

His method is to inoculate directly the surface of the brain, having recourse to trepanation, and using as noculating matter the celebral substance of a mad dog as pure as possible. In that case the first symptoms of rabies infallibly appear in a week or two, and death ensues in less than three weeks. New Shingle Machine

Mr. Albert Barter of New Richmond Bonaventure, Province of Quebec, was in town this week, having with him the model of a shingle machine of his invention, which was patented on 11th June last. It is a portable machine and can be moved about from place to place by two horses and can be worked by horse power, water power or steam. The "Barter" is superior to all other

shingle machines, inasmuch as it makes the split and shaved article, instead of the sawn, and will manufacture them of any length from 16 to 22 inches. net. A peculiarity of the sturgeon is that as soon as it finds itself fast in a net it immediately comes to the surface and the fishermen draw the nose out of the water. The fish is very still and it does not take but a minute to put a small lasso round under the fins, and by this means the huge creature is drawn into the boat with no more resistance than from the same weight of lumber. But it requires care to handle the animal when it is being taken from the water and it has been found prudent not to abuse it, as in that case it uses its tail very freely and with great effect. So powerful is the tail that when struck fairly a man is easily knocked down. In Ger many and Russia the fish are usually towed ashore and landed on the beach. but the St. John is so wide where sturgeons are most abundant that this process

has been found impracticable.

HOW THEY ARE KILLED When the season first opened the fish were allowed to die a natural death in the boats. 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
