GERMANS SWITCH ATTACK AND LAUNCH FIERCE DRIVE AT BRITISH

GERMANS GAIN 500 YDS. GRUMBLING IN BERLIN IN DRIVE AT BRITISH LINE NEAR HULLUCH

British Counter-Attack, However, Succeeds in Dislodging Enemy From Part of Ground Won --- Infantry Fighting on Smaller Scale on French Front --- Russians Advance to Very Threshold of Mesopotamia.

CZAR'S FORCES FIGHT WAY ACROSS MOUNTAINOUS DISTRICT, SWEEP THE TURKS BACK ON THEIR BASE AT KHANIKIN AND ARE READY FOR LAST STAGE OF DRIVE TOWARDS BAGDAD.

Swithcing attacks from the Verdun region against the French the Germans have begun again a sharp offensive against the British line around Hulluch.

Preceding their movements with the usual heavy bombardments, the Germans loosed an infantry attack against the British lines in the region of Vermelles and were successful in capturing first-line trenches over a front of about 500 yards.

The British admit the loss of the positions, but say that part of them were retaken

Berlin declares that in their defence of the trenches, and especially later in the counter-attacks, the British suffered heavy casualties, and in addition lost men made prisoners and several machine guns captured.

Around Verdun the French on the left bank of the Meuse have re-captured points of vantage previously taken from them southeast of Haucourt by the Germans.

Bombardments are again taking place in the vicinity of Le Mort Homme and Cum-eres, and against the French first and second line trenches on the right bank of the Meuse Stween the Haudromont Wood and Vaux. A German attack southeast of Fort Doua-

Considerable infantry fighting, which, as yet, has been without result is in progress on the Dvinsk and Jacobstadt sectors of the Russian front. Petrograd reports that German attacks at several points here and farther south have been repulsed.

In the Austro-Italian theatre intense wirtiliery actions are ensuing in the Col Di Lana zone, and the Italians have put down two Austrian attempts to against captured positions on Mount Cukla.

INTERNATIONAL LAW NOT APPLICABLE TO AIRSHIPS

No Regulation to Cover Case Norwegian Gov t Releases Crew of Wrecked

Berlin, May 12—by wireless to Sayville.—"According to a despatch from Christiania," says the Overseas News Agency today, "six men of the wrecked Zeppelin L-20 have been released in view of the lack of international regulations regarding airships.

The Norwegian government decided to follow the law governing shipwrecked crews of belligerent warships. In accordance with this decision six men from the Zeppelin, who had been rescued by private boats were liberated."

The Zeppelin L-20 was blown ashore on the west coast of Norway on May 3 and wrecked against the side of a mountain. Despatches the day following stated that all the sixteen men comprising the crew were rescued and interned by the Norwegian authorities. The airship, when wrecked, was supposed to have been returning from an attack on the east coast of England and Scotland.
