Fifteen Years. The recent arrival of the Japanese em-bassy at San Francisco, and the facts stated by Governor Ito, in his speech at the banquet given there, are among the most significant events of the era of pro-gress in which we live.

most significant events of the ers of pro-gress in which we live. Fifteen or twenty years ago little was known of Japan. No foreighner could land on its shores ; no native could visit a foreign land and return ; and scarcely any of the products of the Empire could be exported. The penalty of any violation of this law was death. For over two hundred years the only foreign people with whom the Japanese would trade were Dutch, who were confined, like rats in a cage, to the little islet of the Desima, off Nangasaki ; and what traffic was carried on there was but the exchange of a jew European articles for the precious metals, copper, &c. Even this little commerce was con-ducted under such dolus restrictions and amid such constantly occurring insults, that none but the most meek spirited of them. 



No public moneys will be received by Dis-trists which fail to establish Schools under the Act. It will be observed that the amount of Provincial and County moneys to be ex-pended in any District in aid of Schools will depend almost exclusively upon local exertion. or the direct efforts made by the people of the several Districts in maintaining their own Schools. The sum to be received by the Tescher from the Province is definite, but the exact amount that will be received by the Trustees from the Gounty Fund on account of the aver-age attendarce of pupils, cannot be known at the time of the School meeting. The meeting should, therefore, be careful in voting its esti-mates to authorize a sum amply sufficient to en-able the Trustees to meet the liabilities of the School year. Any balance remaining in the hands of the Trustees, is, of course, to be car-ried to the credit of the next School year, while any deficit arising from an authorized expendi-ture may be carried forward and provided for in the estimates of the following year.
