PROCEEDINGS OF FIRST DAY.

OPERA HALL, ST. MARYS, ONT.

FEBRUARY 15th 1881.

The Right Worshipful the Provincial Grand Lodge of Western Ontario assembled this day in its twenty-second annual session.

The Right Worshipful the Grand Master, Brother and Companion Sir James Bennett, took the Chair at 2 o'clock, p.m., and Brother and Companion Sir H. A. L. White, Right Worshipful Deputy Grand Master, took the Deputy Chair, supported by Brother and Companion Sir John Hoey, Right Worshipful Associate Deputy Grand Master.

The R. W. Grand Master appointed Companions Sir James Norris, W. M., 821, Toronto, Deputy Grand Secretary, *pro tem*; Companion Sir Robert Clyde as Outward Herald, and Companion Sir William Jameson as Inner Herald, and instructed them regarding the duties of their offices.

Companions Sir Arthur Robb and Sir T. C. McAvoy tested the Companions present.

The R. W. Deputy Grand Master reported all present entitled to sit in this R. W. Grand Chapter.

Companion Rev. Sir Hugh Cooper, R. W. Grand Chaplain, conducted the opening services in the illustrious degree of Royal Scarlet, after which the R. W. Grand Master declared this R. W. Grand Chapter opened for the dispatch of business.

Moved by Companion Sir H. A. L. White, R. W. Deputy Grand Master, seconded by Companion Sir John Graham, W. M., 275, Toronto, and

Resolved,—That it be an instruction to the Committee appointed to strike the Standing Committees to nominate a Committee for Petitions and one for Appeals.

Companion Sir James Bennett, R. W. G. Master, called upon Companion Sir William Douglas, R. W. D. G. Lecturer, and Companion Sir H. A. L. White, R. W. D. G. Master, to repeat the Lecture of the illustrious degree of Royal Scarlet.

Moved by Companion Sir James S. Duff, D. M., Essa, seconded by Companion Sir O. R. Ferguson, W. M., 449, and

Resolved,—That this R. W. G. Chapter be now reduced to the Orange Degree for the dispatch of business.

Brother James Bennett, R. W. G. Master, then delivered his Annual Address as follows :

To the Officers and Members of the Provincial Grand Lodge of Ontario West, in Grand Lodge assembled :

MY DEAR BRETHREN,—It is with feelings of pleasure that I again meet you, who are the representatives of the Orange Association of Ontario West, in Grand Lodge assembled. I am pleased to see so many of the old and tried members of our beloved Order present, and I also extend a hearty and brotherly welcome to our younger brethren, hoping that as years roll by they may be able to look back with pride and pleasure to their good work and usefulness in our glorious association.

Brethren, in reviewing the events of the past year, I think we have cause for thankfulness. In this Canada of ours peace and plenty have been our lot. Divine Providence has blessed us with a bountiful harvest, and our Dominion Government has passed such wise and beneficial measures as to protect and foster infant manufactures, thereby giving our mechanics and artisans employment at home instead of compelling them to wander off to the neighboring republic; and it is to be hoped that the return of prosperity to our country will be the means of augmenting the ranks of our Order, by bringing back some of our brethren who, from financial circumstances, have not been able to pay their just dues and demands.

If we turn to the mother land, how different do we find things? In Ireland, anarchy, sedition, murder, and almost

open rebellion exist. A country that nature has done so much for—a land that poets write of as the “Green Isle of the Ocean,” and the “Emerald of the Sea”—but cursed by the upas tree of Popish bigotry and superstition. I am glad to know that amidst all this turmoil and commotion, our brethren in Ireland have lost none of the old fire and zeal of their forefathers, and that they are still true to their colors, and cannot be shaken in their allegiance to the Altar and the Throne. And I hope that a Committee will be appointed by this Right Worshipful Grand Lodge to draft an address to the brethren of Ireland, assuring them not only of our sympathy, but of material help, if necessary, to preserve their Protestant rights and British connection.

Brethren, coming to more pleasant recollections at home, I had the pleasure, as well as the honor, as your Grand Master, and on behalf of our Order, to lay the corner stone of St. George's Church, Walton, in the County of Huron, with Orange honors and ceremonies, on the 11th of June last. The brethren and Orange Young Britons turned out, dressed in full regalia, with banners flying and bands playing Orange music. Bro. the Rev. Francis Ryan and the people surrounding the village of Walton are to be congratulated for this spirit of Christian enterprise in building so fine a church. Your Grand Master was presented with a beautiful silver trowel by the churchwardens on that occasion, and I shall ever look upon it as a sacred memento of the very interesting ceremonies that took place on that day. The trowel bore the following inscription: “Presented to Major Jas. Bennett, G. M., L. O. A., O. W., on the occasion of laying the corner stone of St. George's Church, Walton, June 11th, 1880.”

Your Grand Master was also presented with the following address by the brethren of the Districts of Hullet and Grey:

I may here mention that on the 12th of July last our Grand Master and Sovereign, Bro. Merrick, performed a similar duty in laying the foundation stone of a Methodist Church in the Province of Quebec; and I think that our Order may be congratulated on those events, as shewing the rise and progress of our beloved Association in the social as well as in the public estimation of the people of Canada.

I also had the honor and pleasure of dedicating an Orange Hall on the 5th of November last, in the village of Burford, in the County of Brant. I was met at the station by Bro. S. Wetmore, District Master of Burford, accompanied by a brass band and a torchlight procession, and escorted to the village hall, where an oyster supper had been provided by L. O. L. 362. The hall was filled to its utmost capacity by the brethren and their friends. A noticeable feature was the presence of a large number of ladies. After ample justice had been done to the eatables, an adjournment was made to the Orange hall, and the ceremony of dedication proceeded with. The brethren of L. O. L. 362 are to be commended for their spirited enterprise in building so fine a hall, and having it free of debt.

