Ottaws, March 21—Colonel Francis Douglas Farquhar, D.S.C., commander of the Princess Patricias Canadian Light Infantry, and late military secretary to His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught, Govmintary secretary to His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught, Governor General of Canada, has been killed in action at the front. A cable to the chief of staff of the Canadian Militia Department conveyed the news late tonight. The late Col. Farquhar came to Ottawa in October, 1913, as military secretary to His Royal Highness, and by his charming courtesy made himself a popular figure in official and social circles in the century.

The message was communicated to government nouse and the royal family was deeply moved on its receipt. The Duke and Duchess cabled a message of condolence to Lady Farquhar, and a separate message of sympathy was sent to the regiment by Her Royal Highness Patricia, whose name it bears.

# FIGHTING QUALITIES OF THE BRITISH SOLDIERS PUT TO TEST IN THE BATTLE OF ST. ELOI

"The Germans then rushed supports to the trenches and also to a mound which they had blowngup by a mine. They were not allowed to remain long in undisputed possession of it, however. Our first counter-attack took place at 2.30 a. m. on the 15th and was only partly successful, the enemy retaining possession of St. Eloi and some breastworks and trenches.

"By another effort made nearly two hours later we succeeded in driving the enemy completely out of the village and in recapturing all the trenches which had not been destroyed. The mound, however, remained in the hands of the Germans although it was subjected to so heavy a fire that no use could be made of it.

"The fighting at St. Eloi, as is usual in such cases, was of the fercest description. Upon gaining the place the Germans erected barricades across the streets defended by machine guns. These had to be stormed one by one, our men coming on time after time regardless of their losses until the village had been cleared of the enemy.

"When morning dawned a search was carried on among the houses for wounded and on this occasion the Germans displayed a humanity which," and the rush and vance that heavy casualties occurred.



Two years ago, in the Canadian House of Commons, F. B. Carvell, Liberal member from New Brunswick, made an attack upon the military character and worth of Sir John French. The great British soldier who is standing today between the Empire and defeat, who is bearing the brunt of the most terrific conflict the world has ever witnessed, was the subject almost of revilement by the Laurier henchman.

Yesterday in the House of Commons Carvell's voice was raised again. This time he was assisting in the effort to overthrow the Canadian war tariff, the result of which would be to immediately affect the sending of troops from Canada. Mme. Stelle-Pourtet said the French were ready for war two years ago, and that all realized that a grantic struggle with Germany was only a matter of time. If the people could have had the deciding vote on several occasions within the last five years when the dominating policies of Emperor Willam practically were forced down the throats of the French, there would have been war, she said, but the government placed its veto upon that course.

"When Belgium was invaded the spirit of patriotism spread over France like wildfire," she said. 

Hon. Mr. Hazen has arranged for the 55th to be sta tioned here along with Railway Construction Corps - The City will benefit.

Hon. J. D. Hazen, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, has arranged with the Federal Department of Militia for the mobilization of the 55th Battalion in St. John. This was the word received by Joseph A. Likely, president of the Board of Trade, from Mr Hazen on Saturday.

Talking with The Standard last evening Mr. Likely said he had written the Minister of Marine and Fisherels concerning the mobilization of the new battalion here, and Mr. Hazen had assured him that he had several weeks ago arranged for the stationing of the 55th in St. John. "This shows," said Mr. Likely, "that Mr. Hazen, as always, is working in the interests of St. John, and he deseryes the credit."

Mr. Likely felt that the stationing of troops here was a good thing for the city. Besides the supplies for the soldiers, each man spent a fortion of his pay. Mr. Likely figured that the location of the battalion here meant at least \$3,000 a day to the merchants and people of St. John.

Mr. Hazen had also arranged for the mobilization here of the five hundred men of the railway construction corps, which was being organized at present. This body would consist of trained railway builders, who should prove of great service during the coming season.

It is understood that ample arrangements for the accommodation of the new battalion have been made in St. John, and there will be no difficulty in housing the men.

Hon. Mr. Hazen has taken a deep interest in the welfare of St. John, and it was through his efforts that other troops were stationed here. He has also seen that St. John firms secured their share of the contracts for war supplies, and the busy factories and workshops of the city testify to his work for St. John.

The 56th Battalion, for which recruiting is now going on, will be made up of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island men. Recruits are fast coming in, and it is hoped to have the ranks filled within a short time.

The organization of the Railway Construction Corps is being undertaken by the C. P. R. for the Government. This body will consist largely of the properties of the present of the prese
