**CHARLO MILL BURNED FRIDAY**  
 Large Up-to-Date Mill of Continental Lumber Co. With Lumber Destroyed.

About three o'clock Friday afternoon the large lumber mill of the Continental Lumber Co. at Charlo River was discovered to be on fire, and before any steps could be taken to extinguish it, the entire structure was doomed.  
 Fanned by a westerly wind the fire quickly spread to the adjacent buildings and lumber piles, which were soon a mass of flames. The fire fighting equipment was all in the burning mill and little could be done to check the fire.  
 A hurry call was sent to Campbellton and about six o'clock the steam fire engine in charge of a number of the firemen went to the scene, and did noble work in saving lumber piles and the shingle sheds and piles.  
 About seven o'clock the wind turned to the east and for a short time a gale raged, which sent the fire up through the large piles, so that about four fifths of the total quantity was burned.  
 The mill, office, cook house, store, stables and warehouses were destroyed and the scene of a bustling lumber industry is now a smoking ruin.  
 The loss will be one of the heaviest experienced in this county in recent years, but up to present writing no definite figures can be given. The loss is fairly well covered by insurance. St. John agencies are interested in the insurance of the mill and lumber of the Continental Lumber Co., at River Charlo which was destroyed by fire last week to the extent of more than a quarter of a million dollars.

**BOARD OF TRADE HOLDS MEETING**  
 Enthusiastic Opening Meeting of Season Held Tuesday Evening.

A largely attended and enthusiastic meeting of the Board of Trade was held in the Murray Hall Tuesday evening, President Champoux in the chair.  
 President Champoux in a very optimistic address said that he hoped the Board of Trade would meet regularly and work for the best interests of the town. When he visited other towns and cities he saw Boards of Trade doing excellent work. We should be alive to our interests.  
 The matter of a subway from Patterson street to Union street as an extension of Central street was discussed, as was the necessity of increased facilities at the C.N.R. shops here and after a lengthy discussion a committee composed of Messrs. D. A. Stewart, D. Champoux, H. A. Carr, W. H. Miller and W. H. Wallace was appointed to confer with the proper authorities and press for the necessary work.  
 Some other matters were discussed after which the meeting adjourned.

**MR. LaBILLOIS MADE THE OFFER**  
 Wanted \$2500.00 to Withdraw From Contest—Offer Was Turned Down.

To the Electors of the County of Restigouche, Ladies and Gentlemen:—  
 The Tribune of last evening contains the statement that the "Hon. C. H. LaBillois received \$2,500 to lay down in the 1916 election."  
 This is not in accordance with the facts which are as follows:—  
 Early in 1916 Hon. C. H. LaBillois requested that a committee of the Liberal Association meet him. A committee was appointed but a meeting was not arranged.  
 Again in July 1916 Mr. LaBillois met Mr. John Harquail at Dalhousie and commenced to explain for what purpose he wished to meet a committee. Mr. Harquail told him that he was not one of the committee, but if he wished to tell him the circumstances to go ahead.  
 Mr. LaBillois then said that, if the Liberal party wanted to keep him quiet they would have to pay him \$2500.00. Mr. Harquail promised to bring this matter to the attention of the executive of the Association.  
 When Mr. Harquail returned to Campbellton he stated to members of the Liberal Association what Mr. LaBillois would sell himself in this manner. However to corroborate Mr. Harquail's statement a committee of three, viz: John Harquail, John Quinn, and F. M. Anderson, was appointed to wait upon Mr. LaBillois.  
 This committee went by auto on the 13th day of July, 1916 to Mr. LaBillois' home and there met him.  
 Mr. LaBillois there and then put the following proposition "up to the committee."  
 He said that he had mortgages on his property which he wanted to pay off. If the Liberals would pay him \$2500.00 he would not only retire from the local field, but he would come out and work for the liberal candidates.  
 The committee informed him that they had no authority to make any such arrangement.  
 The matter was kept between the committee and a few members of the executive who all expressed regret that Mr. LaBillois had made such a proposition, but agreed that they would never sanction the payment of any money.  
 The above are the true facts of the case, and the result was that Mr. LaBillois took no part in the provincial election of 1917.

**GOOD RECORD OF THE GOVERNMENT**  
 Contrast Conditions of To-Day With Those of Four Years Ago.

If the citizen who ordinarily does not take an active interest in provincial politics will take time to contrast present conditions with those existing four years ago, he or she will have no difficulty in arriving at a right conclusion as to the course to be pursued on Oct. 9th.