I was also present at the monster celebration in Hamilton of the Battle of the Boyne, on the 12th of July last; and I would take this occasion of saying that I not only believe in 12th of July celebrations, but of having them as large as pos-

sible. I believe that it is better to have one large procession than several small ones; and there is no reason, with our present railroad facilities, why large processions should not take the place of small ones; but they should be well marshalled, and the brethren dressed in uniform regalia. Nothing attracts the public eye so much as a military appearance in all public parades—that is, uniformity of dress and regalia; and nothing is more demoralizing than to see members leave the ranks and run into the first tavern they chance to come to. Every brother should feel that upon his individual conduct the success of the day's celebration depends; and if this line of conduct was adhered to, instead of having parades little better than promiscuous crowds, we would have a procession that would command the respect and admiration of the community where it took place.

I would also call the attention of the brethren to the speeches delivered on those occasions. In my opinion, those speeches should take place in moving and seconding resolutions, carefully prepared, on some subject in the interest of our Order and its Protestant principles, by a Committee selected by the District or County having charge of the celebration, so that the speeches would really be the sentiments of our Order, and not merely the opinion of some individual, spoken in the heat of the moment, and often calculated to give a wrong impression as to the usefulness and desirability of promulgating our principles in Canada.

Brethren, it appears from the reports of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge that there are over 1,400 Lodges under its jurisdiction; and taking those Lodges at an average of say forty members, it would give the total membership of our Order in British America at 56,000, which I consider a low estimate. Each member paying as dues \$3.00 per annum would be \$171,000, over one-third of which is paid by the members under the jurisdiction of this Right Worshipful Grand Lodge, or say \$60,000 for dues only, besides degrees. Now, my reason for bringing those figures before you is that we may ask ourselves, Has this large amount of money been spent to the best advantage in the interest of our Order? Have we accomplished all the good that such an amount of money, year after year, is capable of accomplishing? Have we shown ourselves as charitable as we ought to be in connection with the widows and orphans of our deceased brethren? We have four Orphan Homes, getting a small pittance from this Grand Lodge yearly.

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Now, I think that if the Lodges (which might be mapped out geographically), surrounding those homes would make it a point of duty to subscribe annually something to those charitable institutions, and also to collect, by districts, provisions in the fall or harvest time, and, when collected, forward such collections to the Home in their districts, it would accomplish a great deal of good, and would give a claim of sending any orphans that might be left destitute by deceased brethren. By taking this into your consideration a great deal of good might be accomplished, and a brother would have the satisfaction of knowing, if it should please Divine Providence to call him hence, that in leaving his orphans behind, they would be cared for by his brethren.

I would also call your attention to the large number of Protestants who send their daughters to convents in Toronto to be educated. I find from inquiry that a large portion of them are from the rural districts. Now, there is an old maxim, "Train up a child when it is young in the way it should go, and when it is old it will not depart from it." Such being the case, what must be thought of those Protestant parents who, under the guise of superior education, send their daughters to be educated by Sisters of Charity and nuns in convents, where their young minds become saturated with Romanism? And when we come to think that in a few years those same young ladies will become the mothers of some of our future leading families, one can hardly contemplate the effect it will have on generations yet unborn. We see already the effects of the past course of such education. Our Provincial Legislature cannot be opened or closed, or a state dinner given by our Lieutenant-Governor, without Archbishop Lynch and his clergy having the posts of honor. Our Protestant clergy seem to be asleep, or they would protest against members of their flocks sending their daughters to be educated by papist teachers, thereby endangering their Protestant faith. The press of the country is also silent on the subject, for fear of offending the Romish hierarchy. The only paper we have to bring this and other matters affecting the Protestant interest fearlessly before the public is *The Sentinel* ; and yet how do we support it? Instead of having a circulation of fifteen or twenty thousand, only as many hundreds are in circulation. This is not as it should be. No society such as ours can accomplish the good that it should do if it has not a journal to advocate its claims and to defend its rights ; and I may go further and say that we do not de-

serve success if we are afraid of patronizing a paper which, on all occasions, advocates our interests and defends them from all attacks.

According to resolution of this Right Worshipful Grand Lodge, it was my pleasing duty to present our late Grand Master, Bro. Parkhill, with a gold watch and chain on behalf of this R. W. G. Lodge, which presentation took place at the annual meeting of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge, held in Toronto in June last.

I have also, according to your instructions, and in connection with our sister Grand Lodge of Ontario East, caused the Orange Incorporation Bills to be again submitted to the Ontario Legislature. They were brought before the Private Bills Committee on Thursday, 10th inst., and were declared not proven by a vote of 22 to 13. Bro. Merrick, our Grand Master and Sovereign, will move in the House that the Bills be referred back to the Committee; then we shall have the yeas and nays, and we can see who are for us and who against us.

I think it will be useless to again present the Bills until we have a change of Government in the Ontario Legislature; and it behooves the members of our Order, independent of other political considerations, to labor from this time forward, in their different localities, to bring about such a result at the next general election for our Local Legislature. The Conservative party are committed to incorporation, and must, when in power, give us the long-desired Bills.

I understand that resolutions will be introduced recommending to the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge changes in our degrees, lectures and ritual. I am one of those who do not think that we can either increase Orangeism or retain persons in our ranks by ritual or change of degrees. A man, to be a sound Orangeman, must have Orange principles within him; and if he has not, no amount of ritual and degrees will impart them to him. I believe that our several degrees, and the ritual and lectures in connection with them, are founded upon historical facts and biblical truths; and if the degrees are correctly given, and the lectures properly explained, they cannot fail to impress the candidate with the importance of the degree which he has just taken. But if, on the other hand, degrees are not given with good order and solemnity, no amount of alteration will make them impressive. I believe, however, that our degrees and ritual should be uniform here and elsewhere; and as there was a Committee appointed for that pur-

Bro. Thomas Keyes, R. W. G. Secretary, then read his Annual Report as follows :

To the Right Worshipful the Grand Orange Lodge of Ontario West :

SIRS AND BROTHERS,—Through the mercies of an All-wise Providence, we are again permitted to meet in peace and harmony, our beloved land enjoying full and plenty, affording ample facilities for all to gain an honest and honorable livelihood, beholding to the caprice of no tyrannical master, nor intimidated by the threats of lawless mobs. We should feel grateful, indeed, to the Giver of every good and perfect gift, for His bounties to us, whilst many others, even in portions of our own great empire, are suffering from the evil effects of famine, war, and internal strife.

