

Daily Hints For the Cook

NUT CAKE Cream one cup of sugar and half cup of butter, add two eggs, one at a time (without beating them), half cup of milk, 11-2 cups of pastry flour; before stirring in the flour add the broken nut meats; one teaspoon of cream of tartar, half teaspoon of soda sifted with the flour (several times). I get half pound of English walnut meats, reserve enough for the top of the cake, then chop the rest. Frost with butter frosting.

Make a good crust with half pound of sifted flour, quarter pound of butter, one tablespoon of sugar, the beaten yolk of an egg, a pinch of salt, and just enough milk to mix smooth. Line the edge of a deep pie tin with a strip of this paste, fill it with ripe stoned plums, add a small cupful of granulated sugar and cover the pie with the crust. Ornament the edges and bake in a good oven until very lightly browned. Sprinkle the top with powdered sugar and serve with whipped cream or a thin boiled custard. PLUM TART