The remains were brought by team on Sunday night to his late home on Sugar Loaf street arriving there about 11 p.m. An inquest was held Monday morning, the Coroner's Jury bringing in a verdict of accidental drowning.

## WARM RECEPTION FOR CANDIDATES

Government Supporters Speak to Large Gatherings in County Districts.

Last Saturday evening, Mr. A. T. LeBlanc, M. P. P., accompanied by F. M. Anderson, went to Balmora where a very enthusiastic meeting in the interest of the government party was held. The large school house was filled with electors both men and women and both speakers received a very attentive hearing.

Mr. Anderson made a brief address in English, followed by Mr. LeBlanc in French. The meeting broke up with cheers for LeBlanc.

UPPER CHARLO. Another crowded house greeted Hon. P. J. Venot and the government candidates at Upper Charlo Monday evening. At sharp 7:30 the meeting opened. Mr. LeBlanc announced that because Mr. John C. McLean was disqualified, a new candidate in the person of Mr. S. S. Harrison had been chosen by the delegates from the different parishes. The announcement was received with great applause.

Hon. Mr. Venot delivered addresses in French and English and he was frequently applauded. He made it clear that Messrs. LeBlanc and Harrison were the only accredited candidates running in the interest of the Foster government and that a vote for any other candidate was a vote for the opposition.

Mr. S. S. Harrison entered the hall while Hon. Mr. Venot speaking and received a great ovation.

Mr. LeBlanc also spoke in French and English and Mr. Harrison made a brief address as did Mr. John Harquail. The meeting was very enthusiastic and was attended by a large number of ladies.

SEVEN MILE RIDGE. Mr. A. T. LeBlanc, M. P. P. spoke to a crowded meeting at the Seven Mile Ridge school house Tuesday evening and was most enthusiastic received.

The statement was made there that the people of that district had been informed that Messrs. LeBlanc and LaBillette were the candidates in support of the Foster government. Mr. LeBlanc set this matter clearly before the electors, but it shows to what measures the opposition are resorting to gain a few votes.

## CONSERVATIVES ARE HOPELESS

Hard Effort to Get Candidates to Come Up For Sacrifice—The Ticket.

A convention of the Conservative party was held here Monday evening for the purpose of nominating candidates to contest the coming election.

The meeting was fairly well attended. The matter of nominating candidates was taken up and it was decided to nominate from an open convention.

The name of Mr. D. A. Stewart was first placed in nomination and voted upon. The name of Mr. James E. Stewart was also proposed but he failed to get a majority of votes.

The next was to procure a candidate of French extraction who would offer for the sacrifice. A number of names were proposed but all positively refused until Henry Diotte of Balmora stepped into the breach.

Speeches were next in order after which the meeting adjourned.

The whole tone of the meeting was the utter hopelessness of the fight, but so that the party cause might be bolstered up two men had to offer even though there was no hope of winning.

Mr. McLean's card to the electors is as follows: To the Electors of the County of Restigouche: Ladies and Gentlemen,—

I wish to place before you my reason for returning from the Political Field at so early a date after having been nominated at the government convention held in Campbellton on the 21st.

When I then accepted the nomination which was tendered me unsolicited on my part, it was not till the following day I was aware that under Section 39 of the New Brunswick Election Act, I was disqualified from sitting or voting as a member. The fact that I had entered into a contract with His Majesty some months ago, did not then occur to me. After vainly trying to have this contract cancelled, there remained no other course open to me, but to tender my resignation to the President, and retire from the contest. This I have done and I take this opportunity of thanking my many friends for their confidence and kindly feelings of good will which they have expressed in offering me the Nomination as a supporter of the present government, and I would ask my friends to give the same strong support to Mr. LeBlanc and Mr. Harrison.

FREDERICTON, Sept. 27.—A report upon agricultural conditions in New Brunswick issued by the Provincial Agricultural Department here today says: "The potato market is weak. Cars were being loaded last week in Carleton and Victoria counties at two dollars per barrel. There is not much movement at that price and the tendency is to hold the potatoes for a higher figure, it being generally agreed among the growers that to sell for that price would be to sell at a price that would not cover the actual cost of production."