I shall occupy your attention for a brief space in a few

remarks upon Ireland. I have received papers from Bro. Johnson, P. I. T. Council, and D. G. M., Ireland, containing many capital articles upon the state of Ireland, and especially one extracted from the *Quarterly Review*, in which the weak and vacillating conduct of the present Imperial Government is faithfully depicted, and which remarks may be applied to our own Governments; also, papers and letters from the Grand Secretary's Assistant, Bro. Camlin, soliciting aid, which will be placed before you during the present session, and I sincerely hope will meet with your most earnest consideration. I would also recommend a careful perusal of the speech delivered by the Rev. F. O'C. Patman, as reported in THE SENTINEL of January 20th, 1831. As to Orange news in general I will not take up your time, as the able advocate of our glorious cause, THE SENTINEL and *Orange and Protestant Advocate* has furnished to the brethren all the available news. I heartily commend it to the confidence and support of the brethren, and sincerely hope that now, with returning prosperity, its circulation will be such that its publisher will be able to reduce the subscription, and thus place it within the reach of all, so that every member of the Order may become a subscriber. Every Lodge should keep a copy on file in their lodge-room. Societies of not one-tenth our magnitude support their organs, and is it not a shame that the great Orange Association of the Dominion, outnumbering any two of the largest associations, does not do so liberally, and make our influence to be properly felt? Brethren, by the unanimous patronage of the members of our Association, we can have the strongest paper in the Dominion. It requires money to run a paper to-day. Journalism, as carried on a few years ago, has become a thing of the past, and a new era has set in. It is by your undivided aid that our cause can be properly set before the people and appreciated by them.

Brethren, we all regret that the events, which have caused so much misery and commotion in Ireland, should have taken place. Be that as it may—they have transpired, and are still transpiring, and it only remains for us to draw a lesson from them. What is that lesson intended to teach? It is intended to teach lethargic Protestants that the Rome of to-day is the same as of old. So long as the germ of Romanism lives, so long will Rome continue the same. I glanced over the telegraphic despatches this morning and found the following from the mouthpiece of the Roman Vatican: "The amount of good

that the Pope will be less than it would be with England." B day that such will history too truthful I see much in the and, with your pen from the concluding Seventy Bishops," Liverpool:

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that the Pope will be able to do for the cause of Ireland, will be less than it would be if he were in direct communication with England." Brethren, you and I never wish to see the day that such will again be the case. The bloody pages of history too truthfully record the era of those events. I confess I see much in the events of the times to arouse suspicion; and, with your permission, I will quote the following extracts from the concluding portion of "James the Second and the Seventy Bishops," by the present truly evangelical Bishop of Liverpool:

It remains for me to point out the three practical lessons which appear to flow naturally out of the whole subject.

"(a.) First and foremost, the reign of James II. ought to teach a lesson about *English rulers and statesmen*, whether Whig or Tory. That lesson is the duty of never allowing the Government of this great country to be placed again in the hands of a papist.

"If this lesson does not stand out plainly on the face of history, like the handwriting at Belshazzar's feast, I am greatly mistaken. Unless we are men who having eyes see not, and having ears hear not, let us beware of Popish rulers. We know what they were in Queen Mary's days. We tried them a second time under James II. If we love our country let us never try them again. They cannot possibly be honest, conscientious Papists if they do not labour incessantly to subvert English Protestantism, and turn everything upside down. I yield to no man in abhorrence of intolerance and religious persecution. I have not the slightest desire to put the clock back and revive such miserable disabilities as those of the Test and Corporation Acts. I am quite content with the Constitution as it is, and the laws which forbid the Crown of England to be placed on the head of a papist. But I hope we shall take care that these laws are never repealed.

"Some may think me an alarmist for saying such things. But I say plainly there is much in the outlook of the day to make a thinking man uncomfortable. I dislike the influence which men like Cardinal Manning are gradually getting among the upper classes. I dislike the growing disposition to make an idol of mere earnestness, to forget history, and to suppose that Rome has changed, and earnest Papists are as good as Protestants. I dislike the modern principal, unknown to the good old Puritans, that States have nothing to do with religion, and that it matters not whether the sovereign is Protestant or Papist,

Jew, Turk, Infidel, or Heretic. I see these things floating in the air. I confess they make me uncomfortable. I am sure we have need to stand on our guard, and to resolve that, God helping us, we will never allow the Pope to rule England again. If he does, we may depend upon it we shall have no more blessing from God. The offended God of the bible will turn away His face from us, and we shall bid a long farewell to peace and home influence abroad, comfort in our families, and national prosperity. Once more then, I say, let us move heaven and earth before we sanction a Popish prime minister or a Popish King. On the 28th of January, 1689, the House of Commons resolved unanimously 'that it hath been found by experience inconsistent with the safety and welfare of this Protestant kingdom to be governed by a Popish prince.' (Hallam, iii. 129.) I pray God that resolution may never be forgotten, and never be cancelled or expunged.

"(b.) In the second place the reign of James II. ought to teach us a lesson about *English bishops and clergy*, that lesson is the duty of never forgetting that the true strength of the Established Church lies in loyal faithfulness to Protestant principles and bold unflinching opposition to the Church of Rome.

"Never was the Church of England so unpopular as in the days of Laud, and never so unpopular as in the days of the seven bishops. Never was the Church so hated by Nonconformists as she was when Laud tampered with Rome, never so much beloved by them as when the seven bishops went to prison rather than help the pope. Why was it that when Laud was committed to the Tower few hands were held up in his favour and few said "God bless him?" There is only one answer, men did not trust him, and thought him half a papist. Why was it that, when Sancroft and his companions were taken to the Tower fifty years after, the heart of London was stirred and the whole metropolis rose up to do them honour? The answer again is simple. Men loved them and admired them because they stuck to Protestantism and opposed Rome.

