



THE CASE OF FRENCH DEPUTY SERIOUS ONE

May Be Charge of Trading With Enemy

Swiss Notes of 25,000 Francs Found in His Locker Room-His Statement as to Source Denied by Bankers

Paris, Sept. 19—The procurator general of the appeal courts has addressed a communication to parliament asking for the suspension of immunity in the case of Deputy Louis Turmel. He says that Deputy Turmel gave three explanations concerning the origin of money found in his locker and further remarked that Magistrate Gilbert, charged with investigation of the case, twice served a subpoena on Thurmel on Monday, but the latter ignored the summons "under circumstances from which it is permissable to presume that Turmel's dealings in Switzerland, given by him as the source from which he drew the money that was found, were of a fradulent nature, coming under the law prohibiting French citizens carrying on economic relations with enemy subjects."

A committee elected to report on the demand for the authorization of legal proceedings against Turmel, met yesterday and voted unanimously in favor of authorizing legal proceedings.

It was stated last night that the judicial authorities contemplate charging him with treasonable dealings with the enemy which is punishable by death.

Berne, Sept. 19—The Swiss telegraphic agency has received a telegram from Arrich relative to a statement made by the French Deputy Turmel that he reveived a sum of money from the Swiss Federal Bank for advice. The directors of the Swiss Federal Bank, according to the telegram, declared formally that they never made any such mysterious payments and have never had any dealings with Turmel.





Germans Guilty Of Blackest Of Crimes Charged

Rev. Dr. Hillis Brought Back Indisputable Proofs of Atrocities

Cut Out German Cancer

Official Records of More Than 10,000 Separate Outrages Filed for Production in Peace Conference-Some Awful Cases

The Rev. Dr. Newell Dwight Hillis, pastor of Plymouth church, Brooklyn, quoting from official records and affi-davits he had collected on his recent tour davits he had collected on his recent tour of regions in France evacuated by the Germans, asserted, in the first of a series of sermons on the war in his church on last Sunday, that there could no longer be any doubt of the fact that the German armies have been guilty of the blackest crimes charged against them. Dr. Hillis spent last July and August visiting the areas in France that were wined by the German armies in their retreat. He brought back with him hundreds of trophies testifying to German brutalities, and some of these, such as affidavits and copies of official records, he placed on the pulpit from which he preached.

"For three years German-Americans"

"For three years German-Americans have protested that the stories of German atrocities were to be disbelieved as English inventions, Belgian ites, and French hypocrisies, but that day has gone forever," he said. "When the representatives of the nations assemble for the final settlement, there will be laid before the representatives of Germany affiadvits, photographs, and other legal proofs that make the German atrocities far better established than the scalpings of the Sioux Indians on the western frontiers, the murders of the Black Hole frontiers, the murders of the Black Hole of Calcutta, or the crime of the Spanish

Photographs Tell No Lies.

"The photographs of dead and muti-lated girls, children and old men tell no lies. Jurists rank high two forms of testimony—the testimony of mature men who have seen and heard, and the testimony of children too innocent to invent their statements, but old enough to tell what they saw.

"For the first time in history, the

German has reduced savagery to a science, therefore, this great war for peace must go on until the German cancer is cut clean out of the body politic." cut clean out of the body politic.

Dr. Hillis asserted that more than 10,000 separate atrocities committed by the
German armies had been documented
and were on file in the chancelleries of
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the allied nations, for use when the terms of peace are to be discussed.

"When the German army in Lorraine was defeated by one-half its number," he went on, "it fell back northward, passing through French towns and villages where there were no Frenchmen, no guns, and where no shots were fired. During July and August, we went slowly from one ruined village to another, talking with the women and children, and comparing the photographs and the full official records made at the time with the statements of the poor wretched survivors, who lived in cellars where once there had been beautiful houses, orchards, vineyards—but now was only desolation.

Boy a Flaming Torch.

The Buy a Calf movement began when Mry Hoover asked the representatives of the restaurant and hotel men from all parts of the country to help out the present food emergency. They adopted calf buying as part of food conservation and each one pledged himself to buy and raise a calf to stimulate interest in cattle raising. 

peace manoeuvre.

A despatch to the Central News from A despatch to the Central News from Amsterdam says: "A careful reading of German papers leads to the belief that reports of a British peace offer were circulated simply with the object of making it easy for the German government to rally to the attitude of the Reichstag majority, and the whole thing is ah adroit manoeuvre engineered by Dr. Von Kuehlmann, the German foreign secretary." Speech by Erzberger

Zurich, via London, Sept. 18.—(Montreal Gazette cable)—Herr Erzberger delivered an important speech yesterday at Biberach. He said that in spite of the fact that fifty per cent. of the guaranteed shipping of Britain had been sunk, it had not been noticeable, and England remained unconquered. Before voting a new war loan, it was the duty of the Reichstag to consider whether a way could not be found to shorten the war. 

W. W. AND GERMAN PROPAGANDA AMONG AMERICAN FARMERS

Chicago, Sept. 19—I. W. W. and German propaganda among American farmers and the protection of a fixed price have resulted in much curtailment of the usual fall movement of wheat that there is a scarcity of wheat and flour in the

largest consuming centres.

A shortage of wheat and flour at the end of a short crop is not unusual, but the present situation, coming after the winter wheat movement, has been on two months and the spring wheat movement three weeks is unprecedented. It results from the depletion of the world's supplies, due to last year's small crops, and the demands of the war, and the slow movement of this year's crups due to "peace" propaganda and the certainty of sale at the price fixed by the food ad-

ministrator.

In parts of Iowa and Wisconsin a German propaganda has influenced the farmers to hold their grain so that it may not be used to support a war. Some of these farmers also have a notion that the government price of \$2.24 at Chicago for best grades may be increased. Food Administrator Hoover has declared that this will not happen, but he also said that the grain will not be commandecred. In the northwest the I. W. W. activi-In the northwest the I. W. W. activities are largely responsible for the 20,000,000 bushel shortage. The Dakotas and Minnesota have 86,000,000 bushels more than last year and 24,000,000 more than their standard capacity.
In Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Missouri and
Michigan, where the capacity of the mills exceeds the wheat production, the crop this year is 140,000,000 bushels or forty per cent. over last year. But the grain has moved slowly to the mills.
