-needed with all earnestness upon the attention of the Government until the just claims of the Methodist Church are recognized.

3. With regard to institutes in British Columbia, the situation is still less satisfactory. This question has been the subject of correspondence with the Indian Department for a considerable time, and was exhaustively presented by a deputation in an interview with the Dominion Premier and the Superintendent-General of Indian Affairs in the spring of 1889. But up to the present time, so far as we are aware, no further notice has been taken of the matter, and none of the grievances complained of have been redressed. In view of all the facts that have come to our knowledge, we cannot but feel that the Methodist Church has not received that consideration from the Government to which it was fairly entitled, and which has been freely accorded to other Churches.

4. In connection with the matter of Institutes, your Committee call attention to that aspect of our Indian educational policy which touches the ordinary Reserve Schools. We are of opinion that a point has been reached, especially in Ontario, where the Church should relinquish these schools to the Government, and put its main efforts into Residential Schools and Industrial Institutes. There may be exceptional cases where it would not be wise to surrender the day-school, but we recommend that the Board adopt this policy where they consider it safe to do so, and where there is a guarantee that the schools will be made non-decominational in fact as well as in name.

5. Respecting correspondence with the Government on Indian affairs, your Committee recommend, in harmony with the resolution of the General Board of 1888, that it be conducted by the General Secretary, and when it is necessary for local church authorities, such as Chairmen of Districts, Presidents of Conferences, or the like, to interview or correspond with Indian Commissioners, Inspectors or Agents, they promptly inform the General Secretary of such Conference, so as to avoid confusion in dealing with the Government.

6. A number of resolutions, memorials, etc., were considered as follows:—

(1) A memorial from the Newfoundland Conference, asking that among the members of the General Board of Missions elected by this Conference, a representative from Newfoundland be chosen. As all the Annual Conferences are already represented on the General Board by their own delegates, further provision for Conference representation is not considered necessary.

(2) Resolution of Rev. J. S. Ross, respecting Centennial of Missions. We recommend that the matter be referred to the General Board, with power to act if they deem it desirable.

(3) Resolution of Rev. T. M. Campbell, that moving expenses of missionaries be laid in detail before the Financial District Meetings. As this matter is covered by existing provisions, if faithfully carried out, no action is recommended.

(4) Resolution of Rev. T. M. Campbell, that the District expenses of

Chairmen in connection with missionary work be laid in detail before the Annual District Meeting. We recommend no action.

(5) A resolution of Rev. P. Addison, respecting investment of legacies to the Missionary Fund—the interest to be a permanent subscription in the name of the testator. We recommend this resolution to the General Board for favorable consideration.

(6) A resolution of Rev. J. Shaw, that the Committee of Consultation and Finance be reduced from eighteen to ten. We recommend that the number remain as at present, but that the Committee have power to appoint a sub-committee to deal with routine matters, the full Committee to be called for important business.

(7) Resolution of the Manitoba Conference, that a representative to the Missionary Board be elected from that Conference in addition to the Superintendent of Missions. As the Superintendent is now a member ex-efficio, the request comes under general rule, and needs no further

(8) Resolution of Rev. T. G. Williams, respecting the unification of We recommend the adoption of the resolution, which is as missions follows:-

"That the following words, on page 114 of the Journal of the General Conference of 1886, beginning in the sixth line from the bottom of the page, namely: 'of the Presidents of Annual Conferences, Chairmen of Districts, and five laymen to be appointed by the Special Committee of each Annual Conference,' be omitted, and that the following words be substituted therefor: 'The Committee for each District shall consist of the President of the Conference, the Chairman of the District, the Financial Secretary of the District, and two laymen, who have been elected by the lay delegates in the May District Meeting; and that in case more than one District is affected by any proposed change, the Committee of each District concurrent shall form a part of the court before which the matter shall be presented, and that for the present year the Conference Special Committee in each Conference shall have power to appoint two layman for each District.'"

7. The case of the Oka Indians has received the attention of your Committee, but as there is a deliverance on this subject in the Quadrennial Report of the General Board and also in the Report of the Committee on Civil and Religious Liberty, we deem any further recommendation unnecessary.

8. Respecting the Quadrennial Report of the Woman's Missionary

Society, we recommend the adoption of the following:-

"That this Conference has heard with great satisfaction the Report of the Woman's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church, presented We rejoice in the success that has crowned the efforts of the Society, and gladly welcome their co-operation in the great work of evangelizing the heathen; and we commend the Society to the cordial support of all the women of the Methodist Church."

(2) Add a new section with the new caption, "New Missions and Schools, 10," to read as follows: -- "No new mission in the Indian, French, Chinese or Foreign Work shall be formed without the concurrence of the General Board first obtained; and in this matter the Board shall act only on the recommendation of the Annual Conference within whose bounds the proposed mission is located. Where there is no Conference jurisdiction the Board may act independently; also in cases of emergency which arise during the year."

(3) "Newschools in any of the aforesaid departments shall be authorized only by the General Board on the recommendation of the Annual District

- (4) Add to paragraph 386, section 3, of the Discipline, "And he shall have authority in the absence of the Chairman of the District and the Superintendent of the Circuit or Mission, with the consent of the Superintendent of the Circuit or Mission, to preside at the Quarterly Official Boards of those Circuits or Missions on which probationers or supplies are stationed."
- 10. Your Committee further call the attention of the Conference to the growing importance of the Indian Work in the North-West, the probability of large expenditure on Industrial Institutes and Schools, and the necessity of conducting all business with the Government through some one recognized channel. We, therefore, recommend that this matter be referred to the General Board, with authority, if they judge it necessary, to designate some one of the Indian Missionaries in the North-West as agent of the Society in regard to the matters above referred to.

(See resolution re Dr. Shaw's appointment.)

REPORT OF MEMORIAL COMMITTEE.

Report No. 2.

Your Memorial Committee respectfully submit the following :-

1. Touching memorials from the Toronto, Niagara, Guelph, Bay of Quinte, Montreal, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick Conferences, on the subject of the Order of Precedence on State Occasions, your Committee recommend, (a) That, whereas the Constitution of the Dominion of Canada knows nothing of the union of Church and State, but recognizes all Christian Churches as standing on the ground of perfect equality; and whereas, in the Table of Precedence we have the following order: "The Governor-General, Lieutenant-Governors, Archbishops and Bishops, Members of the Cabinet," etc., etc., thus ignoring the very existence of those Protestant Churches which represent the majority of the people of this Dominion; and whereas, in the aforesaid Order of Precedence pre-eminence is given to Archbishops, the appointees of the Primate of Rome, thus degrading the clergy of all Protestant Churches: therefore resolved, that this General Conference, representing the largest body of Protestants in the Dominion, records its emphatic protest against the aforesaid Order of Precedence, regarding it as an invasion of the principle of religious equality recognized in the Constitution; and (b) that this Conference memorialize the Governor-General in Council, the Senate and the House of Commons, with regard to the aforesaid obnoxious order, asking for the abrogation of the invidious distinctions implied therein.

2. In the matter of the memorial from the Montreal Conference, respecting the Registration of Deaths and Baptisms, your Committee recommend that, as the Discipline of our Church orders that all baptisms by our ministers be duly registered in a book kept on the Circuits for that purpose, the Book Steward be required to prepare proper books for such

registration.

3. Regarding the memorial of the British Columbia Conference, in reference to the eligibility of women to membership in our Church Courts, your Committee submit the following: That while the New Testament recognizes no distinction between Christian men and women which implies inferiority on either side, or involves any difference of right or privilege in the Church on the ground of sex; and while we recognize the noble service rendered by Christian womanhood in the Church of the living God, and gladly welcome her co-operation in every good word and work, we are of opinion that the question raised by the British Columbia Conference is one to be decided on grounds of Christian expediency, rather than of abstract right; and as there is not at the present time any connexional need, or any general opinion or desire which points to the change asked for in the composition of our Conferences by this memorial, we recommend that no action be taken.

4. Re the memorial of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Conference, asking for the payment of expenses incurred in defending the action of our Church Courts before the civil tribune, we recommend, that in view of the peculiar circumstances surrounding the case—rendering it entirely exceptional—together with the greatness of the expense, the sum of \$500 be paid from the General Conference Fund to the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Conference, to recoup that

Report No. 3.

Your Committee respectfully submit the following report on matters referred to them:—

1. In the matter of the memorial of the Bay of Quinte Conference, respecting the Nelles Memorial, your Committee recommend the General Conference to sanction the effort for the erection of a monument to mark the resting place of the late Dr. Nelles, and recommend it to the favorable consideration of all our Annual Conferences; and further recommend that a Special Committee be appointed by this General Conference to carry out this recommendation.

2. Your Committee have given the memorial from the Montreal Conference, re Criminal Law Amendment Act their serious consideration, and recommend this General Conference to grant the prayer of said memorial by petitioning the Dominion Government to so further amend said Act:

(1) That the age of consent be raised to sixteen years

(2) That girls in any employment whatever be afforded the same protection as is now afforded to girls employed in factories and workshops.

(3) That all minors be put on the same footing as heiresses, and the State take the place of guardians for girls who at present are without guardians.

3. Believing that the efforts of the "White Cross" and "White Shield" organizations have been productive of good in this Dominion, your Committee recommend that the General Conference hereby express its extreme satisfaction with the earnest efforts of said organizations in the prosecution of the Social Purity Movement.

4. A reference was handed to your Committee asking for the doing away with Quarterly Tickets; but as your Committee has been informed that the Committee on Discipline has dealt with this matter, we deem it unnecessary to take action in the matter.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON OBITUARIES.

The General Conference desires to place on record its deep sense of the loss sustained during the past Quadrennium through the lamented death

of two of the chief executive officers of the Church.

In the death of the Rev. John A. Williams, D.D., we mourn the loss of a revered and honored General Superintendent. Eloquent of speech, fervid in spirit, indefatigable in labor, his many years of toilful service claim for him the lasting gratitude of the entire Church. His robust and manly Christian character, his strong and tender brotherly love, his wise counsels and executive energy greatly contributed, under the blessing of God, to the success which attended the years of his joint administration of its public affairs. We thank God for his long life of usefulness, wherein he labored strenuously for the upbuilding of Christ's kingdom in the earth, and especially of the branch of the Church of 'which he was a trusted and honored minister.

The death of the Hon. John Macdonald removes from among us one of the foremost laymen of the Methodist Church. His services as Honorary Treasurer of the Missionary Society, as a judicious counsellor and as an earnest promoter of aggressive enterprises, gave a great impetus to our missionary operations. Nor were his sympathies and benefactions confined to his own Church. Catholic as Christianity itself, his generous contributions to many philanthropic objects, and his valuable services in the cause of morality and religion were employed for the benefit of all the Churches

and of the whole community.