"(c.) In the last place, the reign of James II. ought to teach a lesson to all loyal Churchmen. That lesson is the duty of using every reasonable and lawful means to resist the re-introduction of Romanism into the church of England.

"Controversy and religious strife no doubt are odious things; but these are times when they are a positive necessity. Unity and peace are very delightful, but they are bought too dear if they are bought at the expense of truth. There is a vast

amount of maundering quarters about unity the language of St. should be so much nature should be so loose in the world. Christ's person; but nasius had not of ping up the Pope's in er pity if Luther had is one of the condit be defended and ma it.

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amount of maundering childish weak talk now-a-days in some quarters about unity and peace, which I cannot reconcile with the language of St. Paul. It is a pity, no doubt, that there should be so much controversy, but it is also a pity that human nature should be so bad as it is, and that the devil should be loose in the world. It was a pity that Arius taught error about Christ's person; but it would have been a greater pity if Athanasius had not opposed him. Tetzal went about preaching up the Pope's indulgences: it would have been a far greater pity if Luther had not withstood him. Controversy, in fact, is one of the conditions under which truth in every age has to be defended and maintained, and it is no nonsense to ignore it.

"Of the one thing I am very certain. Whether men will come forward or not to oppose the Romanizing movement of these days, if the Church of England cannot get rid of the revived Popish mass and the revived detestable confessional, the people of this land will soon get rid of the Established Church of England. True to the mighty principles of the Reformation, our Church will stand and retain its hold on the affections of the country, and no weapon formed against us shall prosper. False to these principles, and readmitting Popery, she will certainly fall, and no amount of histrionic sensuous ceremonial will prevent her ruin. Like Ephesus, which left her first love, like Thyatira which suffered Jezabel to teach, like Laodicea which became lukewarm, her candlestick will be taken away. The glory will depart from her. The pillar of cloud and fire will be removed. The best and most loyal of her children will forsake her in disgust, and, like an army whose soldiers have gone away, leaving nothing behind but officers and band, the Church will perish, miserably and unpitied but deservedly, for want of Churchmen."

When we look back, even to the time when this Grand Lodge was first organized, viz., twenty-one years ago, it fills us, who are still spared, in the Providence of our Merciful Father, with sadness, to meet so few of those who were then so full of zeal and love for our noble order. During the past year we were called upon to mourn the great loss we have sustained in the death of our late revered R. W. Brother F. H. Medcalf, so long and favorably known to us all; Bro. Dr. F. A. Locke, of Hamilton; Bro. Dr. C. B. Hall, of Toronto, and our late Brother John Carr, Harbor Master of Toronto, for many years a prominent and indefatigable worker for our Order. They

have, by their decease, left blanks which will be hard to fill. May we all be prepared for that call, "For we know not the day nor the hour when the Son of Man cometh."

Large numbers of our brethren have moved to the Province of Manitoba and the North-West, where, no doubt, as soon as settled, they will form new Lodges. Many also have left, seeking more remunerative employment in the United States, but I am pleased to learn that they are returning with the returning prosperity of our country.

I would call your attention to Table No. 6, of the M. W. G. Treasurer of B. A., on pages 32 and 33 of last M. W. G. L. Report, from which you will find that that great painstaking officer (no doubt unwittingly) has debited this R. W. G. Lodge with 755 Lodges; but making an allowance of 55 as dormant, thus leaving 700 as working Lodges. By a casual perusal of our Reports since 1874 you will perceive that only one new Number since that date has been issued to Ontario West, viz., 1450 to the County of Wentworth, and that has since become dormant, all the rest being the re-issue of dormant numbers, to new applicants in place of new numbers. This R. W. G. L. will therefore perceive the necessity of taking the proper steps to have this long-vexed question settled, and thus prevent the charges of indebtedness, when perhaps none exist, as I am quite satisfied that upon a thorough investigation there will be found to be not nearly as many working Lodges as we are charged with. Your Grand Secretary, after most careful scrutiny of the M. W. Grand Register, finds therein 691 Warrants issued to Ontario West, some of which he cannot find any trace of now, and which the oldest officers say were never in their Counties. After considerable time, labor, and careful comparison of returns, Directories, etc., I have drawn out a list of Lodges according to consecutive numbers, giving names of County, District and Private Masters, with their Post Office addresses, as far as I have received returns, which I would recommend to be published with the Annual Report.

Although we cannot boast of issuing as many new Warrants in the past year as in former years, still the Order is in a very satisfactory condition. Four new Warrants have been issued:

The correspondence has been carefully arranged, and will be laid before the proper Committees. The annual returns are coming in slowly.

When I assumed the Grand Secretaryship only 308 Lodges had paid Grand Lodge dues the previous year. In order to find out how any Lodge stood, with respect to dues, I had to wade through the whole statements compiled from 1860 up to that time. I perceived that that would entail endless labor upon me, and I therefore set to work to devise some better method of book-keeping. After careful thought, I adopted the grouping of the Lodges into Counties; but owing to misprints, the manner of keeping the accounts, etc., I found it to be a much more difficult task than what I had at first antici-

pated. However, I persevered. Upon request, Bro. Andrew Fleming, M. W. Grand Secretary of British America kindly furnished me with a copy of the Register of British America as far as related to the warrants issued to Ontario West. Here a new difficulty presented itself. I found that all the early numbers were issued to the old Districts of Home, Gore, etc., the divisions of the Province at that time, and many had changed locations. At length I issued the tabulated County statements to the County Masters (see financial report of 1868, pages 29 and 30), which created quite a commotion, many Lodges claiming that their Grand Lodge dues had been paid. Upon investigation, it was found that they had never reached your then Grand Treasurer's hands. Some of the Lodges, issued to Counties, could not be found, and the District and County officers knew nothing of them. Many Lodges have paid delegate dues, but still I find there are a great many defaulters.

In 1875 and 1876 I again prepared detailed statements showing indebtedness for Grand Lodge and Delegate dues. (See Report A, 1876, pages 14, 15 and 27). I also published said statement, in accordance with Committee's recommendation same year, with the following results, as witnessed in the next Annual Statement of the Treasurer, viz., \$1,262.00, Grand Lodge dues, and \$337.00, Delegates dues, being more than double what it was when I assumed office in 1865.

