Sinai. Valuable papyrus has been secured through Professor Francis Kelsey, of the University of Mchigan, acting for the foundation. The American School of Archaeology in Jerusalem also is a beneficiary of the Longyear trust.

Three of the five trustees of the Foundation have been selected. They are Mrs. John M. Longyear, Frederick P. Burall and James F. Lord. A state-timent issued by the trustees says:

RETRENCHMENT IN THE D.S.C.R.

Cost of Administration and the Number of Employes Gradually Being Reduced.


(Special to The Times) Ottawa, Feb. 13-As the great war recedes in time economy or reduction of expenditure in the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment continues to increase, according to the annual report of the department tabled in the House of Commons by Hon. Dr. H. S. Beland. The cost of general administration has been reduced from 6.65 per cent, of gross expenditures, as of December 31, 1921, to 5.1 per cent of gross expenditures for the calendar year of 1922. The staff was reduced from 4.886 at December 31, 1921, to 3,823 at December 31, 1922, a total reduction of 1,063 or about 21 per cent. At the end of 1922 there were 4,307 patients, as compared with 5,930 at the end of 1921; and 4,173 clinical treatments per week, as compared with recedes in time economy or reduction



SOME INSIDE GOSSIP ABOUT MOVE IN RUHR

London Comment on French Invasion and Some Possibilities

The Forthcoming Royal Wedding-Farewell to the Famous Dreadnought -What They are Talking About in the Empire Capital.

(From our own correspondent)
London, Jan. 25—At the outset of the new French move into the Ruhr I mentioned the sinister suggestions current in reputable and well-informed quarters in London. What these amounted to was that France had deliberately made impossible demands on Germany with the simple object of seizing a pretext to dismember her, and this banish for some generations, whatever the ultimate historical sequel, the hounting shadow of Teutonic revanche from French frontiers. At the same time I mentioned the remarkable suggestion that Herr Stinnes, the German super-capitalist, whose vast interests are mainly in the Ruhr neighbourhood, might be a tacit party to the French stroke, one possibility of which is a close economic entente between the Ruhr coalfields and the Lorraine metal close economic entente between the Ruhr coalfields and the Lorraine metal heids. These things are well worth bearing in mind today, when one of the ablest journalists in London, closely in touch with Lloyd George and writing touch with Lloyd George and writing in a journal controlled by the ex-Pre-mier, puts forward some grave deduc-tions about the trend of policy in Paris.

The Dreadnought Passes.

After being built sixteen years ago at a cost of a million and three-quarters, the famous battleship Dreadnought has been sold for about 40,000 to the shipbreakers, and is now being broken up. She was hopelessly outclassed by her giant progeny when the war broke out, but even so she sank an enemy ship in action, which was more than any other battleship of her standing could boast. It was when she was flagship of the "wobbly oight," that strange collection of obsolescent battleships at Sheerness, and was flying the flag of Sir Doveton Sturdee, the victor of the Falkland Islands, that the Dreadnought was leading the line up Channel one winter's day. A submariine hunting for unarmed merchantmen blundered into the squadron of ancient battleships out of the thick weather, and, before it could dive, the ponderous mass of the Dreadnought swung round and cut the pirate U-boat in half. After a due interval a destroyer was dispatched to look for survivors, but there was none.

WHAT'S DOING IN THE MONEY AND STOCK MARKETS TODAY

2,000,000-TON DROP IN IDLE

During the last six months of 1922 the idle steam tonnage of the world declined approximately 750,000 gross tons, and on January 1, 1923, stood at around 9,000,000 gross tons, as shown by figures complied by the transportation division of the U. S. Department of Commerce. During the whole of 1922 idle tonnage dropped nearly 2,000,000 gross tons. The idle fleet of the United States Shipping Board increased over 400,000 tons and nearly 200,000 more tons of privately-owned American vessels were out of employment on January 1,1923, than on July 1, 1922.

Idle tonnage in British ports, which was 1,961,000 tons on January 1, 1922, and 1,667,000 tons on July 1, 1922, dropped to 1,010,000 tons on Junuary 1, 1923. The tied-up tonnage in French ports, which increased from 1,085,000 to 1,200,000 tons during the first half of the year, declined to 730,000 tons at the end of 1922. Italian and Norwegian idle tonnage also decreased. Japanaese and Greek vessels had less employment on January 1, 1923, than on July 1 last.





TURKEY MAKES WAR ON SHOESTRING, SAY FINANCIAL EXPERTS

Economy Has Put Nation in Position of the Least Bankrupt of Any European Country in Conflict.

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


