



Hence their ingenuous and quite natural disapointment.

"It would seem that nearly every flag except the "It would seem that nearly every fing except the one that braved a thousand years was honored during the festivities, for the report in the New York Herald states that on Sunday when the procession was in pro-gress, 'the first real enthusiasm shown by the masses of humanity along the line of march was when the stars and stripes appeared.' As has already been remarked the majority of the people of this British Dominion are an easy-going lot, but the fing business has surely at last reached the reductio ad absurdum."