Your Grand Secretary embraces this opportunity of returning his hearty and sincere thanks to the brethren for the kindness and courtesy shewn him whilst your Grand Secretary, and more especially during his severe illness. Also, for re-electing him during his absence last winter, in hopes of recovering his health. Although his health has greatly improved during the last four months (many thanks to the Great Physician), still he feels it best, both for his own sake and for the interests of our beloved Association, that the office should be held by some more vigorous hand.

I feel much pleasure in being able to say that my successor in office will not have many of the difficulties to contend with which I encountered upon assuming the Grand Secretaryship. It shall always afford me much pleasure to give him any assistance in my power.

Wishing our Grand Lodge every success, and again thanking the officers and members for their uniform courtesy and kindness to me during my fifteen years' official connection with this

The members of the Grand Lodge then formed in order of procession, under direction of the R. W. Grand Director of Ceremonies, Bro. Arthur Robb, and marched to St. James' Episcopal Church, headed by the St. Marys Town Band.

The Rev. Bro. Hugh Cooper, R. W. Grand Chaplain, preached the following

SERMON.

For the Lord is our judge, the Lord is our lawgiver, the Lord is our King: He will save us.—Isaiah, xxxiii, 21.

We meet again, by divine permission, at the gathering of our Grand Lodge, when another year has passed away—a year which has been pregnant with mighty changes; changes that are accompanied naturally with much anxiety witnessed in all the great writers of the day. Anxiety pervades the cabinet of the politician and makes him shade his brow, as he looks into the future asking, Whither are we drifting, or whither are we being carried? The binding powers of treaties no longer respected as they used to be, adds intensity to these characteristics. Combination entering more and more into political affairs, undermining the welfare of the State in general, to give dominance to party, tells us that our lot is cast in momentous times. But resting upon the principles of our Order, based upon the Word of God, and fully realizing that "mortality rests upon divinity," what assurance do we gather from such a text as this. "For the Lord is our judge, the Lord is our lawgiver, the Lord is our King; He will save us." You notice it divides naturally into four heads, each of which should give us confidence.

I. The Divine decision in the affairs of life, "The Lord is our judge," referring as generally in the Old Testament to the verdict in things of this life. A Divine decision principally made known in reference to nations, as seen in the verdict given in favour of Israel against Egypt; afterwards against the nations of Canaan, whom He thrust out for their sakes; then

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against the Assyrians, by destroying their trusts, as seen in this chapter from which my text is taken. Well might Israel say “The Lord is our judge.” A proof that He is judge is seen also in the extinction of powerful nations, as recorded in the Bible and in history. So, likewise, in the case of individuals, though the Divine decision may not be so manifest as in the case of nations, simply because the decision in the case of individuals may be made manifest hereafter; but nations as such do not rise, and are dealt with in their national capacity during their existence as such. Nothing is so high as to be above His rule, nothing so low as to be beneath His care.

II. The next part part of our text tells us that the divine will is the rule of national life, and should be the rule of our individual life, although we many times allow other guides to direct our pathway. Sometimes we allow our passions, inclinations and desires to rule our lives; at other times the maxims of society and other people's example. Yet we must confess that the benevolent will of God, aiming at our happiness here as well as hereafter, is always the safest rule. All others depend on human wisdom, and that being variable would leave us in as much uncertainty as the ancient heathen, who feared to call their tutelary gods by their proper names, for fear their enemies would learn them, and by bestowing more cost upon them, or devotion towards them, than they themselves used, would win them from them. This was a misery, that they were not sure of their gods when they had them. But we are sure of God's constancy, and our only fear should be lest we turn from His will as the rule of our actions. If we accept that Divine will as the rule of life, we shall share in the blessings of that rule—as a nation here, and individually here and hereafter. And to reject that will as the rule of life brings its own punishment to nations here and to individuals here and hereafter. If we wish to test the proof of this, we have only to take the history of the past and trace it up to the present, and we see it written in flaming characters. One instance of this I must mention, as it is seen, I believe, in its intensity at the present day, and is a subject of interest to every loyal subject of our gracious Queen: I refer to the will of God declared to the Israelites when they entered the land of Canaan. The land was inhabited, as you all know, by a people who were then what they are now, “Hewers of wood and drawers of water,” and these they were commissioned to destroy or exterminate from the country. But failing to do so, they turned aside

from the will of God as their guide or rule ; and see the consequences that followed and are still following in their course. The Lord says, in Judges ii. 3 " Because ye have not obeyed My voice, I will not drive them out before you ; but they shall be as thorns in your sides, and their gods shall be a snare unto you." As in Joshua xxiii. 13, " Know for a certainty that the Lord your God will no more drive out any of these nations from before you, but they shall be snares and traps unto you, and scourges in your sides, and thorns in your eyes, until ye perish from off the good land which the Lord your God hath given you." The truth of these declarations is seen in the years during which the Canaanites mightily oppressed Israel in their own country. Notice also that these troubles were generally sent to the Israelites on account of their favoring or associating with the religious practices of these people. In addition to this the Lord tells them that the time will come when they both shall be driven from the land, (Num. xxxiii. 55, 56,) " Those which ye let remain of them shall be pricks in your eyes and thorns in your sides, and shall vex you in the land wherein ye dwell. Moreover, it shall come to pass that I shall do unto you as I thought to do unto them." When the Canaanites left that country, they made their way to Ireland. There need be no doubt on this point, if we can place any confidence either in history or legend. It is also the boast of these people this day. Founded on such veritable evidence, it is not straining the point at all to assert that one element in the population of Ireland is no other than the descendants of the Canaanites. But there is another entirely distinct element in the Irish population, the so-called Norman element, which I believe is certainly Israelitish, and to which we belong. The Canaanite intermingles with the Israelite to day to *prove* him, and well are they fulfilling the prophecy by being " goads and scourges, and thorns to our sides." And what vitality do they give to the description, " Their gods shall be a snare to you." Countenancing their religion, and pandering to their clamor, a so-called Liberal Government has given support, violating, I believe, that constant and unchanging will, and throwing aside the rule which alone can guide to peace and happiness. Our mission now is clear as it was to our forefathers. It is to tear down their altars, instead of allowing them to abolish our Protestant oaths and tests. The nation was not justified in disestablishing the Irish Church for their sakes. It was not justified in endowing Maynooth, nor in giv-

