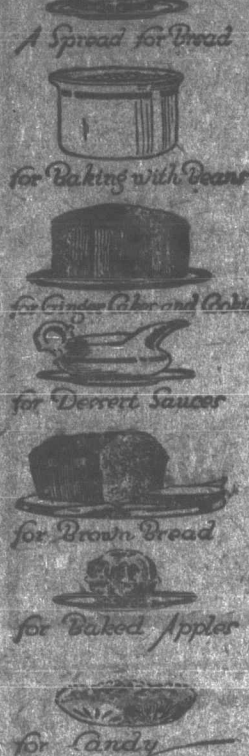

### TOWN ELECTIONS

According to a notice appearing elsewhere in this issue the annual election for Mayor and Aldermen will be held on January 10. Nominations of Candidates will be accepted by the town clerk up to 6 p.m. on January 7.

So far, The Observer has heard of no aspirants for civic honors, either by new candidates or by any of the present honorable board. Various rate payers called at the office to express their views. Not a few are of the opinion that there should be put in the field a ticket favorable to revoking the town charter. Others are in favor of bonding the town for permanent public work. Their theory is that whereas a system of patching up roads has gone on for a hundred years, with the roads no better than at the beginning, the money expended on roads should be in the way of permanent work, and that the streets to receive first attention should be in the Main street of the town. For instance Main street should be entirely rebuilt from the bottom up and covered with tarmac or some other permanent pavement. At the time this work is done, larger water pipes and a sewer of ample size should be laid. The sum at present appropriated to road purposes would pay interest on a large sum of money and leave money for a sinking fund. It is reasonable to assume that during the next twenty-five years the wealth of the town will increase in the same ratio as it has in the last twenty-five years, and when comes the time for redemption of bonds it may be done in part for the accumulated sinking fund and in part by a reissue. Other permanent public work could be carried on in the same way and the town would at once be made a pleasant place to live in, and attractive to those looking for a quiet spot to settle down in life.

With regard to the outgoing council some fault is found that the Mayor and aldermen, with one exception, all live within hailing distance of each other and that the chief expenditures this year have been all made practically along their own street frontage.

### ILLEGAL TO CARRY FIREARMS IN WOODS

Game wardens in various parts of the province have reported that persons have been violating the law by carrying firearms in the woods and pleading ignorance of the law as an excuse. The sections of the law on this subject are as follows:

"Everyone is guilty of an offence and liable to the penalty hereinafter provided, who at any time or season hereafter, in any part of the province:

"(7) Brings or carries, or has in his possession, in or upon any forest, wood or other resort of moose or caribou, any gun or other firearm, between the 30th day of November in any year, and the fifteenth day of September then next following, without first having obtained from the Minister of Lands and Mines, a permit to do so. The like right is hereby given to search for,

seize and confiscate between the said dates, both inclusive, any gun or other firearm in any camp, or other building, situate in any forest, wood or other resort of moose or caribou, or any vehicle or vessel capable of being used for conveyance or transportation by land or water, being in any such forest, wood or other resort."

The penalty provided for bringing firearms into woods or resorts of moose, etc., in close season are: a fine of not more than \$50, nor less than \$10, or imprisonment not longer than twenty-five days nor less than five days.

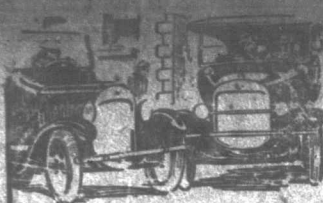

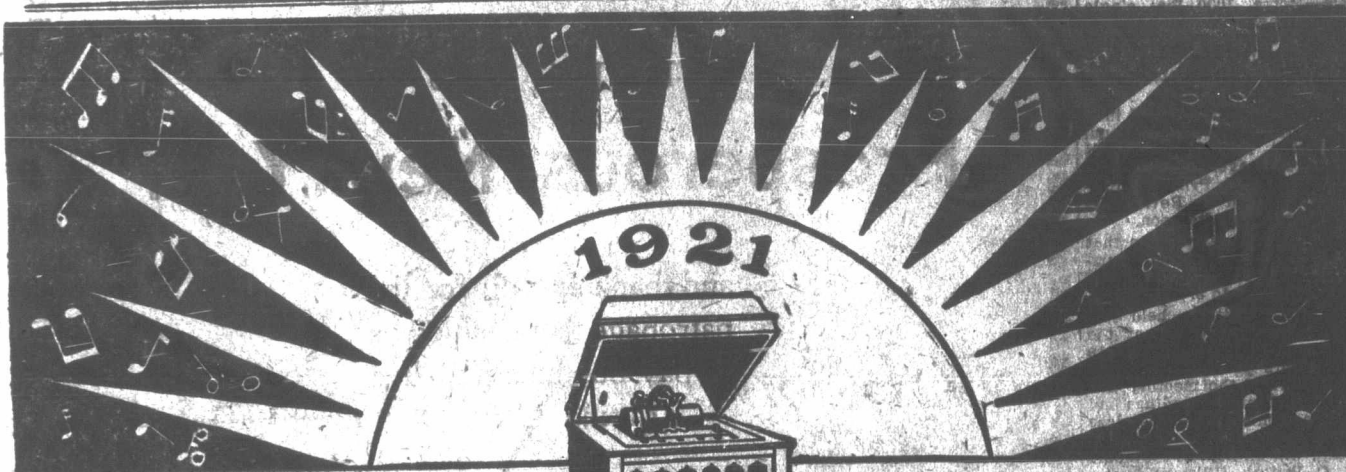

### CARLETON COUNTY POTATO MEN ASK OTTAWA TO HELP

Many Farmers Fear Ruin if Product Shut Out of States

(Telegraph, Dec. 23)

The proposed high duties on potatoes shipped to the United States, if carried out, means a very serious situation for the Carleton county potato growers. The effect of such a step would be far-reaching and every branch of business would be hit hard. There are thousands of bushels of potatoes in Carleton county that cannot possibly be consumed in Canada.

One prominent farmer today said: "If this embargo goes on it means utter ruin and there is no use trying to disguise the fact. There is much uneasiness as, if the American market is closed thousands of bushels of potatoes will simply rot. When it is taken into consideration that it cost nearly \$2 per barrel to raise potatoes last season it will be seen what a tremendous loss will result by the proposed legislation. It is felt that the Canadian Government should take the matter in hand to head off this movement if it is possible to do so. It is all very well to talk of retaliation, but this will not help the present emergency."

A. D. McCain, of Florenceville, who is a heavy shipper, endeavored to have the minister of customs make some move in the matter but the latter either did not realize or misunderstood the situation, as the following telegrams would indicate:

Mr. McCain wired as follows:

"Hon. R. W. Wignmore, Ottawa:

"Newspaper reports state that an embargo or prohibitive tariff is about to be placed on the export of potatoes to the United States. If so, this means complete ruin to this county as there are thousands of bushels to be shipped and there is no possible sale in Canada. Cannot some arrangement be made to stop this procedure? Must act quickly."

(Signed) "A. D. McCain."

The minister of customs replied as follows:

"A. D. McCain, Florenceville, Carleton Co., N.B.:

"Your wire. Canadian government not contemplating placing any restriction on any export of potatoes to the United States."

(Signed) "R. W. Wignmore."

It will be seen that this reply did not cover the present difficulty.

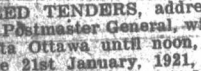