The Rev. S. S. Nelles, D.D., LL.D., whose death created so large a vacancy in the noble staff of workers in the Educational Department of our Church, was for the long period of thirty-six years the head of our oldest and most important educational institution. To his scholarship, academic experience and unwearied industry may be traced much of the success of Victoria University. Learned, accomplished and high-souled, he commanded the affection of those who, as students, came under his influence. He will long be held in loving remembrance by the Church and by his native land.

The lamented decease of other honored ministers and lay members of the Methodist Church is admonitory to us to "work while it is called day,

for the night cometh when no man can work."

The venerable Senator Ferrier, continuing active in the service of his Divine Master; the devoted and eloquent Rev. S. J. Hunter, D.D.; those veteran pioneers of Methodism, the Rev. Humphrey Pickard, D.D, the Rev. S. Rose, D.D., and I. B. Aylesworth, M.D.; the man of consecrated life and princely liberality, Mr. William Gooderham; Mr. R. I. Walker, and Mr. Thomas Milner have, during the Quadrennium, passed from labor to reward. As the fields wave white unto the harvest, we pray the Master to send forth laborers unto the harvest-men who shall fill the places of those who have fallen by the way, till both they who sow and they who reap shall rejoice before God with exceeding great joy.

AN OVERTURE TO THE HIGHEST ECCLESIASTICAL AUTHORITIES OF THE UNIVERSE OF CHRISTENDOM.

To the General Conference of the Methodist Church of Canada:-

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States respectfully makes the following representation and overture:—

Notwithstanding the healthful influence of Christianity in all those lands that have received the Gospel, it is a lamentable fact that still international questions are referred to the arbitrament of arms. Many Christian countries maintain large standing armies and navies, that constantly menace the peace of the world, and are a grievous burden to the people that support them. Whilst some international differences are settled by peaceful arbitration, this is not recognized as the only and final resort for the adjudication of these questions. War and bloodshed are still the means to which Christian nations look to right their wrongs.

We believe that among the Christian people of our own and other lands there is a strong sentiment in opposition to this deplorable evil, and

in favor of referring all matters of international claims to some suitable tribunal for peaceful solution. And further, we entertain the hope that if the influence of this sentiment were properly brought to bear upon the governments of these Christian nations it would greatly further this desirable end.

We, therefore, ask you to join us in petitioning all the governments of Christian countries to take measures to banish warfare as the means of settling the strifes that arise between nations, and to substitute a more rational and Christian tribunal.

We send you a copy of a petition which we propose to address to these several governments, and ask you to adopt the same, if it meets your approval, or some other looking to the same end.

We further request that you appoint a delegate, who shall meet like delegates from the other bodies addressed, in on the day of A.D. 1891.

Trusting that our communication will receive your favorable consideration, we invoke upon you grace and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.

And, further, let it be borne in mind, that wars do not settle causes of dispute between nations on principles of right and justice, but upon the barbaric principle of the triumph of the strongest.

They have carefully considered that portion of the Report of the Commission on the Revision of Discipline, as well as the various memorials and special resolutions referred to them, and submit the following recommendations:—

- 2. That on page 182, line 8, the words "being saved by Thy grace," be substituted for "being delivered from Thy wrath."
- 4. That on page 184, at the conclusion of the selections from Scripture, the following be inserted:—
- "Then may the minister say: Dearly Beloved: Forasmuch as this child is now presented by you for Christian baptism, you must remember that it is your part and duty to see that he be taught, as soon as he shall be able to learn, the nature and end of this Holy Sacrament, and all those truths of the Holy Scriptures which reveal our duty and God's will concerning us. Bring him up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord, so that he may lead a virtuous and holy life, and, being sheltered from the dangers and temptations of the world, and kept safe from ungodly teaching and example, may be led to trust in Christ his Saviour, and abide through life a faithful member of His holy Church."
- 5. That the changes recommended in paragraph 52, the last clause of paragraph 53, also paragraphs 54 and 55, of the Report of the Commission on Revision of Discipline, be not adopted.
- 6. With regard to a memorial from the Quarterly Board of the Aylmer Circuit, London Conference, asking that paragraph 37, of the Discipline, be amended by the omission of the words "but should any candidates for baptism prefer another mode, the officiating minister may comply with their request," your Committee recommend that the amendment be not made.
- 7. That on page 187, line 10, for "everlasting life after death," "life everlasting" be substituted.
- 2. That on page 191, line 1, for "only promised to those," "promised to those only" be substituted.
- 3. Your Committee recommend the following in the order of administering the Lord's Supper:—
 - (1) That on page 194, line 6, the first word "but" be omitted.
 - (2) That on page 194, line 17, the first word "for" be omitted.
 - (3) That on page 194, line 21, the first word "but" be omitted.
 - (4) That on page 194, line 23, the first word "but" be omitted.
- (5) That on page 195, line 3, the words "person or persons" be substituted for "some fit person."
- (6) With regard to a special resolution of Dr. Willmott, that the last line in the second paragraph, on page 195, be amended by striking out the words "upon your knees," and inserting instead the words "before Him," your Committee recommend that the change be not made.

- (9) That on page 198, the word "first" be omitted from the first line, and the words "proceed to" from the second line.
- (11) Memorials were received from the British Columbia Conference, the Orangeville District, Toronto Conference, and a special resolution moved by Rev. John Kay, asking that the posture of communicants be that of sitting instead of kneeling; your Committee are of opinion that no one posture should be ordered to the exclusion of others, but they recommend that paragraph 38 of the Discipline be amended so as to read, "Let those persons who do not desire to receive the Lord's Supper kneeling, receive it either sitting or standing."
- (12) Concerning a memorial from the Quarterly Board of Euclid Avenue Church, Toronto, asking that laymen be allowed to assist in the administration of the Lord's Supper, your Committee recommend that the memorial be not entertained.
- 4. Your Committee recommend the following changes in the form of the solemnization of matrimony:—
 - (1) That on page 201, line 5, the word "special" be omitted.
 - (2) That on page 202, line 7, "he" shall be substituted for "is."
- 6. Your Committee recommend the following in the form of ordaining ministers:—
- (1) That on page 209, line 7, the word "alleged" be substituted for "objected."
 - (2) That on page 214, line 18, "so do" be substituted for "do so."
 - (3) That on page 215, line 6, "will" be substituted for "shall."
- (4) That on page 215, lines 12 and 18, "so do" be substituted for "do so."
- (5) That the change suggested in paragraph 68 of the Report of the Commission on Revision of Discipline be not made.
- (6) With regard to a special resolution of Rev. J. McAlister, that the last question proposed to candidates for ordination, found on page 215 of the Discipline, be expunged, your Committee recommend that such change be not made.
- 7. (4) Your Committee recommend, that on page 228, line 14, the word "before" be read instead of "under the feet of."

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

- 1. Only two memoriais have been presented to your Committee on the matter of Sabbath desecration. This may indicate that the Sabbath is properly observed, or, if violated, that there is general indifference to the evil.
- 2. Sabbath desecration most generally practised is that done by companies, notably the running of railway trains, streets cars, pleasure excursions, boat or otherwise, and we recommend our people to discountenance them in all proper ways.
- 3. We recognize the good work done by the Law and Order League in reducing Sabbath labor to a minimum in some places, and urge the formation of a League in any locality where the Sabbath is violated with impunity.
- 4. We are reminded that there is no law at present for punishing the employer for requiring the employee to labor on the Sabbath. We think such a law very necessary; and cannot speak too highly of the good work done by the Lord's Day Alliance in their efforts to secure legislation on the subject. The last General Conference appointed a committee to co-operate and confer with any similar committees appointed from other Churches.
- 5. Rev. John Scanlon of our own Church, and Rev. Dr. Armstrong of the Presbyterian Church, together with a few earnest Christian workers at Ottawa, and several members of Parliament, instituted the Lord's Day Alliance for the Dominion, which meets at Ottawa every year during the session of Parliament. The object of this Alliance is to secure necessary legislation for the proper observance of the Lord's Day. The late Hon. Senator Macdonald joined the Alliance, and rendered valuable assistance in the meetings of 1888-9.
- 6. The Alliance will furnish petitions to all our ministers and others, with the earnest request that they will use their utmost endeavor to obtain as large a number of signatures as possible, and forward the same to the Secretary of the Alliance at Ottawa, to be presented to the House of Parliament.
- 7. We heartily endorse the provisions of Mr. Charlton's bill for the better observance of the Lord's Day, and we urge our people to secure signatures for its adoption, and forward the same to Ottawa. The bill has now passed its second reading.
- 8. The keeping open of shops to a late hour on Saturday night is much to be deplored, as tending to infringe upon the proper observance of the Sabbath.

In many places, also, saloons, restaurants, butcher-shops, groceries and other places of business are opened on the Sabbath.

In reference to the memorial from a large number of milkmen of Montreal, respecting the delivery of make on the Sabbath; we are in full sympathy with the purport of the memorial, and pained to find so much Sabbath desecration in the unnecessary labor connected with the milk trade throughout the country.

- 9. We would recommend that paragraph 191, sub-section 11, page 90, of the Discipline, be amended by adding the words "and to enforce the proper observance of the Sabbath at such meetings."
- 10. The command, "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy," is still in force, and the blessing of the Lord is promised to those who keep the day holy: "If thou turn away thy foot from the Sabbath, from doing thy pleasure on My holy day; and call the Sabbath a delight; the holy of the Lord, honorable; and shalt honor Him, not doing thine own ways, nor finding thine own pleasure, nor speaking thine own words: then shalt thou delight thyself in the Lord; and I will cause thee to ride upon the high places of the earth, and feed thee with the heritage of Jacob thy father: for the mouth of the Lord hath spoken it."
- 11. We would recommend that the following be appointed by this Conference as members of the Sabbath Observance Committee to co-operate with the Lord's Day Alliance or any similar organization for securing the proper observance of the Lord's Day:—Revs. John Scanlon and Hugh Cairns, and the ministers stationed in Ottawa, and Messrs. Thos. Kenney, Wm. Bow and David McElroy, all of the Montreal Conference, and the following from each Conference, as corresponding members:—

Toronto, H. S. Matthews and J. T. Moore; London, Wm. McDonagh and Wm. Bowman; Guelph, J. E. Howell, M.A., and James Mills, M.A.; Niagara, T. W. Jackson and S. F. Lazier, Q.C.; Bay of Quinte, Wm. Jolliffe and E. D. O'Flynn; Manitoba and North-West, Andrew Stewart, B.D., and Geo. W. Beynon; British Columbia, Coverdale Watson and Daniel Spencer; New Brunswick and P. E. I., J. A. Clark, M.A., and Wm. Heard; Nova Scotia, T. Watson Smith and David Allison LL.D.; Newfoundland, T. H. James and Hon. J. J. Rogerson.

QUADRENNIAL REPORT OF THE SUNDAY-SCHOOL BOARD OF THE METHODIST CHURCH.