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ing them a voice in Parliament. And the Great Lawgiver is now entering His indignant protest against the violation of His will. Ireland may have wrongs, but they can never be righted by tampering with the idols of Canaan. I do not believe the statement of the Romish bishops, that the slavery, poverty, and hatred in the hearts of that element in Ireland, is to be laid at the door of unjust laws, unfriendly Government officials, or absentee landlords; facts are against it, for there is a less percentage of foreigners holding office in Ireland than in England, Wales, or Scotland. There are other absentees who are draining the money from the poor in Ireland, and giving nothing in return. One-third of the Roman bishops belong to this class, over thirteen hundred of their priests are annually spending that poor people's money in visiting Italy and France for their pleasure. At one time nearly fifteen thousand dollars were wrrenched from these poverty-stricken people, at the last exaction of "Peter's Pence," to support the golden images of the Pontiff at Rome in his thousand-roomed palace. The priests at home lay out their money in land for themselves, that is ex-empted from taxes, which assists in impoverishing the country. More than half-a-million dollars was extracted from these poor people last year on plea of being needed for the liberation of their fathers, mothers, sisters, and brothers from Purgatory, when the Pope might have given the whole 375,000 a free pass for charity sake, if there was a particle of charity in his heart for these poor downtrodden people. These are the greater evils which are causing slavery and poverty. But where does the hatred arise? It has its origin in the existence of a Church, which is a foreign invader, forced upon the people, A.D. 565, by the sword, and acknowledges yet allegiance to a foreign power. The emissaries of that power continue that hatred by continually preaching tirades against the British Government,—a Government whose money educated one-third of the Irish priests, a Government that gave them fifty million dollars in the potato famine. Let the money taken out of the country by this foreign power be spent in land for the poor, and ere long Ireland will be free. But nothing will enterely remove their dislike to England. They will remain to fulfil the prophecy. And the more the nation tampers with that element, the more sops it throws to them, the more lawlessness and anarchy will follow. The only means of restoring peace and removing a condition of things in Ireland which is a disgrace to humanity, is to follow the original direction given by

the Divine Lawgiver ; a means which is at the disposal of the Government, and which has always been successful in restoring peace and order in Ireland, the suspension of the Habeas Corpus Act. Indubitable evidence in proof of this can be found in the facts connected with the condition and treatment of this element in Ireland in the years 1833 and 1872. It may be contrary to the wisdom of man or the feelings of the people as it was in the case of our forefathers ; but it is our duty to accept the next part of our text.

III. The Divine Sovereignty. "The Lord is our King." A King whose dominion extendeth to all things, to every element and every creature, good or bad, in heaven and earth and hell ; and because the Sceptre of His kingdom is a right sceptre, let us earnestly and devotedly pray, "Thy Kingdom come, Thy will be done." And then will follow the last part of our text :

IV. Our assurance and safety. This is the result of accepting the Divine judge, the Divine will, and the Divine Sovereignty. "He will save us." "As he spake by the mouth of His Holy prophets, which have been since the world began, that we should be saved from our enemies and from the hands of all that hate us ; to perform the mercy promised to our forefathers, and to remember His holy covenant ; to perform the oath which he swore to our forefather Abraham that he would give us. That we, being delivered from the hand of our enemies, might serve Him without fear, in holiness and righteousness before Him all the days of our life."

Blessed is the people whose God is the Lord. May that blessing be ours individually and nationally through Christ Jesus. AMEN.

After the sermon a collection was taken up in aid of the Protestant Orphans' Homes in Western Ontario.

After the conclusion of the service, the R. W. Grand Director of Ceremonies re-formed the procession and returned to the Grand Lodge Room at 12.30 o'clock.

That we have carefully examined the Registry of your R. W. Grand Secretary, and compared the same with your R. W. Grand Treasurer's Books, and find that there are a large number of Lodges in arrears, and Dormant Warrants out.

Your Committee have made their statement out upon Lodges who have not paid Grand Lodge dues for three years and upwards, and find as per annexed statement of respective counties that there are

- 110 Lodges who have not paid Grand Lodge Dues for three years and upwards,
- 19 Lodges whose Warrants are in the R. W. Grand Secretary's hands, but charged to their respective counties,
- 53 Lodges whose Warrants have been returned and re-issued, but still stand charged to the counties of original issue,
- 2 Warrants charged, which were never issued.

We, your Committee, would recommend that all the Lodges above referred to, which shall not have paid their Grand Lodge dues on or before the first of June next, be declared dormant, and that the R. W. Grand Secretary notify the County Masters to have such Warrants returned if the Grand Lodge dues are not paid by the private Lodges on or before the fifteenth of May next.

1879, page 53, Grand Lodge Report :

That in cases of appeal to any Lodge of competent jurisdiction, no evidence be allowed other than that furnished by the documents upon which the Lodge is called to decide, and that when it appears to the satisfaction of the Lodge to which the appeal is made, that new evidence has been discovered or required, the matter in dispute to be sent back to the Lodge in which the charge was made, for the taking of such evidence.

1879, page 58 :

That all officers of the M. W. and Provincial Grand Lodges shall be *ex officio* members of all O. Y. B. Lodges, with the right to speak and vote upon all questions before the Lodge, except the distribution of Lodge funds, and all District and District and County Masters in the District and County where the O. Y. B. Lodges are situated, shall have the same right.

1879, page 59 :

That the Lodges of O. Y. B. in any Orange County or District shall not make arrangements for any procession or public display, without first consulting and getting the sanction of said County or District Lodge in which they are situated.

