Seven hundred patrons are now enjoying the great privileges a local creamery affords. The steady increase in the business of McKenzie's Creamery is ample proof of the splendid relations and fair dealings the numerous patrons receive.

The annual collection is being made through the creamery for the National Dairy Council and the Nova Scotia Dairywomen's Association. The assessment is very small—being only 50 cents per head—and the returns as all patrons know, is worth many times more.

The price paid for butter fat during June was one cent higher than that paid in February, which was 37 cent per pound.

65,157 lbs. of butter were manufactured in the month of June. This is sufficient to butter several slices of McGill's bread—and the two make a wonderful combination—for any person that knows quality when they need it.