Through the blessing of God the past Quadrennium has been one of great success in every department of our Sunday-school work. The full result of that work cannot be tabulated or adequately represented in figures. Only the Great Dayshall declare it. The following statistics, however, will in part represent its progress:-

Number of schools in 1890, 3,173; number in 1886, 2,675; increase, 498.

Number of teachers in 1890, 28,411; number in 1886, 24,246; increase, 4,165.

Number of scholars in 1890, 226,050; number in 1886, 191,185; increase, 34,865.

Number meeting in class in 1890, 37,158; number in 1886, 31,496; increase, 5,622.

Number studying catechism in 1890, 36,486; number in 1886, 32,872; increase, 3,614.

Number who have taken temperance pledge during 1890, 49,419; number during 1886, 37,208; increase, 12,139.

Raised for missions in 1890, \$28,122; raised for missions in 1886, \$20,762; increase, \$7,360.

Raised for school purposes in 1890, \$105,313; for same purposes in 1886, \$77,692; increase, \$25,621.

Raised for Sunday-school Aid Fund in last Quadrennium, \$13,874; in previous Quadrennium, \$7,717; increase, \$6,157.

The detailed report of the Treasurer of this fund will show the steady growth in the income of this fund from its beginning in 1875.

GRANTS TO POOR SCHOOLS.

Special prominence has been given to the what may be called the missionary operations of the Board in promoting the establishment of new schools in remote and destitute neighborhoods, by means of grants of books and papers from the Sunday-school Aid and Extension Fund. In this way 498 new schools have been established in the last Quadrennium, and very many more, which in all probability could not have maintained an existence without the aid of the fund, have been liberally assisted. Schools applying for aid are required, if possible, to contribute something toward the grant given. In this way the schools assisted have, during the Quadrennium, contributed in part payment for grants the sum of \$5,175, as against \$1,822 during the previous Quadrennium, an increase of \$3,353.

The grants are given in small amounts, generally from \$5 to \$10 at a time, and are distributed through every province of the Dominion and Island of Newfoundland, especially among the fishing villages of the Maritime Conferences, among the new settlements of the Upper Ottawa and in the Muskoka and Algoma Districts, in Manitoba and the North-West, and in British Columbia. Many grateful testimonies show the warm appreciation with which these grants are received. Extracts from the communications are appended to this report.

The continued growth of the operations of the Sunday-school Board has required on the part of its Secretary a very extensive correspondence, averaging about 1,200 communications a year, or nearly 5,000 during the Quadrennium. The Secretary also superintends the preparation and mailing of the Sunday-school schedules, circulars, reports, etc., and the collection and tabulation of the statistics of the Sunday-school work. He has received and distributed to poor schools, during the Quadrennium, about 10,000 volumes of second-hand Sunday-school books. For these there are always numerous applications, and much good can be accomplished by schools sending to the Secretary their old libraries.

Within a very small fraction, of the entire income of the Board is disbursed directly for the benefit of poor schools, there being no expenses of management beyond a small amount for postage and petty sundries of the kind.

The extent of the Sunday-school operations of our Church, and the deep interest felt in those operations, is shown by the fact that the expenditure for school maintenance during 1890 reached the very large amount of \$105,313, an increase of one-fourth on the income of 1886. When to this is added the amount raised for missions, the \$28,122 for missions and \$3,517 for the Sunday-school Aid Fund, we have the aggregate of \$136,952, or nearly fifty cents per head for every scholar in the schools.

The number of books reported in the Sunday-schools is 266,277. In many cases these are almost the only books accessible in the families and communities where the schools exist. While a considerable proportion of these books are story books of not a very high grade, yet a large number are books of superior merit, and nearly all are of a direct religious tendency. An earnest effort has been made to improve the character of the Sunday-school libraries by the preparation of a "winnowed list" of about 1,600 volumes which have been carefully read by ministers of our Church; and by an impartial review and criticism of new issues from the press in the Sunday-school periodicals.

Few things are more encouraging than the growing interest of our Sunday-schools in the missionary cause. Much attention has also been given to missionary topics in the Sunday-school papers, and much missionary information has been imparted. In this the Editor has been greatly aided by letters from a number of missionaries of our Church in Japan, British Columbia, the North-West, Newfoundland, and other high places of the field." As a result of these combined efforts, and of the hearty sympathy and co-operation of the Sunday-school officers, the juvenile missionary offerings have increased, as shown above, from \$14,701.07 for all the Methodists of the Dominion in 1883, to \$20,762.97 for the United Methodist Church in 1886, and to \$27,851 in 1890.

The number of children and youth reported as studying that excellent compendium of Christian doctrine, the Methodist Catechism, is 35,854; but this is far too small a proportion out of 225,953 scholars. Superintendents and teachers are earnestly urged to do all they can to promote, as much as in their power, the study of those Christian doctrines that make wise unto salvation. These Catechism lessons find a place in all our Sunday-school Lesson papers, and circulate to the extent of over 324,000 copies every Lord's-day.

SUNDAY-SCHOOL PERIODICALS.

In no department of our Sunday-school work has more marked progress been exhibited than in the growing circulation and improved character of our Sunday-school periodicals. The circulation has increased from a total of 103,729 on March 31st, 1882, to 194,076 on March 31st, 1886, and to 252,566 on March 31st, 1890. But these figures do not represent the aggrega e circulation, as many schools are not open in March. The circulation at the 1st of September was 324,350. The following extract from the report of the Book Committee describes the character and work

of these periodicals:-

"These papers have also greatly improved in mechanical excellence and in style of illustration. There is scarcely a hamlet in the Englishspeaking parts of the country where they do not penetrate. From their cheapness, and by their distribution through the Sunday-schools, they reach many who possess no other religious reading, and in many cases no other reading of any sort. They do not lay claim to very high literary art. They are adapted to the comprehension of the humblest. But they bring the Word of Life to many by whom the voice of the living preacher is seldom heard. They are of much assistance to scores of thousands of faithful Sunday-school teachers in the instruction of the young people committed to their care. They focus upon the selected lessons all the light that can be concentrated from various sources, so as to be a continuous commentary, by some of the best Biblical scholars living, brought within the reach of the most remote, the poorest, and the humblest of these self-denying teachers, and of the scholars under their instruction. These papers are permeated throughout with sentiments of loyalty to Methodist doctrine and practice; with loyalty to Queen and country; with implacable hostility to the twin evils, intoxicating liquors and tobacco; with love for pure, sound, wholesome literature; and, above all, they are filled with those holy teachings which make wise unto salvation. They furnish important vantage ground for moulding, in large degree, the future of the Church and nation, by influencing toward piety and godliness, in the most susceptible and formative period, the minds of the young people of Methodism. Of these papers, over 160,000 pages are printed for every working-day in the year. influence of such a stream of directly religious teaching proceeding from the press is incalculable—only the Great Day shall reveal it."

It is a gratifying fact that the foreign periodicals, which once had a large circulation in our schools, have in very large measure been superseded by our own papers, which, for their size and character, are among the

cheapest in the world.

Notwithstanding the growth of our Sunday-schools, there are still a very large number of appointments in connection with which no Sunday-schools are yet organized. In some cases there are union schools, where no schools of separate denominations can be maintained. But where there are no such schools the assistance of the ministers is urgently solicited, that in every place where there is Methodist preaching there may also be a Methodst Sunday-school. It is in helping this work that the Sunday-school Aid and Extension Fund has been most useful in the past, and may be expected to be increasingly useful in the future.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY-SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

1. The Sunday-school Committee desire to report the following emendations in the Quadrennial Report of the statistics of our Sunday-(See corrected figures of Appended Report.)

2. Whereas much obstruction to Sunday-school work results from the parades on Sunday of uniformed societies and their public meetings during Sunday-school hours,

Resolved,—That it be a recommendation to our ministers and trustees of our churches, that the use of these churches be not granted for any service at an hour that will interfere with the services of the Sunday-

3. For the better organization of our Sunday-school work in cities, it is recommended that local associations of the Sunday-schools in our towns and cities, where practicable, be organized.

4. The Committee recommend the following changes in the Discipline on Sunday-schools :-

5. Whereas that excellent compendium of Christian Doctrine—the Methodist Catechism-is not studied in the schools and households of our people to the extent that is desired, although marked improvement in this respect is reported; the Committee recommend that the following committee be appointed to revise Methodist Catechisms numbers I. and II. (with proof texts from the authorized version), for the purpose of making them better adapted for the study and comprehension of young people, viz.: Revs. Dr. Potts, A. M. Phillips and W. H. Withrow, and Messrs. J. B. Boustead and W. H. Pearson.

6. Resolved,—That the Book Committee be requested to authorize and direct the publishing of the revised catechism.

7. That we strongly reaffirm the instructions of the Discipline in sections 95 and 316 for the forming of catechumen classes for children of tender years, and their sedulous training in the nurture and admonition of the Lord. We respectfully request the co-operation of pastors, teachers and class-leaders in carrying out more fully the instructions of the Discipline in this respect

8. The following recommendations are made with reference to the Epworth League:-

Whereas, under authority of a Committee of the General Conference and of the General Conference Sunday-school Board, an organization of Young People's Societies, known as the Epworth League, has been formed in the Methodist Church in Canada and Newfoundland, and local associations, now numbering 137, have also been formed;

And whereas, there have been formed also a number of local associations of the United Society of Christian Endeavor in our own and other Christian Churches;

And whereas, it is deemed highly desirable that the Epworth League in Canada should continue to maintain fraternal relations with the Epworth League of the Methodist Episcopal Church of the United States, and should also cultivate Christian fellowship with the Society of Christian Endeavor;

And whereas, the last International Convention of the United Society of Christian Endeavor at St. Louis, provided for affiliation with other Young People's Societies of a similar character;

Therefore resolved, that the General Conference be requested to authorize and recommend the union of the Epworth League and Christian Endeavor Societies in connection with our Church on the following basis, viz.:—

- (1) That the Society of Christian Endeavor form the Department of Christian Work of the Epworth League.
- (2) That the Departments of Literary Work, Social Work, and Mercy and Help of the Epworth League be the same departments of the United Society.
- (3) That while adopting the name, Christian Endeavor, as the name of the Department of Christian Work of this Society, its general designation and official title shall be "The Epworth League."
- (4) That a pledge of Christian consecration, combining the essentials of the pledges of both the Epworth League and Christian Endeavor Society, be required of all the active members of the united society.
- (5) And that the General Conference recommend that all the Young People's Societies of the Methodist Church be organized on this basis.

RULES FOR THE ORGANIZATION OF THE EPWORTH LEAGUE.