1880, page 46 :

That the Constitution be altered by adding the following clause : "Whenever a member has been suspended for any offence, not a violation of the fundamental principles of the Order, he must be reported to the District Lodge, and from the District to the County Lodge, and not to the Provincial Grand Lodge ; and said County Lodge shall have power to reinstate brethren so suspended on application of private Lodges so suspending, and endorsed by the District Lodge."

1880, page 50 :

That the members attending the meeting of the Grand

Lodge shall enter their names in the Register each day of the session, and the Grand Secretary shall record their names in the report as being present on the days which their names appear on the register.

1880, page 50 :

That the Grand Master of the Grand Black Chapter of British America be, by virtue of his office, accorded a vote and seat on the platform of this Most Worshipful Grand Lodge.

1880, page 51 :

That Rules 95 and 112 of the Constitution be amended, so that after the words Committeemen of private Lodges, said Rules shall read, "or proxy duly appointed in open Lodge, who must be a member of such Lodge.

1880, pages 58, 79, 80, 81, 82 :

Constitution and Laws of the O. Y. B. Association, revised and adopted by the Most Worshipful the Grand Orange Lodge of British America, at its annual meeting, held in the City of Toronto, on the 1st, 2nd and 3rd days of June, 1880 :

1. All applications for Warrants to Establish Orange Young Briton Lodges shall be made by not less than six Orange Young Britons, enclosing six dollars, the fee for the Warrant, three dollars of which shall be paid to the Grand Secretary of the Orange Young Britons, and such application shall be recommended by the Orange District Master of the District where such Lodge is to be held, setting forth the name of the person who is to be Master. In the event of there being no District Master, then the County Master shall discharge that duty. And such applications shall be forwarded through the Orange Young Briton District Master or Orange Young Briton District Deputy Grand Master; or, if there be no such officers, then through the same officer as an application for a Warrant for an Orange Lodge.

2. No candidate under fourteen nor over twenty years of age shall be admitted a member of an Orange Young Briton Lodge.

3. Any member in good standing, having reached the age of twenty-five years, must be struck of the rolls, or become a member of an Orange Lodge, and in such case may remain an honorary member of the Orange Young Britons, with power to speak and vote on all questions, by vote of the Orange Young Briton Lodge.

4. Every Orange Young Briton Lodge shall, on the occasion of any public procession of the Orange Association, have assigned them by the Orange Association a place therein, and they shall march in the place so assigned them; provided, where there is an Orange Young Briton District Lodge all the Lodges composing it shall march as a District in the place so assigned them.

5. A Warrant shall be granted to the Right Worshipful the Grand Lodge of Orange Young Britons, similar to that of the Provincial Grand Orange Lodges.

6. The Masters of Orange Young Briton Private and District Lodges shall have a vote in the Orange County and District Lodges in which their Lodges are situated, provided they have the necessary degrees.

7. The Grand Lodge of Orange Young Britons of British America shall contribute annually such sums as may be required to pay for any printing done for the said Grand Lodge of Orange Young Britons by the Grand Orange Lodge.

8. When a Warrant is issued for holding a Lodge of Orange Young Britons, the Orange District Master, or the County Master where there is no District Master, shall have power to investigate all cases of irregularity which may come to his knowledge, and shall report to the Grand Master of the Orange Young Britons, who shall correct the same in such way and manner as to him may seem meet, subject, however, to an appeal to the Grand Lodge of Orange Young Britons of British America, and from their decision to the Grand Orange Lodge of British America.

9. Any member of an Orange Young Briton Lodge who shall feel himself aggrieved by the decision of his Lodge in any case may appeal to the Orange Young Briton District Lodge, or to the Orange Young Briton District Deputy Grand Master, and any member who may feel himself aggrieved by the decision of the Orange Young Briton District Lodge or the Orange Young Briton District Deputy Grand Master may appeal from their decision to the Grand Lodge of Orange Young Britons of British America, and from their decision to the Most Worshipful the Grand Orange Lodge of British America. The procedure in such cases shall be the same as in cases of appeal in the Orange Association.

10. All Orange Young Briton Lodges shall have power to constitute themselves into Districts with a Grand Lodge, and

to make such By-Laws, Rules and Regulations necessary for the good conduct and internal government of their respective Lodges, as shall not be inconsistent with the Constitution and Laws of the Most Worshipful the Grand Orange Lodge, or the Grand Lodge of Orange Young Britons, or with this Constitution.

11. No member of an Orange Young Briton Lodge shall wear any regalia adopted by the Lodge except in the Lodge-room, or in public procession with the Lodge.

12. The designation, duties, terms of office, time of election, installation and order of procedure in the Orange Young Briton Lodges shall be the same as in the Private Lodges of the Orange Association; provided, that Orange Young Briton District Lodges shall hold their annual meeting for the election of officers on the Monday preceding the day of the annual election of officers in the Orange District Lodges.

13. No meeting of an Orange Young Briton Lodge shall be held in any room of any hotel, tavern, or saloon, nor shall any intoxicating liquors be allowed in any Lodge-room, or be paid for out of the funds of any Orange Young Briton Lodge.

14. Any Orange Young Briton entering a Lodge-room in a state of intoxication shall be expelled, or otherwise dealt with as a majority of the Lodge may decide.

15. Any Orange Young Briton becoming intoxicated, or in any other way misbehaving himself on the Twelfth day of July, or any other day or occasion, or when appearing in a public procession with regalia, shall be expelled, or otherwise dealt with as a majority of the Lodge may determine.

16. The District Master of every Orange District Lodge shall be *ex officio* the Guardian of all Orange Young Briton Lodges within his District. In the event of there being no Orange District Lodge, then the Orange County Master shall have the same power as such District Master.

17. The Rules of the Grand Orange Lodge of British America, as far as practicable, shall apply to regulate and govern the conduct and proceedings of all Orange Young Britons and their Lodges.

18. When any person who is a member of an Orange Young Briton Lodge, is suspended or expelled from any Orange Lodge, the Master of the Orange Lodge from which such person is suspended or expelled, shall notify in writing, under the seal of

the Lodge, the Master of the Lodge, that such person was suspended or expelled from the Association. It shall be the duty of the Master of the Lodge, at their next meeting, to notify the name of the person so suspended or expelled to the Orange Association, and to have any Orange Young Briton so suspended or expelled reinstated in the Orange Association.

