

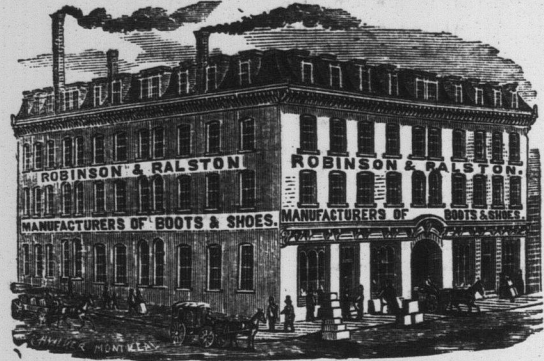

UNITED STATES STATEMENT of the case before the Geneva Tribunal. It has been published.

The documents from the Secretaries of State and Navy sent to the Senate to-day, relative to instructions to U. S. officials, had in them some sent to the House on 30th December.