- (6) The League shall be under the general direction and control of a joint Board, composed of the members of the Suncay-school Board of the Methodist Church and of representatives of the League from each Annual Conference, all of whom shall be nominated by the delegations of the Annual Conferences present at the General Conference, and elected by the General Conference. All members of this joint Board shall have the right of voting on all subjects coming before the Board, whether relating to the League or the Sunday-school.
- (7) The Treasurer and Secretary of the Sunday-school Board shall also be Treasurer and Secretary of the Epworth League.
- (8) In each Annual Conference there shall be an Epworth League Committee, analogous to the Sunday-school Committee, and composed like it, of one minister and one layman from each District, elected by the District Meeting. To this committee shall be assigned all matters connected with the Epworth League.

It is recommended that an Epworth League convention be held annually in each District, at such time and place as the District Meeting shall decide.

- (10) That the President of a local Epworth League shall be approved by the Quarterly Meeting at the next ensuing meeting after his election as such President, and shall be ex officio a member of the Quarterly Board.
- (11) The Committee also recommend that for the words "General Conference Sunday-school Board," wherever they occur in the Discipline, the words "Sunday-school and Epworth League Board" be substituted.
- (12) That the preparation of the Constitution, By-Laws, and Course of Reading of the League be referred to a committee composed of the General Superintendent and the following persons: The Revs. Dr. Potts, Dr. Stafford, Dr. Johnston, A. C. Courtice, G. A. Mitchell, A. M. Phillips,

Report amended by the following:-

That the department of Christian Endeavor shall always be essential and fundamental in the organization and working of an Epworth League.

(13) The Committee also recommend the adoption of the following

Whereas the Epworth League is established on the basis of the broadest catholicity and with the desire of cultivating Christian fellowship with all who love our Lord Jesus Christ;

And whereas there exist, in a number of our own and other churches, branches of the Society of Christian Endeavor, Kings' Daughters, Kings' Sons, and other Young People's Societies, be it

Resolved,—That the Epworth League in Canada, while maintaining close affiliation with the great and growing Epworth League of the Methodist Episcopal Church of the United States, desires also to hold an intimate and fraternal relationship with the societies of Christian Endeavor, Kings' Daughters, Kings' Sons, and all other societies for the promotion of Christian culture and Christian service.

Resolved, also,—That while in no case interfering with the autonomy and self-management of any young people's association, unless such association shall freely and of its own choice become enrolled in the Epworth League, we at the same time cordially invite all young people's associations of the Methodist Church to affiliate with the Epworth League and become a department of the same.

Resolved, also,—That the Epworth League, while retaining its corporate existence and autonomy, desires to have Christian fellowship with the young people's associations of other Churches, and welcomes to all its religious and social meetings and public conventions all members of any kindred association, and invites their co-operation in Christian work.

- 9. It is recommended that home classes, for those who cannot attend Sunday-schools, but who can be induced to study the regular Sunday-school lessons systematically, be constituted, where practicable, and reported in connection with the church or appointment where they are held.
- 10. That the General Conference request the postal authorities to allow religious and Sunday-school papers, many of which are a free donation to poor schools, to be sent through the mails at the rate heretofore obtaining of one cent per pound, instead of at the rate of one cent per two ounces, as now required.

This was amended by referring the matter to the publishers of these papers.

11. With respect to the memorial praying for the adoption of a system of graded classes with the Primary, Secondary and Adult departments,

promotion from one to another of which shall be by competitive examination, and that Lesson Helps be prepared to meet the requirements of such graded classes, the Committee recommends that the subject be referred to the Sunday-school Board.

- 12. That the subject of the publication of Sunday-school and other papers, other than the *Guardian*, *Magazine* and *Wesleyan*, be referred to the Book Committee, with authority to take such action in the case as the Committee may think best.
- 13. It is recommended that, as far as practicable, all members of the Sunday-school and Epworth League Board be active members of the department of work which they represent.
- 14. With reference to the memorial asking for the appointment of a Children's Day, on which collections shall be made for the purpose of aiding the education of candidates for the ministry, the Committee reaffirms the decision of the General Conference of 1886, that it is inadvisable to recommend the addition of this collection to the existing collections for Missions, for School purposes and for the Sunday-school Aid and Extension Fund.
- 15. The Committee strongly recommend the development of the Sunday-school idea, so as to promote the organization of congregational adult Bible classes in connection with all our schools.
- 16. The memorial asking for an improved Sunday-school Register, it is recommended be referred to the Sunday-school Board.
- 17. It is recommended that total abstinence pledge sheets or books be prepared for use in all our Sunday-schools, in which the names of teachers and officers and scholars be enrolled every year; the members so enrolled to be reported annually to the May Quarterly meeting; also that suitable pledge cards be prepared for individual signature.
- 18. The memorial concerning the systematic Biblical instruction of youth, with competitive examinations, was referred to the Epworth League Committee, to incorporate the plan with the Bible study of the League.
- 19. The Sunday-school Committee make the following recommendation:—

Whereas the Sunday-school libraries of the Methodist Church circulate more literature for young people than any other organization in the country, your Committee express the conviction that while a large proportion of the books in those libraries are of a wholesome and elevating character, they also contain a proportion of works of fiction of a sensational and inferior literary style and cultivating only worldly ideas and unspiritual views of life. We beg to urge library committees to exercise the utmost vigilance in selecting their libraries, so as to prevent their being harmful instead of helpful to the communities in which they circulate. To secure this end, we recommend all our schools to procure their libraries, when practicable, from our own Publishing Houses and Book Rooms at Toronto, Montreal and Halifax, and especially from the "Winnowed Lists" of selected books of those houses; also that additional "Winnowed Lists" of unexceptional books be issued, and large supplies of the same kept in stock.

Your Committee, in concluding their pleasing duties, desire to express their gratitude to Him "from whom all blessings flow" for the important increases all along the line of Sunday-school work. An army of now 254,461 teachers, officers and scholars—an increase during the Quadrennium of 39,030—should call for "songs of loudest praise," as one of the signs of the times pointing to the realization of the "ideal Sunday-school." We note the increase in adult classes of 12,425. We further have to report a substantial increase in the number of adult classes taught by the pastor, resulting in the addition of many grown-up persons to the Sunday-school. If added proof were needed of the practical interest taken by the Church in our Sunday-school work, it is found in the large amount of \$105,313 raised for school purposes, an increase of \$25,621, and in the erection of

Sunday-school rooms specially adapted for the wants of the school.

The operations of the Sunday-school Aid and Extension Fund have greatly promoted the establishment of 498 new schools and their assistance in destitute places. The aid given by that fund was \$13,874 for the last Quadrennium, as against \$7,717 during the previous Quadrennium, and \$3,331 in the Quadrennium before that.

The circulation of the papers has also increased phenomenally, till they now reach an aggregate of 324,350, or an issue of 160,000 printed pages of directly religious teaching for every working day in the year.

In view of what has been achieved in the past Quadrennium, your Committee look hopefully into the future, and believe that, by God's blessing, the Sunday-schools of our Church will, in the ensuing Quadrennium, go forward in the work given them of winning souls to Christ and building souls up in the Church.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

That, as the development of the spirit of benevolence on the part of our Sunday-school scholars would not only be a means of grace to our young people, but also a means of largely aiding the funds of our Church;

Resolved,—That the Sunday-school Board be instructed to encourage all our Sunday-schools to adopt the best methods of developing the liberality of the children of our schools, especially in support of the Missionary Fund of the Church.

The following changes in the Discipline were recommended by the Sunday-school Committee, and adopted:—

V. Elections.

308. The Committee of Management shall annually elect all the officers and teachers at its regular meeting nearest to the first of May.

1. The Superintendent of the Circuit shall nominate for the office of Superintendent of the school two or more persons, and the Committee of Management shall elect by ballot.

VI. Meetings.

309. Meetings of the Committee of Management shall be held quarterly, or as much oftener as the Committee shall, by resolution, decide.

2. Special meetings of the Committee of Management may be called at any time by the Secretary, at the request of the Superintendent of the

Circuit or the Superintendent of the school.

314. The Superintendent of the school shall present, at each meeting of the Quarterly Official Board, a report concerning the state of the school, and shall cause the Annual Schedule to be filled up and present the same to the fourth meeting of the Quarterly Official Board of the Circuit.

In section 319, second line, strike out the word "juvenile."

324. There shall be a Sabbath-school Committee for each Annual Conference, composed of two members from each District, as provided by section 321, of which the President of the Annual Conference shall be Chairman; but in his absence, the Committee shall proceed to elect its own Chairman and Secretary and Treasurer.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SUSTENTATION.

Your Committee begs leave to report, that having given this important subject full and earnest consideration, in the light of all available infor-

mation, the following is presented as the result:-

1. It is ascertained that the net aggregate deficits sustained by the brethren in the active work, last year, amounted to \$110,717, after including all supplementary grants from Connexional Funds, and that this large deficiency on salaries was borne by ministers whose appropriations were less than \$750 each—indeed, nearly the whole amount by men receiving less than \$700.

2. The official returns show that 166 ordained married ministers of our Church received, last year, less than \$500 each, and 180 additional, less than \$600 each, as salary; and that, but for the help from the Funds, a very much larger number would have received like limited support.

3. From the foregoing, your Committee has unanimously agreed to

offer for your consideration the following resolution, viz.:-

That in view of the above recited facts, and in harmony with memorials from the London and Niagara Conferences, we regard the maintenance of a Sustentation Fund as an imperative necessity for our entire work; and as the efforts of the past four years in this direction have been, so far, satisfactory, we recommend to the General Conference to enact that each of our Annual Conferences may have a Sustentation Fund, and that the government of such Fund, and also the full control and management of its income, be left entirely with the several Annual Conferences. The object of this Fund shall be to secure salaries of not less than \$750 for ordained married ministers; \$400 for ordained unmarried ministers, and \$350 for probationers.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

We also make the following suggestions for the direction of District and Annual Conference officials:-

1. That Financial Secretaries be required to compare their receipts with the figures placed in the authorized schedule, and see that they

2. That Treasurers of Connexional Funds should take pains to see that the schedule reports harmonize with their receipts.

3. That District Secretaries should be made responsible for the revision and harmonization of all Circuit and District schedules.

4. That two members of the District Meeting, one minister and one layman, be appointed to audit all the Circuit and District schedules, and see that the extensions and additions are correct.

5. That Chairmen of Districts insist upon full and complete returns being furnished at the May District Meeting.

6. That Secretaries of Annual Conferences be not allowed to alter returns of District Secretaries at the Conference.

7. We recommend the appointment of a General Conference Statistician, to tabulate and present at the General Conference the various statistics

8. That a set of General Conference schedules shall be sent each year to the Secretaries of the several Annual Conferences, to be filled out by the Annual Conference Statistical Committee, and forwarded by the Secretary to the said Statistician, who shall prepare a tabulated statement, a copy of which shall be furnished the several Conference Secretaries, to be inserted in their Annual Conference Minutes.