**A ROMANCE OF THE CANADIAN NORTH.**

*(Toronto Globe.)*

An Anglican missionary-clergyman, Rev. W. F. Walton, has for many years devoted himself to the spiritual and temporal welfare of the Eskimos who live on the eastern shores of James Bay. In the vast solitude of the north, a trip to be taken only in the summer months. It was a journey involving so much preparation and so long an absence from the post of duty that Mr. Walton's visits to the outer world were necessarily infrequent. When Mr. Walton went back a few months ago to his spacious but lonely parish, after a well-earned furlough, during which he placed the needs of the Eskimos before many audiences in Ontario, he had no expectation of returning for years. Saturday's newspapers announced that he had arrived in Toronto again, having covered the distance between Moose Fort and Cochrane by aeroplane in two and a half hours. With close train connections he could have made the entire journey from Moose Fort to Toronto in less than twenty-four hours. The possibilities of man's conquest of the air have seldom been better illustrated so dramatically a manner. Canada's remotest outposts may be brought in future into almost immediate touch with the frontier of settlement.



## PERFORMANCES before PROMISES

All Fair Minded Men and Women can appreciate "BUSINESS GOVERNMENT." Particularly if they have lived under the "Other Kind." Small wonder is it that the Fair Minded Men and Women of New Brunswick, irrespective of Federal Politics, stand firmly behind the Foster Government, now appealing to the people on its record of the last three and one-half years. A very large majority will surely agree that the following summary of concrete accomplishments warrants an extension of power to this business-like government.

1. The government has maintained the financial credit of the province in the markets of the world, reduced the debt on the Valley Railway by \$685,412.66 through sound financing and introduced an independent system of audit which does away with political juggling of financial statements.
2. The revenue from Crown Lands has been increased from \$544,191 in 1916-17 to \$1,425,000 in 1920-20 and vigorous steps have been taken to prevent the forests from fire destruction and the game from extermination.
3. By funding from motor vehicle licenses, sinking fund and interest for Bond Issue for permanent highways were provided and stretches of durable road have been completed this plan also relieving the ordinary road expenditure and making possible attention to many branch roads and roads leading to remote settlements, hitherto long neglected.
4. Agricultural education has been greatly encouraged through increased grants and the provision of special courses and the dairy industry aided by the establishment of co-operative creameries.
5. Through providing credits and conducting an educational campaign the number of sheep has been increased from 140,000 in 1917 to 280,000 in 1920; in fact during the last five years New Brunswick led all Canada in the increase of live stock and this was largely due to the policy of the present government.
6. The government has provided for the erection of a modern limestone powdering plant with the object of making available at a price lower than from any other source ground limestone which is greatly needed on many farms of the province.
7. Through the creation of the Workmen's Compensation Board the laborer is no longer obliged to seek redress in the courts in case of injury and free hospital and medical treatment are also assured him.
8. Far-reaching benefits have been secured through a new Jury Act and amendments to the Succession Duties Act, County Court and Probate Courts Acts.
9. Through the addition of a Department of Public Health, the government has brought New Brunswick from a backward position to the forefront of Canadian provinces as respects the combating of social disease, the gathering of vital statistics, medical examination in schools, has cleared the province of smallpox, rendered nearly the whole school population immune to the disease and established public health as a most important and vital interest of the people.
10. Government grants to teachers have been increased in the interest of education and a Vocational Board created, making possible the opening of Vocational schools in different centres throughout the province.
11. The water powers of New Brunswick have been investigated by a government-appointed commission and tenders for the work on the Musquash and Shogomoc have already been advertised. Reports on other water powers are already available.
12. The government has put in force the Prohibition Act of 1916 and, as provided for by that Act, granted a plebiscite, the result of which may be construed as warranting only changes which make the Act more effective.
13. The government has granted the full provincial franchise to women and has kept in touch with the progressive labor legislation of the present day.
14. The Valley Railway has been completed from Centreville to Westfield and handed over to the C. N. R. for operation according to agreement, the government, however, passing upon the dominion government their duty to take over this burden upon the province as a federal undertaking in the same way that Nova Scotia and the western provinces were relieved through the absorption of the Canadian Northern into the government system.

