**PROTECTION OF GAME**

There has been a good deal said in the Legislature of New Brunswick this year, the necessity of better protection on our game animals and birds. The game law has been amended and several new sections added which will prove of material assistance to the wardens and others engaged in enforcing the law. Surveyor General Grimmer has stated that his main object in amending the game law was to secure better protection. While not disputing this in any way it may be pointed out that the only way in which this can be accomplished is by the appointment of responsible men who have knowledge of woodcraft and a realization of the importance of the duties assigned to them. So far Mr. Grimmer's appointments have not all been of this character. On the contrary the results in one or the most important big game districts of the province have been so unsatisfactory that one chief game warden has been dismissed and another appointed. In another district there has been a large slaughter of beaver and no effective means have been employed to bring the offenders to justice, or to give better protection in the future to these valuable fur bearing animals. Everyone who knows anything about game protection is aware of the difficulties in the way of a rigid enforcement of the laws. Evidence that will convict is always difficult to procure and is generally circumstantial in its character. Because of the vast territory over which moose and caribou roam it would require an army of men to prevent illegal shooting during the open season. Therefore the crown land department is largely dependent on the guides who take parties into the woods to hunt during the open season. If the guides always stand for the enforcement of the law there would be fewer violations to report. There are guides who compel the sportsmen to rigidly adhere to the spirit of the law, but there are others who permit those who engage them to do as they please. Such men should be deprived of their licenses and prevented from going to the woods at all. As all the guides have considerable investments of their own in the woods and the killing of an extra moose by a sportsman is only a matter of a very little danger that the moose or caribou in the country will be killed off by legitimate sports. It is in the spring of the year when the snow is deep and the moose cannot leave their yards that they are in most danger, and require protection from the pot hunters who are always ready to hide of the animal. It has always been the custom to appoint a number of extra wardens at this season, and while it cannot be claimed that all of these appointments were of the right kind there has been no decrease in the moose of this province. Last winter they were reports from Restigouche of the slaughter of moose to supply lumber camps with fresh meat. These reports were well founded. The law as it stands at present provides all the machinery to put an end to this sort of thing and Mr. Grimmer will be expected to see that it is carried out. If he does not, one of the most valuable assets of the province will be lost to us forever. All over the country there is an awakening as to the value of game birds and animals to a country and the necessity for their protection. There is no section of this continent where moose are more plentiful than in New Brunswick. We have a game law which although not perfect, is as comprehensive as any on this continent. All that is required now is that it be enforced and this can only be done by men who understand the habits of the game and the methods employed by those who would evade the law.—Telegraph.

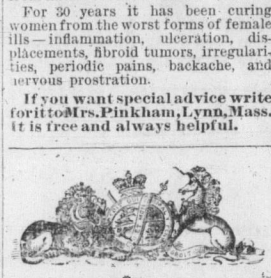

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 15 years old may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any time, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$13.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$350.00.

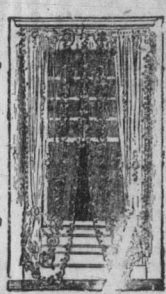

Referring to the North Shore of New Brunswick the booklet mentions the following: The Miramichi, the Nepisquit and Restigouche are world famous salmon rivers, while the deep woods are the haunts of the hunter and the sportsman. The Miramichi, with its pretty towns of Chatham and Newcastle, and villages along the river, is a truly noble river. Bathurst, on the mouth of the Nepisquit, and Dalhousie and Campbellton on the Restigouche are most attractive resorts.