9. This Committee desire to place on record its appreciation of the very laborious and valuable services of Rev. Dr. Cornish in connection with the collection and tabulation of the statistics of the various Conferences of the Western Section of our work, during the past Quadrennium, and strongly recommend his appointment as General Conference Statistician, and that he be paid \$50 from the General Conference fund for his services during the ensuing Quadrennium.

10. Your Committee would also express its appreciation of Dr. Cornish's very valuable work, "Cyclopædia of Canadian Methodism," and recommend that the General Conference request him to publish an appen-

dix to the same, covering the period between 1880-90.

11. We further request that Rev. T. W. Jackson and the Chairman of this Committee be appointed a committee to superintend the publication of the new schedule.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

The Committee on the State of the Work desire to report :-

1. That in reference to means and methods of Christian work in connection with District Meetings and Annual Conferences, no change be recommended, as the case is already provided for in the Discipline.

2. That in reference to the question of the relation of baptized children to the Church, it is recommended that we call attention to the decision of the Conference as found in Discipline, page 36, and urge upon all our ministers the importance of a careful and conscientious compliance with

what is contained therein.

3. On the question of employing special evangelists, this Committee believes there is need of great care on the part of those who seek the aid of such an agency. The practice of depending on these to gather in the unsaved, instead of expecting to do so in the ordinary means, and through the united efforts of pastor and people, tends to the nonuse of the revival power of the Church and the training of our people, to expect conversions only in connection with such special services, as well as the danger of weakening the ties that bind the people to the pastor. And, believing that such a condition of things is not promotive of a high type of spiritual life nor of continuous good, this Committee recommend:—

(1) That no evangelist be employed whose teaching is not in harmony with our doctrinal standards or whose work tends to lessen attachment to

our Church.

(2) That the Annual Conferences place no minister in the position of a special evangelist without the fullest evidence that he is called of God to that particular work, and that they permit none to give themselves to this work without their sanction. When evangelists other than the recognized ministers of the Methodist Church are employed, Superintendents of Circuits are strongly recommended to engage only those that are recognized by and are amenable to the Church; and such evangelists shall be under the supervision of the pastor of the church where they may labor.

(3) Where any minister is employed as an evangelist, arrangements be made by which a regular salary shall be paid, the contributions of the people being paid into a fund for that purpose.

4. On how to render the class-meeting more effective for good, this Committee, believing this means of grace to be of vital importance in promoting the spiritual prosperity of the Church, would earnestly recommend that on every District one or more class-leaders' conventions be held at such times as the Financial District Meeting may determine, for the purpose of discussing such subjects as pertain to their work, with a view of their being better fitted for the same.

5. That this Conference, feeling the importance of a more definite recognition of woman's work in connection with the Methodist Church, recommends that each Annual Conference may, if deemed desirable, make provision for such a systematic organization of consecrated Christian women as will give them an official relation to the Church similar to the order of deaconesses in primitive Christianity. Such women, being duly qualified, shall be employed as aids to the pastor; no vow shall be exacted from them, nor uniform dress required, neither shall life-long service or enforced residence be necessary.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF THE TREASURERS OF THE SUPERANNUA-TION FUND.

A review of the past four years will show an increase in the number of claimants of eleven ministers, twenty-two widows and seven children, forty in all classes, with additional claims, \$12,199.04.

The amounts raised on circuits this year, as compared with the amount raised in 1886, is in advance, \$10,254.33; while the amount raised by ministerial subscription during the same period has fallen off

This latter result is largely accounted for by a practice which has grown out of the legislation of the last General Conference, by which probationers are not required to pay their personal subscriptions annually. It was considered sufficient if four years' subscription was paid before ordination, and very few now pay annually. There is a list of subscriptions unpaid by our young men this year of over \$1,000, and the Treasurers are fully satisfied it will be more difficult for them to pay these subscriptions at the close of their probation than to do it year by year.

The securities held by the Treasurer on behalf of the Fund were all examined by a competent committee of laymen appointed by the Board, and were declared satisfactory. Certain doubtful amounts that had been carried on through the books for a number of years were ordered by the Board to be written off, and the accounts as presented in the balance sheet are considered to be reliable and satisfactory.

The following financial statement will show the progress made during the past Quadrennium, as well as the present state of the Fund :-

7. That paragraph 416 read: "When a superannuated minister has commuted his claim, and that of his wife and children, he shall not be allowed any further claim on this Fund, although he may return to the effective work by permission of his Annual Conference.

8. That to paragraph 431 there be added, "such commutation shall cancel all claim of wife and children."

10. To paragraph 408, add: "If the Superintendent have a colleague, the responsibility for making up any deficiency in the assessment on the Circuit or Mission shall be divided between them in proportion to their respective salaries."

11. That paragraph 396 read: "The Fund shall be managed by a Board, composed of twenty-six members, thirteen of whom shall be laymen who are members of the Church.

12. The Conference recommend that but one meeting of the Board of Management shall be held each year.

Report No. 3.

1. The Committee recommend that paragraph 414 be changed to read: "All ministers hereafter, coming to us from other Churches, shall be allowed a claim upon the Fund according to the number of years they shall have travelled in connection with any of our Conferences connected with this Fund."

3. That paragraph 434 read: "Any minister who shall leave our work, shall thereby forfeit one-half the amount he has paid into the Fund.

4. That to paragraph 433 there be added, "and shall have no further

5. That paragraph 405 read: "From donations, bequests, and legacies," etc.

6. That paragraph 407 read: "The basis of assessment shall be the amount raised on the Circuit for ministerial support, and the following Connexional Funds—Union Church Relief, Contingent, Educational, Sunday-school Aid, General Conference, Superannuation and General Missionary Funds."

7. That paragraph 409 read: "The calculation for each year shall be based on the income and return of the year preceding, as found in a certified list to be furnished by the Secretary of each Annual Conference to the General Treasurer of the Fund immediately on the rising of his Conference."

8. Add to paragraph 401: "The Investment Committee shall also be an Advisory Committee, to which the Treasurer may refer in any cases in which he may need their advice during the intervals of the meetings of the Board."

10. The Committee having considered the several memorials and recommendations submitted to their consideration, asking that the principle of equitable apportionment for raising the amount required for this Fund be abolished, recommend that for the present no change be made. This item was referred back to the Committee, and afterwards to the Commission referred to in subsequent paragraph.

11. Whereas a number of memorials from Quarterly Boards and District Meetings, relating to the present Constitution of the Superannuation Fund, indicate the existence of some dissatisfaction with the method of raising and distributing the Fund, the Committee recommend, that in view of the importance of the interests involved, and the many persons affected by the operation of this Fund, this General Conference appoint a Commission, composed of ministers and laymen in equal numbers, from the Western Conferences, to take into full consideration, during the next Quadrennium, the whole question of the Constitution of the Fund, with a view to such adaptations as shall make it acceptable to the Church. The Commission to report to the next General Conference.

12. Whereas certain memorials have been referred by the Conference to this Committee, asking that the Fund be divided into two parts—one part to be made up from ministerial subscriptions, legacies, grants from the Book Room and revenue from invested capital: the other part to be made up from the contributions of the Churches, and that from this latter Fund aid be given to the superannuated ministers only who are needy. The Committee recommend that the subject-matter of these memorials be remitted to the Commission already recommended to the Conference, and

that for the present we recommend no change.

13. Whereas a number of memorials from Quarterly Boards and District Meetings have, by the Conference, been referred to the Committee, asking that the salary of all ministers shall be assessed two per cent. for

the Fund, the Committee recommend:-

(a) That each probationer and minister, whose salary is six hundred dollars or under, shall pay into this Fund the sum of twelve dollars per annum, the same to be paid year by year, as specified in paragraph 403. In the case of probationers, the payments shall be in accordance with the credit of their years travelled; and in the computation of claims, four years thus credited shall be reckoned as the term of probation.

(b) Each minister, whose salary is more than six hundred dollars per annum, shall pay into this Fund a sum which shall equal two per cent. on the amount received from his Circuit or Mission as salary, board and fuel; such amount to include appropriations from the Missionary and

other Connexional Funds.

This rule shall apply to all Conference officials, evangelists, and all other ministers not engaged in active pastoral work, except superannuated and supernumerary ministers.

CHANGES IN THE CONSTITUTION OF THE SUPERNUMERARY MINISTERS' AND MINISTERS' WIDOWS' FUND OF THE THREE MARITIME CONFERENCES.

1. Sec. 440—To amend as follows: After the word "meeting" in the third line, to read, "Summoned not later than the sixth day of the session of the General Conference by one of the General Superintendents, at which he or one of the Presidents of the Annual Conferences shall preside, to consider the affairs of this Fund, and to elect by ballot two persons, a minister and a layman, as General Treasurers of the Fund."

2. After sec. 446, the following: "A special meeting of the Committee shall be summoned in the event of the death or disability of one of the General Treasurers, by the surviving one, and in case of emergency, on the call of four of the members of the General Committee. At such meeting any business may be transacted that is competent for any annual meeting to discharge."

3. That sec. 447 be amended by the inserting after the words "Investment Committee," of the following words, "which, under direction of the General Committee, shall have the management of the capital stock of the Fund," and also by the following addition, "the General Committee at its annual meeting shall appoint an Audit Committee of two persons for the ensuing year."

4. That sec. 448 be amended by omission of words, "Secretary and Treasurer," in second line on page 166, and by insertion of words, "it shall be the duty of said committee," instead of words, "it shall be its duty."

5. After 448 the following section be added: "Each Conference shall appoint the Secretary-Treasurer of the aforesaid committee, whose duty it shall be to receive all ministerial payments and moneys collected on the circuits, and generally, as representative of the General Treasurer, to transact any business of a financial nature connected with this Fund in his Conference, and to account for the same to the General Treasurers; also to present each year to Conference an abstract of the current income and capital stock accounts as prepared by the General Committee, and to

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SYSTEMATIC BENEFICENCE.

Your Committee having duly considered the memorial of the Niagara Conference, on the subject of Systematic Beneficence, beg leave to report:—

That the principle of systematic Beneficence, beg leave to report:—
enjoined in the Holy Scriptures from the earliest times. The example of Abraham, who paid tithes to Melchisedec, priest of the Most High God, and of Jacob, who vowed one-tenth of his increase to God, as well as the general prevalence of the tithe system among various nations, shows its early, and probably divine, origin. It was rigidly enforced under the Mosaic economy, and is endorsed by the sacred writers down to Malachi, who closes the Old Testament with withering rebukes against those who had robbed God of His just claims upon their property, and exhorts them to "Bring all the tithes into the storehouse that there may be meat in mine house, and prove me now herewith, saith the Lord of hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven and pour you out a blessing that

In the New Testament, the payment of tithes receives the sanction and commendation of Christ himself; while the Apostle Paul teaches the duty of proportionate and systematic giving, in his directions to the Corinthians, that each "Lay by him in store, as God has prospered him, on the first day of the week."

