### MCKENZIE'S CREAMERY GOING STRONG

Seven hundred patrons are now enjoying the great privileges of a local creamery. The steady increase in the business of McKenzie's Creamery is ample proof of the splendid relations and fair dealings the numerous patrons receive.

The annual collection is being made through the creamery for the National Dairy Council and the Nova Scotia Dairywomen's Association. The assessment is very small, being only 50 cents per head—and the returns as all patrons know, is worth many times more.

The price paid for butter fat during June was one cent higher than that paid in February, which was 37 cent per pound.

65,157 lbs. of butter were manufactured in the month of June. This is sufficient to butter several slices of McGill's bread—and the two make a wonderful combination—for any person that knows quality when they use it. If you want to see a busy spot, just wander down to the creamery, and you will find the busiest hive you ever stepped into. Every body knows and they all seem to enjoy their work very much.

Five big cheques were given out last month, all over one hundred dollars—just think of it. Seems to us it pays to feed cows and dispose of the cream. The lucky ones were: F. H. Ball of Bridgetown, \$158.59; W. A. Curry of Wilmot, \$148.37; A. L. Lee, Auburn, \$120.33; V. B. Leonard, Clarence, \$104.10; H. L. Forsythe, Middleboro, \$103.14. If you are not in the dairy business, just read the amounts of the cheques over again, and ponder a bit.

The high tests went to Rufus W. Connor, Digby, 55 per cent; Freeman Schofield, Canby, 52 per cent, and A. H. Harris, Nictaux Falls, 50 per cent.