The foregoing is the record of performance; what of the future? The platform of this capable government is briefly set forth in the concluding paragraphs of Premier Foster's manifesto as follows:

- To give the greatest possible assistance to agriculture in every shape and form:
- To lend most vigorous support to hydro-electric development and to further the same by using the credit and resources of the province in order that the people may have cheapest power and light for their use:
- To continue our policy for the improvement of all the roads of the province, back roads as well as front, farmers' roads as well as those for the use of automobiles, giving an equal policy of fair play to everybody no matter where they live:
- To give further encouragement to education, not only in the common schools of the province, but to vocational education and to agricultural education, so that the young people of New Brunswick will have equal opportunities with the youth of any other province:
- To provide such labor legislation within provincial jurisdiction as may be called for by the findings of the National Industrial Conference and the International Labor Conference:
- To conserve energetically and carefully our timber resources and to give every encouragement to the development of mining areas:
- To continue our policy of protection of public health and give such assistance as we can to hospitals and institutions necessary to provide for those unable to fend for themselves:
- To guard the interests of the people at all times:
- To maintain provincial rights:
- To inquire into the best methods of inducing immigration to the province and to make such arrangements with the other provinces as will be conducive to this:

In appealing for your support, I do so, confident that the record of the government will meet with your approval. I have endeavored to carry out every promise made to the people and have carefully guarded the interests of the province, administering its affairs prudently, honestly and with such impartiality as will, I hope, commend itself to you.

It was necessary, because of some transactions during the period of the preceding administration to hold certain inquiries and investigations. The findings, so far as possible, were dealt with by the legislature and actions arising out of the findings are still before the courts of the country. I hope the days of investigations and royal commissions are over in New Brunswick and the fair name of the province will never again be smirched in the eyes of the rest of Canada.

Reconstruction is going on here as well as in the rest of the world. All must do their part as best they can. Good government is essential; honest government imperative; economical government necessary. It will be the aim of my colleagues and myself to carry out these ideas and so administer provincial affairs as to win your approval.

### THE FRENCH CANADIAN HORSE.

The French Canadian Horse, which is comparatively little known outside the province of Quebec, is claimed to be one of the most durable and otherwise useful horses to be found anywhere in Canada. In bulletin 56 of the Experimental Farms, the author, Mr. Gus Langlois, points out that this breed is descended from the old time French Canadian pony, sent from France to Canada by Louis XIV. These ponies were of the best that could be procured in their native land. They remained for three years the property of the king, and were then distributed among farmers of Canada, in order to encourage the development of agriculture.

Some few years ago the pedigree records for the French Canadian Horse, maintained by the Quebec Government were transferred to the National Live Stock Records. Other steps have been taken to maintain the breed as pure as possible. One of the latest methods, as pointed out in the bulletin which can be obtained from the Publication Branch of the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, has been the establishment of a horse breeding farm at St. Joseph, situated some twenty-five miles east of Quebec City. This farm which is operated under the Experimental Farms system has some thirty well selected brood mares. These, together with fifteen of similar quality kept on the Experimental Station at Cap Rouge, Que., form a collection from which it is hoped to produce a superior new foundation stock for the breed.



### SAY FROM NOW ON PRICES WILL BE DOWNWARD

Ottawa, Sept. 25.—While not disposed to definitely commit themselves officials of the Dominion government in touch with matters affecting the cost of living are disposed to the opinion that the tendency from now on will be downward. They point to the steady decrease in the past few months in wholesale sugar quotations, the prospect of a lower price level for such commodities as flour and milk and the announcement that the peak of the cost of clothing has been reached as sure indications that the five per cent. decrease in the family budget indicated in the September report of the department of labor on prices is likely to be followed by further decreases.

### TO MAKE BRICKS OUT OF RUBBISH.

New Process Discovered in Paris to Utilize Waste Product.

A notable example of conservation is to be found in the scheme just announced by the Paris Municipal Council for the use of the city's rubbish which is gathered daily in trucks from apartments and buildings. It is proposed to use the rubbish for the manufacture of bricks. The rubbish is first broken up into small pieces, then heated and then chemically treated until it forms a pulp, to be mixed with chalk found in abundance near the city.

Special mills have been constructed to transform the garbage pulp into bricks for the reconstruction of homes and streets in the devastated regions. Experiments have proved that such bricks have greater wearing qualities than those of ordinary red clay and can be manufactured at one-tenth the cost. The heating process also releases electricity used in the operating of the garbage destroyers, with a balance left for lighting the streets of one of the city's largest suburbs.

### SUGAR REFINERS REDUCE THE PRICE

Sweet Substance 19 1/2 Cents a Pound in Montreal.

MONTREAL, Sept. 27.—Sugar refiners of this city announced this morning that the price of sugar is to be reduced one and a half cents, the reduction to take place from to-day. This brings the price down to nineteen and a half cents a pound.