The obligations of Christian stewardship rest upon every follower of our Lord Jesus Christ, who, "Though He was rich, yet for our sakes He became poor," and in view of the inestimable blessings secured to us by the Gospel, and the imperative commission to preach it to every creature, we are persuaded that every true disciple of the Master will strive to exceed the minimum of one-tenth by liberal offerings according to his means.

The experience of the Christian Church corresponds with the teaching of the Bible, that those who contribute according to the scriptural method are prospered spiritually as well as in material things, while at the same time the treasury of the Lord's house is proportionately replenished.

While we hail with delight the tendency in our Church to rise to a higher plane of religious consecration and giving, we must at the same time express our regret that so much practical unbelief still exists on this subject, as amply shown by the straitened condition of many of her institutions and agencies, because of the scanty resources at her command.

We have, therefore, to make the following recommendations:-

1. That all our people be urged to give to the cause of God as He has prospered them, at the rate of at least one tenth of their income, and that the use of all unscriptural methods of raising money for Church purposes be discountenanced as unworthy a Christian people.

2. That in addition to the teaching of the pulpit on the duty of systematic giving, our ministers be earnestly requested to arrange for the circulation, throughout their congregations, of suitable literature on this important subject.

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

During the Quadrennium now closing the Temperance question has attracted a large degree of public attention. When this Conference met four years ago, the law known as the Canada Temperance Act of 1878 was in force in the majority of the counties composing the Dominion of Canada, if we omit those of the Province of Quebec. In 1887 and 1888, the increasing opposition of the supporters of the liquor traffic culminated in a vigorous and wide-spread effort for the repeal of the Act. The success which attended this movement was a surprise to both of the contending parties. As the wave of prohibition sentiment had swept over the Dominion with irresistible torce in 1884 and 1885, so in 1887 and 1888 the repeal movement carried nearly all the same counties. The supporters of the license system asserted that the success of the repeal movement proved the unwillingness of the people to bow to sumptuary laws, while, on the other hand, the advocates of prohibition affirmed that the secret of the successs of the movement was to be found chiefly in the want of proper enforcement of the prohibitory clauses of the Act. This, your Committee feel bound by evidence to accept as the true explanation of an apparent surprising change in public opinion. We affirm it as our strong conviction that, if the same energy had been displayed in enforcing the provisions of the Scott Act as in the administration of our Customs laws and the laws against illicit stills, the possibility of suppressing the traffic of intoxicants by legal enforcement would before this have been fully and clearly demonstrated.

The immediate effect of the success which attended the repeal movement was a feeling of despondency in the minds of many true and earnest men and women; however, these results were but momentary in their duration. As soon as the temperance host had recovered from its surprise, the question was heard on every side, "What is now our duty?" and the answer came in strong and clear tones, "We must now work for total

The defeat of the Scott Act in so many counties had purified the intellectual atmosphere, and revealed to us that victory over evil must result from united action in favor of the most perfect legislation human thought could devise. This unanimity of purpose having been reached, the next question to discuss was, "How can we secure the legislation we demand?" and this is to-day the question which absorbs the attention of the friends of temperance. It is an intensely practical question, the most difficult problem we have yet had to solve: yet, from the very difficulties which surround it, we gain inspiration and courage, inasmuch as it shows the nearness of our approach to the stronghold of the enemy. It is not when we are skirmishing around the outposts of the enemy that we will find the most active fighting, or the most formidable obstacles to overcome; but when, having carried the outposts, we approach the very citadel itself, and stand only at arm's length, and batter at the very gates, that we will arouse the most determined efforts and the strongest defences of the enemy. And here the army of temperance stands to-day. The evils produced by this traffic are admitted.

It is execrated in homes and denounced in halls; from the judicial bench, it is charged with being the source of nine tenths of the crimes which cause our land to mourn, and which paralyze our civilization. Every form of iniquity, from the heritage of ignorance imposed on the child to the crimes which are expiated on the gallows, finds its parentage in this most prolific mother of evil. The press of our land has thundered against it, and day by day has held up faithfully before a Christian sivilization scenes of such horror as appeal to senses not blunted by continual wrong-doing. The pulpits of our land have borne testimony against it, and have held up the fierce denunciation of Almighty God against the drunkard-maker. The traffic bears the curses of suffering humanity. The utter hopelessness of removing its evils by legalizing the principle, which is admittedly a moral wrong, and of rendering it harmless by hedging it with partial safeguards, is confessed by all who have thoroughly studied the matter without personal interest or prejudice.

Thus have we been brought to legal prohibition as the only remedy, and the aim to secure it concernates the effort of the friends of temperance to-day. We have learned that the prevalence of right sentiment without concerted action cannot, of itself, accomplish the desired end. We have till the present been impotent to devise a scheme by which we can remove the supremacy of the spirit of party politics from the hearts of our own brethren, and supplant it by the principles which we profess, and for the prevalence of which we all bow in supplication before our God. we pause here, we are the sport of our enemies, and our cause must either fail or be entrusted by God to more earnest workers.

We must by united action give a political value to our forces, so that the desires of temperance men will be a factor in determining the fates of candidates for parliamentary honors, or we must leave the control of our legislatures, as at present, largely in the hands of our enemies.

There is need of political force to secure the ends at which we aim,

and the appeal of our brethren in the North-West for aid is a loud call for united action on our part. How this is to be accomplished is, at the present moment, both the problem for the temperance men and the abhorrence of the mere party politician, the horizon of whose political sky is bounded by the advancement of party interests. Your Committee is not unaware of the efforts that for some time past have been put forth by earnest men to accomplish this desired end, but the present stage of these various proceedings is not sufficiently advanced to enable us to formulate any definite line of action which we can confidently recommend for the adoption of this Conference. While we disclaim any intention of underestimating the standard of political morality, or of placing too small a value on political intelligence, yet we cannot affirm that the antecedents of either political party warrant us in holding out the hope that, with the present attitude of our ballot-holders, either will espouse our cause and stand as the defender of our principles. The experiment of pledging candidates has been tried, but it has not thus far been a conspicuous success, nor do your Committee anticipate the possibility of obtaining the goal by attempts to pledge members of Parliament, and yet leave the individual voter free from the obligation to support the candidate who adopts this principle.

If we raise a firm edifice, we must have a firm foundation, and in this country the ballot is the foundation of our political structure. Make the ballot-holder right, and the righteousness of the one who represents his principles must necessarily follow; but all attempts at political reform which fail to reach the ballot-holder will end in failure, and leave the victory where it now rests, with the saloon, which does control its ballotholders. They have their party allegiances, but when loyalty to party and loyalty to the liquor interests come into antagonism, party interests are disregarded, and their ballots are invariably cast in the manner which will best further the prosperity of the liquor traffic. Until the friends of temperance exalt their allegiance to principle above that which they owe to mere party, we repeat we must remain the laughing-stock and derision of our enemies. We, therefore, urge upon the Conference to adopt some m-thod by which the friends of this great cause can bind themselves together and give each other the assurance that they will stand firmly by their principles, and support only such men as will honestly represent their prohibition sentiments in the Houses of Legislature to which they may be elected. For the accomplishment of this end, the desirability of which we have repeatedly affirmed, we recommend that the General Conference adopt some plan by which the temperance sentiment of our Church will be utilized in bringing about the adoption of a prohibitory law.

In harmony with the Standing Committee on Temperance of the Presbyter in Church, action was taken to bring the question of petitioning the Senate and House of Commons, asking for immediate prohibition, before the various Protestant Church courts of the Dominion. Favorable answers have been received from many of them, and we trust the Temperance Committee of this Conference will bring before you such recommendations in this direction as will secure your heartiest endorsation.

The General Conference of 1886 divided this Permanent General Committee into three sections, viz.: Ontario, Quebec and the Eastern Provinces. There has been no meeting of the General Committee until

To the Members and Adherents of the Methodist Church in the Province of

DEAR BRETHREN AND FRIENDS,-The General Conference of the Methodist Church, in session assembled in the city of Toronto in September, 1886, appointed a permanent Committee on Temperance, dividing it for convenience of meeting into three sections, viz. : Ontario, Quebec and

A general effort to repeal the Canada Temperance Act in the cities. and counties in this Province where it is now in force has been begun, and to give this movement greater force a reign of lawlessness and violence has been inaugurated, and, to all appearance, has become the settled policy of

For these and other reasons, a meeting of the Ontario section of the Committee was convened by the Rev. John A. Williams, D.D., General Superintendent, on the 12th day of September, 1887, when, after a careful consideration of the present aspect of the temperance question, it was decided to call the prayerful attention of the Methodist people of this Province to the emphatic utterance of the General Conference on the subject, and its application to the present situation.

ENFORCEMENT OF SCOTT ACT.

The Scott Act is in force in twenty-five counties and two cities in Ontario, and in the whole Dominion the law has been adopted in sixtythree counties and cities. The net majority of the votes for the Act thus far in all the contests is 49,955. It is now more than eight years since it was first voted upon and adopted, and no county or city has yet rejected it, although repeated efforts have been made to do so. We regard it of great moment that our people give due attention to the proper enforcement of this law. We would urge that everywhere they stand by the officers appointed to that work and assist them in every lawful way.

The adoption of the Act has taught us several valuable lessons, which we do well to profit by :-

1. We have learned that the abolition of the license system has not

been followed by commercial disaster, as the liquor advocates everywhere declared it would be.

- 2. That municipal government may be carried on without the local revenue derived from the licensing of intoxicating liquors, and that without the imposition of new and burdensome taxes upon the people.
 - 3. That the law has proved a valuable educator of public opinion.
- 4. That where the law is even moderately well enforced the mischievous and wicked treating customs are largely destroyed.
- 5. That the consumption of intoxicants is decreasing in our Dominion in a degree corresponding with the extent to which the Act is adopted.
- 6. That the reduction of poverty, drunkenness and crime is more and more manifest.
- 7. That our hope of ultimate and complete victory over this great enemy of all righteousness lies in total prohibition. We must not stop short of this. We cannot, if we would conserve what we have already secured.

NO REPEAL.

That these advantages as well as others may have the fullest effect, let us oppose—with all our might of work, prayer, faith and vote—the repeal of the Act whenever and wherever an attempt is made in that direction. Let the name of no member of the Methodist Church be found upon a repeal petition, much less, let no one co-operate directly or indirectly with those who seek to reclothe with the garment of respectability and legality a traffic which the Act has made disreputable and illegal. Utterly refuse to have any partnership in a business whose policy is that of the Anarchists in the use of the dynamite bomb, violence and terrorism. Let it be known to all that a vote to repeal the Act is a vote against prohibition, and every vote to sustain the Act is a vote for prohibition. Then, in the fear of God, let us endeavor to repeat the repeal agitation all along the line, and prohibition will soon be gained.

