DEMOCRATS MAY YET Disorders In Italy Follow Attempt On Mussolini's Life CAPTURE THE SENATE; PETITION FOR RECALL IS WITHDRAWN **CUT HOUSE MAJORITY**

Little Group of Seven Insurgent Republican Senators Will Wield Deciding Power, Election Results Reveal

"AL" SMITH RE-ELECTED IN NEW YORK

Democrats Made Five Gains in Senate and Must Capture Four Out of Five Doubtful Seats to Dominate-Prohibition Referenda Results

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—The squall that rocked the Republican brig yesterday washed away most of the party's majority in the Senate, reduced its margin in the House, and still was giving a scare today to some of the crew of stalwarts.

Democrats have made five gains from Republicans in the Senate - Massachusetts, New York, Kentucky, Oklahoma and Arizona-and must win four of the five doubtful seats to wrest control of the upper house from the administration party. Doubtful seats are Indiana, Maryland, Missouri, Oregon and Colorado.

Total membership of the Senate is 96. Democrats have gained nine seats from the Republicans in the lower house, where the membership is 435. They must gain 27 more to gain control and this is regarded as unlikely. More than 50 constituencies have not yet reported complete figures.





LONDON, Nov. 3 - Two crews, drawn largely from London, are now under orders for lonely parts of the world, so that time and distance may be further subdued in the interests of man. British Ornithoolgist Tells of Pictures of Golden

LONDON, Nov. 2-Captain C. W. R. Knight, the ornithologist, has described recently how he obtained remarkable photographs of the golden

This year he went with a friend to a treeless deer forest in Scotland and managed to erect a "hide" on the face of a cliff within 14 feet of a golden eagle's eyrie. There he watched the eaglets grow up, the mother feeding them, and studied their habits. Fortunately, the old eagle took no notice whatever of the whirr of the cinema camera, and he used 400 fcet of film.

He filmed a tragic squabble between the female and the male caglet, which ended with the smaller eaglet, the male, being thrown out of the eyrie and dashed to death on the rocks at the foot of the cliff while the mother bird non-

CARRIED WASTE AWAY In the eyrie at one time he saw the emains of ten grouse, six hares, and four rabbits, but when any waste food went bad the old eagle would carry it away. Their habit was to gorge themselves with food and then sit and think about it. None would eat till they had cast out indigestible food, such as grouse feathers.

A heavy rainstorm dislodged one cyric and it fell from its perch and caught in some trees at the foot of the cliff. The eaglets were unhurt, and with great perseverance Captain Knight climbed to the nest and put them back into it, although in danger of having returned and fed them as though noth-

Now, inasmuch as it is well known to all men that women have this crazy obsession about little things, it has always seemed to me that it was the height of stupidity for a husband not to gratify his wife's mania on the subject. If a little flattery and a pound of chocolates and a sentimental token now and then would make a woman happy, and keep her eating out of your hand, for Heaven's sake why not let her have it?

THERE is no other way in the world that a man can invest a little time and trouble and money, where it will pay such enormous dividends in c and comfort and well-being for himself as it will if put in on showing his wife some little attention.

If I were a married man, I should make it a rule to begin the day just as regularly by paying my wife a florid compliment as I did by brushing my teeth.
