The resignation by Rev. Dr. Thompson of the charge of the Proof line congregation was accepted, to take effect on the last Sabbath of the year. Rev. F. Ballantyne was appointed moderator during the vacency.

THE YEAR'S RECORD.

The annual meeting of the Board of Water Commissioners was held last evening, when the reports of the fiscal year just closed were read and adopted. 