THE DUTY OF THE HOUR.

The present situation defines the duties of Christian electors in unequivocal terms. We would not ignore, or in any way depreciate, the value of the subordinate forces in the struggle for deliverance from a great national bane. We rejoice in the power of moral suasion, in the good work wrought by the numerous temperance organizations of our land, in the influence of the religious and political press, that is ever becoming more potent for prohibitory legislation. Still, it is evident, even to the superficial observer, that the mightiest weapon in this conflict is the ballot, and that the great decisive battles of the temperance movement must be fought at the polls. The issue is fairly before the country now. The attitude and personnel of our enemies were never so clearly defined. The temperance men of Canada have the opportunity of striking a blow for the complete and final suppression of the liquor traffic such as they never had before. May they prove equal to the duties and responsibilities of this hour!

Report No. 2.

1. That it has considered the Report of the Standing Committee on Temperance, and recommend the adoption of the same.

Special attention is called to the Committee's emphatic statement respecting the largely increased drunkenness and crime in those counties that have been led to repeal the Canada Temperance Act of 1878, and we earnestly join in admonishing our people to stand firmly by local option by-laws, wherever in force, until such time as they are superseded by a general prohibitory law.

We desire further to express our approval of the preliminary steps taken by the Standing Committee, in association with that of the Presbyterian Church, to arrange for the general circulation of petitions asking for the immediate enactment of a prohibitory law.

2. Your Committee has carefully considered the memorials of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland Conferences, the Bay of Quinte Conference, and the Kincardine District, touching temperance teaching in the Sunday-schools, and to give effect to these memorials, recommend the following, viz.:—

3. First, that paragraph 317 be amended (1) by striking out the headline "Temperance Pledges," and substituting therefor "Sabbath-school Temperance Work."

4. (2) By expunging the pledge and substituting the following: "I do hereby pledge myself to abstain from the use of all alcoholic liquors as a beverage, from the use of tobacco in any form, from the use of profane language, the reading of bad books and papers, and to earnest effort to secure the prohibition of the liquor traffic."

5. Secondly, that paragraph 318 be amended by striking out the word "further," and by inserting after the word "that," in the first line, the words "unless otherwise provided for."

6. That an additional paragraph be inserted to follow paragraph 318. Paragraph 319. The following is recommended as a constitution for temperance work in our schools:—

CONSTITUTION OF SABBATH-SCHOOL TEMPERANCE SOCIETY.

7. (1) Object—Its object shall be to promote the principles of total abstinence and prohibition, especially among the young.

8. (2) Membership—It shall be composed of all who take the pledge and sign the roll of membership.

9. (3) The pledge shall be that prescribed in paragraph 317.

10. (4) Management—The Society shall be under the control of the Sabbath-school Committee of Management, which shall appoint the officers

11. (5) Meetings—The officers shall arrange for meetings at least once in three months.

12. Your Committee have noted the memorial of the Manitoba Conference, re Sacramental Wine, and approving of the same, submit the following, viz.:—That section V., page 17 of the Discipline, be amended by adding: "Paragraph 41. In the public administration of the Lord's Supper non-alcoholic wines shall be used wherever possible."

13. Amended by the following resolution: "That we strongly urge all our people to abstain from signing petitions to license places for the sale of intoxicating liquors."

14. Your Committee has considered the memorial of the County of Carleton Prohibitory Alliance, re Plebiscite on Prohibition, and recommend that as high legal authorities have declared that the submission of the question of prohibition to a plebiscite would be out of harmony with constitutional usages, therefore the memorial be not entertained.

15. Your Committee gave lengthened consideration to the memorial of the Montreal Conference, recommending the circulation of a "declaration" for signature by Methodist electors, but cannot recommend the adoption

of the said resolution.

16. The resolution of Mr. Thos. Nixon, re the sending of delegates from this General Conference to the World's Temperance Convention, is approved; and it is hereby recommended that each Annual Conference, at the session of 1891, elect two or more delegates who shall represent the General Conference, without any expense to the same, at the World's Temperance Convention to be held in Chicago in 1892.

17. Your Committee have given its attention to the memorial of A. M. Featherstone and others, re the "Permit" system in vogue in the North-

West Territories, and present the following :-

"That this Conference has learned, through its delegates from the North-West Territories, that drunkenness and other crimes are increasing to an alarming extent in that part of our Dominion, and that the increase is due to an unwarrantable extension of the issue of permits, and also to the issue of certificates or licenses authorizing the sale of beer, and this in violation of the spirit and letter of the North-West Territories Act. We desire to place on record our emphatic protest against this unjustifiable exercise of executive power, and hereby call upon the Government to abolish this crying evil by revoking all such licenses."

18. Your Committee have carefully considered the resolution of the Rev. D. L. Brethour and the memorial of the Douglas Church Official Board, touching the attitude of our Church toward the liquor traffic, and

present the following for adoption by the Conference, viz. :-

That John Wesley, under God, the venerable founder of Methodism, in a letter to the Right Hon. Wm. Pitt, Prime Minister of England, and dated September 6th, 1784, declared, that though the spirits distilled that year brought an excise revenue to the Government of twenty thousand pounds, they cost twenty thousand lives of His Majesty's liege subjects, thereby vilely bartering for this money the blood of these men, not to say anything of the enormous wickedness occasioned thereby, and the ruin in many other ways coming to the peace and happiness of the common wealth. Rising to unwonted vehemence and indignation, he exclaims: "All who sell these liquors to any that will buy are poisoners general. They murder His Majesty's subjects by wholesale, neither do they even pity or spare."

(2) That the attitude of the Methodist Church has ever been one of

antagonism to the traffic in strong drinks.

(3) That the Rules and Discipline of the Church explicitly forbid the use of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes, declaring that "drunkenness, buying or selling spirituous liquors, or drinking them unless in case of extreme necessity," is doing harm, and is placed in the same category as profanity, Sabbath breaking, and the buying and selling of men, women and children for the purpose of enslaving them.

the Church's progress, is fraught with untold evils to humanity, and spreads desolation over the length and breadth of our fair Dominion.

(5) That the efforts put forth by governments to restrain, by license laws, this cyclone of destruction, have failed of their purpose; be it

Resolved, (1)—That we are unalterably opposed to all efforts to regulate the liquor traffic by taxation or license, high or low. These afford no protection from its ravages, but, on the other hand, entrench it in the commonwealth, throw around it an artifical garb of respectability, and make the people partakers of, and responsible for, the evils resulting therefrom. "It is impossible to legalize the liquor traffic without sin"

(2) That we declare the complete and immediate legal prohibition of the manufacture, importation and sale of alcoholic liquors for beverage purposes to be the duty of the Civil Government.

(3) That this is one of the great questions in regard to which Christian men are obligated by their profession to rise above all considerations of expediency, or personal and party interests, and so to use their moral influence and their franchise as to contribute to the overthrow of a traffic that is evil, only evil, and evil continually.

Therefore, to this end, this General Conference

19. (1) Endorses the proposal of the Dominion Alliance to secure the election to the House of Commons of Prohibitionists, irrespective of party, charged with the responsibility of representing the temperance electorate in the House of Commons, compelling the attention of the House and of the country to the great question of prohibition, and dividing the House of Commons on all suitable occasions on this issue; and it is strongly recommended that wherever such candidates are presented, they be given the earnest and undivided support of the members and adherents of the Methodist Church.

(2) This Conference further recommends, that in every constituency, sincere efforts be made in the party conventions and at the polls to secure the election to Parliament of men of sterling temperance principles; and it is specially urged that those who, in the House of Commons, sustain prohibitory resolutions and offer themselves for re-election, be supported by our people, irrespective of party considerations, as against candidates acceptable to the liquor interest; and it is our strong conviction that members of Parliament who have voted against such prohibitory resolutions should, on no account, receive the support of the electors of our Church. It is only by thus showing ourselves independent of party influence on this supreme moral question that we can secure for our convictions the consideration they deserve, and force the early solution of this prohibitory problem.

(3) That in accordance with memorials presented by the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Conference to the Rev. D. L. Brethour, this General Conference, under its seal, petition the Dominion Parliament for the enactment of a General Prohibitory Liquor Law.

(4) That the following form of petition be circulated in all our congregations for the signature of all persons who are over sixteen years

To the Honorable the House of Commons of Canada: —

The petition of the undersigned members and adherents of the Methodist Church of , County of , Province of and Dominion of Canada, and others, not less than sixteen years of age, humbly showeth:—

That the general traffic in intoxicating liquors is a recognized evil, producing a large proportion of the poverty, suffering, disorder and crime in our Dominion.

That your petitioners believe that a law enacted by your Honorable House, prohibiting the importation, manufacture, and sale of all alcoholic liquors, except for mechanical, scientific and medicinal purposes, and containing ample provisions for its strict enforcement by the proper authorities, will greatly diminish these and other evils, and largely increase the prosperity and promote the health, peace and morals of our country.

Therefore your petitioners respectfully pray that your Honorable House may be pleased forthwith to enact such a prohibitory law.

20. That a representative deputation be appointed to wait upon the Dominion Government to press upon their attention the attitude of the Methodist General Conference on the great question of National Prohibition, and also upon the subject of North-West permits and licenses.

21. It is recommended that the following constitute the deputation, with power to add to their number, viz.: Revs. Dr. Carman, Dr. Ryckman, Dr. Potts and D. L. Brethour, M.A.; Hon. J. C. Aikins, J. J. Maclaren, LL.D., and J. H. Carson.

22. The following are respectfully recommended as the Standing Committee on Temperance, it being an instruction that the said Committee meet for organization and other business before the rising of the Conference:—

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON TOBACCO.

That whereas the attention of this Conference has been called to the great and increasing evils arising from the use of tobacco, especially among the young people of the present day; and whereas, our young people naturally and properly look to their leaders in the Church for advice and example on this and other important questions, therefore be it

Resolved,—1. That this Conference asserts its strong disapproval of the use of tobacco, as hurtful to the physical constitution and especially injurious to the young. We earnestly recommend that every member in our Church be urged to be a total abstainer from its use; and, alarmed by the growing use of tobacco among the youth of our country, we earnestly recommend that those in our Sabbath-schools, in the educational institutions of our Church, and in the ministry, shall be total abstainers; and we further recommend that our people use all their influence to have the teachers in our public schools and higher institutions set the example of abstention from its use.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TRANSFERS.

The Committee on Transfers beg leave to report that the various memorials and resolutions that were referred to them have come under review, and have received careful consideration. They respectfully submit the following recommendations:—

1. Concerning a resolution moved by Rev. Geo. Richardson, to the effect that the Transfer Committee shall not transfer a minister into a Conference unless a minister of similar standing be transferred out of said Conference, except when such transfer is requested by the properly appointed representative of the Conference affected thereby; your Committee recommend that no action be taken.

