



Synopsis of Canadian North-west Land Regulations west Land Regulations Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The appli-cant must appoar in person at the Do-minion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son daughter, brother or sister of intend-ing homesteader. Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely own-ed and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a ord standing may pre-empt a quar-er-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.--Muat re-ide six months in each of six years rom date of homestead entry (includ-ing the time required to earn home-tead relation) and cultivity for ead patent) and cultivate fifty acres





DANBURY, Conn., June 8—The hat-ters' strike, which has been in progress in the twenty-three factories in this city, New Milford and Bethel since January 15, was practically brought representing domations of \$51,596,963, city, New Millord and Bethel since January 15, was practically brought to a close today when fifteen of the manufacturers agreed to open their factories for a ninety days' period on the open shop basis. With the return to work of the strikers the manufac-turers agree to resign from the Man-ufacturers Association and to allow all difficulties to be settled by arbitration with the exception of the use of the union label. The use of the union label will be resumed at the end of the ninety days' period when the manufacturers have severed their com-nection with the Manufacturers Asso-ciation. The opening of the factories will mean the returning to work of about 3,000 hands.
