SPOOKS IN MONCTON.

For some time past, says the *Transcript*, there have been reports about extraordinary manifestations at a house out some distance on the Northern line of the I. C. R. occupied by a brackman and his family named the Peppers. The manifestations were reported to be similar to those exhibited in connection with the famous, but now almost forgotten, Amherst mystery, and connected with which Belle Cox was the central figure and actor.

These manifestations were various mysterious knockings about the house, extraordinary movements of furniture, ringing about of books and other articles, including the Bible, and a variety of mysterious noises. The "Father Cox" of the mystery is a little girl about nine years of age, an adopted daughter of Mr. Pepper.

The mystery, so called, apparently assuming very serious proportions and exciting the curiosity of the whole town, was terminated by the fact that the materials for a first class mystery did not exist—in fact, so far as their observation extended, there was no mystery at all, unless it consisted in the fact that so many people should become excited over "manifestations" which betrayed neither mystery nor cleverness.

HEAVY FIRE IN AMHERST.

AMHERST, Sept. 2.—One of the most serious conflagrations Amherst has ever experienced occurred this morning, when Moffat & Smith's large store, the Moffat block, a large three-story building containing four stores, James S. Hickman's store, all wooden structures, and a large number of other buildings, were completely destroyed. The fire was first seen about 2 a. m. in the cellar and back store of Moffat & Smith. The firemen with engine and other appliances were promptly on hand, but the flames had made too much progress to be stopped. Excellent service was, however, done in protecting the neighboring buildings and in delaying the flames so as to give many of the sufferers an opportunity to save a portion of their stocks. The origin of the fire is a complete mystery.

The total loss is estimated to be not less than \$50,000; insurance, about \$20,000.

Atchison Moffat, who owns the main portion of the burnt buildings; Moffat & Smith, who have lost nearly all of a general stock worth \$25,000; Mrs. Douglas, millinery; A. W. Moffat, groceries and provisions; W. J. Moran, dry goods and groceries; the Amherst Boot and Shoe Co. and James S. Hickman, are the principal sufferers. The insurance is distributed among most of the leading companies represented in the Province.

PRISONERS ESCAPE.

DORCHESTER, N. B., Sept. 2. Two prisoners, named respectively Dixon and McQueen, attempted to escape from the penitentiary to day, when on their way to work after dinner they seized two planks and by standing them against the fence made their escape over the wall. They had no sooner gained the outside of the wall than the two guards stationed in the watch towers opened fire upon them, wounding Dixon in three places, when McQueen, thinking discretion the better part of valor, stopped. In the absence of the penitentiary doctor, Dr. Church, who acts in his absence, was called upon to look after Dixon's wounds. The doctor considers the wounds not fatal.

POOR WORKERS, TEXAS, August 31.—Unprecedented rains for August have fallen throughout northern Texas. All the rivers are over their banks and many without are reported. Trains are all delayed. Eleven persons have been drowned at Cleburne, seven of whom belonged to a family named Schmidt.