2. Concerning a resolution moved by Rev. Dr. D. G. Sutherland, asking this Committee to declare and define the powers of the Transfer Committee, your Committee, believing that such powers are sufficiently defined by the constitution of the Transfer Committee, recommend that no action be taken.

3. Concerning a second resolution moved by Rev. Dr. D. G. Sutherland, asking that paragraph 129 of the Discipline be amended so that the Transfer ('ommittee shall have power, under certain circumstances, to deal with cases brought before it, where the notices required by clauses 2, 3 and 4 of said paragraph have not been given, your Committee recommend that no action be taken.

4. Your Committee recommend that the memorial of the Niagara Conference be granted, and that it shall be the duty of the Chairman of a District in which a transferred man has been stationed during the previous year to report to the President of the Conference to which such minister has been transferred, whether or not in his case the usual disciplinary questions concerning character and standing have been satisfactorily answered. Nevertheless, this shall not be necessary in cases where the transfer does not take effect until after the usual examination of character in the Conference out of which the transfer is made.

The Treasurer visited, with some member of the Committee, the following places: Aylmer, Wyoming, Chatham, Strathroy, Sombra, Kincardine, Goderich, Listowel, Prescott, Kingston, Belleville, and Agnes Street, Toronto, and a report was submitted, including Emerson, West Cape, Ebenezer Church, Walter's Falls Circuit, and subsequently Palmerston, where the following appropriations were made under the rule laid down by the General Conference:-

That no Church should receive aid unless embarrassed through the Union, and then only to the smallest extent possible, the persons now liable, to bear and carry all they were able, and not to be relieved from the responsibility in the meantime. The Treasurer to be the judge of what amount any trust should receive from year to year over the six per cent. interest on the appropriation. The total amount appropriated, including \$12,000 note in the bank on which \$1,274.93 of interest had accrued, was \$45,595.98, distributed as follows:-

Aylmer, \$600, provided \$1,000 be raised in the District. Chatham, \$1,000, provided the Trustees pay the other \$1,000. Strathroy, \$600, providing the debt be reduced to \$3,000.

Wyoming, \$200, providing the balance of \$200 be paid by Trustees. Arkona, \$188.90, as agreed by the London Conference, 1886.

Prescott, ordered church to be sold, which was done, for \$2,700, and

\$3,160 be paid to relieve the Trustees from law costs and the balance to stand till a later date, the Trustees to handle the same and pay what they

Kingston, \$13,000 was appropriated, providing \$1,000 was raised by subscription and \$5,000 placed on mortgage, the balance of \$1,000 to be carried and paid by the persons responsible for the debt.

University Church, Belleville, \$300, provided the Trustees pay the

same amount and mortgage for \$500 balance.

Goderich, late Methodist Episcopal Church, \$1,500, providing the con-

gregation assume and reduce the balance of debt.

Listowel, it was found that one man was responsible for the debt and had been sold out and lost almost everything; \$500 was appropriated, payable in four instalments of \$125 each, without interest.

Kincardine Methodist Episcopal Church, \$1,500.

Agnes Street, Toronto, \$5,000, providing \$3,000 subscription was raised to reduce the debt.

Ebenezer Church, Walter's Falls, \$300, providing balance was paid by the people.

Sombra, \$250, providing all the balance was paid within two years. Emerson and West Lynn, \$3,000; churches to be sold and amount received applied in reducing the appropriation.

West Cape, Prince Edward Island, \$150.

Palmerston, \$1,000, providing balance is paid by Trustees and sale of church.

Towards these appropriations and interest thereon, there has been paid as follows: Appropriations, \$9,270.98; interest, \$9,263.03.

The Treasurer has given a great deal of time and attention to the details of this Fund, has done his best in every way, and now presents below the following financial statement :-

THE ANSWER OF THE BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1890 TO THE METHODIST CHURCH OF CANADA.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN:

The recurrence of your General Conference affords us the opportunity of renewing to you the assurance of our affectionate interest in your well-being, and of our joy in the prosperity which God, the Father of mercies, continues to bestow upon you. Our concern for your welfare has roots as various as they are strong and deep. The remembrance that your vast organization owes its origin to the labor of missionaries who went forth from our midst, nourishes in us a perpetual affection and solicitude toward you. We are sensible, moreover, of the great future which must belong to the regions which our race is rapidly filling; and, foreseeing that these "greater Britains" across the seas are destined to react more and more powerfully upon the life and history of the Mothercountry, we feel that few matters can be of more moment to the British Empire, and, if God so order it, to the future of the world, than the widening spread in countries like yours of a pure religious belief, spirit That in one important dominion of the empire you uphold unsullied and unimpaired, the standard of our Methodist doctrine, discipline and spirit, knits you to us in firm alliance. But apart from all this, the zeal, courage and success with which you undertake the responsibilities of the honorable position that God has assigned you, and face the successive problems that arise from the growth alike of your power and your opportunities, would suffice to win from us, your fellow-soldiers in the warfare of Christ, warm admiration and ready sympathy.

The address of your last General Conference, and the luminous and comprehensive utterances of your esteemed representative, Dr. Stewart, who conveyed it to us, have set vividly before our mind your joys and cares, your trials and triumphs. The problems that perplex you, and the tasks that engross your energies are, in many features, different from those with which we are called to grapple. While we study how to deal with huge populations gathered in small areas, you are confronted by the problem of vast areas sparsely peopled. While we, in our agricultural districts, are often dismayed by the removal of our people and the reduction of our resources, you are in more danger of being overwhelmed by rapidly multiplying demands upon your resources, and a growth of your opportunities outrunning the increase of your means. satisfaction to you to be assured that the doctrines and methods of our Church are justifying themselves as effectually in the changed and changing England of to-day as they ever did in the days of our fathers; as it is gratifying to us, on the other hand, to observe that this same Methodism is equally acknowledged by God and useful to man in the novel social conditions and national needs of a country like yours. Our attention and energy have of recent years been strenuously applied to home missionary enterprises; and by free resort to new agencies, and fresh strength given to those already existing, we have striven to cope with the evils resulting from disorganized social conditions, and a national life in many ways unnatural and unhealthy. Among yourselves, also, for many years to come, home missionary labors will have to be assiduously and vigorously prosecuted; but your toil in this department may well be more pleasurable and cheerful than ours, since the task that demands your energies, arduous though it may be, is to maintain your Church on the crest of the advancing tide that is bringing to your country ever-growing

In your valuable Church enlargement and prosperity you will, we doubt not, be watchfully alive to the danger lest the Evil One, who will weave a snare even out of the mercies of God, should betray you into putting too much trust in what may be called e clesiastical politics. Only in proportion as our Societies are pervaded by the spirit of Christ, at once pure and ardent, and all our members, in humble pursuit after righteousness and fervent zeal for souls, manifest a living faith, can your Church or ours be abidingly fruitful. We gather with satisfaction from your address, and from more recent information of your progress, that you have not taken the prosperity that God has given you as an invitation to "rest and be thankful," but have understood that God's gifts are ever designed to be man's opportunities. We look with hopeful expectation for the unfolding of yet larger divine purposes in your regard, and the outpouring of yet richer blessings than those over which we now so heartily rejoice with you.

Your enlightened and steadfast recognition of the vital importance to your Church and country of sound Scriptural and Christian education and literature, commands our warm admiration. The general and earnest interest which has been aroused among you by the question of University Federation is an indication that you appreciate justly the manifold and serious issues involved in the character of the higher education of the country, and in the relation sustained by religion to science, philosophy and culture. While, on the one hand, it is injurious to stamp upon education a sectarian impress, it is, on the other hand, fatal to let it lack a living and pervasive Christian influence; and called, as you are, by the position God has given you, to minister to the more advanced and cultured classes of society among you, as well as to those of smaller knowledge and narrower opportunities, it behoves you to maintain with jealous guardianship your influence in connection with the higher education

Your zeal for the evangelization of the heathen proves to us that you bear the true family likeness of the Methodist stock, and are ambitious to claim your share of our Founder's "parish." And we are thankful for the wise instinct and the guiding Providence that have led you to add to

In this sphere you apply the forces of Christianity to a nation ancient in culture, adult in intellectual development, but youthfully plastic in its love of novelty; in the other, you seek to enlighten and gladden an aged race, wedded to hoary tradition, its vigor worn to decrepitude, whose life belongs to the past rather than the future, and yet primitive, almost infantile, in moral and mental condition. In the one task, you tend the dying embers of the old life in the New World; in the other, you fan the rising flame of the new life which Christian civilization is imparting to the Old World. Wisely have you, by choice of these contrasted tasks, made appeal to various sympathies and found employment for various resources among your people. Mr. Egerton Young's visit to this country has greatly increased our knowledge of and interest in your heroic labors among the Indians, while your own description of your Japanese mission, a description confirmed by many testimonies, compels us to glorify God in your success there.

We pray that, in these and all similar labors which your love for Christ and the world may lead you to undertake, our God may fulfil all the good pleasure of His goodness, and the work of faith with power; that the name of our Lord Jesus Christ may be glorified in you, and ye in Him, according to the grace of our God and the Lord Jesus Christ.

We commit this address to the hand of the Rev. Wallace McMullen, D.D., whom we have deputed as our representative to your General Conference. We commend him to your affectionate regard as a brother who has rendered invaluable service to the cause of Methodism in Ireland, and has for nearly twenty years been a member and trusted adviser of our British Conference.

You will be looking forward with interest, as we are, to the Œcumenical gathering of the Churches of our Methodist brotherhood, which is to assemble in the United States next year. We anticipate with pleasure the opportunity which that occasion will afford us, of renewing with you and with the other Churches of the brotherhood, a fellowship more intimate than is afforded by such communications as this.

We pray that the Lord may make you to increase and abound in love one toward another, and toward all men, even as we do toward you.

We offer you our sincere and hearty congratulations on the union recently effected of the four sections of the Methodist family, which now constitute the Methodist Church of Canada; and we rejoice to learn, from the address of your last General Conference to the British Conference, that "the fruits of that blessed union were becoming more and more developed; that the Lord of Peace had given you harmony, tranquility and prosperity within your borders, and that not a discordant note was heard throughout the consolidated Methodism of the Dominion." May the peace of God continue to abide with you!

May we remind you that twelve years ago the two principal Methodist bodies in this country were happily united, and now constitute the Methodist Church of Ireland. We have every reason to believe that this union was sanctioned by the great Head of the Church; and that Methodism in Ireland was thus better adapted to fulfil its arduous and important mission. In the prosecution of our work we have to contend with many difficulties; but the God who was with our fathers is with us also, and the fruit of our toil is to be found in many lands, as well as at home. It is our solemn purpose to continue to labor earnestly in the sphere assigned to us by the providence of God, trusting that He, upon whose shoulders is the government, will cause even those things which now appear to be adverse to turn out for the furtherance of His Gospel throughout our native land.