19. Not less than thirty days before the transaction of business, the Master of the Lodge shall give notice of the same to the Grand Master of the Orange Association.

20. Should any Orange Young Briton be suspended or expelled from the Grand Master of the Orange Association, the Grand Master of the Orange Association shall be subject to an appeal by the Orange Young Britons of British America, and the Grand Orange Lodge of British America.

21. The Orange Association shall be communicated on by the Grand Orange Association, who shall be the Orange Young Briton County Masters, and the Orange Young Briton District Masters.

22. The Grand Orange Association, Grand Secretary, Grand Treasurer, Grand Master, and Grand Most Worshipful the Grand Orange Lodge, and have the same powers as the Grand Orange Association.

23. The Orange Association, to be called on the officers, and the Grand Most Worshipful the Grand Orange Lodge of British America, shall be the Grand Orange Association.

24. Each and every Orange Young Briton Lodge shall, before the Grand Most Worshipful the Grand Orange Lodge, be bound to the amended obligations of the Grand Orange Association.

the Lodge, the Master of such Orange Young Briton Lodge that such person was suspended or expelled from the Orange Association. It shall be the duty of the Orange Young Briton Lodge, at their next meeting, to strike off the roll of the Lodge the name of the person who was so suspended or expelled from the Orange Association, and he shall not be permitted to enter any Orange Young Briton Lodge or to take part in any Orange Young Briton procession or demonstration, unless he has been reinstated in the Orange Association.

19. Not less than five members shall form a quorum for the transaction of business in any Orange Young Briton Lodge.

20. Should any question arise in the conduct or government of any Orange Young Briton Lodge for which no special provision is made, the instructions of the Right Worshipful the Grand Master of the Orange Young Britons shall be called for, subject to an appeal to the Grand Lodge of Orange Young Britons of British America, and from their decision to the Grand Orange Lodge of British America.

21. The Orange Young Britons' Annual shall be promulgated by the Grand Orange Lodge of British America, and by it communicated only to the Grand Master of the Orange Young Britons, who shall communicate it to the proper officers of the Orange Young Briton Lodges, and to the Orange District and County Masters, for the sole purpose of enabling them to visit the Orange Young Briton Lodges.

22. The Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Grand Chaplain, Grand Secretary, and Grand Treasurer of the Orange Young Briton Grand Lodge shall be *ex officio* members of the Most Worshipful the Grand Orange Lodge of British America; provided always that they are in good standing in some Orange Lodge, and have the required degrees.

23. The Orange Young Briton Association shall have one degree, to be called the Council Degree, to be conferred only on the officers, and such degree shall be approved of by the Most Worshipful the Grand Master of the Grand Orange Lodge of British America.

24. Each and every member of the Orange Young Briton Lodges shall, before the next annual meeting of the Most Worshipful the Grand Orange Lodge of British America, take the amended obligation in their respective Lodges, and in case any Orange Young Briton Lodge neglects or refuses to comply

with this resolution, the Warrant shall be cancelled forthwith by the Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Grand Orange Lodge of British America, and in case any member of an Orange Young Briton Lodge does not comply with the above resolution within the same time, it shall be the duty of the Master of said Orange Young Briton Lodge to strike his name off the roll of his Lodge, and he shall no longer be permitted to enter any Orange Young Briton Lodge.

25. All former Constitutions of the Orange Young Britons are hereby repealed.

26. No change or alteration shall be made in the Constitution of the Orange Young Britons except by a two thirds vote of the Most Worshipful the Grand Orange Lodge, at its annual meeting, nor unless notice thereof shall have been given at the preceding annual meeting.

ORANGE YOUNG BRITONS' OBLIGATION.

I, A—— B——, in the presence of Almighty God, do now of my own free will, voluntarily and solemnly promise and declare that I am and ever will be a sincere Protestant and a true and faithful Supporter of the Unity and Integrity of the British Empire, so far as in my power lieth, so long as that Unity and Integrity shall not be hostile to the Protestant Religion and the laws of this country; that I will inviolably preserve all the secrets of the Order to which I am now to be admitted, as they are at present or may hereafter be communicated to me; the Obligation and Rules I will obey, and its best interests support and maintain to the utmost of my ability and power. I further promise that I am not now nor ever will be a Roman Catholic or Papist, that I am not now nor ever will be married to a Roman Catholic or Papist, nor will I educate my children nor suffer them to be educated in the Roman Catholic Faith, nor in any Roman Catholic institution (if in my power to prevent it); that I never was, to my knowledge or belief, expelled from any Orange or Orange Young Briton Lodge.

I further declare candidate or men do further declare nances of the M for the guidance Lodges, and be e that may be ma organization from Most Worshipful t and that I will the Loyal Orange order of Orange Y and pay all just d the Constitution a true and faithful, i Young Briton, nei wronged or injurec preventing it if in with my Brethren being the anniver King William the All these things Saviour, will enabl
Amen.

I further declare that I will not reject or vote against a candidate or member through personal spite or malice. I do further declare that I will obey all the Rules and Ordinances of the Most Worshipful the Grand Orange Lodge for the guidance and government of Orange Young Briton Lodges, and be ever ready to resist any and every attempt that may be made to separate the Orange Young Briton organization from under the jurisdiction and control of the Most Worshipful the Grand Orange Lodge of British America, and that I will do my utmost to support and maintain the Loyal Orange Association of British America, and the order of Orange Young Britons, obey all its regular summonses, and pay all just dues (if in my power), and observe and obey the Constitution and Laws of the same; that I will always be true and faithful, in all just actions, to every Brother Orange Young Briton, neither wronging him nor knowing him to be wronged or injured without giving him due notice thereof, and preventing it if in my power; that I will, if in my power, meet with my Brethren on the Twelfth day of July in each year, being the anniversary of the victory of our Great Deliverer, King William the Third, over James at the Boyne in Ireland. All these things I trust that God, my Supreme Judge and Saviour, will enable me steadfastly to keep unto my life's end.
