#### OF THE

## FRESH-AIR FUND

### COMMITTEE,

#### MONTREAL, 1889.

#### To the Subscribers and Friends of the Fresh-Air Fund :-

We beg to submit a report of last season's work. The Fund was generously supported, the subscriptions covering the expenditure and leaving a small balance on hand. As a matter of fact, however, we could profitably have spent more money than was received, and should have done so had it been forthcoming in time. It might be explained that, until the close of the season, there was no means of accurately estimating the amount of funds to be depended upon. An estimate prepared on the 12th August did not warrant the expectation that we should have sufficient means to continue the work until the end of the month, as in former years. In consequence of this it was deemed advisable to arrange for the closing of the Home at Chambly on the 23rd, instead of at the end of the month. We greatly desired to avoid running into debt. Shortly afterwards, but too late to be turned to account, further subscriptions were received, hence the small balance on hand, which will prove very useful in providing additional furniture for the Home, if thought advisable. This experience must emphasize the importance, and indeed the necessity, if the work is to continue, of our friends sending in their subcriptions as early in the season as possible.

The first meeting was held at 165 St. James street, on June 4th ult., when the following gentlemen, interested in the Fresh-Air movement, organized the Committee for the season, viz. : The Reverends J. Nichols, J. Patterson, S. Massey, Robert Lindsay, H. J. Evans, E. McManus, J. Holmes, and Messrs. Charles Alexander, George Kemp, Peter McLeod, Peter Sinclair, H. F. Lunan and S. H. Parsons. Later in the season the names of of Messrs. Donald Campbell and J. A. Kneeland were added. The Rev. John Nichols was re-elected Chairman, and Mr. Charles Alexander, Hon-Treasurer. Sub-Committees were also appointed for the different branches of the work.

The "Officers' Quarters" at Chambly Canton, Que., were leased again to serve as the Home for the beneficiaries of the Fund. A staff, comprising Mrs. Walters, late of London, England, as Matron; Miss Moir, as Assistant Matron; and nine others who acted as laundry women, cooks, chamber-women, &c., was installed, and Mr. Howard D. Kemp again generously gave his services as Resident Medical Officer.

#### THE BENEFICIARIES OF THE FUND.

After a great deal of preliminary work in securing the staff and putting the Home into proper order, the first instalment of the inmates were sent out on the 28th of June. Altogether during the season 976 mothers and children enjoyed the benefits of a short residence at Chambly. This number is about 74 below that of the previous year, and may be accounted for, not from lack of applicants, but because of the closing of the Home a week earlier than in 1888. The applications were far more numerous this year than in either of the former years and, therefore, the circumstances which compelled us to decline many of them were deeply to be regretted, the doing of much good being thereby prevented. It may be noted here that many who were decidedly unworthy were found among the applicants, as well as many who were not needy ; all such, when discovered, were promptly refused.

The work of selecting these beneficiaries and forwarding them to the Home was entrusted to a Sub-Committee, composed of the Rev. James Patterson, Mr. P. Sinclair and Mr. P. McLeod; later, Mr. J. A. Kneeland joined it. The work required of these gentlemen was difficult and arduous, but it was done faithfully and well. Their report, at the close of the season, was most interesting, and for that reason it is here incorporated.

"The work of selection was prosecuted upon the same lines as last year. Those applying, if there was no obvious or already known objections to their being sent, were asked to get a minister, priest, or other responsible person, to sign a declaration that they were well known to him, and that they were of a character and disposition fitting them to become inmates of such a Home. To this there was added the further declaration that, in the opinion of the signer, the party applying was unable to get the benefits sought for without the help of the Fresh-Air Fund. When the applicants returned this form, duly signed, the physician was sent to visit them, to ascertain, first, whether there was need for the applicants being sent away at all, from sickness or any other cause; second, whether they were likely to be benefitted by being sent to Chambly; and

third, whether there was any contagious disease in the family, or neighborhood.

"The strict adherence to these rules will account for the very safe and satisfactory work of the season. It would be claiming much to assert that the work, this year, considering the time it lasted, was equal to that of last year, but your Sub-Committee have no hesitation in saying that it was. The number sent to Chambly, allowing that the season was one week shorter, was fully equal to the number taken out the previous year. Owing, no doubt, largely to the skill and care exercised by the medical gentlemen, both in the city and at the Home, there was very little sickness which was not speedily and successfully treated, and there was no instance of a contagious case being taken out to endanger the health of the Home.

