Shipwreck.—The ship Columbus, on her
passage from London to New York, fell in with
ship Leonidas, of Belfast, (Ireland) bound
from Quebec to Dublin. She was water-log-
ged, and the captain and eighteen men had
been eighteen days in the ship's tops, living
on raw meat, and a short allowance of bread;
and without water for eleven days, excepting
the little rain water which they caught.
When taken off by the boats of the Columbus
their provisions were about exhausted, and
some of the men were badly frozen. The
Leonidas was fallen in with in lat. 47, long.
30, on the 21st of Nov.