"There are some things that necessarily limit a work of this kind, as there will be limits to any work of philanthropy that can possibly be started. (1) Some of the poorest and most destitute are unable to go from home for so long a period without much more being done for both mothers and children than the Committee can possibly undertake with the means at its disposal. (2) Wives and housekeepers must sometimes stay at home for the sake of their husbands and boarders. (3) Some cannot fulfil the necessary conditions as to character and fitness. (4) Some are rejected by the Doctor for sanitary reasons. And yet there was no difficulty in keeping the Home filled to its utmost capacity during the whole season by those who were able to fulfil all the conditions. More could have been done had not the Committee been exceedingly anxious to close this season's work without a balance on the wrong side.

"The Committee upon Inmates, in fact all engaged in the work, have much cause for thankfulness that all these people, most of whom were of very tender age and unused to travelling, were safely conveyed to and from the city without any serious accident. The Committee could not fail to note in those returning from the Home the general improvement that had taken place, as well as many individual cases which attracted special attention.

"Such an agency as this cannot fail to produce a good effect upon the public health, and create a kindly feeling and interest between the different sections of the community. The Committee would close with a strong recommendation that the work be continued.

"It frequently happens that children are found too ill to be taken from their beds to the Fresh-Air Home, and consequently remain unprovided with medical treatment, or any attempt at methodical nursing. If the funds permitted an extension of the work, it would appear that great benefit might be done by providing some means of relieving these little sufferers."

The last paragraph suggests an important extension of the work. That such an extension would be productive of great blessing no one can deny, but to carry it out would necessitate an increased medical staff, competent nurses, and an increase in the moneys placed at the Committee's disposal. The public alone can decide this question. We were fortunate in securing the services of Dr. W. Grant Stewart, recently of the staff of the General Hospital, as our verifying physician. His duties were discharged in an able and painstaking manner. In his report he writes : "To me, life in the lanes and backyards of the city is a revelation. I have visited the abodes of nearly all who have been sent to Chambly; the majority of these are indeed poor, and in many cases wretched. A number of applicants were refused admission on account of there being contagious diseases in the family or neighborhood. These precautions were taken to prevent similar troubles spreading at the Home. Has this work done good? Look at the sickly babes entering the Home, and when they leave it, and the question is answered. Many a life has been spared to years of usefulness, and many an infant is healthy and strong, who but for this treatment would be sleeping on the mountain side."

It is a matter for thankfulness that no serious accident occurred to any one during the whole season. Two deaths took place among the children—both from convulsions. One of these little ones was dying when it arrived, and only lived a very short time.

We are gratified to report that in addition to those sent out to the Home at Chambly, three

were held. The good people of Huntingdon and Lachute sent hearty invitations, offering to provide all the necessary provisions. These were right royal offers, far too good to be declined. We availed ourselves of them, and conveyed about 600 to Huntingdon and 500 to Lachute. The arrangements at both places were admirable; the refreshments supplied were good and abundant; the inhabitants of the two towns respectively gave themselves up to a holiday, and fulfilled the duties of hosts in a magnificent manner. Another excursion was held to St. Rose, and this time the provisions were provided by the Committee. It also was successful. Altogether about 1,800 mothers and children on one or other of these three days enjoyed the benefits of an outing. Mr. Lunan and Mr. Parsons had charge of the arrangements, and to these gentlemen thanks are due.

#### FINANCES.


Herewith will be found the Hon.-Treasurer's statements of receipts and disbursements, and assets and liabilities, kindly audited and certified by Messrs. Philip S. Ross & Sons, Chartered Accountants, as well as a list of the subscribers. A reference to the former will show the receipts from all sources to have been \$4,408.16, and the disbursements \$4,002.73, leaving a balance on hand of \$405.43. Of this latter sum it is proposed to appropriate \$300.00 to the purchase, repairs and renewal of furniture, which will leave a net balance of \$105.43 to form a nucleus for the next season. The expenditure includes the sum of \$173.47, which went to procure necessary furniture for the Home.

The Committee must again record a grateful acknowledgment of the sympathy and help it has received from the very numerous contributors to the Fund, both in the city and at the various summer resorts; from those who forwarded individual subscriptions, as well as those who assisted in the success of the numerous bazaars and concerts having the same worthy object in view. The members are indebted to the Railways for the excellent transport facilities provided, and especially to the following gentlemen, who, amongst others, courteously facilitated the work in every possible way :- James Stephenson, Esq., Supt.
